This project will be delivered under the construction management at-risk statute K.S.A 75-37,144. Turner Construction Company is the construction manager.

Kansas Aviation System Plan and
Economic Reporter (KASPER)

The Kansas Department of Transportation is seeking proposals from qualified firms to update the Kansas Airport System Plan and Economic Impact Study, a project that will be carried out over two phases, contingent on FAA State System Planning grants. Phase I will specifically address updates to the existing state system plan, including the gathering and updating of data that is compatible to the GIS application used by KDOT. Phase II will address the update to the economic impact study of public-use airports in Kansas. The data from both studies will be depicted in an online GIS tool the same as or similar to the Kansas Airspace Awareness Tool. The total effort should also produce a model that will demonstrate

the shift of burden within the system if an airport should close.

The Consultant Shortlist Committee will select three to five of the most highly qualified firms expressing interest and schedule an individual interview for the project. The consulting firms can more thoroughly discuss their experience related to the project at the interview and will be expected to discuss their approach to this project in detail and the personnel to be assigned to this project.

The Consultant Selection Committee, appointed by the secretary of transportation, will conduct the discussions with the firms invited to the individual interview conferences. The committee will select one firm to perform the professional services required for completing the advertised project.

It is KDOT's policy to use the following criteria as the basis for selection of the consulting engineering firm:

1. Size and professional qualifications.
2. Experience of staff.
3. Location of firm with respect to project(s).
4. Work load of firm.
5. Firm's performance record.

The firm's accounting systems must have the following capabilities before the firm may be awarded a contract:

- Valid, reliable and current costs must be available within the system to support cost and pricing data.
- Capability to provide a means of measuring the reasonableness of incurred costs.
- Capability to identify and accumulate allowable costs by contract or project records that will reconcile with the general ledger.
- Ability to provide supporting documentation of actual expenditures for each billing, based on costs.

A public hearing will be conducted at 8 a.m. Monday, April 29, in Room 560 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in an existing regulation.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the EMS operations manager, Room 1031, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Ann Stevenson at 785-296-7296. This regulation is proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulation and the economic impact statement follows:

K.A.R. 109-2-5, Ambulance service operational standards. The proposed amendments remove redundancy regarding statistical information submitted to the board during relicensing that already exist in K.A.R. 109-2-2, reinserts language that was inadvertently left out during the last major revisions that mandates that each service maintain a duty roster, and ensures each service has their medical protocols approved annually.

These changes are not mandated by federal law and there is no economic impact expected on the board, other governmental agencies, private businesses, individuals or consumers of the service.

Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted by the Wildlife, Parks and Tourism Commission at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 25, at the Great Plains Nature Center, 6232 E. 29th St. North, Wichita, to consider the approval and adoption of proposed regulations of the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism.

A general discussion and workshop meeting on business of the Wildlife, Parks and Tourism Commission will begin at 1:30 p.m. April 25 at the location listed above. The meeting will recess at approximately 5:30 p.m., then resume at 7 p.m. at the same location for the regulatory hearing and more business. There will be public comment periods at the beginning of the afternoon and evening meeting for any issues not on the agenda, and additional comment periods will be available during the meeting on agenda items. Old and new business also may be discussed at this time. If necessary to complete business matters, the commission will reconvene at 9 a.m. April 26 at the same location.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public meeting and may request the meeting materials in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the meeting by contacting Sheila Kemmis, commission secretary, at 620-672-5911. Persons with a hearing impairment may call the Kansas Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing at 800-432-0698 to request special accommodations.

This 60-day notice period prior to the hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed administrative regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the chairman of the commission, Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism, 1020 S. Kansas Ave., Suite 200, Topeka, 66612, or to sheila.kemmis@ksoutdoors.com if electronically. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for approving, amending and approving, or rejecting the proposed regulations.

The regulations that will be heard during the regulatory hearing portion of the meeting are as follows:

K.A.R. 115-2-3. This permanent regulation establishes camping, utility and other fees for state parks. The proposed amendment would reduce the monthly recreational vehicle short-term parking cost.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendment is not anticipated to have any appreciable negative economic impact on the department, other agencies, small businesses or the public.

K.A.R. 115-4-11. This permanent regulation establishes provisions for big game and wild turkey permit applications. The proposed amendments add units to the per-

mit application process consistent with management unit changes for spring and fall seasons.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable negative economic impact on the department, other agencies, small businesses or the public.

K.A.R. 115-25-7. This exempt regulation establishes the open seasons, bag limit and permits for antelope. The proposed version of the regulation reduces permits slightly over previous years.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable negative economic impact on the department, other agencies, small businesses or the public.

K.A.R. 11-12-2 provides additional clarification for those areas in which applications will be considered.

K.A.R. 11-12-3 outlines the timelines, standards and procedures by which the agency will accept applications.

K.A.R. 11-12-4 identifies the basis on which applications for water right retirement grant applications will be evaluated and prioritized, and the methods of payment for approved applications.

K.A.R. 11-12-5 provides a mechanism for water rights to be conditioned to provide for a brief period of limited irrigation where lands are being converted to permanent vegetation.

Economic Impact Statement:

The Department of Agriculture, Division of Conservation, administers the program. The personnel costs to the agency for this position are approximately \$85,000 per year. An estimated additional \$2,000 per year will be expended for supplies, work station, postage, computer equipment, meetings and travel expenses. The agency may incur additional administrative costs to conduct field investigations and monitor grant payments for possible 10-year contracting periods.

Past experience has resulted in an average of approximately 15 applications per year with a resulting approval of approximately four applications per year, although the number of applications and approvals each year has varied considerably based on the amount of money available and the opportunity for landowners to leverage dollars with other federal and local programs. The total number of future applications to be processed and the total number of resulting water right transition contracts to develop and manage is expected to average about the same if annual allocations also remain about the same as in the past five years. To date, a total of \$2,946,082 has been expended by the Division of Conservation in five enrollment periods between 2008 and 2012.

While not highly likely in the short term prognosis, it is possible that land with economic incentives provided under the water right transition assistance program (WTAP) could be converted to even higher economic yielding purposes than before, and then concurrent increases to the tax base of local governments could be realized. It is estimated that approximately 1,500 acres of irrigated land would potentially be retired from irrigation and converted to dryland agricultural uses.

K.A.R. 5-16-1 through 5-16-7. The regulatory amendments outline the revised conditions regarding the approval and operation of multi-year flex accounts (MYFA). These amendments are necessary to implement the 2012 statutory change in K.S.A. 82a-736 in S.B. 272.

Economic Impact Statement:

There will be a significant economic impact to the department as the application filing fees will only partially offset permitting and monitoring requirements. We estimate an average of \$900 of staff time per each application including staff assistance to customers to consider the program and complete the application, processing time,

maintain records of water use and remaining allocation, and field monitoring and enforcement. We are adding four new technical staff to assist with the additional workload.

Approximately 2,300 emergency drought term permits were received. We could see 1,000 drought term permits enroll into a MYFA. If they are all filed by July 15, this would result in \$200,000 in filing fees to help offset the \$700,000 to the agency. This will be absorbed into that mission. Fees from 2011 drought term permits will partially offset our costs.

We expect there will be interest in this program for water rights that are not enrolled into a drought term permit, due to the greater flexibility allowed in managing water. We estimate at least 500 applications. The filing fee for these applications will be \$400, resulting in \$200,000 in fees to help offset the cost of \$450,000 to the agency. Again, this process will be part of our core mission and will be absorbed into that mission.

Finally, the law allows for a third category of MYFA in 2012: for those who over-pumped in 2011, did not file for an emergency drought term permit, and wish to avoid an enforcement sanction. If filed by July 15, 2012, the 2011 overage is deducted from the MYFA quantity, therefore reduced over a five year period. The filing fee for this option is \$600. We do not anticipate a large number of these to be filed; therefore, not a significant fiscal impact to the agency.

There should be no significant fiscal impact to other state or federal government agencies. There will be an impact to a groundwater management district (GMD) if a flex account application is located within the boundaries of that GMD. The GMD may assist with completing the application form and will be part of the review process. There will be a fiscal impact of a \$200, \$400 or \$600 filing fee to a private business or individual that makes an application for a flex account. This program is voluntary. It is expected that there will be a positive fiscal impact to applicants as a result of the additional flexibility provided. We do not have a method to project these financial impacts.
