Coffeyville Resources Crude Transportation, LLC Hooser Station has applied for a Class I operating permit renewal in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-510 et al. The purpose of a Class I permit is to identify the sources and types of regulated air pollutants emitted from the facility; the emission limitations, standards, and requirements applicable to each source; and the monitoring, record keeping, and reporting requirements applicable to each source as of the effective date of permit issuance.

Coffeyville Resources Crude Transportation, LLC – Hooser Station, PO Box 3516, Bartlesville, OK 74006, owns and operates a crude petroleum pipeline station located at Section 13, Township 34S, Range 7E, Cowley County, Kansas.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation, and all information relied upon during the permit application review process are available for public review during normal business hours of 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the KDHE, Bureau of Air (BOA), 1000 SW Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, KS 66612-1366 and at the South Central District Office, 300 W. Please direct written comments or questions regarding the proposed permit to Allan Ddamulira, KDHE, BOA, 1000 SW Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, KS 66612-1366. In order to be considered in formulating a final permit decision, written comments must be received no later than 12:00 p.m. Monday, April 20, 2020.

A person may request a public hearing be held on the proposed permit. The request for a public hearing shall be in writing and set forth the basis for the request. The written request must be submitted to Allan Ddamulira, KDHE BOA, 1000 SW Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, KS 66612-1366, no later than 12:00 p.m. Monday, April 20, 2020 in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has a 45-day review period, which will start concurrently with the public comment period, within which to object to the proposed permit. If the EPA has not objected in writing to the issuance of the permit within the 45-day review period, any person may petition the administrator of the EPA to review the permit. The 60-day public petition period will directly follow the EPA's 45-day review period. Interested parties may contact KDHE to determine if the EPA's 45-day review period has been waived.

Any such petition shall be based only on objections to the permit that were raised with reasonable specificity during the public comment period provided for in this notice, unless the petitioner demonstrates that it was impracticable to raise such objections within such period, or unless the grounds for such objection arose after such period. The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) and the Kansas Department on Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) will conduct a public hearing at 9:00 a.m. Thursday, May 21, 2020, in the Basement Conference Room, New England Building, 503 S. Kansas Ave., Topeka, KS 66603, to consider the adoption of proposed amendments to K.A.R. 129-10-31 concerning the Quality Care Assessments for beds in a skilled nursing care facility.

The proposed amendment to K.A.R. 129-10-31 would increase the annual assessment to \$818 per bed for facilities identified by K.A.R. 129-10-31 (b)(1) and to \$4,908 per bed for facilities identified by K.A.R. 129-10-31 (b) (2). Amending the regulation will not change the Quality Care Assessment program for either providers of nursing facility services or any other government agencies. The proposed changes align the Quality Care Assessment rates referenced in the regulation with the rates stated in K.S.A. 75-7435. The economic impact statement is available from the agency contact person listed below.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a 60-day public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation.
