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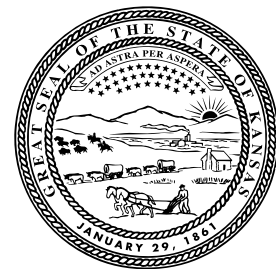

Notice of Commencement of Negotiations for Construction Manager At-Risk Services

Pursuant to K.S.A. 76-7,125 et seq., notice is hereby given for the seeking of interest and qualifications for Construction Management At-Risk (CMAR) services for the Wichita State University (WSU) Wilkins Stadium Expansion Project – Phase 1. The Wilkins Stadium Phase 1 expansion project is part of a larger master plan for the existing 5,500 square foot softball stadium that was built in 1998. Phase 1 will be split into two phases to maintain access to the existing outdoor batting cages during construction. Phase 1A of construction is a new indoor practice facility (approximately 14,400 general square feet) located on the west side of the stadium adjacent to the Heskett Center. The indoor

practice facility includes a full infield, nets to divide the field into batting cages, and a storage area. Phase 1B is a team facility (approximately 12,000 general square feet) that will be built immediately south and contiguous to the indoor practice facility. The team facility will include a new locker room, coach's locker room, classroom, team room, athletic training room, staff offices, break room, work room, and team laundry room.

Construction costs are estimated at \$7.4 million.

The construction manager at-risk will provide for each phase: cost estimating, scheduling, constructability reviews, and value engineering studies; procure equipment, prequalify subcontractors, and take bids; review bids with the design team and owner to determine bids to accept; prepare cost estimate(s) for the un-bid portion(s); provide a guaranteed maximum price and a bond; and manage construction and track all costs for the design team and owner's review.

The written request must be submitted to Donald Dyster Jr., KDHE BOA, 1000 SW Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, KS 66612-1366, no later than 12:00 p.m. Monday, April 15, 2024, in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has a 45-day review period, which will start concurrently with the public comment period, within which to object to the proposed permit. If the EPA has not objected in writing to the issuance of the permit within the 45-day review period, any person may petition the administrator of the EPA to review the permit. The 60-day public petition period will directly follow the EPA's 45-day review period. Interested parties may contact KDHE to determine if the EPA's 45-day review period has been waived.

Any such petition shall be based only on objections to the permit that were raised with reasonable specificity during the public comment period provided for in this notice, unless the petitioner demonstrates that it was impracticable to raise such objections within such period, or unless the grounds for such objection arose after such period. Executive Order 24-01

Proclaiming States of Drought for Kansas Counties

WHEREAS, the Director of the Kansas Water Office has informed me, pursuant to K.S.A. 74-2608, of drought conditions within the state;

WHEREAS, there is every indication that drought conditions are present across the state;

WHEREAS, the Kansas Emergency Management Act (K.S.A. 48-924, et seq.) states that the Governor shall be responsible for meeting the dangers to the state and its people from disasters, and specifically authorizes drought proclamations such as this to address drought conditions; and

WHEREAS, Director of the Kansas Water Office, in consultation with the Governor's Drought Response Team, is authorized to upgrade a county to emergency status, as the need arises;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas and K.S.A. 48-924(e), I hereby:

1. Declare a Drought Watch, Drought Warning or Drought Emergency for the counties below:

- a. **Drought Watch counties:** Allen, Anderson, Atchison, Barton, Bourbon, Brown, Butler, Chase, Cherokee, Cheyenne, Cloud, Coffey, Cowley, Crawford, Decatur, Doniphan, Douglas, Ellis, Ellsworth, Franklin, Geary, Gove, Greenwood,

Jackson, Jefferson, Johnson, Kingman, Labette, Lane, Leavenworth, Lincoln, Linn, Lyon, Marion, Marshall, Miami, Morris, Nemaha, Neosho, Ness, Norton, Osage, Phillips, Pottawatomie, Pratt, Rawlins, Republic, Riley, Russell, Saline, Sedgwick, Shawnee, Sheridan, Sherman, Smith, Stafford, Thomas, Trego, Wabaunsee, Washington, Woodson, Wyandotte.

- b. Drought Warning counties: Chautauqua, Clay, Dickinson, Elk, Graham, Harvey, Jewell, McPherson, Mitchell, Montgomery, Osborne, Ottawa, Reno, Rice, Rooks, Wilson.
 - c. Drought Emergency counties: None
2. Authorize and direct all agencies under the jurisdiction of the Governor to implement the appropriate Watch, Warning or Emergency level drought response actions assigned to them in the Operations Plan of the Governor's Drought Response Team.

 4. Rescind Executive Order 23-04 upon Executive Order 24-01 becoming effective.

**Article 2.—AMBULANCE SERVICES;
PERMITS AND REGULATIONS**

109-2-2. Application for ambulance service permit and ambulance license; permit renewal and license renewal. (a)(1) Any applicant for an ambulance service permit may apply for only one ambulance service permit for each ambulance service that the applicant seeks to operate.

(2) Any applicant for an ambulance license may apply for only one ambulance license for each ambulance that the applicant seeks to operate.

(continued)

(3) Any operator may apply for a temporary license for an ambulance. Each temporary license shall be valid for 60 days. Any temporary license may be extended by the executive director.

(b) All initial and renewal applications for an ambulance service permit and for an ambulance license shall be submitted through the online license management system.

(c) Each applicant who submits an insufficient application for an ambulance service permit or ambulance license shall have 30 days to correct all identified deficiencies and submit a sufficient application. If the applicant or operator fails to correct the deficiencies and submit a sufficient application, the application may be considered by the board as withdrawn.

(d) Each application shall be deemed sufficient if both of the following conditions are met:

(1) The applicant or operator submits all requested information, and no additional information is required by the board to complete the processing of the application.

(2) The applicant or operator submits payment of the fee in the correct amount.

(e) Each initial application for an ambulance service permit shall meet the following requirements:

(1) Specify the name of the operator;
 (2) specify the name of the ambulance service;
 (3) designate an ambulance service director;
 (4) designate a medical director;
 (5) designate an office address where all ambulance service records will be maintained;

(6) state the primary territory for which the permit is sought;

(7) designate the type of ambulance service being requested as either ground ambulance service or air ambulance service;

(8) designate the levels of service intended to be provided;

(9) include a copy of all operational policies;
 (10) include a copy of all approved medical protocols;
 (11) include a listing of all EMS providers and health care providers affiliated with the ambulance service;

(12) include a listing of all station locations where an ambulance could be parked or stored;

(13) provide the location and physical description of the facility where calls for service will be received;

(14) provide a description of each vehicle being used by the ambulance service to include the year, make, and model of the vehicle, and the primary use of the vehicle; and

(15) if the type of ambulance service being requested is for an air ambulance service, provide evidence of an air safety training program and an informational publication that meets all requirements of K.A.R. 109-2-10a.

(f) Each initial application for a ground ambulance license shall include the following:

(1) A copy of the mechanical or safety inspection without deficiencies submitted on forms required by the board or documentation from the manufacturer indicating that the vehicle has undergone a predelivery inspection without deficiencies;

(2) proof of state vehicle registration; and

(3) a copy of the list of supplies and equipment carried on the ambulance as approved by the medical director.

(g) Each initial application for an air ambulance license shall include the following:

(1) A copy of the valid standard airworthiness certificate;

(2) proof of aircraft registration with the federal aviation administration; and

(3) a copy of the list of supplies and equipment carried on the ambulance as approved by the medical director.

(h) Each ambulance service permit and ambulance license that is not temporary shall expire on April 30 of each year. Any such permit or license may be renewed annually in accordance with this regulation.

(i) Each renewal application for an ambulance service permit shall meet the following requirements:

(1) The operator shall affirm that the following information is current and accurate:

(A) Name of the ambulance service;

(B) personnel affiliated with the ambulance service, including the service director, medical director, EMS providers, and health care providers;

(C) office address where all ambulance service records shall be maintained;

(D) levels of service being provided;

(E) ambulance service's operational policies;

(F) ambulance service's approved medical protocols;

(G) description of all vehicles being used by the ambulance service to include the year, make, and model of the vehicle, and the primary use of the vehicle;

(H) all station locations where the ambulance service's ambulances could be parked or stored;

(I) location and physical description of the facility where calls for service will be received;

(J) the entry of all requests for service for the previous calendar year into the board's data collection system; and

(K) for an air ambulance service, the ambulance service's air safety training program and informational publication.

(2) The operator shall provide the following emergency medical service information to the board:

(A) The gross receipts received by the ambulance service during the previous calendar year from the provision of patient care;

(B) the ambulance service operating budget and, if any, the tax subsidy;

(C) the charge for emergency and nonemergency patient transports, including mileage fees;

(D) the number of full-time, part-time, and volunteer staff; and

(E) the odometer reading for each vehicle being used by the ambulance service.

(j) Each application for renewal of an ambulance license shall meet the following requirements:

(1) The operator shall affirm that the following information is current and accurate:

(A) List of supplies and equipment carried on the ambulance; and

(B) the primary location where the ambulance is parked or stored.

(2) For a ground ambulance, the application shall include both of the following:

(A) Proof of valid state vehicle registration if not permanently registered; and

(B) proof of a mechanical and safety inspection completed after November 1 indicating no deficiencies that would compromise the safe transport of patients.

(3) For an air ambulance, the application shall include proof of valid aircraft registration with the federal aviation administration.

(k) A mechanical and safety inspection for each ground ambulance shall be completed by a person doing business as or employed by a vehicle maintenance service or from a certified mechanic as defined in K.A.R. 109-1-1. Proof of this inspection shall be demonstrated by submitting one of the following:

(1) A completed mechanical and safety inspection form, as provided by the board; or

(2) documentation of regular service and preventative maintenance equivalent to or exceeding the requirements of the mechanical and safety inspection form provided by the board. Article 8.—LIQUEFIED PETROLEUM GASES

22-8-5. Application and drawings. (a) Each LP gas marketer who wants to construct an LP gas facility or make a major modification to an existing liquefied petroleum gas facility shall submit an application, on a form provided by the state fire marshal's office, with drawings to the state fire marshal's office as specified in this regulation. If required, the marketer shall send a copy of the drawings to the local authority having jurisdiction before the marketer begins the construction or a major modification.

(b) Each application shall be accompanied by drawings, which shall be made to scale on paper no larger than 11 inches by 17 inches. The tank drawings and site plan shall be clear and readable and shall show all dimensions. The applicant shall submit the application and drawings and shall obtain approval from the state fire marshal before the construction of, or any major modification to, any of the following:

(1) Any bulk storage or transfer facility with an aggregate water capacity of more than 2,000 gallons;

(2) any tank installed for the retail sale of LP gas through dispenser devices;

(3) any portable cylinder storage and filling facility;

(4) any vehicle fuel dispensing station;

(5) any facility where the handling or use of liquefied petroleum gas is undertaken; or

(6) any liquefied petroleum gas service station.

(c) The construction or major modification of any liquefied petroleum gas facility with an aggregate water capacity exceeding 2,000 gallons shall not commence until the application and drawings are reviewed and approved by the state fire marshal.

(d) The requirement to submit drawings for approval shall be in addition to any local jurisdiction's zoning or permit approval requirements and any additional local requirements.

(e) All submitted drawings shall include the following information:

(1) The name of the person, firm, or corporation planning the new or modified LP gas facility, the location of the proposed facility, and the location of the adjacent streets or highways;

(2) for bulk plants, the location of the plot of ground to be utilized and its immediate surroundings, including any structures of value located on adjacent properties within 100 feet of the property line on all sides, and the complete layout of the buildings, tanks, point-of-transfer operations, driveways, and dispensing equipment;

(3) the location, capacity, and dimensions of each tank; the types, sizes, and locations of all valves, including hydrostatic relief and emergency shutoff valves; the location of all lines and pumps; the location of the plot of ground to be utilized; and the complete layout of the buildings, driveways, and dispensing equipment;

(4) the type, size, and location of all appliance piping located below ground and connected to aboveground equipment;

(5) for underground storage, the location and capacity of each tank, the class and name of the liquid to be stored in each tank, and the location of the fill openings, gauges, vent pipes, valves, and regulators; and

(6) all details specifically requested in the application. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 55-1810; effective, E-82-28, Dec. 22, 1981; effective May 1, 1982; amended May 1, 1983; amended March 31, 2006; amended March 29, 2024.)

Article 18.—EDUCATIONAL OCCUPANCIES

22-18-2. Fire drills, tornado drills, and crisis drills in public and private educational institutions. (a) Each administrator of a public or private educational institution, except a community college, college, or university, shall conduct at least four fire drills each school year. Each fire drill shall be conducted during school hours at a time other than the regular dismissal time at the close of the day's session. Each fire drill shall be unannounced and shall be conducted by the use of the regular fire alarm system. Each fire drill shall include all floors, wings, and sections of each building. Each person shall vacate the building they are occupying during the fire drill, and teachers and administrators shall accompany their pupils from the buildings and account for each pupil within their authority. Each administrator of a public or private educational institution or a school district shall ensure that the fire drills are con-

(continued)

ducted and that accurate records of the drills are kept on forms provided by the state fire marshal and posted in a conspicuous location.

(b) Each administrator of a public or private educational institution, except a community college, college, or university, shall conduct at least two tornado drills during each school year. Each tornado drill shall be conducted during school hours at a time other than the regular dismissal time at the close of the day's session. Each tornado drill shall be unannounced and shall be conducted using a means of alerting that is different from the fire alarm and crisis alarm. Each tornado drill shall include all floors, wings, and sections of each building, and each person in the building shall take refuge in a designated tornado safety area. An administrator shall determine the areas to be used for tornado refuge and shall work with the local emergency management coordinator or emergency manager, in locales where one is available, to establish tornado safety procedures. Each superintendent of a public or private educational institution or a school district shall ensure that the tornado drills are conducted and that accurate records of the drills are kept on forms provided by the state fire marshal and posted in a conspicuous location.

(c) Each administrator of a public or private school, except a community college, college, or university, shall conduct at least three crisis drills during each school year. Each crisis drill shall be conducted during school hours at a time other than the regular dismissal time at the close of the day's session. Each crisis drill shall be unannounced and shall be conducted using a means of alerting that is different from the fire and tornado alarms. Each crisis drill shall include all floors, wings, and sections of the building.

(d) Upon written request from an administrator pursuant to K.S.A. 31-136 and amendments thereto, a variance in the number or manner of drills conducted pursuant to this regulation may be granted by the state fire marshal for students receiving special education or related services at that school. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 31-133; effective May 1, 1979; amended March 29, 2024.)

22-18-3. Construction requirements for school buildings. (a) The construction of each school building shall meet the requirements of the international building code, which is adopted by reference in K.A.R. 22-1-3. All electric wiring shall conform to the requirements of the national electric code of the national fire protection association, which is adopted by reference in K.A.R. 22-1-3.

(b) The construction of each mobile, modular, portable, or relocatable school building shall meet the requirements of the life safety code, which is adopted by reference in K.A.R. 22-1-3. Article 47.— ELECTION AUDITS

7-47-1. Postelection audit implementation. The requirements of this regulation shall not apply to local question elections or mail-ballot elections pursuant to K.S.A. 25-431 through 25-441 and amendments thereto.

(a) As used in K.S.A. 25-3009 and amendments thereto, the term "unofficial election night returns" shall include ballots cast and counted on election day, ballots cast in advance and counted on election day, and ballots cast by means of the uniformed and overseas citizens absentee voting act (UOCAVA) procedures and counted on election day. This term shall not include any ballots cast that are challenged or marked as provisional or any ballots that are cast in advance and received after election day.

(b) Each county election officer shall complete the training provided by the secretary of state. As specified in K.S.A. 25-3009 and amendments thereto, each county election officer shall provide training to the election board conducting the postelection audit. The training shall include the identification of voter intent specific to the vote-casting technologies in use across Kansas.

(c)(1) An auditable race and precinct shall be a race and precinct meeting the requirements in K.S.A. 25-3009, and amendments thereto, for an audit to be conducted. The random selection of races and precincts shall take place in a public setting, and the procedure to randomize the selection of races and precincts shall be determined solely by each county election officer and the secretary of state but must use a physical random method and not an electronic random number generator. Upon completion of the audit, each election board shall transmit to the secretary of state and the county election office the results of the audit no later than 48 hours before the meeting of the county board of canvassers.

(2) In even-year elections, within 24 hours of the closing of the final polling location in Kansas, the list of randomly selected races to be audited shall be transmitted by the secretary of state to each county election officer. Each county election officer shall examine each race in the order specified until an auditable race is determined. Each county election officer shall then randomly select one percent of the total county precincts from the subset of auditable precincts. If no contested race exists, the election board shall audit the first race listed.

(3) In odd-year elections, each county election officer shall randomly select the races and then each precinct to be audited.

(d) Ballot images may not be used for the manual audit. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 25-3009 and K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 25-2912; effective, T-7-6-26-19, June 26, 2019; effective Sept. 27, 2019; amended Oct. 13, 2023; amended T-7-3-5-24, March 5, 2024.)

111-501-113. How to play. (a) Midi-Baccarat is played with eight decks of 52 standard playing cards. Each card shall only be used for one hand of play after which it is removed from any further play. The players may place a wager on either the bank's hand, the player's hand, or on a tie between the player's and the bank's hands.

(b) Two cards are dealt face down to the player's hand without exposing the cards to any player. The dealer shall then pass the two cards comprising the player's hand to the seated player who has placed the highest player bet on that hand, without exposing the cards to any other player. In the event two or more players have made the highest player bet on that hand, the cards shall be passed to the first player seated clockwise from the dealer with the highest player bet for that hand, and will alternate when the next hand is dealt if more than one player has again made the highest player bet. Players may decline to touch the cards, in which case the cards will be passed to the next player seated clockwise from the dealer who has made the same or the next highest player bet. The player who received the cards may look at and otherwise handle the cards and then return them to the dealer. The dealer shall then place the cards face up on the table layout and announce the total of the two cards. If all players decline to touch the cards, the dealer shall then place the cards face up on the table layout and announce the total of the two cards.

(c) Two cards are then dealt face down to the bank's hand without exposing the cards to any player. The dealer shall then pass the two cards comprising the bank's hand to the seated player who has placed the highest banker bet on that hand, without exposing the cards to any other player. In the event two or more players have made the highest bank bet on that hand, the cards shall be passed to the first player seated clockwise from the dealer with the highest bank bet for that hand, and will alternate when the next hand is dealt if more than one player has again made the highest bank bet. Players may decline to touch the cards, in which case the cards will be passed to the next player seated clockwise from the dealer who has made the same or the next highest bank bet. The player who received the cards may look at and otherwise handle the cards and then return them to the dealer. The dealer shall then place the cards face up on the table layout and announce the total of the two cards. If all players decline to touch the cards, the dealer shall then place the cards face up on the table layout and announce the total of the two cards.

(d) A third card may be drawn by either side subject to the rules herein, with the player's hand acting first. If the player's hand receives a third card, the dealer shall pass the one additional card to the same seated player, if any, who touched the first two player's hand cards, without exposing the card to any other player. The player who received the card may look at it and then return it face down to the dealer. The dealer shall then place the card face up on the table layout and announce the new total of the three player's hand cards. If all players declined to touch the first two cards as provided in subsection (b), no player

shall be permitted to touch the third card and the dealer shall place the third card face up on the table layout and announce the total of the three cards. If the bank's hand receives a third card, the dealer shall pass the one additional card to the same seated player, if any, who touched the first two bank's hand cards, without exposing the card to any other player. The player who received the card may look at it and then return it face down to the dealer. The dealer shall then place the card face up on the table layout and announce the new total of the three bank's hand cards. If all players declined to touch the first two cards as provided in subsection (c), no player shall be permitted to touch the third card and the dealer shall place the third card face up on the table layout and announce the total of the three cards. Neither the player side nor the bank side will ever have more than three cards.

(e) If on any hand no player has placed a bet on the player's hand, then the dealer shall not pass any cards to any player but instead shall skip to that step in the dealing procedure as stated hereinabove in subsections (b), (c) and (d) wherein the dealer places the card or cards face up on the table layout and announces the total or new total of the player's hand.

(f) If on any hand no player has placed a bet on the bank's hand, then the dealer shall not pass any cards to any player but instead shall skip to that step in the dealing procedure as stated in subsections (c) and (d) hereinabove wherein the dealer places the card or cards face up on the table layout and announces the total or new total of the bank's hand.

(g) When a player has placed a bet on the bank's hand and no other player has placed a bet on the player's hand, upon request by that player and approval from the table games supervisor or higher ranking casino official, the player's hand will not be turned face up until the bank's hand is turned face up.

(h) When a player has placed a bet on the bank's hand and no other player has placed a bet on the player's hand, upon request by that player and approval from the table games supervisor or higher ranking casino official, only one of the cards from the player's hand will be turned face up before the bank's hand is turned face up.

(i) At no time shall more than one player have physical possession of a hand of cards nor shall any action be taken until that hand of cards is returned to the dealer.

(j) The winning hand is the one with the point count closest to nine, after all cards are dealt. Each "10" card, the sum of cards totaling 10, and the jack, queen and king card all count as zero points. Aces count only as one point, and numbered cards 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 count as their respective face value. If the point count total is a two-digit number, only the last digit is utilized when determining the hand with a point count closest to a total of nine.

(k) If either the player or the bank has a total point count of 8 or 9 on the first two cards, no further cards are drawn, the hand totaling 8 or 9 is declared a natural, and unless there is a tie the hand totaling 8 or 9 is announced the winner.

(l) If the player's hand has a point count total of 5 or less, a third card will be drawn unless the bank wins with a natural.

(continued)

(m) If the player's hand does not draw a third card, then the bank's hand stands on a hand having a point count total of 6 or more and draws a third card on a hand having a point count total of 5 or less.

(n) If the player's hand does draw a third card, then the bank's hand draws according to the third card rules of Midi-Baccarat.

(o) The highest point count closest to 9 wins the hand, and if both hands are equally close to a point count total of 9 the hand shall be declared a tie.

(p) The bank and player hands are even money bets that pay odds of 1 to 1.

(q) There is an optional tie bet that pays odds of 8 to 1. The tie bet is a separate bet wagered before the cards are dealt.

(r) A commission or vigorish shall be collected out of the wagers on each winning bank hand, which commission shall be equal to five percent of the amount wagered on that winning bank hand. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-8710 and K.S.A. 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-18-12, Aug. 15, 2012; amended, T-111-1-31-24, Jan. 10, 2024.)

111-501-155. Midi-baccarat 5 treasures and eternal baccarat bonus bet. (a) The 5 treasures baccarat bonus may be offered for play in the game of midi-baccarat. The 5 treasures baccarat bonus offers several optional side bets with separate pay tables. The pay tables shall be posted on the midi-baccarat table.

(b) Rules for the 5 treasures baccarat bonus bet are as follows:

(1) Players must make a standard midi-baccarat wager in order to make a 5 treasures baccarat bonus bet;

(2) 5 treasures baccarat bonus bet limits will be posted at the table and must be made in \$5 increments; and

(3) 5 treasures baccarat bonus bets must be placed within the designated betting area on the game table.

(c) There are five optional wagers on the 5 treasures baccarat bonus as follows:

(1) Fortune 7 wins if the banker's outcome is a three-card total of seven and pays odds of 40 to 1.

(2) Golden 8 wins if the player's outcome is a three-card total of eight and pays odds of 25 to 1.

(3) Heavenly 9 wins if either the banker's outcome or the player's outcome is a three-card total of nine and pays odds of 10 to 1. Heavenly 9 wins if both the banker's outcome and the player's outcome are three-card totals of nine and pays odds of 75 to 1.

(4) Blazing 7 wins if both the banker's outcome and the player's outcome are two-card totals of seven and pays odds of 50 to 1. Blazing 7 wins if both the banker's outcome and the player's outcome are three-card totals of seven and pays odds of 200 to 1.

(5) The cover all bonus wins if any one or more of the separate bonus wagers in sections (c)(1), (c)(2), (c)(3) or (c)(4) wins. The cover all bonus wager pays odds of 6 to 1. The cover all bonus may be played alone. Players are not required to place a separate bonus wager in order to win the cover all bonus wager.

(d) Dealing procedures for the 5 treasures baccarat bonus shall be as follows:

(1) Players must make the standard midi-baccarat wager and, if desired, the optional 5 treasures baccarat bonus bet before the dealer reveals any of the cards.

(2) The dealer will collect and pay standard wagers first, and then the optional 5 treasures baccarat bonus bet of each player before moving to the next player position.

(e) A commission shall not be charged on winning 5 treasures baccarat bonus bets.

(f) The eternal baccarat bonus may be offered for play in the game of midi-baccarat. The eternal baccarat bonus offers several optional side bets with separate pay tables. The pay tables shall be posted on the midi-baccarat table.

(g) Rules for the eternal baccarat bonus bet are as follows:

(1) Players must make a standard midi-baccarat wager in order to make an eternal baccarat bonus bet;

(2) Eternal baccarat bonus bet limits will be posted at the table and must be made in \$5 increments; and

(3) Eternal baccarat bonus bets must be placed within the designated betting area on the game table.

(h) There are five optional wagers on the eternal baccarat bonus, as follows:

(1) Sun 7 wins if the banker's outcome is a three-card total of seven and pays odds of 40 to 1.

(2) Moon 8 wins if the player's outcome is a three-card total of eight and pays odds of 25 to 1.

(3) Supreme 7 wins if both the banker's outcome and the player's outcome is a three-card total of seven and pays odds of 200 to 1. Supreme 7 also wins if both the banker's outcome and the player's outcome are two-card totals of seven and pays odds of 50 to 1.

(4) Divine 9 wins if both the banker's outcome and the player's outcome are three-card totals of nine and pays odds of 75 to 1. Divine 9 also wins if either the banker's outcome or the player's outcome is a three-card total of nine and pays odds of 10 to 1.

(5) The eclipse bonus wins if any one or more of the separate bonus wagers in sections (h)(1), (h)(2), (h)(3) or (h)(4) wins. The eclipse bonus wager pays odds of 6 to 1. The eclipse bonus may be played alone. Players are not required to place a separate bonus wager in order to win the eclipse bonus wager.

(i) Dealing procedures for the eternal baccarat bonus shall be as follows:

(1) Players must make the standard midi-baccarat wager and, if desired, the optional eternal baccarat bonus bet before the dealer reveals any of the cards.

(2) The dealer will collect and pay standard wagers first, and then the optional eternal baccarat bonus bet of each player before moving to the next player position.

(j) A commission shall not be charged on winning eternal baccarat bonus bets. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-8710 and K.S.A. 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-6-1-22, May 11, 2022; amended, T-111-7-27-22, July 13, 2022; amended, T-111-9-25-23, Aug. 16, 2023; amended, T-111-1-31-24, Jan. 10, 2024.)
