Project

Project number 106 C-4906-02, Underwater Bridge Inspection Project

Background and Purpose of Project

The Kansas Department of Transportation is seeking a consultant to provide statewide bridge inspection services consisting of requested underwater inspections on the local system, starting with the inspections due in 2019. Due to the unique nature of these inspections, as well as the need at times to use specialized equipment, this program is offered to the local bridge owners as a method to make use of economy of scale by bundling inspections. Inspections are to be performed in accordance with the latest published edition of the KDOT Bureau of Local Projects Local Bridge Inspection Manual and Local Underwater Inspection Scope of Services (available at <https://kart.ksdot.org>). This contract may be for up to 5 years.

Scope of Services to be Performed

Consultant shall complete the following tasks and produce the deliverables described below:

- Provide an estimate of cost for work to be performed each year to be approved prior to commencing inspections.
- Provide underwater inspections on local system bridges (historically about 80 bridges—currently two on a 36-month interval (2020), remaining bridges on a 48-month interval (2020: 9; 2021: 36 2022: 33)).
- Provide a final cost-per-bridge for each inspection performed at the end of each program year.
- Input inspection data into the KDOT-BLP Bridge Inspection Portal.
- Provide PDFs of the Draft Inspection Reports to the KDOT Program Manager for review and approval.

- Upload PDFs of the Final Inspection Reports into the Bridge Inspection Portal and provide them to the KDOT Program Manager for distribution to the bridge owners.

Qualifications-Based Selection Process

No cost or pricing information shall be submitted with the Letter of Interest and will not be considered in the selection process to shortlist or rank proposals. Background and Purpose of Project

Consulting engineering services are sought for the load ratings for all required structures on the local system and owned by Local Public Authorities (LPA). The selected firm(s) will review design plans, analyze structure geometries and conditions, and develop required load rating(s) for the structures. The final product for submittal will include analysis assumptions, condition state reduction factors, a load rating model compatible with BrR (AASHTO), final load rating calculations, and a standard Load Ratings Summary sheet developed by BLP. Public notice is hereby given that Wichita State University (WSU) intends to directly lease, and indirectly sublease through its affiliate corporation Wichita State Innovation Alliance, Inc., subject to all required state approvals, an approximate ground area consisting of 150,000 square feet or less with the potential for expansion for parking, for the private development of one or more partnership buildings. K.A.R. 68-2-10. Cessation of operations. This regulation is being amended to require closed pharmacies to notify the Board and patients about the location and disposition of patient records, and creating requirements for pharmacies accepting records of closed pharmacies.

K.A.R. 68-7-15. Prepackaging or repackaging of oral drugs. This regulation is being amended to allow packaging of drugs dispensed or supplied by the pharmacy or any other pharmacy engaged in a shared services agreement under K.A.R. 68-7-20, and to provide necessary limitations for prepackaging and repackaging of parenteral products.

K.A.R. 68-19-1. Minimum program requirements. This regulation is being amended to require review of the Board's quarterly newsletter during the pharmacy's quarterly continuous quality improvement meetings.

K.A.R. 68-21-6. Reciprocal agreements with other states or government entities to share information. This regulation is being amended to allow the Board to share K-TRACS data with other relevant government entities that have established prescription drug monitoring programs, including the Missouri St. Louis County initiative,

military health system via the department of defense, Indian health systems, and veteran health system.

K.A.R. 68-14-1. This regulation is being considered for revocation as the result of proposed amendments and additions to the remainder of Article 14 of the Board's regulations (KAR 68-14-2 through 68-14-7b).

K.A.R. 68-14-2. Definitions. This regulation is being amended to include additional definitions consistent with the Federal Drug Supply Chain Security Act (DSCSA) that shall apply to Article 14 of the Board's regulations, as well as clarify language in the Pharmacy Practice Act.

K.A.R. 68-14-3. This regulation is being considered for revocation as the result of 2017 amendments to the Pharmacy Practice Act which make the contents of this regulation duplicative of statute.

K.A.R. 68-14-4. Minimum required information for registration. This regulation is being amended to include application requirements for virtual wholesale distributors, third-party logistics providers, and outsourcing facilities. It also further clarifies the requirements for wholesale distributors, including inspection and other non-resident compliance requirements.

K.A.R. 68-14-5. Personnel. This regulation is being amended to include personnel requirements for virtual wholesale distributors, third-party logistics providers, and outsourcing facilities. It also further clarifies the requirements for maintaining training records for five years and requires outsourcing facilities to designate a pharmacist-in-charge.

K.A.R. 68-14-7. Wholesale distributors; minimum requirements for the storage and handling of prescription-only drugs and devices and for the establishment and maintenance of prescription-only drug and device distribution records. This regulation is being amended to update the operations requirements for wholesale distributors to be consistent with the Federal Drug Supply Chain Security Act (DSCSA).

K.A.R. 68-14-7a. Third-party logistics providers; minimum requirements for operation and maintenance of records. This is a new regulation drafted to provide operational requirements for third-party logistics providers, a newly regulated category of registrants, consistent with the Federal Drug Supply Chain Security Act (DSCSA).

K.A.R. 68-14-7b. Outsourcing facilities; minimum requirements for operation and maintenance of records. This is a new regulation drafted to provide operational requirements for outsourcing facilities, a newly regulated category of registrants, consistent with the Federal Drug Supply Chain Security Act (DSCSA).

Summary of Economic Impact

It is the mission of the Board to ensure that all persons practicing pharmacy are properly licensed and registered, and to ensure compliance with Kansas statutes regarding proper compounding, storage, and dispensing of prescription drugs, maintenance of professional standards, and proper manufacture, distribution, and sale of prescription and nonprescription drugs. Thus, the Board is proposing these regulatory changes.

DSCSA: The Board anticipates minimal economic impact to the Board, its licensees and registrants, or Kansas-registered pharmacies. Amendments will enhance business activity related to the manufacture, distribution, and compounding of prescription drugs and devices by allowing these facilities to more readily transact business with Kansas. The regulations are also designed to maintain necessary public protection mechanisms within these facilities and ensure compliance with recognized pharmacy standards. Registration and renewal application fees have been set in a separate regulation. However, fees should have a null effect on revenue and expense because the Board is merely shifting registrants from one registration category to another. The Board does not anticipate any financial impact upon other governmental agencies, and the Board is unaware of any less costly or less intrusive methods to achieve the stated purposes.

Cessation of Operations: The Board anticipates minimal economic impact to the Board, its licensees and registrants, or Kansas-registered pharmacies. Any economic impact would be specifically related to the closing pharmacy's new responsibility to notify patients of the closure and the disposition of patient records. Pharmacies are already required to maintain patient records for five years and, upon closure, are required to secure another pharmacy buyer or a permanent storage location for the files. The only new component is a notification to the patient about the disposition of the patient record. Notification may be made by mail or email, the economic effect of which may include the cost of paper, envelopes, and postage. This cost would be allocated to the closing pharmacy.

K-TRACS Interstate Data Sharing: The Board anticipates no economic impact to the Board, its licensees and registrants, or any Kansas citizen/business. The Board has data sharing capabilities and will merely expand to these other entities. If there is any economic impact, it would be related to increased data sharing and increased program utilization which could positively benefit the health of patients and Kansans. Such impact is unquantifiable.

Other Regulations: No economic impact.

regulation K.A.R. 28-4-133, reporting of critical incidents at day care homes, group day care homes, child care centers, and preschools.

A summary of the proposed regulation and estimated economic impact follows:

Summary of Regulations:

K.A.R. 28-4-133. Reporting critical incidents. This regulation requires licensees to notify parents immediately in the case of a critical incident, expanding the existing notification requirements in K.A.R. 28-4-127(e)(2) pertaining to illnesses and injuries. It includes a list of critical incidents such as fires, vehicle collision, missing child, injuries requiring medical attention or death of a child. It also includes a requirement that licensees submit written reports of these critical incidents by the next working day to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, on a form provided by KDHE.

Economic Impact:

Cost to the agency: The proposed regulation will enable KDHE to meet a federal requirement of the Child Care Development Grant Act of 2014 (Pub. L. 113-186). The Child Care Development Fund (CCDF) block grant Final Rule, 45 CFR §98.33, pertaining to consumer education, requires states to provide parents and the public online access to information concerning the aggregate number of serious injuries and deaths in licensed facilities through a consumer website. This is consistent with K.S.A. 65-534, which requires KDHE to maintain an online information dissemination system accessible to the public. Consumer education, including web-based access to information, is an important tool to help parents make informed child care choices. KDHE will track reports of critical incidents received from licensees in the KDHE Child Care Licensing System (CLARIS). Costs to KDHE include entry, review and tracking of data. Costs will be absorbed in the ongoing KDHE budget.

Cost to licensees: The proposed regulation requires licensees to notify parents immediately after a critical incident. There are no implementation or compliance costs to licensees for notifications to parents. Licensees will also complete and submit a written report of each critical incident to KDHE. The report form will be provided by KDHE. Depending on the complexity of the critical incident, it is estimated to take the licensee or individual designated by the licensee approximately 15 minutes or less to complete and submit. The estimated cost to complete one report is \$3.20. This cost is based on an average of the hourly wages for a day care home/group day care home licensee and a child care center/preschool program director. The annual cost to licensees will vary depending on the hourly wage of the individual completing the form and the number of reportable incidents in a year. KDHE accepts the completed form by email, fax, or regular mail. Future enhancements to CLARIS may allow web-based submission of a report.

Costs to other governmental agencies or units: The proposed regulation applies to local units of government, including cities, counties, and unified school districts that operate a licensed child care facility. For those licensees, there are no implementation or compliance costs for notifications to parents following a critical incident. Licensees

ees will also complete and submit a report of each critical incident to KDHE. Depending on the complexity of the critical incident it is estimated to take the licensee or individual designated by the licensee approximately 15 minutes or less to complete and submit. The estimated cost to complete one report is \$3.20.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a 60-day public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to 5:00 p.m. on the day of the hearing to Amber Sellers, Kansas Department of Health and

Environment, Bureau of Family Health, Administration and Policy, 1000 SW Jackson, Suite 200, Topeka, KS 66612-1274, by email to Amber.Sellers@ks.gov, or by fax to 785-559-4244. During the hearing, all interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed regulation as well as an opportunity to submit their written comments. K.A.R. 60-16-101. Definitions. The proposed revision adds the definition of a clock-hour in an intravenous therapy course, IV and a stand-alone intravenous therapy course. The language was changed in the following definitions: calculating, evaluation and monitoring. There is no economic impact of this proposed regulation for businesses that offer intravenous therapy courses.

K.A.R. 60-16-103. Stand-alone course approval procedure; competency examinations; recordkeeping. The proposed revision adds language for the approval procedure for a stand-alone intravenous therapy course offered. Language has been added that lists the requirements the stand-alone course and course coordinator shall meet. It adds language about the facility in which skills practice and competency occurs and the need for a signed, written agreement between the provider and each affiliating health care facility. Language has been added that describes the duties of the stand-alone course coordinator relating to documentation of course completion. There is no economic impact of this proposed regulation for businesses that offer stand-alone intravenous therapy courses.

K.A.R. 60-16-104. Standards for course and program curriculum content. The proposed regulation adds language regarding the requirements when an intravenous therapy course is provided as part of a practical nursing program's curriculum. Language has been added that lists the topics of instruction that must be included when

intravenous therapy is taught in a practical nursing curriculum. The economic impact of this proposed regulation would be for practical nursing programs who offer intravenous therapy in their practical nursing curriculum. They may have to purchase additional supplies to teach the intravenous therapy content in their program.
