The Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) is seeking the services of a consulting firm for the KDOT guardrail set-aside program which is a program to remove/replace all blunt end guardrail terminals on the National Highway System (NHS) in Kansas. KDOT conducted a mainline NHS blunt end guardrail inventory and data collection was completed and reviewed in February 2019. The new inventory has approximately 1,639 remaining blunt end guardrail terminals and were separated in four tiers based upon traffic volumes and speed limits. This advertisement is for Tier 1 (22 sites) and Tier 2 (241 sites). This could be a multi-phase agreement. Phase I will include site visits and recommendations. Consultant will develop the scope, schedule, and budget for each site in coordination with Road Design and Program Project Management. Phase I is to be completed by December 13, 2019. Phase II, if added, will include preparation of construction drawings and summary memos for construction letting. Additional phases may be added as needed as the program progresses.

Qualifications-Based Selection Process

Based on the qualifications submitted and other information available to KDOT, on or about August 16, 2019 KDOT will shortlist three to five firms and notify all firms submitting Letters of Interest of the names of the shortlisted firms by return email. Thereafter, KDOT will issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) to the shortlisted firms soliciting a technical proposal. Shortlisted firms may be asked to attend meetings or participate in other discussions with KDOT regarding the project. Technical proposals will be evaluated on the basis of 1) the quality of the response to the RFP; 2) qualifications and experience of consultant personnel proposed for services; 3) proposed approach to performance of services; and 4) past performance history. In the event KDOT cannot reach agreement with the highest ranked firm, it will terminate negotiations with such firm and commence negotiations with the next highest ranked firm, and so on, until either agreement is reached for a satisfactory scope of services for a fair and reasonable price, or KDOT decides to pursue other alternatives. KDOT intends to conclude or terminate negotiations on or before September 20, 2019.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) received a Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) permit renewal application for hazardous waste treatment and storage from Safety-Kleen Systems, Inc., the operator and owner of the facility located at 1311 S. Anna, Wichita, Kansas. KDHE is providing notice of their intent to renew the Safety-Kleen RCRA permit, EPA identification number KSD000809723.

The permit will allow Safety-Kleen, Inc. to receive hazardous waste via road in both bulk and containers from

off-site generators and other hazardous waste processors; store a total of 20,125-gallons of hazardous waste in two (2) above ground storage tanks; store a total of 4,875 gallons of hazardous waste in two (2) container storage areas.

The draft permit is being considered for issuance under authority of the Kansas Statutes Annotated (K.S.A.) 65-3430 *et seq.* and Kansas Administrative Regulations (K.A.R.) 28-31-4 through 28-31-279a. Documents that support the permit conditions specified in the draft permit are part of the administrative record.

Notice of Proposed Permit Renewal Action

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) received a Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) permit renewal application for hazardous waste treatment and storage from Systech Environmental Corporation (Systech), the operator and owner of the facility located at 1420 South Cement Road, Fredonia, Kansas. KDHE is providing notice of their intent to renew the Systech RCRA permit, EPA identification number KSD980633259.

The permit will allow Systech to: receive hazardous waste via rail and over the road in both bulk and containers from off-site generators and other hazardous waste processors; process and blend hazardous waste into a fuel for use in cement kilns in two (2) miscellaneous process units; store a total of 780,000 gallons of hazardous waste in twelve (12) above ground storage tanks; store a total of 264,000 gallons of hazardous waste in seven (7) container storage areas; and transfer hazardous waste not suitable for processing into a fuel to other RCRA permitted facilities. The materials stored at the facility include ignitable, corrosive, reactive, toxic, and listed liquid or solid hazardous wastes.

The draft permit is being considered for issuance under authority of the Kansas Statutes Annotated (K.S.A.) 65-3430 *et seq.* and Kansas Administrative Regulations (K.A.R.) 28-31-4 through 28-31-279a. Documents that support the permit conditions specified in the draft permit are part of the administrative record.

State hazardous waste laws require that the public be given at least 45 days to review the administrative record for the draft permit prior to KDHE taking a final action. The purpose of having a public comment period is to ensure that interested parties have an opportunity to evaluate the conditions specified in the draft permit and to provide their input into the permit decision-making process. Synopsis: Under the facts presented, a former state employee may accept an employment offer with the Office of the Attorney General of Kansas without violating Kansas governmental ethics laws.

Cited herein: K.S.A. 46-233.

Dear Mr. Chanay:

We understand that, in your capacity as chief deputy attorney general for the Kansas Office of the Attorney General (OAG), you request our opinion concerning

application of the state governmental ethics law, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* Our opinion in response to your request is limited to its applicability. This opinion does not address whether some other statutory system, common law theory, or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry.

Factual Statement

The following factual statement is provided in the request for opinion:

...a former OAG employee [...] [is] now employed by a private employer that receives funds from two entities that have direct contractual relationships with another state agency.

The potential employee in question served as Secretary of the Department for Children and Families (DCF) from 2017 until January 2019. During the time that she served as Secretary she signed contract amendments with various private entities that provide case management services for DCF. Two of those entities, St. Francis Ministries and KVC Kansas, in turn, contract with O’Connell Youth Ranch (OYR) for the placement of boys in need of social services prior to adoption, for foster care, or for integration into their families. OYR is licensed by DCF as a residential living facility and it has a provider agreement with the agency. OYR’s license and provider agreement were in place with DCF prior to when the former Secretary assumed her duties. In addition, the relationship between O’Connell Youth Ranch and St. Francis Ministries and KVC Kansas existed long before the former Secretary assumed her duties at DCF.

Upon the end of her service as Secretary of DCF, the individual in question accepted fulltime employment with the OAG as Deputy Director of the Victims’ Services Division. She resigned from the OAG effective June 27, 2019, to accept the position of Executive Director of the O’Connell Youth Ranch. There has been a complete break in State of Kansas service as a result of the former employee’s resignation from the OAG.

Independent of the foregoing, the Kansas Legislature passed and the Governor signed into law, 2019 House Bill 2290, which, among other things, created the position of Kansas Youth Suicide Prevention Coordinator. The OAG would like to offer the coordinator position, on a part-time, non-benefits eligible basis, to its former employee who will remain employed by the OYR as its Executive Director.

K.S.A. 46-233(a)(2) provides, in pertinent part: “Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, whenever any individual has participated as a state officer or employee in the making of any contract with any person or business as an employee, independent contractor or subcontractor until two years after performance of the contract is completed, or until two years after the individual terminates employment as a state officer or employee, whichever is sooner.”

Because this fact pattern is distinctly different from

anything previously encountered by the OAG, we believe it is prudent to seek an opinion from the Governmental Ethics Commission as to the propriety of the OAG's part-time employment of this individual.

Questions

"Is the OAG permitted to employ, on a part-time basis, an individual who is otherwise principally employed by a private entity that receives placements from two entities that have direct contracts with DCF that were amended and signed by the individual in 2018 when she was serving as DCF Secretary?"

Analysis and Opinion

The former OAG employee, in her capacity as DCF secretary, was substantially involved in the making of contracts with St. Francis Ministries and KVC Kansas by signing amendments to those preexisting contracts. She was not substantially involved in the making of any DCF-OYC contracts. As such, she wasn't prohibited from accepting employment with OYC, pursuant to K.S.A. 46-233(a)(2). This is true even if OYC agreements with St. Francis Ministries and KVC Kansas would involve deliverables under the latter two entities' contracts with DCF.

The words "employee," "contractor," and "subcontractor," as used in K.S.A. 46-233(a)(2), are in reference to a former state employee's current work or contemplated work outside of state government. "Employee," "contractor," and "subcontractor" are not interpreted by us to mean that a former state employee may not work as a contractor with the state or as a subcontractor to a state contractor. In other words, the former OAG employee may be employed by OYC, even though OYC may be a subcontractor to St. Francis Ministries and KVC Kansas under DCF contracts that the former OAG employee was substantially involved in making by her amendments during when she was DCF secretary.

Conclusion

Under the facts provided, the former OAG employee (and current director of OYC, a DCF contractor) may accept employment with the OAG and not violate the provisions of the Kansas governmental ethics laws, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Agriculture, 1320 Research Park Dr., Manhattan, KS 66502, or by email to ronda.hutton@ks.gov. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes. These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 5-21-7 was adopted by the Chief Engineer of the Divisions of Water Resources, Kansas Department of Agriculture at the request of the Western Kansas Groundwater Management District No. 1 ("GMD1") in 2003. The regulation adopted rules applicable only in GMD1 which governed applications for a change in use made of water from irrigation to any other type of beneficial use based on past use. In 2017, the Chief Engineer updated K.A.R. 5-5-9, which is the statewide rule applicable to change in use made from irrigation to other uses. The GMD1 Board of Directors has requested their specific rule be repealed so that the new statewide rule may be applied within GMD1. K.A.R. 5-5-9 adopts irrigation return flows for each county for which changes in use from irrigation can be based, rather than using the past use and the alternative maximum caps previously adopted by GMD1.

Economic Impact Statement for K.A.R. 5-21-7:

This regulation will likely enhance business activities and growth by increasing the predictability of water right quantities when the type of use is changed from irrigation to other uses, including changes to livestock use. GMD1 has approximately 25 medium to large livestock facilities as well as numerous smaller operations within the District's boundaries. One could argue they are the main economic driver in the area, providing local grain markets for irrigation and dryland farmers. Because K.A.R. 5-21-7 was based on the previous 10-year historical use, it was rendering inactive or little used irrigation water rights almost worthless and was preventing livestock facilities from expanding, and municipalities from

securing water for the future. Since the District is closed to new appropriations the only way to secure water is the purchase of existing water rights. The board did not want 5-21-7 to be the cause for livestock facilities moving out of the area and harming the local economy.

This regulation is not mandated by federal law.

There are no additional economic effects by changing the calculation method for consumptive use.

All entities that own or purchase irrigation water rights, including farmers, ranchers, and any other water right owners that wish to change them from irrigation to other types of use would be directly affected by the proposed regulation.

The changes will create a simplified and predictable method for converting water rights from irrigation use to other types of use, which in turn will allow greater utilization of remaining resources within the district for entities that require additional water to grow. Without this change, future growth could be hampered because of the inability to secure additional water for new purposes or expanded purposes and additional unnecessary use of the depleted aquifer could occur in order to increase the 10-year average use calculation used by the existing regulation.

The rule change itself will minimize the cost and impact on business and economic development within the State of Kansas, local government and individuals. Other methods were considered but ultimately not adopted because they did not prevent the total quantity of water consumed from increasing.

No costs will be incurred by or passed along to businesses, local governments, or members of public.

There are no actions mandated by updating this regulation. Only those persons wishing to change the type of use of a water right are subject to the regulation. This regulation changes the formula used, so that a predictable outcome from a change in consumptive use can be achieved without additional costs.

It is not anticipated that this regulation will impose any function or responsibilities upon cities, counties, or school districts.

The agency did extensive outreach prior to the passage of K.A.R. 5-5-9, and the GMD1 conducted their own process through public board meetings. GMD1 began discussions at their April 2016 board meeting and the topic was discussed at virtually every meeting through September 2017. The board was presented with numerous comments for requests in the change from irrigators, livestock facilities, and municipalities.

K.A.R. 5-25-2, 5-25-4 and 5-25-22 are intended to assist Big Bend Groundwater Management District No. 5 ("GMD5"), and the water users located therein, in finding a solution to the impairment complaint filed by the United State Fish and Wildlife Service regarding the senior surface water right for Quivira National Wildlife Refuge located at the bottom of Rattlesnake Creek. These regulations will assist in developing an augmentation project pursuant to K.S.A. 82a-706b and in moving water out of a high impact zone near the stream and refuge.

K.A.R. 5-25-2 – This regulation is amended to allow augmentation wells to be drilled closer in proximity to

(continued)

one another than the standard allowance for new wells. GMD5 has proposed an augmentation wellfield made up of multiple low-volume wells, that they believe will meet standard spacing requirements. However, engineering work has not been completed on the project and this amendment is to ensure the project can continue if circumstances require closer spacing than is currently allowed.

K.A.R. 5-25-4 – New water rights may only be established under limited specific circumstances within GMD5. This regulation is amended to add two additional circumstances. First, any application for the development of augmentation wells, and second, an application to move an existing water right out of the identified high impact area along Rattlesnake Creek. In both cases, existing water rights are protected from impairment by the new water right.

K.A.R. 5-25-22 – This is a new regulation that will allow an existing water right in the identified high impact area around Rattlesnake Creek to be transferred to another area of GMD5 if the stated conditions are met. When a water right is transferred, it will take a new priority number in the new location.

Economic Impact Statement for K.A.R. 5-25-2, 5-25-4 and 5-25-22:

The proposed regulations will protect business activities in the district. While it is not possible to determine their actual impact as allowable actions under these regulations are voluntary, without development of an augmentation system for Rattlesnake Creek and the reduction of water use within the high impact area, it may become necessary to strictly administer water rights throughout the basin. This could result in a catastrophic cut in water use that would cut income to local farmers and cause drastic changes in land values as they shifted from irrigated to dryland use.

These regulations are not mandated by federal law.

The proposed regulations do not require any implementation or compliance costs. If GMD5 or some other entity decides to develop augmentation or individuals decide to move water rights, they will incur costs in those activities, but none are mandated.

Farmers, ranchers, feedlots, and other water right owners located within GMD5 will be directly affected by the proposed regulations.

As there are no direct costs mandated, these regulations offer the benefit of additional methods to solve the impairment of the Quivira National Wildlife Refuge that are much cheaper than strict administration of the basin.

The agency has worked with GMD5 to remove all obstacles to the establishment of augmentation, including development of an MOU with GMD5 and the amendment of these regulations.

No cost will be incurred by or passed along to businesses, local governments, or members of the public.

It is not anticipated that this regulation will impose any function or responsibilities upon cities, counties, or school districts.

The agency has worked extensively with GMD5 to develop these regulations so that they could continue to move forward with their plans for augmentation. The

GMD5 Board passed a resolution requesting that these regulations be adopted by the Chief Engineer. Numerous public meetings on solving the impairment of Quivira National Wildlife Refuge have been held over the last two years and these regulations are just part of a larger conversation about solutions to the impairment.

Failure to adopt these regulations could, if they prevented the development of an augmentation project or enough water use is not reduced, cause a large loss in income for local water right owners if they are strictly administered. Land values would decrease and also cause a corresponding decrease in tax revenue for local entities.

tion on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 9-18-23 – This new regulation would allow, under specified conditions, the transfer and adoption of feline immunodeficiency virus-positive (“FIV”) cats.

K.A.R. 9-23-1; 9-23-2; and 9-23-3 – These regulations should have been repealed when the rest of the Pet Animal Act regulations were updated last year. They previously regulated hobby kennel operators, but those operators are now subject to the general requirements contained in K.A.R. 9-18-4 through 9-18-31.

These regulations are not mandated by the federal government. However, this amendment will bring Kansas into alignment with neighboring states.

These regulations are not expected to enhance or restrict business activities but allowing the adoption of FIV cats will likely lower the number of infected cats that are euthanized in shelters and decrease the costs required by shelters to maintain such cats.

This regulation will likely decrease costs incurred by animal shelters. There is no reliable data on how many FIV cats are taken into shelters each year. Some shelters do not maintain data on FIV cats and other shelters can take in as many as 50 plus FIV cats each year. Currently, these cats cannot be permanently adopted, and for no kill shelters, the annual estimated cost to maintain a FIV cat is \$25 per day or \$9,125 per year, although this varies by shelter and the needs of any particular animal.

Animal shelters, rescue networks, animal foster homes, veterinary clinics, and any other persons or entities that may shelter or hold FIV cats will be directly affected by the proposed rule and regulation.

The proposed regulation will reduce the number of FIV cats that are euthanized and reduce the costs of animal shelters that choose to maintain these cats.

There are no implementation costs associated with this regulation because animal shelters are already required to provide care for FIV cats (or euthanize them) and cannot permanently transfer them. Since animal shelters are already providing care to FIV cats, this regulation will reduce the care they provide and should only reduce costs.

It is not anticipated that this regulation will impose any additional functions or responsibilities upon cities, counties, or school districts.

The agency received comments and feedback from local animal shelters and the Midwest Alliance for Animals, the United States Humane Society, and various individuals in support of allowing the adoption of FIV cats during the last update of our regulations and since then. After consulting with veterinarians at the Kansas State College of Veterinary Medicine, it was determined by the Animal Health Commissioner to allow transfer and adoption under the specified circumstances. The regulation was also reviewed and approved by the Pet Animal Advisory Board, representing all entities licensed under the Pet Animal Act.

The proposed regulations are not expected to have an environmental impact.

Permanent Administrative Regulation

Article 7.—APPLICATIONS

66-7-4. Potentially disqualifying civil and criminal records; advisory opinion; fee. (a) Conviction of any felony may disqualify an applicant from receiving a license.

(b) Civil records that may disqualify an applicant from receiving a license shall be the records of any court judgment or settlement in which the applicant admitted or was found to have engaged in conduct that would constitute a violation of the technical professions act or any of the board’s regulations. Those records shall not be used to disqualify an applicant for more than five years after the applicant satisfied any judgment or restitution ordered by the court or agreed to in the settlement.

(c) Any individual with a criminal or civil record described in this regulation may submit a petition to the board for an informal, advisory opinion concerning whether the individual’s civil or criminal record may disqualify the individual from licensure. Each petition shall include the following:

(1) The details of the individual’s civil or criminal record, including a copy of the court records or the settlement agreement;

(2) an explanation of the circumstances that resulted in the civil or criminal record; and

(3) a check or money order in the amount of \$50.00. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-120 and K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-120 and K.S.A. 74-7026; effective August 16, 2019.)
