The following are proposed amendments and changes to the 2020, 2021 and new 2022 program. Listed below are the items for discussion. The year of funding is listed behind the change.

CARES Act funding – 2020

There is approximately \$4.5 million dollars in CDBG-CV money left to be allocated. The program is interested in hearing what communities need that will meet the criteria of prevent, prepare for and respond to coronavirus without duplicating other funding sources. If small business working capital grants are needed, we will require 50% of awarded funds to be awarded locally within 90 days, which is down from 180 days.

Economic Development–2021

Interest Rate will be reduced to 3.5% minimum instead of 4%

Commercial Rehabilitation–2021

Change to 50% match requirement from 25% match requirement

Annual Competition – Housing, Community Facilities, Water and Sewer–2022

Bonus 10 points if not funded CDBG dollars in last 5 years in all categories

Community Facilities and Services- 2022

Four different project subcategories will be awarded under the Community Facilities and Services category.

1. Recreation – Includes but is not limited to parks, splash pads, ball fields and playground equipment.
 - a. regardless of population size, minimum grant award \$50,000 and maximum grant award is \$350,000.
2. Streets, sidewalks, bridges, trails – regular funding levels.
 - a. for population under 5,000, maximum grant award is \$600,000.
 - b. for population over 5,000, maximum grant award is \$750,000.
3. Buildings – Fire station, library, community center, storm shelters.
 - a. for population under 5,000, maximum grant award is \$600,000.
 - b. for population over 5,000, maximum grant award is \$750,000.
4. Services – gas, electrical, fire trucks, broadband, demolition, day care, emergency alert systems.
 - a. for population under 5,000, maximum grant award is \$600,000.
 - b. for population over 5,000, maximum grant award is \$750,000.

Leverage – up to 10% of the required 25% match may be in-kind or volunteer labor 10 bonus points for including other private funding sources such as foundations (not bonds or state and federal agencies). At least 10% of local match needs to come from private source to receive the 10 bonus points.

Project need points will stay at 60 points but up to 5 of those will be for letters of support

Water – 2022

10 bonus points for submitting a project with a regional approach

The highest ranked firm will be asked to enter into negotiations with KDOT for an agreement. Background and Purpose of Project

A strategic highway safety plan (SHSP) is a coordinated and informed approach to reducing highway fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads. By coordinated, we mean that many agencies staffed by people with a variety of skills representing the 4E's of highway safety take part—including engineering, education, law enforcement, and emergency medical services. Informed refers to a need for crash data. It also means using research results in the deployment of proven safety

countermeasures to make travel safer. All public roads include the 10,000 miles of road within the Kansas state highway system and the 130,000 miles of roads owned by cities, counties, and townships.

Since 2009, Kansas has coordinated development and implementation of its SHSP under the direction of an Executive Safety Council (ESC). The role of the ESC is outlined in the current 2020-2024 SHSP:

The Executive Safety Council (ESC) will tap the skills of many agencies to champion transportation safety on all public roads in Kansas by developing and maintaining the Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP). The ESC will:

- analyze data to identify statewide goals and emphasis areas.
- recruit stakeholders for emphasis area teams.
- direct the teams.
- support strategy implementation by the appropriate agencies.

Reporting to the ESC, are Emphasis Area Teams (EAT). The role of the EATs is also outlined in the current SHSP:

Reporting to the ESC, the emphasis area teams will develop action plans, including safety-related programs and projects, to implement the SHSP. The teams will:

- analyze data to select and prioritize strategies.
- develop performance measures.
- identify resources, including funding, legislation, staffing and lead agencies, to support programs and projects.

Moving forward, additional roles are being considered for the ESC. These include:

- Promote collaboration among member agencies.
- Annually promote a “big push” focused on a specific area of highway safety.
- Approve advisory opinions developed by the EATs.
- Establish SHSP policies and procedures.
- Provide advice and guidance, address challenges, and remove barriers for meeting the strategies and goals outlined in the SHSP.

We are also looking to create a Steering Committee made up of a KDOT and non-KDOT representative of each EAT. The Steering Committee will:

- Assume the function of directing the teams from the ESC.
- Serve as liaison between the ESC and EATs.
- Complete assignments given by the ESC.

There are currently nine EATs:

- Roadway Departure
- Occupant Protection
- Impaired Driving
- Older Drivers
- Intersections
- Local Roads
- Teen Drivers
- Pedestrians and Cyclists
- Data Support

Between these nine teams there are 51 strategies based on the 4Es of Highway Safety: Engineering, Education, Enforcement, and Emergency Medical Services. Each of these strategies are further detailed based on:

- Method of implementation
- Program
- Cost
- Lead agency
- Target date
- Output
- Outcome

KDOT is initiating a project to contract with a consultant to coordinate implementation of the Strategic Highway Safety Plan and administer activities of the ESC, Steering Committee, and EATs. KDOT is asking proposers to describe their approach to delivering on this project scope.

The following sections of this RFP provide details on the project schedule, budget, scope, and instructions. Following review of the proposals, KDOT will invite a subset of proposers to participate in a virtual interview to further explain their approach and answer any questions KDOT has about the proposal.

Schedule

KDOT will look to proposers to provide a schedule for deliverables for a three-year contract beginning May 1, 2021.

Budget

KDOT has secured approximately \$350,000 per year in federal funding to be used toward this project. KDOT considers this an upper limit on the funds that will be allocated toward this project.

Scope of Services to Be Performed

The consultant will maintain the overall SHSP safety partners’ involvement process working with the ESC, Steering Committee, and EATs to facilitate effective implementation of the Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP). These tasks are listed below with examples. The tasks and examples are not intended to be definitive or complete.

- Task 1: SHSP Oversight and Promotion:
 - Provide facilitation and guidance on implementation strategies.
 - Evaluate the effectiveness of current strategies and determine if strategies can be enhanced by restructuring or leveraging additional support.
 - Prepare for and host a quarterly management progress meeting with the Steering Committee.
 - Host a website specific to the SHSP.
 - Prepare and distribute a quarterly electronic newsletter.

 - Facilitate meetings and activities of the nine (9) EATs.

- Provide engineering technical expertise to the EATs where applicable.
- Facilitate development of legislative advisory opinions from each EAT.
- Ensure performance measures (output and outcome measures) for each EAT and its corresponding strategies are in place and tracked.
- Provide/update list of known and adapted strategies that were developed by each EAT applicable on Kansas roadways.
- Task 3: ESC Facilitation:
 - Ensure member agency plans are consistent with the SHSP.
 - Provide support to the ESC so the members can review relevant data and information and provide the direction for effective implementation of SHSP strategies.
 - Facilitate quarterly meetings and activities of the ESC.
 - Prepare a meeting binder and distribute to members one (1) week in advance of the meeting.
 - Consolidate legislative advisory opinions from EATs.
 - Identify and coordinate with legislative safety champions.

Instructions for Proposal

The main text of the consultant’s proposal must not exceed eight (8.5x11) pages to address the topics listed below. Proposals shall address the following items:

1. Staffing Plan

Include the following information to describe the proposed team and staffing plan:

- Name, address, and phone number for each proposed organization on the team.
- Provide the name and contact information for the project manager.
- Provide name, contact information, anticipated role, qualification, education, training, and expertise as well as prior relevant experience of all key staff intended to perform services.

2. Project Approach

Please describe your team’s proposed approach to deliver the scope of services listed above.

3. Quality Control Process and Communication

Please describe your team’s process for assuring information quality, timeliness, and communication among the various groups supporting development and implementation of the SHSP.

4. Document Ownership, Storage, and Access

KDOT requires to retain ownership of the documents and amendable final deliverables. KDOT prefers the vendor to maintain these documents on their own servers, and to provide access to same through a web-based user interface.

5. Past Performance

Request for Proposals

Interested parties are invited to submit a proposal to remove and install 5,280 track feet of CWR Relay for the proposed South Kansas & Oklahoma (SKOL) Railroad project.

Scope of Work

CWR Relay consisting of 5,280 track feet (MP 213.3 – 214.3) between Grenola, Kansas and Cambridge, Kansas. Provide all necessary labor, equipment, and logistical services to supply all materials called for to complete this project.

- Provide and install 136# rail (no sticks of rail are to be less than 80-feet long.)
- All rail replaced during this project, shall be discussed in depth at the pre-proposal meeting.
- Provide and install all Welds & OTM – spikes, spike plugs, anchors and plates.
- The use of a Cribber/Adzer will be required.

- All OTM that is removed shall be stacked in an organized manner at the nearest crossing, unless otherwise instructed by the railroad representative. Any material deemed non-salvageable shall be disposed of according to all local and state laws and regulations.
- New rail installation will need to be adjusted/heat-treated with a rail heater to obtain the proper rail neutral temperature of or at the minimum of 105°F in compliance with SKOL Rail CWR Policy where not otherwise stated, the minimum AREMA Standards. Refer to Watco's CWR Policy and Procedures for any additional information.
- Additional details concerning the scope of work needing to be done with each portion of the project, will be addressed in the pre-proposal meeting.

Minimum Requirements

MSA and Roadway Worker Protection

Contractors must complete, and have on file, a current Master Services Agreement with SKOL Railroad. Prior to submitting a proposal:

- Contractors shall comply with all parts of 49 CFR Part 214 and 219 regarding FRA Roadway Worker Safety at all times. Men and equipment shall remain clear of the track unless they have gained Roadway Worker Protection from a qualified person.
- Contractor, contractor employees, agents and/or subcontractors must be enrolled and comply with the FRA 219 approved drug testing program.
- Any subcontracted work will need to be approved by the SKOL Railroad prior to any work starting.
- As of January 1, 2021, all contractors will be required to complete Watco Contractor Orientation at <https://watcocontractor.com/>. Any contractor who was previously enrolled in e-SHORTLINE with Watco in the past, will be required to complete the Watco Contractor Orientation.

Work Windows

Impact to current railroad operations must be kept to a minimum. When work must take place that causes an active track to be taken out of service for the purposes of performing work that pertains to the project, the contractor must pre-arrange a defined work window with the railroad. Contractor can anticipate a minimum work window of eight hours with no more than one schedule of interruption in that time frame, between the hours of 07:00 and 17:00. For work windows extending more than eight hours, a minimum of 72-hours of notification is required to the railroad to arrange this window. Work windows may be arranged seven days a week, if desired. Current railroad operations consist of at least one train per day through the work area. This train operates in the evening hours; however, this schedule is subject to change at any time. This topic will be further discussed during the pre-proposal meeting.

Standards

All standards referenced by the project plans and specifications, as well as all applicable AREMA standards must be upheld during all phases of the project work, unless certain standards are excluded from the project with

written approval by the SKOL Railroad. All rail shall be replaced at standard gauge of 56-½."

Submittals

The following documents shall be submitted by the contractor as part of the project at the times listed:

- Schedule of Work – submitted with proposal
- Certificate of Insurance – submitted prior to construction
- Safety Plan – submitted prior to construction
- Proof of Roadway Worker Training – submitted prior to construction

Other Responsibilities

- Permits – contractor is responsible for all federal, state, and local permits required for the work.
- Utilities – contractor is responsible to locate and protect site utilities.
- Site Clean-up – contractor is responsible for proper site restoration and proper disposal of materials removed in accordance with all local, state and federal laws.

Insurance

Contractor shall purchase required coverage and submit for verification a Certificate of Insurance.

Materials

All materials shall meet the requirements found in the project plans and/or specifications as well as applicable AREMA requirements. Material storage is granted on railroad right of way to the contractor. However, no materials shall be stored closer than 15' from the centerline of any active track at any time. Material and equipment laydown areas and reclaimed materials stockpiling locations shall be discussed and further clarified at the pre-proposal meeting. All removed materials remain property of the SKOL Railroad to be stockpiled as directed by a railroad representative.

Non-Project Areas

The SKOL Railroad has secured access to the project through the railroad right of way. Other access may be obtained by the contractor if he so chooses. All areas (public, private, and railroad right of way) that are used for access to the project, including parts of the railroad right of way which have no proposed work, shall be maintained and/or remediated, incidental to the project, by the contractor to the satisfaction of the property owner if any damage to these areas occurs.

Pre-Proposal Meeting

The SKOL Railroad shall hold a pre-proposal meeting at the project site at 9:00 a.m. (CST) Thursday, March 25, 2021, and shall meet at the Cherryvale Depot in Cherryvale, Kansas. Contractors are required to be present at this meeting to submit a proposal or their proposal can be rejected.

Project Completion

It is expected the contractor must start construction no later than 30-days after being awarded the bid and complete the project within 90-days of being awarded the bid. Executive Order No. 21-01 Temporary Provisions for Employer Payment of Income Tax Withholding for Work Performed in Another State

WHEREAS, securing the health, safety, and economic well-being of residents of the State of Kansas is this Administration's top priority;

WHEREAS, Kansas is facing a crisis—the pandemic and public health emergency of COVID-19—resulting in illness, quarantines, school closures, and temporary closure of businesses resulting in lost wages and financial hardship to Kansas citizens;

WHEREAS, the United States Departments of Health and Human Services declared a public health emergency for COVID-19 beginning January 27, 2020, with now more than 25,018,000 cases of the illness and more than 417,000 deaths as a result of the illness across the United States;

WHEREAS, a State of Disaster Emergency was proclaimed for the State of Kansas on March 12, 2020, and the Kansas Legislature extended that State of Disaster Emergency to March 31, 2021 by enacting Senate Bill 14 during the 2021 Legislation Session;

WHEREAS, as of this date, there have been over 269,255 positive cases of COVID-19 in Kansas, spread among all 105 counties and 3,622 deaths as a result of the illness;

WHEREAS, Kansas law requires employers to withhold from wages whenever the wage recipient is a Kansas resident or the wages are paid on account of personal service performed in Kansas;

WHEREAS, Kansans and Kansas businesses have had to suddenly adapt to the COVID-19 pandemic by adjusting work schedules and employee work sites, including requiring many employees to telework, sometimes across state lines, and

WHEREAS, Kansas must do what it can to facilitate the payment and accounting of income tax withholding for employers who responsibly encouraged or required telework or a change in primary work location to protect their employees and keep businesses operating during the COVID-19 pandemic.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, including the authority granted me by K.S.A. 48-924 and K.S.A. 48-925(b), (c)(1), and (c)(11), in order to mitigate the effects of COVID-19, I hereby direct and order the following:

1. For the period of March 13, 2020, through December 31, 2020, inclusive, for wages paid to employees who are temporarily teleworking in a state other than their primary work location, employers shall have the option to continue to withhold income taxes based on the state of the employee's primary work location and not based on the state in which the employee is teleworking or otherwise working during the pandemic. Any provisions of K.S.A. 79-3296 in conflict with the provisions of this paragraph are hereby suspended.
2. On and after January 1, 2021, employers shall comply with K.S.A. 79-3296 and make all necessary adjustments to withhold from wages whenever the wage recipient is a Kansas resident or the wages are paid on account of personal service performed in Kansas.
3. Other than as provided in paragraph 1, above, this order does not affect any other laws, regulations, or rules relating to the filing requirements in K.S.A. 79-3201 *et seq.*, known as the Kansas income tax act and K.S.A. 79-3294 *et seq.*, known as the Kansas withholding and declaration of estimated tax act.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 21-01. It shall become effective

immediately and remain in force until the earlier of its rescission or the expiration of the statewide State of Disaster Emergency extended by Section 3 of Senate Bill 14 enacted during the 2021 Legislative Session and as extended by any subsequent enactment or resolution.

Executive Order No. 21-02 Extending Certain Executive Orders Relating to the COVID-19 Pandemic

WHEREAS, securing the health, safety, and economic well-being of residents of the State of Kansas is this Administration's top priority;

WHEREAS, Kansas is facing a crisis—the pandemic and public health emergency of COVID-19—resulting in illness, quarantines, school closures, and temporary closure of businesses resulting in lost wages and financial hardship to Kansas citizens;

WHEREAS, the United States Departments of Health and Human Services declared a public health emergency for COVID-19 beginning January 27, 2020, with now more than 25,018,000 cases of the illness and more than 417,000 deaths as a result of the illness across the United States;

WHEREAS, a State of Disaster Emergency was proclaimed for the State of Kansas on March 12, 2020, and the Kansas Legislature extended that State of Disaster Emergency to March 31, 2021 by enacting Senate Bill 14 during the 2021 Legislation Session;

WHEREAS, as of this date, there have been over 269,255 positive cases of COVID-19 in Kansas, spread among all 105 counties and 3,622 deaths as a result of the illness;

WHEREAS, since March 12, 2020, I have issued emergency executive orders to address or combat the COVID-19 pandemic and its effects on Kansans;

WHEREAS, several of those orders expire on January 26, 2021, yet the reasons for those orders persist and they remain necessary to enable the state to respond to and deal with the spread of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, the Legislature, by Senate Bill 14 enacted during the 2021 Legislative Session, has extended the State of Disaster Emergency relating to COVID-19 through March 31, 2021; and

WHEREAS, this Administration will do whatever it can to assist Kansans in these challenging times, including providing relief that will help avoid immediate danger to the health, safety, and welfare of Kansans.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, including the authority granted me by K.S.A. 48-924 and K.S.A. 48-925(b), including the specific subsections of K.S.A. 48-925(c) set

out in each of the individual orders listed below, to continue the emergency response efforts and other measures dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic I hereby direct and order the following:

1. Each executive order listed below is incorporated herein by reference and is hereby re-issued and remains in effect until the statewide State of Disaster Emergency extended by Senate Bill 14, enacted during the 2021 Legislative Session, relating to COVID-19 expires, or until the order is rescinded, whichever is earlier.
 - a. 20-37 – Allowing certain deferred tax deadlines and payments during state of disaster emergency
 - b. 20-39 – Extending professional and occupational licenses during state of disaster emergency
 - c. 20-40 – Temporarily allowing notaries and witnesses to act via audio-video communication technology during state of disaster emergency
 - d. 20-43 – Temporary relief from certain restrictions concerning shared work programs during state of disaster emergency
 - e. 20-56 – Amended Licensure, Certification, and Registration for persons and Licensure of “Adult Care Homes” during state of disaster emergency
 - f. 20-61 – Temporarily prohibiting certain foreclosures and evictions
 - g. 20-66 – Amended provisions related to drivers’ license and vehicle registration and regulation during state of disaster emergency
 - h. 20-70 – Provisions related to drivers’ license and identification cards during the state of disaster emergency
2. This order supersedes and amends the expiration dates noted in each executive order listed in paragraph 1 above.

Executive Order No. 21-03

Conditional and Temporary Relief from Certain Motor Carrier Rules and Regulations

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 48-925(b) provides that the Governor may issue orders and proclamations which shall have the force and effect of law under subsection (b) of K.S.A. 48-924;

WHEREAS, severe winter cold, in the mid-west and upper mid-west, has caused an interruption to the delivery of essential home heating fuels;

WHEREAS, these conditions require the operation of motor carriers and drivers of commercial motor vehicles for the purposes of providing direct assistance to supplement State and local efforts in the restoration of services and relief in the affected area(s) of the State of Kansas;

WHEREAS, this disaster has caused or threatens to cause an emergency as defined in 49 C.F.R. 390.5, as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-3f, and which has or threatens to interrupt the delivery of essential services or essential supplies or otherwise immediately threatens physical harm or injury to persons, the public welfare and/or substantial damage to property;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby acknowledge a state of emergency exists in Kansas and declare it necessary to assist and expedite all disaster recovery efforts. In order to accommodate this need and to provide assistance to the citizens of Kansas in this emergency situation, I hereby order the following:

1. This declaration applies to motor carriers directly participating in relief efforts; and
2. In accordance with Title 49 C.F.R. § 390.23(a)(1) allowing for the suspension of motor carrier regulations in the event of a regional emergency, the requirements contained in the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations, Title 49 C.F.R. Parts 390-399 are hereby suspended through the duration of the motor carrier’s assistance in the disaster relief effort not to exceed a period of thirty (30) days from the date of the initial declaration unless the order is rescinded or expanded by executive order or concurrent resolution of the legislature; and
3. All other applicable state and federal regulations shall apply to include but not limited to: Title 49 C.F.R. Part 382, Controlled Substances and Alcohol Use and Testing; the Kansas Motor Vehicle Driver’s License Act, K.S.A. 8-234 *et. seq.* and Title 49 C.F.R. Part 383 Commercial Driver’s License Standards as adopted by the Kansas Uniform Commercial Drivers’ License Act, K.S.A. 8-2,125 *et. seq.*, the federal Minimum Levels of Financial Responsibility (insurance requirements) Title 49 C.F.R. Part 387 as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-3n and state insurance requirements as provided in K.A.R. 82-4-23, and the regulations governing transportation of hazardous materials in Kansas in 49 C.F.R. Part 107, 171, 172, 173, 177, 178 and 180 as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-20.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 21-03 and shall become effective immediately. This order will continue in effect until 11:59 PM on February 28, 2021, or until rescinded, whichever occurs first.

Executive Order No. 21-04

Temporary Relief from Certain Tuberculin Testing Requirements During State of Disaster Emergency

WHEREAS, securing the health, safety, and economic well-being of residents of the State of Kansas is this Administration's top priority;

WHEREAS, Kansas is facing a crisis—the pandemic and public health emergency of COVID-19—resulting in illness, quarantines, school closures, and temporary closure of businesses resulting in lost wages and financial hardship to Kansas citizens;

WHEREAS, the United States Departments of Health and Human Services declared a public health emergency for COVID-19 beginning January 27, 2020, with now more than 27,600,000 cases of the illness and more than 486,460 deaths as a result of the illness across the United States;

WHEREAS, a State of Disaster Emergency was proclaimed for the State of Kansas on March 12, 2020, and that State of Disaster Emergency continues as a result of extensions approved by the Legislature and the State Finance Council;

WHEREAS, as of this date, there have been over 288,717 positive cases of COVID-19 in Kansas, spread among all 105 counties and 4,521 deaths as a result of the illness;

WHEREAS, persons who reside and work in adult care home settings, as defined by K.S.A. 39-923, will be given access to vaccines as supplies are available under Phase 1 of Kansas' COVID-19 Vaccination Plan, and persons who reside, attend or work in other congregate settings will be given access to vaccines as supplies are available under Phase 2. Amongst other types of settings included in Phase 2's "congregate settings," such settings may include residential and day services programs for persons with disabilities or the frail and elderly, preschools, school age programs, day care settings, and various residential settings and placements for foster youth;

WHEREAS, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) issued interim recommendations for the use Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines for prevention of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) in the United States. Both vaccines are lipid nanoparticle-formulated, nucleoside-modified mRNA vaccines encoding the prefusion spike glycoprotein of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19.

WHEREAS, on November 20, 2020, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC") issued interim clinical guidelines for mRNA vaccines (which apply only to the Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines), and the CDC mRNA Immunization Guidelines recommend if the mRNA COVID-19 vaccination has been given, tuberculin ("TB") screening drawing blood for interferon gamma release assay ("IGRA") or utilizing the Tuberculin Skin Test ("TST") should be deferred until 4 weeks after the Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine 2-dose is completed;

WHEREAS, this Administration will do whatever it can to assist Kansans in these challenging times, including providing relief that will help avoid threats to the health, safety, and welfare of Kansans by following CDC immunization guidelines for tuberculin testing.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, including the authority granted me by K.S.A. 48-924 and K.S.A. 48-925(b), (c)(1), and (c)(11), in order to mitigate the effects of COVID-19, I hereby direct and order the following:

1. Definitions

- a. "Adult care homes" or "facility" as used in this order includes any nursing facility, nursing facility for mental health, intermediate care facility for people with intellectual disability, assisted living facility, residential healthcare facility, home plus, boarding care home and adult day care facility; all of which are classifications of adult care homes and are required to be licensed by the secretary for aging and disability services in accordance with K.S.A. 39-923(a).
- b. "Congregate setting" or "program" as used in this order includes only those congregate settings identified in Phase 2 of Kansas' COVID Vaccination Plan licensed by the Kansas Department for Health and Environment ("KDHE") or the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services ("KDADS"), and if such State agencies require tuberculin testing of recipients, staff or unpaid persons as a requirement to entry or onboarding.
- c. "Staff" as used in this order includes employees, consultants, contractors, volunteers, and caregivers who provide care to residents of an adult care home, and students in such adult care home's nurse aide training programs or from affiliated academic institutions. "Staff" shall also include employees, consultants, contractors, volunteers, and caregivers who provide care to recipients of services offered in a congregate setting.
- d. "Resident" as used in this order shall include all residents of adult care homes as defined by K.S.A. 39-923(a).
- e. "Recipient" shall include persons who receive services in a congregate setting only if such persons are required by KDHE or KDADS to receive tuberculin testing for admission or receipt of the services offered by the program.

2. TB Testing of Staff and Residents in Adult Care Homes and Congregate Settings

- a. According to the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines, inactive vaccines do not interfere with TB test results, and there is no immunologic reason to believe either a TST or IGRA tuberculin test would affect the safety or effectiveness of mRNA COVID-19 vaccines. There is no data to inform the impact of the COVID-19 mRNA vaccines on either the TST or IGRA tuberculin test for infection.

(continued)

- b. At the time of entry or onboarding, the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines recommend that TB symptom screening be performed on all staff, residents and applicable recipients. If the facility or program is utilizing the IGRA, the blood draw for the interferon gamma release assay should be done prior to the COVID-19 vaccination. If the facility or program is utilizing the TST, the skin test should be placed prior to the COVID-19 vaccination. If the mRNA COVID-19 vaccination has been given and TB testing needs to be performed, defer the TST or IGRA until 4 weeks after the COVID-19 vaccine 2-dose completion. Staff, residents, and recipients who have received the COVID-19 vaccination should weigh the risks and benefits of delaying TST/IGRA tuberculin testing with their medical providers.
- c. K.A.R. 28-4-126(c), applicable to preschools, day care homes or child care centers licensed by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, that requires tuberculin testing of each person living, working or regularly volunteering in such preschool, day care home or child care center is suspended. During the period K.A.R. 28-4-126(c) is suspended, tuberculin testing for residents, recipients and staff of preschools, day care homes and child care centers shall be conducted in accordance with the protocols established by the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines described in paragraph 2(b). The requirements of K.A.R. 28-4-126(c)(2) for notification to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment of any significant exposure to an active case of tuberculosis, or symptoms compatible with tuberculosis develop, shall otherwise be effective.
- d. K.A.R. 28-4-126(c) and K.A.R. 28-4-126(e), applicable to group boarding homes and residential facilities licensed by the Kansas Department for Children and Families, that requires tuberculin testing of each person living, working or regularly volunteering in such group boarding home or residential facility is suspended. During the period K.A.R. 28-4-126(c) and K.A.R. 28-4-126(e) are suspended, tuberculin testing for residents, recipients and staff of group boarding homes and residential facilities shall be conducted in accordance with the protocols established by the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines described in paragraph 2(b). The requirements of K.A.R. 28-4-126(c)(2) for notification to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment of any significant exposure to an active case of tuberculosis, or symptoms compatible with tuberculosis develop, shall otherwise be effective.
- e. K.A.R. 28-4-291(c)(2), applicable to attendant care centers licensed by the Kansas Department for Children and Families, that requires each attendant shall present written proof of freedom from active tuberculosis is suspended. During the period 28-4-291(c)(2) is suspended, tuberculin testing for attendants of attendant care centers shall be conducted in accordance with the protocols established by the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines described in paragraph 2(b).
- f. K.A.R. 28-4-356(b)(2)(C) and K.A.R. 28-4-356(d)(4)(5)(6), applicable to detention and secure care centers and staff secure facilities licensed by the Kansas Department for Children and Families, that requires tuberculin testing of each person living, working or regularly volunteering in such detention or secure care center and staff secure facility is suspended. During the period K.A.R. 28-4-356(b)(2)(C) and K.A.R. 28-4-356(d)(4)(5)(6), are suspended, tuberculin testing for staff, volunteers, and residents of a detention or secure care center or staff secure facility shall be conducted in accordance with the protocols established by the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines described in paragraph 2(b). The requirements of K.A.R. 28-4-356(d)(4)(5) for notification to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment of any significant exposure to an active case of tuberculosis, or symptoms compatible with tuberculosis develop, shall otherwise be effective.
- g. K.A.R. 28-4-590(c)(1), applicable to school age programs licensed by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, that requires a Mantoux tuberculin test when an operator, program director, staff member, child or youth in such program is exposed to an active case of tuberculosis or, if the location of the program is in an area identified by the local health department or the Secretary of KDHE as a high-risk area for tuberculosis exposure, is suspended. During the period K.A.R. 28-4-590(c)(1) is suspended, tuberculin testing for residents, recipients and staff of school age programs shall be conducted in accordance with the protocols established by the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines described in paragraph 2(b). The requirement of K.A.R. 28-4-590(c)(1) that such individuals shall obtain a chest x-ray if there is exposure to an active case of tuberculosis and all other provisions of K.A.R. 28-4-590(c) shall otherwise be effective.
- h. K.A.R. 28-4-819(e)(1), applicable to family foster home licensed by the Kansas Department for Children and Families, that requires tuberculin testing of each person living, working or regularly volunteering in such family foster home is suspended. During the period K.A.R. 28-4-819(e)(1) is suspended, tuberculin testing for residents, and youth in placement of a family foster home shall be conducted in accordance with the protocols established by the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines described in paragraph 2(b). The requirements of K.A.R. 28-4-819(e)(3) for notification to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment of any significant exposure to an active case of tuberculosis, or symptoms compatible with tuberculosis develop, shall otherwise be effective.

- i. K.A.R. 28-4-1259(b)(7)(A) and KAR 28-4-1259(f)(5)(A)(B), applicable to staff secure facilities licensed by the Kansas Department for Children and Families, that requires tuberculin testing of each person living, working or regularly volunteering in such staff secure facility are suspended. During the period K.A.R. 28-4-1259(b)(7)(A) and KAR 28-4-1259(f)(5)(A)(B) are suspended, tuberculin testing for staff, volunteers and residents off a staff secure facility shall be conducted in accordance with the protocols established by the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines described in paragraph 2(b). The requirements of K.A.R. 28-4-1259(f)(7)(D) and K.A.R. 28-4-1259(f)(5)(A) for notification to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment of any significant exposure to an active case of tuberculosis, or symptoms compatible with tuberculosis develop, shall otherwise be effective.
- j. K.A.R. 28-39-161(b)(3), applicable to adult care homes licensed by the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services, that requires tuberculosis skin testing to be administered to each new resident and staff as soon as residency or employment begins, unless the resident or staff has documentation of a previous significant reaction is suspended. During the period K.A.R. 28-39-161(b)(3) is suspended, tuberculin testing for residents and staff of adult care homes shall be conducted in accordance with the protocols established by the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines described in paragraph 2(b). The requirements of K.A.R. 28-39-161(b)(3) for each facility to follow the CDC recommendations for prevention and control of tuberculosis shall otherwise be effective.
- k. K.A.R. 28-39-163(h)(3), applicable to adult care homes licensed by the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services, that requires tuberculosis testing for each professional staff before employment or not later than seven days after employment is suspended. During the period K.A.R. 28-39-163(h)(3) is suspended, tuberculin testing for residents and staff of adult care homes shall be conducted in accordance with the protocols established by the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines described in paragraph 2(b). The requirement of K.A.R. 28-39-161(b)(3) for each facility to perform health screening for each professional staff before employment or not later than seven days after employment is otherwise effective.
- i. K.A.R. 28-51-103(c)(6), applicable to home health aides licensed by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, that requires evidence in the personnel records of a negative tuberculin skin test or chest x-ray upon employment is suspended. During the period K.A.R. 28-51-103(c)(6) is suspended, tuberculin testing for home health aides shall be conducted in accordance with the protocols established by the CDC Interim mRNA Immunization Guidelines described in paragraph

2(b). The requirements applicable to home health aides of K.A.R. 28-39-161(b)(3) for evidence of good health upon employment and subsequent periodic health assessments or physical examinations given in accordance with agency policies after employment shall otherwise be effective.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order 21-04. It shall become effective immediately and remain in force until rescinded or until the expiration of the statewide State of Disaster Emergency extended by Section 3 of Senate Bill 14 enacted during the 2021 Legislative Session and as extended by any subsequent enactment or resolution.

Permanent Administrative Regulation

Article 48.— VOTE CENTERS

7-48-1. Vote centers; plans; report. (a) For purposes of this regulation, each of the following terms shall have the meaning specified in this subsection:

(1) "Election day" means the day for casting ballots for any national, state, county, township, city, and school primary and general election, question-submitted election, or other election authorized by law and conducted by the county election officer.

(2) "Electronic poll book" means the electronic version of the poll book, as described in K.S.A. 25-2507 and amendments thereto, used at a vote center or voting place.

(3) "Vote center" means a voting place where any registered voter in a county with a vote center plan implemented may cast a ballot on election day.

(4) "Voting place" has the meaning specified in K.S.A. 25-2506, and amendments thereto.

(b) Pursuant to K.S.A. 25-2701 and amendments thereto, any county election officer may authorize the use of vote centers allowing all voters within the county to vote at any polling location on election day following submittal of a plan and receipt of approval by the Kansas secretary of state. Once a vote center plan is in effect, each polling location under the jurisdiction of the county election officer shall be a vote center.

(c) The plan specified in subsection (b), which shall be signed by the chairman of the county commission and the county election officer and received by the Kansas secretary of state at least six months before implementation, shall provide the following:

(1) The implementation date of the first election in which vote centers are to be used. A county election official shall not utilize vote centers for the first time in a general or primary election in an even-numbered year;

(2) the number of vote centers that will be established and the number of polling places that will be reduced;

(continued)

(3) the location of each vote center. For each location identified, the plan shall provide the following:

(A) Certification that each location complies with the Americans with disabilities act (ADA) accessibility requirements;

(B) a description of each vote center. The description of each vote center shall include at least the number of voting machines, tables, chairs, and board workers for that vote center location and the number of parking spaces and designated handicap parking spaces available for that vote center location;

(C) a detailed description of all hardware, firmware, and software for all voting equipment and electronic poll books that will be used in the vote center;

(D) a statement that each piece of voting equipment has been certified by the United States election assistance commission and the Kansas secretary of state's office;

(E) a statement acknowledging that each electronic poll book to be used has been successfully used in at least one jurisdiction in the United States before using the poll book at a vote center location;

(F) a detailed testing plan that provides an estimate of the highest volume of voters at each vote center and certifies that testing has been done to ensure that the vote center can accommodate at least that volume; and

(G) a contingency plan designed to both prevent a disruption of the vote center process and ensure that the election is properly conducted if a disruption occurs. At a minimum, the contingency plan shall address likely impediments that could cause issues at vote centers, including the following:

(i) Inclement weather;

(ii) complete loss of connectivity for any length of time to electronic poll books or voting machines that includes a plan of preventing voters from voting at multiple locations;

(iii) higher than anticipated volumes of voters; and

(iv) unavailability of a vote center;

(4) a description of the methods and standards that the county election official will use to ensure the security of voting conducted at vote centers. As part of these security methods, an electronic poll book shall not be connected in any way to a voting system. The county election official shall also certify that each vote center will have a secure connection that has real-time access to an electronic poll book and prevents any voter from voting more than once at that vote center or at any other vote center during the same election; and

(5) a public outreach plan that involves a local working group designed to inform county citizens of the change to vote centers. This public outreach plan shall include the names of local officials, county residents, and any other individuals that are part of the local working group developing and implementing the plan. The public outreach plan shall also describe the activities that the local working group will utilize to educate the public on vote centers.

(d)(1) If a county election officer intends to implement a change to the vote center plan involving the requirements in paragraph (c)(3)(C), the county election officer shall notify the secretary of state no later than 90 days before implementing the change. The notice shall be accompanied by the statements required by paragraphs (c)

(3)(D) and (E) and the testing plan and the contingency plan required by paragraphs (c)(3)(F) and (G).

(2) If a county election officer intends to change or close a vote center location, the county election officer shall notify the secretary of state upon the determination being made and any new vote center location being selected. This notice shall be submitted no later than 90 days before the first election in which the vote center location closing or change is to occur. If the 90-day advance notice is impracticable, the county election officer may seek approval from the secretary of state to waive the 90-day requirement, but notice shall still be provided before implementing the changes identified in this paragraph.

(3) If a county election officer intends to change the vote center plan involving the security methods and standards required in paragraph (c)(4), the county election officer shall notify the secretary of state no later than 90 days before implementation of the change. If the 90-day advance notice is impracticable, the county election officer may seek approval from the secretary of state to waive the 90-day requirement.

(e) Following the first year that a vote center plan is implemented, the county election officer shall submit the county's vote center plan, which shall include any updates or changes since last submission to the secretary of state, six months before the next August primary election occurring in the year identified in K.S.A. 25-101(a)(1), and amendments thereto. The county election officer shall then resubmit the plan at the same time every four years.

(f) The process for casting a ballot at each vote center shall comply with all statutory requirements in Kansas, including the provisions in K.S.A. 25-2901 et seq., and amendments thereto.

(g) Following the first election in which a county utilizes vote centers, the county election officer shall submit to the secretary of state a report that includes the following:

(1) The number of voters and provisional voters who utilized each vote center;

(2) the estimated time that a voter waited during peak voting hours at each vote center; and

(3) any logistical, voting machine, or network problems encountered at any vote center.

(h) If a county election officer in consultation with the county commissioners wants to return to a precinct model of voting rather than the vote center model, the county election officer and the county commissioners shall submit a plan to the Kansas secretary of state. The plan, which shall be signed by the chairman of the county commission and the county election officer and received by the Kansas secretary of state at least six months before implementation, shall provide the following:

(1) The implementation date of the first election in which precinct model voting will be used;

(2) the number of polling places that will be used;

(3) the location of each polling place. For each location identified, the plan shall be accompanied by the following:

(A) Statement of compliance with ADA accessibility requirements;

(B) a description of each polling place. The description of each polling place shall include at least the number of voting machines, tables, chairs, and board workers expected to be used at that polling place and the number of

parking spaces and designated handicap parking spaces available for that polling place;

(C) a detailed description of all hardware, firmware, and software for all voting equipment and electronic poll books that will be used in the polling places;

(D) a statement that each piece of voting equipment has been certified by the United States election assistance commission and the Kansas secretary of state's office; and

(E) a statement acknowledging that each electronic poll book to be used has been successfully used in at least one jurisdiction in the United States before being used in a polling place; and

(4) a public outreach plan that involves a local working group designed to inform county citizens of the change back to precinct voting. This public outreach plan shall include the names of local officials, county residents, and any other individuals that are part of the local working group developing and implementing the plan. The public outreach plan shall also describe the activities that the local working group will utilize to educate the public on the change back to precinct voting. 21-41-2. Submission of complaints and responses. Each complaint and each response to a complaint shall be submitted in hard copy, either typed or handwritten; by facsimile; or by electronic mail. Any complaint may be submitted on a form provided by the commission. 21-41-3. Contents of complaints. Each complaint shall contain the following:

- The full name and address of the complainant;
- the full name and address of the respondent;
- the alleged unlawful employment practice or unlawful discriminatory practice and a statement of the nature thereof;
- the date or dates of the alleged unlawful employment practice or unlawful discriminatory practice, and,

if the alleged unlawful employment practice or unlawful discriminatory practice is of a continuing nature, the dates between which continuing acts of discrimination are alleged to have occurred; and

(e) a statement as to any other action filed or pending in any court or other forum based on the same grievance as is alleged in the complaint, together with a statement as to the status or disposition of the other action. (b) Administrative expedience. A complaint shall be subject to dismissal on grounds of administrative expedience if at least one of the following conditions is met:

- The complainant fails to cooperate with investigation of the complaint.
- The complainant's objections to a proposed conciliation agreement are without substance.

(3) Noticing the complaint for hearing would be otherwise impracticable.
