The money for the project, sponsored by the Kansas Water Office, will come in part from the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act of 2009 fund administered by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment through the Kansas Water Pollution Clean Water Revolving Loan Fund and the state's Reservoir Beneficial Use Fund. Additional funds will come from the state's Conservation Buffer Initiative, the Natural Resource's Conservation Service's Continuous Conservation Reserve Program, and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Section 204 Funds.

By reshaping and stabilizing the banks and improving the riparian area's capacity as a filter, soil erosion that is steadily filling in the John Redmond Reservoir can be reduced and potential pollutants can be intercepted. John Redmond Reservoir has lost more than 39 percent of its storage capacity to sediment since it was built. Excess nutrients can cause water quality problems. A healthy riparian area also provides wildlife habitat and slows runoff that would result in flooding.

K.A.R. 130-1-5. This proposed regulation establishes documentation, education and examination requirements for reinstatement.

Article 2.—Fees

K.A.R. 130-2-1. This proposed regulation establishes fees authorized by statute.

Article 3.—Educational Programs

K.A.R. 130-3-1. This proposed regulation establishes the standards and core curriculum that an educational program must meet in order to be approved by the board.

Article 5.—Continuing Education

K.A.R. 130-5-1. This proposed regulation establishes the standards for approval of continuing education courses.

K.A.R. 130-5-2. This proposed regulation establishes the requirements continuing education providers must meet in order to be approved by the board.

The proposed regulations have an economic impact on individuals who desire to perform home inspections in Kansas and on educational programs and continuing education providers that do not meet the standards for approval. The impact on those who are qualified for registration is limited to the fees charged for the initial and annual renewal of a registration. The impact on educational programs and continuing education providers to meet the standards for approval cannot reasonably be calculated.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 4-10-2a through 4-10-2d, 4-10-2f through 4-10-2k, 4-10-4, 4-10-6, 4-10-15, and 4-10-17 are being revoked. The language was either no longer necessary or moved to a different regulation for better organization.

The following regulation numbers are new. Currently, the information is scattered throughout the regulations. The proposed regulations organize the information into a more logical, efficient and user-friendly format. The new regulations are a result of this reorganization.

K.A.R. 4-10-1a puts all of the prohibited acts into one regulation.

K.A.R. 4-10-1b clarifies when an anhydrous ammonia release must be reported.

K.A.R. 4-10-4a brings all of the requirements for anhydrous containers into one location. It also clarifies the Kansas Department of Labor's inspection responsibilities and adds a record retention requirement.

K.A.R. 4-10-4b organizes all of the requirements for markings on anhydrous containers into one location. It also allows mobile containers without a data plate to obtain a USDOT special permit so they can continue to be used and adds additional markings on containers to comply with federal requirements.

K.A.R. 4-10-4c brings together all of the information on facility design and permanent storage container location.

K.A.R. 4-10-4d explains the requirements for pressure relief valves.

K.A.R. 4-10-4e explains the specifications for hoses.

K.A.R. 4-10-4f explains the requirements for gauging devices.

K.A.R. 4-10-6a brings together the requirements for anhydrous transfers. Also adds requirements for specific valves in the piping used for anhydrous transfers.

K.A.R. 4-10-6b lays out additional transfer requirements pertaining to tank cars and transport trucks.

K.A.R. 4-10-10 organizes the safety information into one location. It also sets minimum requirements for which personal protective equipment the transfer attendant must wear.

The following regulations were amended. Four of these regulations had significant changes that required a rewrite. Once again, this rewrite was for organizational purposes.

K.A.R. 4-10-1 adds, removes and alphabetizes the definitions.

K.A.R. 4-10-2e brings together the information pertaining to container valves and appurtenances. It also requires certain permanent storage containers to have an emergency shut-off valve in place by July 1, 2012.

K.A.R. 4-10-5a explains the requirements for tank trucks and semitrailers used for transport for infield delivery.

K.A.R. 4-10-7 explains the requirements for implementations of husbandry. The regulation was edited to remain consistent with current formatting requirements and contains a few substantive changes.

K.A.R. 4-10-16 reorganizes and clarifies requirements for reactor units.

Economic Impact: The economic impact on KDA is expected to be neutral. There may be cost savings in staff time associated with organized and clearly written regulations.

Although the requirement has been in place for some time, addressing the Kansas Department of Labor's (KDOL) requirement for permanent anhydrous ammonia storage container inspection in these regulations may result in an increase in requests from private businesses or individuals for inspections. These inspections by KDOL will only be necessary if the permanent storage container is newly installed, relocated or has structural damage. Costs for these inspections are expected to be negligible at approximately \$300 per inspection. Therefore, KDOL could see a slight increase in this existing revenue source.

For those businesses or individuals with permanent storage tanks of 4,000 gallons (water capacity) or greater without emergency shut-off valves, there will be an associated cost of approximately \$1500 per container to be in compliance by July 1, 2012. Industry requested this requirement and believes the 2012 compliance date will allow them to have these valves installed during a time of year that will least impact their business.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a revision to a previously issued air quality construction permit. Frontier El Dorado Refining Company (FEDRC) applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to construct a crude expansion project at its refinery located in El Dorado. Emissions of particulate matter (PM), PM equal to or less than 10 microns in diameter (PM₁₀), volatile organic compounds (VOCs), oxides of nitrogen (NO_x), sulfur oxides (SO_x) and carbon monoxide (CO) were evaluated during the permit review process. KDHE issued the construction permit for the crude expansion project September 15, 2006.

The revised permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, prevention of significant deterioration (PSD), which adopt the federal standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attainment areas are areas where the air quality meets or is better than the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS).

The revisions proposed by FEDRC include a re-evaluation of the best available control technology (BACT) NO_x emission limits set for heaters B-306, B-307 and B-2402. Less than significant increases will occur in emissions of NO_x as a result of the proposed revisions to the construction permit.

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the BACT for each pollutant for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to affect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the proposed crude expansion project indicates that the emission rate of oxides of nitrogen, sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, particulate matter and volatile organic compounds all exceed the significance levels. FEDRC conducted the required BACT analyses. The department has reviewed FEDRC's BACT analyses and concurs with its findings that dry low NO_x burners, good combustion practices, use of low sulfur refinery fuel gas, and various good operating practices is the BACT for the revision to the crude expansion project.

A public comment period has been established until October 5 to allow citizens the opportunity to express any concerns they may have about this proposed permitting action. The Kansas Health Policy Authority (KHPA) is submitting its disproportionate share hospital (DSH) pool amounts for the period of July 1, 2009 through September 30, 2009. With this state plan amendment, KHPA desires to realign its DSH payment period from the state fiscal year to the federal fiscal year. To do so, KHPA will have a short DSH period, which is limited to the remaining, unspent balance of its 2009 federal DSH allotment. The remaining amount limits the pools for this transition quarter.

This short period, in effect, will be a run-out period before KHPA transitions to matching the federal fiscal year. KDHA believes that matching the federal fiscal year will simplify its reporting and will better clarify the matching of payments to the federal allotment. In addition, it will facilitate a better matching of payments for any audit reviews. The timing difference is typically a reconciling item.

**Article 20.—INTENSIVE GROUNDWATER USE
CONTROL AREA**

5-20-1. Intensive groundwater use control area; public hearings. (a) In any case in which the chief engineer initiates proceedings for the designation of an intensive groundwater use control area (IGUCA), an independent hearing officer shall be appointed by the chief engineer. The independent hearing officer shall meet the following requirements:

- (1) Not have been an employee of the department of agriculture for at least five years before the appointment;
- (2) be admitted to practice law in this state; and
- (3) be knowledgeable by training and experience in water law and administrative procedure.

(b)(1) The independent hearing officer shall conduct one or more public hearings to determine whether both of the following conditions are met:

(A) One or more of the circumstances specified in K.S.A. 82a-1036, and amendments thereto, exist.

(B) The public interest requires that one or more corrective control provisions should be adopted.

(2) If both of the conditions in paragraph (b)(1) are met, the independent hearing officer shall recommend the boundaries of the IGUCA.

(c) At the public hearing specified in subsection (b), all of the following requirements shall be met:

(1) Documentary and oral evidence shall be taken, and a full and complete record of the public hearing shall be kept.

(2) The division of water resource's (DWR's) staff shall make a proffer of the records of the division pertaining to the proposed IGUCA and may present background, hydrologic, and other information and an analysis of that information, concerning the area in question.

(3) The DWR's proffer and any other DWR presentations shall be heard first, unless the hearing officer determines that a different order of presentation will facilitate the conduct of the hearing.

(4) If any part of the proposed IGUCA is within the boundaries of a groundwater management district (GMD), a representative of that GMD shall be allowed to present the GMD's own data, analysis, comments, provisions of the GMD's revised management plan, regulations, and recommendations at any public hearing.

(5) Each person shall be allowed to give an oral statement under oath or affirmation or to present documentary evidence, including a signed written statement.

(6) At the end of the public hearing, a reasonable opportunity for any person to submit oral or written comments concerning the matters presented may be allowed by the hearing officer.

(7) The hearing shall be conducted according to the procedure specified in K.A.R. 5-14-3a. The hearing officer

(continued)

shall have the discretion to use a different procedure if it facilitates the conduct of the hearing.

(8) The independent hearing officer shall make the following findings of fact:

(A) Whether one or more of the circumstances specified in K.S.A. 82a-1036, and amendments thereto, exist; and

(B) whether the public interest requires that one or more corrective control provisions should be adopted.

(9) The independent hearing officer shall transmit the findings to the chief engineer.

(d) The proceeding shall be concluded if the independent hearing officer finds that at least one of the following conditions is met:

(1) None of the circumstances specified in K.S.A. 82a-1036, and amendments thereto, exist.

(2) The public interest does not require that any corrective control provisions should be adopted.

(e) The procedure specified in subsection (f) shall be followed by the chief engineer if the independent hearing officer meets all of the following conditions:

(1) Finds that one or more of the conditions specified in K.S.A. 82a-1036, and amendments thereto, exist;

(2) finds that public interest requires that any one or more corrective control provisions should be adopted; and

(3) recommends the boundaries of the proposed IGUCA.

(f) If the independent hearing officer makes the findings and recommendation specified in subsection (e), one or more public hearings shall be conducted by the chief engineer to determine the following:

(1) What the goals of the IGUCA should be;

(2) what corrective control provisions should be adopted; and

(3) what the final boundaries of the IGUCA should be.

After the hearing, the order described in K.S.A. 82a-1038, and amendments thereto, shall be issued by the chief engineer. The chief engineer's order shall include the independent hearing officer's findings of fact.

(g) Notice of the public hearings held by the independent hearing officer shall be given by regular mail and by publication, as specified in K.S.A. 82a-1037 and amendments thereto. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-706a; implementing K.S.A. 74-510a, K.S.A. 82a-1036, K.S.A. 82a-1037, and K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 82a-1038; effective Sept. 18, 2009.)

5-20-2. Formal review of intensive groundwater use control area orders. (a) For each intensive groundwater use control area (IGUCA) designated by order of the chief engineer before July 1, 2008, pursuant to K.S.A. 82a-1038 and amendments thereto, a public hearing to review the designation shall be conducted by the chief engineer within seven years of the effective date of this regulation. A subsequent review of the designation shall occur within 10 years after the previous public review hearing or more frequently as determined by the chief engineer.

(b) For each IGUCA designated by order of the chief engineer on or after July 1, 2008, a public hearing to review the designation shall be conducted by the chief en-

gineer within seven years after the order is final. A subsequent review of the designation shall occur within 10 years after the previous public review hearing or more frequently as determined by the chief engineer.

(c) Upon the request of a petition signed by at least five percent of the affected water users in an IGUCA designated by order of the chief engineer, a public review hearing to review the designation shall be conducted by the chief engineer. This requested public review hearing shall not be conducted more frequently than every four years.

(d) Written notice of a public review hearing shall be given to each person holding a water right in the affected area. Notice of the hearing shall be given by publication in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation within the affected area at least 30 days before the date set for the hearing. The notice shall indicate the reason for the hearing and shall specify the time and place of the hearing. At the public review hearing, documentary and oral evidence shall be taken, and a full and complete record of the public review hearing shall be kept.

(e) The following shall be considered by the chief engineer at the public review hearing:

(1) Whether one or more of the circumstances specified in K.S.A. 82a-1036, and amendments thereto, exist; and

(2) whether the public interest requires that the IGUCA designation be continued. The state shall have the burden of proving the need for continuance of the IGUCA designation.

(f) Based on the review specified in subsection (e), one of the following actions shall be taken by the chief engineer:

(1) Continue the IGUCA with its original or current corrective control provisions;

(2) reduce the restrictions imposed by one or more corrective control provisions within the scope and goals specified in the original IGUCA order;

(3) reduce the IGUCA boundaries;

(4) increase any allocations within the IGUCA;

(5) address any other issues that have been identified in the review; or

(6) revoke the IGUCA order and implement alternative measures, if necessary, to address the water issues in the affected areas.

(g) If, as a result of the review specified in subsection (e), the chief engineer determines that the restrictions imposed by current corrective control provisions may need to be increased or additional corrective control provisions may be needed, a hearing shall be conducted by the chief engineer according to K.A.R. 5-14-3a.

(h) If, as a result of the review specified in subsection (e), the chief engineer determines that the boundaries of the IGUCA may need to be increased, a new IGUCA proceeding shall be initiated by the chief engineer pursuant to K.A.R. 5-20-1. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-706a; implementing K.S.A. 82a-706 and K.S.A. 82a-1036; effective Sept. 18, 2009.)
