POLLUTION CONTROL PERMIT

In accordance with state regulations 28-16-57 through 63 and 28-18-1 through 4, and the authority vested with the state by the administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, tentative permits have been prepared for the water pollution abatement facility for the feedlot described below.

The tentative determinations for permit content are based on preliminary staff review, applying the appropriate standards and regulations of the state of Kansas and the EPA. The permit requires control of any existing or potential discharges to achieve the goal of "no discharge" whenever possible. The permit, upon issuance, will constitute a state water pollution control and national pollutant discharge elimination system permit.

If no objections are received, the Secretary of Health and Environment will issue the final determination within 30 days of this notice. If response to this notice indicates significant public interest, a public hearing may be held in conformance with state regulation 28-16-61.

ON PROPOSED  
ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Friday, December 9, in the third floor conference room of the Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of two proposed temporary regulations of the Insurance Department.

Copies of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statements may be obtained by writing to the Commissioner of Insurance, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, 66612. The following is a summary of the economic impact statements and the regulations:

**K.A.R. 40-4-35a** is a new regulation which adopts by reference the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' model regulation to implement the Medicare program revisions contained in the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act of 1988 (P.L. 100-360).

**K.A.R. 40-4-35** adopts the September 1988 edition of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' model regulation for minimum standards for Medicare supplement insurance subject to various Kansas amendments and additions.

These regulations are necessary to affect the orderly implementation and regulation of insurance policies designed to supplement Medicare in conformity with the revised federal requirements imposed by the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act of 1988. Therefore, the economic impact on the public, insurers writing Medicare supplement insurance and the Kansas Insurance Department will be the result of the federal law itself.

There is no less costly or less intrusive means of accomplishing the objective of these regulations since P. L. 100-360 specifically references the NAIC model regulations being proposed for adoption as the minimum standards necessary for compliance.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Commissioner of Insurance at the address above. The period of time between the date of publication of this notice and the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

A sentence of life imprisonment for a class A felony may not be enhanced under the provisions of the habitual criminal act. A defendant sentenced for a class A felony is eligible for parole after serving 15 years of confinement. **Counties and County Officers—General Provisions—Home Rule; Advisory Elections.** John M. Duma, Associate County Counselor, Wyandotte County, Kansas City, October 28, 1988.

The question of whether the city's sale of a municipally owned utility is county business is an administrative decision to be made by the county commissioners in their exercise of the county's powers of home rule. Courts have granted counties great latitude in making such decisions. However, the county's authority to exercise its powers of home rule is subject to the limitations upon such grant of power found in K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 19-101a. Limitation number five prohibits a county from superseding or impairing a city's ability to determine its local affairs pursuant to its constitutional and statutory powers of home rule. Whether an advisory election will impair a city's ability to determine its local affairs must be determined on a case by case basis taking all of the facts and circumstances into consideration. Article 7.—AGENTS

**40-7-13. Agents; scope, subclassification; type and conduct of examinations; reexamination.** (a) The licensing examination for each agent shall test the applicant's knowledge in the following areas:

- (1) The laws of Kansas, including:
  - (A) pertinent provisions of the statutes of Kansas; and
  - (B) rules and regulations of the insurance department;
- (2) General insurance, including:
  - (A) duties and responsibilities of a licensed agent; and
  - (B) basic insurance knowledge; and
- (3) the specific classes or subclasses of insurance for which application is made.

(b) For examination purposes, the classifications and subclassifications of insurance shall be as follows:

Class	Subclass
(1) Life insurance;	
(2) health insurance;	
(3) casualty insurance	title insurance;
(4) property insurance;	crop insurance; and
(5) variable contracts.	

(c) Persons failing to score at least 70 percent on any examination shall have failed that examination and shall not be qualified for a license for that class or subclass. Notification of the result of each examination shall be provided to the applicant only.

(d) Examinations shall be conducted as follows:

(1) Each applicant shall be advised of eligibility for examination by the commissioner or the commissioner's designee.

(2) The applicant's licensing application shall remain effective for a period of one year from the date received. On and after an examination registration shall be effective for a period of 90 days from the date the registration is validated. Article 31.—MOTOR-VEHICLE FUEL  
 MEASURING DEVICES

**99-31-2. Registration form.** Each application for issuance or renewal of a testing service company license shall provide the following information: (a) the name and business address of the applicant;

(b) the name, home address, social security number and birthday of all technical representatives who repair or test dispensing devices for the applicant;

(c) the signature and title of the applicant or representative;

(d) the date of submission of the application;

(e) a certification that the applicant is fully qualified to install, service, repair or recondition dispensing devices; and

(f) a certification that the applicant has in its possession or available for use sufficient standards and equipment adequate to test dispensing devices. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 83-403; implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 83-402 as amended by L. 1988, Ch. 397 § 2; effective May 1, 1986; amended Dec. 26, 1988.)

**99-31-3. Conformance with handbook 44.** Each testing service company shall conduct each test and make each repair to dispensing devices in conformance with the requirements of the national bureau of standards handbook 44 entitled "Specifications, Tolerances and Other Technical Requirements for Weighing and Measuring Devices" as adopted by reference in K.A.R. 99-25-1. Copies of this material or the pertinent portions of it are available from the office of weights and measures, division of inspections of the state board of agriculture, Topeka, Kansas. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 83-403; effective May 1, 1986; amended Dec. 26, 1988.)

**99-31-4. Minimum required equipment.** Each testing service company shall have at each place of business sufficient standards and equipment to adequately test dispensing devices as set forth in the notes section of the general code, liquid-measuring device code, vehicle-tank meter code and LPG liquid measuring device code contained in the national bureau of standards handbook 44 entitled "Specifications, Tolerances and Other Technical Requirements for Weighing and Measuring Devices" as adopted by reference in K.A.R. 99-25-1. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 83-403; effective May 1, 1986; amended Dec. 26, 1988.)

**99-31-5. Removal of rejection tags.** (a) For testing or repairing the dispensing device, each licensed testing service company shall be authorized to remove an official rejection tag or other mark placed on a dispensing device by authority of the state sealer.

(b) After the test is conducted, and necessary repairs are completed, the testing service company shall place the dispensing device in service until examination by the state sealer or a deputy sealer. Where the dispensing device is not repaired properly, the testing service company shall replace the rejection tag or other mark with a substitute rejection tag or other mark supplied by the state sealer.

(c) This regulation shall apply to new and used dispensing devices. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 83-403; effective May 1, 1986; amended Dec. 26, 1988.)

**99-31-6. Placed in service report.** Each testing service company shall submit to the state sealer a placed in service report within 15 days after a dispensing device has been restored to service or placed in service. The placed in service report shall be executed in triplicate. The original of the properly executed report together with any official rejection tag removed from the device shall be mailed to the state sealer. A duplicate copy of the report shall be delivered to the owner or operator of the dispensing device while the third copy of the report shall be retained by the testing service company. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 83-403; effective May 1, 1986; amended Dec. 28, 1988.)

#### PERMANENT ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

#### Article 2.—AGRICULTURAL SEED

**4-2-1. Labeling prohibitions.** Any agricultural seed shall be deemed mislabeled within the meaning of the act if there appears on the label, container, invoice, other accompanying literature, or any advertising media, any statement directly or indirectly implying that any agricultural seed is recommended or endorsed by the Kansas state board of agriculture or its state seed laboratory, or any of its other divisions. This regulation shall become effective on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-1427; implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-1417; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-2-8. Methods of analyses.** (a) Subject to the provisions of subsection (c) of this regulation, the methods of analysis shall be those published in "Rules for Seed Testing—Association of Official Seed Analysts," October 1987 edition. Copies of the pertinent portions of the material adopted by reference may be obtained from the inspections division of the state board of agriculture.

(b) For the purpose of this regulation the term "noxious-weed seed" used in the material adopted by reference in subsection (a) of this regulation shall

mean "restricted weed seed" as defined in K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-1415(k).

(c) The following restrictions shall apply in addition to tolerances for testing of seed found in section 5 of the material adopted by reference in subsection (a) of this regulation:

(1) Restricted weed seed tolerances shall not exceed the limitations set forth in K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-1415(k); and

(2) no tolerance shall be applied to any seed component which is guaranteed as "none" on the label.

(d) This regulation shall become effective on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-1427; implementing K.S.A. 2-1423; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended May 1, 1983; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-2-18. Label requirements for seed delivered to wholesalers.** Seed delivered in bulk to a wholesaler after conditioning shall be completely labeled by an invoice or master label attached to the bulk container. Seed delivered to a wholesaler in bags or other containers may be labeled by an invoice or master label that bears a lot number and all other information required by law provided that each individual bag or other container is properly identified with the lot number shown on the invoice or master label clearly and readably stenciled on each individual bag or other container. Each bag or other container which does not bear a lot number that corresponds to an invoice or master label shall be completely labeled. This regulation shall become effective on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-1427; implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-1417; effective Jan. 1, 1989.)

#### Article 7.—MILK AND DAIRY PRODUCTS

**4-7-716. Adoption by reference.** (a) Except for sections 1(X), 2, 9, 15, 16, 17, and 18, the grade A pasteurized milk ordinance, recommended for adoption and contained in the 1985 revision of the 1978 "recommendations of the public health service and the food and drug administration," as amended effective September 16, 1987, is hereby adopted by reference except as provided in subsection (b). Copies of the pertinent portions of the material adopted by reference shall be available from the inspections division of the Kansas state board of agriculture. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-737a; implementing K.S.A. 65-737a; effective May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1983; amended May 1, 1986; amended Dec. 26, 1989.)

#### Article 8.—NOXIOUS WEEDS

**4-8-14. Definitions.** (a) "2,4-D" shall mean (2,4-dichlorophenoxy)acetic acid.

(b) "Picloram" shall mean 4-amino-3,5,6-trichloropicolinic acid.

(c) "Dicamba" shall mean 3,6-dichloro-o-anisic acid.

(d) "Glyphosate" shall mean N-(phosphonomethyl) glycine.

(e) "Fosamine" shall mean ethyl hydrogen (amino-carbonyl) phosphonate.

(continued)

(f) "Bromacil" shall mean 5-bromo-3sec-butyl-6-methyluracil.

(g) "MSMA" shall mean monosodium methanearsonate.

(h) "Sulfomethuron" shall mean methyl 2[[[4,6-dimethyl-2-pyrimidinyl) amino]-carbonyl]amino[sulfonyl]benzoate.

(i) "Chlorsulfuron" shall mean 2-chloro-N-(4-methoxy-6-methyl-1,3,5-triazin-2-y)aminocarbonyl]benzenesulfonamide.

(j) "Trifluralin" shall mean (a,a,a-trifluoro-2,6-dinitro-N,N-dipropyl-p-toluidine).

(k) "Fluazifop" shall mean butyl (RS)-2-[4-[[5-trifluoromethyl]-2-pyridinyl]oxy]phenoxy]propanoate.

(l) "Sethoxydim" shall mean 2-[1-(ethoxyimino)butyl]-5-[2-(ethylthio)propyl]-3-hydroxy-2-cyclohexen-1-one.

(m) "Imazapyr" shall mean 2-[4,5-dihydro-4-methyl-4-(1-methylethyl)-5-oxo-1H-imidazol-2-yl]-3-pyridinecarboxylic acid.

(n) "Triclopyr" shall mean [(3,5,6-trichloro-2-pyridinyl)oxy] acetic acid.

(o) "Tebuthiuron" shall mean N-[5-(1,1-dimethylethyl)-3,4-thiadiazol-2-yl]-N,N'-dimethylurea. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-1315; effective May 1, 1982; amended May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1986; amended May 1, 1988; amended Dec. 26, 1988.)

**4-8-39. Adoption by reference.** Control practices contained in the "official multiflora rose control program" published by the Kansas state board of agriculture on July 25, 1988 is hereby adopted by reference and shall apply to the control of multiflora rose in the state of Kansas. Copies of this publication are available from the plant health division of the Kansas state board of agriculture, Topeka, Kansas. This regulation shall become effective on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-1315; effective May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-8-40. Adoption by reference.** Control practices contained in the "official sericea lespedeza control program" published by the Kansas state board of agriculture on July 25, 1988 is hereby adopted by reference and shall apply to the control and eradication of sericea lespedeza in the state of Kansas. Copies of this publication are available from the plant health division of the Kansas state board of agriculture, Topeka, Kansas. This regulation shall become effective on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-1315; effective May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

#### Article 10.—ANHYDROUS AMMONIA

**4-10-2d. Basic rules for location of permanent storage containers.** (a) Permanent storage containers shall be located outside of buildings other than those buildings specifically constructed for this purpose. Permanent storage containers shall be located:

(1) at a distance not less than 50 feet from either the

line of any property upon which a building may be erected or from a source of drinking water, or both;

(2) at a distance not less than 1,000 feet from any public assembly area; and

(3) at a distance not less than 1,000 feet from any hospital, nursing home, or home for the aged. The plant site shall be large enough to permit an easy flow of traffic in and out of the plant, storage of implements of husbandry and adequate access for emergency personnel.

(b) Stationary containers used for the storage of anhydrous ammonia shall be located not less than 50 feet from containers of petroleum products.

(c) From and after May 1, 1988, each new permanent storage container or unloading facility shall be located outside of municipalities or other densely populated areas unless the location has been approved in writing by the appropriate local governing body. Each existing permanent storage container or unloading facility located in a municipality or densely populated area shall not be relocated within the municipality or densely populated area without first obtaining written approval from the appropriate local governing body. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-1212; effective May 1, 1987; amended May 1, 1988; amended Dec. 26, 1988.)

**4-10-2k. General rules—miscellaneous provisions.** (a) Liquid level gauging device.

(1) Each container, except containers filled by weight, shall be equipped with a liquid level gauging device of approved design.

(2) Each gauging device shall be arranged so that the maximum liquid level to which the container may be filled is readily determinable.

(3) Each gauging device that requires bleeding of the product to the atmosphere shall be so designed that the bleed valve maximum opening is not larger than a No. 54 drill size, unless provided with an excess flow valve. This requirement shall not apply to containers subject to K.A.R. 4-10-7.

(4) Gauging devices shall have a design pressure at least equal to the design pressure of the storage tank on which they are used.

(5) Each liquid level gauge shall be so designed that the maximum volume of the container filled by liquid shall not exceed 85 percent of its water capacity. The coupling into which the fixed liquid level gauge is threaded shall be placed at the 85 percent level of the container. If located elsewhere, the dip tube of this gauge shall be installed in such a manner that it cannot be readily removed, such as by the use of a nipple attached directly to the coupling or to a multiheaded valve.

(6) Gauge glasses of the columnar type shall be restricted to bulk storage installations. Gauge glasses shall be equipped with valves having metallic handwheels, with excess flow valves, and with extra heavy glass adequately protected with a metal housing applied by the gauge manufacturer. The Gauge glasses shall be shielded against the direct rays of the sun.

(b) Painting. The reflective surfaces of each above ground container shall be maintained in good condi-

tion. Surfaces that require paint shall be painted with white or any other light-reflecting color.

(c) Reports. Each accident involving the storage, transportation or application of anhydrous ammonia shall be reported by the owner or operator of the anhydrous ammonia storage or equipment involved to the secretary or the secretary's authorized representative so that an investigation of the accident may be made. Each required report shall be made by telephone within 72 hours after the accident followed by a written report that must be mailed within five working days after the accident.

(d) Railroad tank cars. Railroad tank cars shall not be used for the storage of anhydrous ammonia unless they are retested and meet the requirements of these regulations.

(e) Welding on containers. Non-code welding, if necessary, shall be made only on saddles or brackets originally welded to the container by the manufacturer. Non-code welding directly to the container or any parts subject to pressure shall not be permitted.

(f) Use of containers for other service. Anhydrous ammonia containers of 3,000-gallon water capacity or under shall not be used for any other commodity.

(g) This regulation shall become effective on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-1212; effective May 1, 1987; amended May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-10-16. Reactor units for production of ammoniated solutions.** (a) Reactor units shall operate only at sites approved by the secretary.

(b) When removing anhydrous ammonia from tank cars or trucks to manufacture ammoniated solutions, portable reactor units shall be equipped with approved safety devices. These safety devices shall include:

(1) Approved air operated or manually operated remote controlled shut-off devices located both on the tank car connection immediately preceding the hose attachment and on the discharge side of the pump; and

(2) a back check pressure valve on the inlet for the portable reactor.

(c) When anhydrous ammonia is transported to a stationary reactor unit in an implement of husbandry, the implement of husbandry shall be equipped with a manually operated remote controlled shut-off device on the discharge valve immediately preceding any hose attachments, and a back check pressure valve installed in the rigid piping leading to the reactor unit at the point of connection for the transfer hose. The implement of husbandry shall be monitored at all times during the manufacturing process. The transfer hose shall be disconnected from the reactor unit when the reactor unit is not operating.

(d) The required air-operated or manually operated remote controlled shut-off device shall be tested prior to each production run of ammoniated solutions and at least once every 24 hours during the production run.

(e) The operator of a portable reactor unit shall notify the secretary in writing of each location where a portable reactor will be operating at least 72 hours prior to its operation.

(f) No person shall operate any reactor unit that does not comply with these regulations.

(g) Safety equipment. Each reactor unit shall have on hand the following equipment for emergency and rescue purposes:

(1) An approved, full-face type gas mask with ammonia canisters;

(2) a container or hydrant of clean water of sufficient size to immerse or cleanse an individual's body;

(3) one pair of gloves made of rubber or other suitable protective material;

(4) one pair of rubber or suitable plastic boots;

(5) one rubber or suitable plastic slicker or rubber or suitable plastic pants and jacket or both; and

(6) flexible, fitted, splash proof goggles.

(h) This regulation shall become effective on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-1212; effective May 1, 1986; amended May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

### Article 13.—PESTICIDES

**4-13-11. Categories and subcategories of commercial applicator certification.** (a) Category 1—agricultural pest control. This category shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides in the production of agricultural crops and animals.

(1) Subcategory 1a—agricultural plant pest control. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides on grasslands and non-crop agricultural lands and in production of agricultural crops, including tobacco, peanuts, cotton, feed grains, soybeans and forage, vegetables, small fruits, tree fruits and nuts.

(2) Subcategory 1b—agricultural animal pest control. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides for places on or in which animals are confined and on animals, including beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, horses, goats, poultry, and livestock. Doctors of veterinary medicine who apply pesticides for hire, publicly hold themselves out as pesticide applicators, or engage in large-scale use of pesticides shall be included in the agricultural animal pest control category.

(3) Subcategory 1c—wildlife damage control. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides for the management and control of wildlife in rangeland and agricultural areas. Wildlife shall mean non-domesticated vertebrate species which hinder agricultural and rangeland production.

(b) Category 2—forest pest control. This category shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides in forests, forest nurseries, and forest seed-producing areas.

(c) Category 3—ornamental and turf pest control. This category shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides to control pests in the maintenance and production of ornamental trees, shrubs, flowers, and turf.

(continued)

(1) Subcategory 3a—ornamental pest control. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides to control pests in the maintenance and production of ornamental trees, shrubs and flowers not included in subcategory 3c of this regulation.

(2) Subcategory 3b—turf pest control. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides to control pests in the maintenance and production of turf.

(3) Subcategory 3c—interior landscape pest control. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides to control pests in the production and maintenance of houseplants and other indoor ornamental plants kept or located within structures occupied by humans including but not limited to houses, apartments, offices, shopping malls, other places of business and other dwelling places.

(d) Category 4—seed treatment. This category shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides on seeds.

(e) Category 5—aquatic pest control. This category shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of any restricted use pesticide purposefully applied to standing or running water. Applicators engaged in public health-related activities included under subsection (h) shall be excluded.

(f) Category 6—right-of-way pest control. This category shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides in the maintenance of public roads, electric powerlines, pipelines, railway rights-of-way or other similar areas. Applicators engaged in regulatory activities under subsection (i) shall be excluded.

(g) Category 7—industrial, institutional, structural and health-related pest control. This category shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides for the protection of stored, processed or manufactured products and in, on, or around food-handling establishments, human dwellings, institutions, schools and hospitals, industrial establishments, including warehouses and grain elevators, and any other structures and adjacent areas, public or private.

(1) Subcategory 7a—wood-destroying pest control. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides in the control of termites, powder post beetles, wood borers, wood rot fungus and any other wood-destroying pest.

(2) Subcategory 7b—stored products pest control. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides in the control of pests in stored grain and food products.

(3) Subcategory 7c—industrial weed control. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides in the control of pest weeds.

(4) Subcategory 7d—health-related pest control.

This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides in health programs for the management and control of pests having medical and public health significance.

(5) Subcategory 7e—structural pest control. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides in structures for control of any pest not covered in paragraph (g)(1) or (g)(2) of this regulation.

(6) Subcategory 7f—wood preservation and wood products treatment. This subcategory shall include commercial applicators using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides to extend the life of wooden poles, posts, crossties and other wood products to preserve or protect them from damage by insects, fungi, marine organisms, weather deterioration or other wood-destroying agents.

(h) Category 8—public health pest control. This category shall include state, federal, or other governmental employees using or supervising the use of restricted use pesticides in public health programs for the management and control of pests having medical and public health significance.

(i) Category 9—regulatory pest control. This category shall include state, federal, or other governmental employees who use or supervise the use of restricted use pesticides in the control of federal and state regulated pests.

(1) Subcategory 9a—noxious weed control. This subcategory shall include state or other governmental employees who use or supervise the use of restricted use pesticides in the control of weed pests regulated under the Kansas noxious weed law.

(2) Subcategory 9b—regulated pest control. This subcategory shall include state, federal or other governmental employees who use or supervise the use of restricted use pesticides in the control of federal or state regulated pests not covered by paragraph (i)(1).

(j) Category 10—demonstration and research pest control. This category shall include:

(1) individuals who demonstrate to the public the proper techniques for application and use of restricted use pesticides or who supervise such a demonstration. Such individuals shall include extension specialists, county agents, commercial representatives demonstrating pesticide products, and those individuals demonstrating methods used in public programs; and

(2) persons who use or supervise the use of restricted use pesticides in conducting field research that involves the use of pesticides. These persons shall include state, federal, and commercial employees and other persons conducting field research regarding or utilizing restricted use pesticides; and

(3) qualified laboratory personnel using restricted use pesticides while engaged in pesticide research in areas where environmental factors beyond their control, such as wind, rain or similar factors, can affect the safe use of the pesticide or cause it to have an adverse impact on the environment. The personnel listed in paragraphs (j)(2) and (3) shall not be considered exempt from certification under the provisions of K.S.A. 2-2441(d).

(k) This regulation shall become effective on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a; implementing K.S.A. 2-2444a and K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a; effective, E-78-26, Sept. 7, 1977; effective May 1, 1978; amended May 1, 1985; amended T-87-39, Nov. 19, 1986; amended May 1, 1987; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-13-13. Commercial applicator examination.** (a) Each examination for commercial applicator certification shall test the applicant's knowledge in the following subjects in addition to those subjects set out in K.S.A. 2-2443a (a) through (h).

(1) Each examination shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of pesticide application including:

(A) The general format and terminology of pesticide labels and labeling, the instructions, warnings, symbols and other information appearing on pesticide labels, the classification designation on pesticide labels and the necessity of using each pesticide in a manner which is consistent with information and instructions on its label;

(B) safety factors, including pesticide toxicity, types and causes of pesticide accidents, precautionary measures that are necessary to guard against injury to the applicator and other individuals, symptoms of pesticide poisoning, first aid and other procedures to follow in case of a pesticide accident, proper identification, storage, transportation of, mixing and handling of pesticides, prevention of and cleanup of pesticide spills and disposal of pesticide containers;

(C) the potential for damage to the environment from use and misuse of pesticides as influenced by such factors as types of terrain, soil and other substrata and drainage patterns;

(D) pest development and biology as it may be relevant to pest identification and control;

(E) types of pesticides and pesticide formulations used, compatibility, synergism, persistence and animal and plant toxicity of pesticides, practices that cause pesticide resistance and dilution procedures.

(F) types of equipment used and the limitations of each, equipment use, maintenance and calibration;

(G) proper application techniques for various pesticides and formulations of pesticide in given situations, relationship of placement of pesticides to proper use, unnecessary pesticide use and pesticide misuse, and prevention of pesticide loss into the environment through drift and other means; and

(H) requirements which must be met by a certified applicator in supervising noncertified applicators of restricted pesticides, including practical knowledge of federal and state supervisory requirements; requirements found on labeling; requirements regarding verifiable instruction of the noncertified applicator and availability of certified applicator during application; and any added restrictions which may be imposed for specific pesticides through labeling including the required physical presence of the supervising applicator during the application.

(2) Each examination shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of the category and subcategory

of applicator certification in which the applicant wishes to be certified.

(A) Agricultural pest control.

(i) Each examination for agricultural plant pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of the crops grown in Kansas and the specific pests commonly associated with these crops, potential soil and water damage, preharvest intervals, re-entry intervals, phytotoxicity, environmental contamination, non-target injury and potential adverse effects on the community which are related to the use of restricted pesticides in agricultural areas.

(ii) Each examination for agricultural animal pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of Kansas agricultural animals and their pests, specific pesticide toxicity levels, residue potential and relative hazards associated with various pesticide formulations, application techniques, ages of animals, stress and extent of treatment.

(iii) Each examination for wildlife damage control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of vertebrate species pests and damage associated with each, methods useful in damage prevention, products used in damage control, the potential for direct poisonings of nontarget species, the potential for secondary poisonings, effects upon threatened and endangered species, specific pesticide toxicity and residue levels, and methods of application necessary to minimize hazards to humans, the environment, pets, and domestic animals.

(B) Forest pest control. Each examination for forest pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of types of forests, forest nurseries and forest seed production in Kansas and of the pests associated with them, pest cycles and population dynamics as they influence control programming, biotic agents and their relative vulnerability to pesticides, and proper use of specialized equipment as it relates to adjacent land use.

(C) Ornamental and turf pest control.

(i) Each examination for ornamental pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of pest and pesticide problems associated with the production and maintenance of ornamental trees, shrubs and flowers in Kansas, potential phytotoxicity problems related to the wide variety of plants in treated areas, pesticide persistence beyond the intended period of control, and application methods which minimize hazards to humans, pets and domestic animals.

(ii) Each examination for turf pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of pest and pesticide problems associated with the production and maintenance of turf in Kansas, potential phytotoxicity problems related to the wide variety of plants in treated areas, pesticide persistence beyond the intended period of control and application methods which minimize hazards to humans, pets and domestic animals.

(iii) Each examination for interior landscape pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical

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knowledge of pest and pesticide problems associated with the production and maintenance of houseplants and other ornamental plants kept or located within structures occupied by humans including but not limited to houses, apartments, offices, shopping malls, other places of business and other dwelling places. The examination shall also test knowledge of potential phytotoxicity problems related to treatment of plants in enclosed areas, pesticide persistence beyond the intended period of control and application methods that minimize hazards to humans, pets and domestic animals.

(D) Seed treatment. Each examination for seed treatment applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of the types of seeds that require protection against pests, factors which may affect germination, including seed coloration, carriers and surface active agents, hazards associated with handling, storing, mixing and misuse of treated seeds and proper disposal of unused treated seeds.

(E) Aquatic pest control. Each examination for aquatic pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of secondary effects caused by improper application rates, incorrect formulations, and faulty aquatic pesticide applications; knowledge of various water use situations and the potential of downstream effects; knowledge of potential effects on plants, fish, birds, beneficial insects and other organisms in the aquatic environment; and knowledge of the principles of limited area application.

(F) Right-of-way pest control. Each examination for right-of-way pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of the wide variety of environments crossed by rights-of-way, problems of runoff, drift and excessive foliage destruction, the nature of herbicides, the need for containment of herbicides within the right-of-way area and the impact of applicator's activities on adjacent areas and communities.

(G) Industrial, institutional, structural and health related pest control.

(i) Each examination for wood-destroying pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of wood-destroying pests, their life cycles, pesticide formulations appropriate for their control, methods of application that avoid exposure of people and pets and specific factors which may lead to hazardous conditions, including continuous exposure to the pesticide use.

(ii) Each examination for stored products pest control shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of pests found in stored grain and food processing areas, their life cycles, pesticide formulations appropriate for their control, methods of application that avoid contamination of food products and exposure of people, and specific factors which may lead to a hazardous condition, including continuous exposure.

(iii) Each examination for industrial weed control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of weed pests found in industrial areas, pesticide formulations appropriate for their control, methods of application that avoid contamination of habitat and

exposure of people and pets, and environmental conditions particularly related to this activity.

(iv) Each examination for health-related pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of vector-disease transmission as it relates to and influences application programs, pests which adversely affect public health, their life cycles and habitats and the variety of environments in which they are encountered.

(v) Each examination for structural pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of the wide variety of pests found in buildings, including their life cycles; types of pesticide formulations appropriate for their control and methods of application that avoid contamination of food, damage and contamination of habitat and exposure of people and pets; specific factors which may lead to a hazardous condition, including continuous exposure in the various situations encountered in this category; and environmental conditions particularly related to this activity.

(vi) Each examination for wood preservation and wood-products treatment applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of pest problems and pests associated with wood degradation, including their life cycles, types of pesticide formulations appropriate for their control, methods of application, application hazards and safety, proper means of container storage, container and waste disposal. The examination shall also test knowledge of procedures to contain spills and to avoid contamination and exposure of the environment including people, domestic animals and wildlife.

(H) Public health pest control. Each examination for public health pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of vector-disease transmission as it relates to and influences application programs, pests which adversely affect public health, their life cycles and habitats, the variety of environments in which they are encountered and the importance of such non-chemical control methods as sanitation, waste disposal and drainage.

(I) Regulatory pest control.

(i) Each examination for noxious weed control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of pest weeds as regulated by the Kansas noxious weed law, the potential impact on the environment of restricted use pesticides used in suppression and eradication programs, and factors influencing introductions, spread, and population dynamics of those pest weeds.

(ii) Each examination for regulated pest control applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of federal and state-regulated pests, applicable laws relating to quarantine and other regulations regarding pests, the potential impact on the environment of restricted use pesticides used in suppression and eradication programs, factors influencing introductions, spread and population dynamics of relevant pests.

(J) Demonstration and research pest control. Each examination for demonstration and research pest con-

trol applicators shall test the applicant's practical knowledge of the many different pest problems encountered in the course of activities associated with demonstration, field research and method improvement work, pesticide-organism interactions and the importance of integrating pesticide use with control methods. Such applicators shall meet the examination requirements for application in the other categories that are applicable to their particular activity.

(b) Each emergency examination administered to applicants for temporary commercial applicator permits under K.S.A. 2-2442 shall be the same examination as is required under K.S.A. 2-2443 and the preceding portions of this regulation.

(c) A grade of 75% correct answers shall be required to pass any commercial applicator examination.

(d) This regulation shall become effective on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a, implementing K.S.A. 2-2443a and K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a, effective; E-78-26, Sept. 7, 1977; effective May 1, 1978; amended May 1, 1985; amended T-87-39, Nov. 19, 1986; amended May 1, 1987; amended May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-13-34. Verification of training of registered pest control technicians.** (a) Each pesticide business licensee who applies pesticides or causes pesticides to be applied for the control of wood destroying pests, structural pests, ornamental pests, turf pests, interior landscape pests, or any combination of these pests shall maintain records to verify that each registered pest control technician employed by such business licensee has received the required training in each appropriate category of pest control. These training records shall contain the following information for each training session:

- (a) The typed or printed name of the trainee;
- (b) the subject matter covered;
- (c) type of training, classroom or on-the-job;
- (d) the date on which the training occurred;
- (e) the duration of the training in hours;
- (f) the signature of the trainee; and
- (g) the signature of the authorized officer or representative of the pesticide business licensee who administered the training.

(b) This regulation shall be in force and effect from and after January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a, implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2440c as amended by L. 1988, ch. 7, § 4; effective, T-88-46, Nov. 10, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-13-35. Registered pest control technician identification cards.** (a) The secretary shall issue an identification card to each registered pest control technician upon satisfactory completion of the requirements for registration. This identification card shall show the registered technician's typed name and signature, the category or subcategory for which the registration has been issued, the name of the business licensee employing the registered technician, the date on which the identification card was issued, and the expiration date of the registration. The registered pest control

technician shall have this identification card in the technician's possession when applying any pesticide for the control of wood destroying pests, structural pests, ornamental pests, turf pests, interior landscape pests, or any combination of these pests or when supervising the application of any general use pesticide. The technician shall produce this identification card when requested to do so by any customer, law enforcement official, the secretary or any authorized representative of the secretary. This regulation does not authorize any registered pest control technician to supervise the use of, or to apply, any restricted use pesticide unless the application is supervised by a commercial applicator who is certified to apply restricted use pesticides for the control of pests in the category or subcategory for which the pesticide application is made.

(b) This regulation shall be in force and effect from and after January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a, implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2440b as amended by L. 1988, Ch. 7, § 3; effective, T-88-46, Nov. 10, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-13-36. Training of registered pest control technicians in wood destroying pest control and structural pest control.** (a) All applicants for pest control technician registration in wood destroying pest control or structural pest control shall have completed a minimum of 40 hours of verifiable training, 30 hours of which must consist of supervised application of pesticides in and around structures, and 10 hours of which must be classroom instruction.

(b) Classroom instruction shall include the following:

(1) The proper use and maintenance of equipment, including calibration, "crack and crevice" and "spot" application, and other application techniques;

(2) the potential dangers involved in applying the pesticides, including:

(A) hazards to the applicator resulting from mixing, loading and applying pesticides, poisoning prevention, symptoms and first aid for pesticide poisoning;

(B) hazards to the occupants of the structures where pesticides are applied with particular emphasis on children, the aged and infirm;

(C) procedures for preventing pesticide contamination of food, groundwater, wells and cisterns, and the air within the structure being treated;

(D) label review and basic information about each pesticide used for control of wood destroying pests or structural pests, including common names of the pesticides, where and how each pesticide may be applied, and the kinds of pests controlled;

(E) basic information about prevention and cleanup of spills; and

(F) the use of non-chemical means to control wood destroying and structural pests.

(3) calculating the concentration of pesticides to be used and the quantities of diluted pesticide necessary to complete a particular treatment;

(4) identification of common pests to be controlled.

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and damages caused by such pests as subterranean termites, carpenter ants, wood decaying fungi, German, American and oriental cockroaches, silverfish, fleas, ticks, spiders, pantry pests, house mice, field mice, and Norway rats, the basic characteristics and habits of these pests and conditions that favor structural infestation by these pests;

(5) protective clothing and equipment including the use and maintenance of rubber gloves and respirators;

(6) general precautions to be followed in the storage and disposal of pesticide containers and rinsate, as well as the cleaning and decontamination of equipment;

(7) applicable state and federal pesticide laws and regulations germane to the work of a technician, including but not limited to following label directions, direct supervision, information required on statements of services, and termite control application procedures;

(8) basic information regarding elements of construction likely to be encountered including heating and plumbing systems and such terms as footing, foundation wall, wall voids, sill plate, joists, subfloor, and slab-on-grade.

(c) This regulation shall be in force and effect from and after January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a, implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2440a as amended by L. 1988, Ch. 7, § 2; effective, T-88-46, Nov. 10, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-13-38. Training of registered pest control technicians in ornamental pest control, turf pest control and interior landscape pest control.** (a) All applicants for pest control technician registration in ornamental pest control, turf pest control or interior landscape pest control shall have completed a minimum of 40 hours of verifiable training, 30 hours of which must consist of supervised application of pesticides for the control of ornamental pests, turf pests or interior landscape pests as appropriate, and 10 hours of which must be classroom instruction.

(b) Classroom instruction shall include the following:

(1) The proper use and maintenance of equipment, including calibration.

(2) The hazards that may be involved in applying the pesticides, including:

(A) The effect of drift of the pesticides on adjacent and nearby property and on non-target organisms, and methods for preventing drift;

(B) the proper weather conditions for the application of pesticides and the precautions to be taken;

(C) procedures for preventing pesticide contamination of groundwater, wells and cisterns, surface water, soil, or the air within a structure;

(D) the effect of the pesticides on humans, plants or animals in the area, including the possibility of damage to plants or animals or the possibility of undesirable or illegal residues resulting on them;

(E) the effect of the application of pesticides on wildlife in the area, including aquatic life;

(F) the possibility of contamination of water or injury to persons, pets or desirable vegetation;

(G) hazards to the applicator resulting from mixing, loading and applying pesticides;

(H) poisoning prevention, symptoms and first aid for pesticide poisoning;

(I) label review and basic information about each pesticide used, including common names of the pesticides, where and how each pesticide may be applied, and the kinds of pests controlled;

(J) basic information about prevention and cleanup of spills; and

(K) basic information about beneficial insects and the use of non-chemical means to control ornamental pests, turf pests and interior landscape pests.

(3) Calculating the concentration of pesticides to be used and the quantities of diluted pesticide necessary to complete a particular treatment.

(4) Identification of common pests to be controlled and damages caused by such pests, as listed below, and the basic characteristics and habits of these pests:

(A) For registered pest control technicians in the field of ornamental pest control, common pests shall include but not be limited to: bagworms, cankerworms, elm leaf beetles, aphids, spider mites, galls and gall-producing insects and diseases, flatheaded and roundheaded wood boring beetles, scale insects, cedar-apple rust, anthracnose and powdery mildew.

(B) For registered pest control technicians in the field of turf pest control, common pests shall include but not be limited to: sod webworms, chinch bugs, white grubs, sowbugs, broadleaf weeds such as dandelion, chickweed, and henbit, grasses such as crabgrass, foxtail and annual bluegrass, *Helminthosporium* leaf spot, *Pythium* and *Fusarium* blights, moles and gophers.

(C) For registered pest control technicians in the field of interior landscape control, common pests shall include but not be limited to: whiteflies, mealybugs, scale insects, spider mites, aphids, fungus gnats, snails and slugs, ants, sowbugs, thrips, damping-off, botrytis blight, and powdery mildew.

(5) Protective clothing and equipment, including the use and maintenance of rubber gloves and boots, rainsuits and respirators.

(6) General precautions to be followed in the storage and disposal of pesticide containers and rinsate, as well as the cleaning and decontamination of equipment.

(7) Applicable state and federal pesticide laws and regulations germane to the work of a technician, including following label directions, direct supervision and information required on statements of services.

(c) This regulation shall be in force and effect from and after January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a; implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2440a as amended by L. 1988, Ch. 7, § 2; effective Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-13-60. Civil penalty; complaint.** (a) Each complaint for the assessment of a civil penalty shall include:

(1) A statement reciting each subsection of the act authorizing the assessment of civil penalty;

(2) specific reference to each provision of the act or implementing regulation which respondent is alleged to have violated;

(3) a concise statement of the factual basis for each violation alleged;

(4) the amount of the civil penalty which is proposed to be assessed; and

(5) the notice of respondent's right to request a hearing on any material fact contained in the complaint or on the appropriateness of the amount of the proposed civil penalty. This notice may be incorporated within the complaint or set forth in a separate document.

(b) Each respondent shall be served a notice of a pre-hearing conference in accordance with the Kansas administrative procedures act (K.S.A. 77-501 *et seq.*).

(c) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a; implementing L. 1988, Ch. 7, § 5; effective Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-13-61. Answer to the complaint.** (a) If a respondent contests any material fact upon which the complaint is based, or contends that the amount of the civil penalty proposed in the complaint is inappropriate or contends that the respondent is entitled to judgment as a matter of law, the respondent shall file a written answer to the complaint. This answer shall be filed with the designated hearing officer within 20 days after service of the complaint.

(b) Each respondent's answer shall be in writing. The answer shall clearly and directly admit, deny or explain each of the factual allegations contained in the complaint to which the respondent has any knowledge. Where the respondent has no knowledge of a particular factual allegation and so states, the allegation shall be deemed denied. The answer shall also state any circumstances or arguments which are alleged to constitute grounds of defense, any facts which the respondent disputes and intends to place at issue and whether a hearing is requested.

(c) The respondent's failure to admit, deny or explain any material facts or allegations contained in the complaint shall constitute an admission of the allegation.

(d) The respondent's failure to answer a complaint shall be deemed to constitute default.

(e) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a; implementing L. 1988, Ch. 7, § 5; effective Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-13-62. Amount of proposed civil penalty.** (a) A separate civil penalty shall be assessed for each violation of the pesticide law which results from each independent act or failure to act by any pesticide business licensee or agent or employee thereof. In determining whether a given violation is independent of and substantially distinguishable from any other violation for the purpose of assessing separate civil penalties, consideration shall be given to whether each violation requires an element of proof not re-

quired by another violation. Where several violations require the same elements of proof and are not distinguishable, assessment of separate civil penalties shall be within the discretion of the secretary or the secretary's authorized representative.

(b) The amount proposed for each civil penalty shall be within the ranges listed below:

(1) For each violation of K.S.A. 2-2453(a) or (b), the proposed civil penalty shall be not less than \$100 nor more than \$5,000.

(2) For each violation of K.S.A. 2-2454(b) or 2-2454(m), the proposed civil penalty shall be not less than \$100 nor more than \$5,000.

(3) For each violation of K.S.A. 2-2454 not covered in subsection (2) above the proposed civil penalty shall be not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000.

(4) For each violation of K.S.A. 2-2453(c) not already covered in subsections (1), (2) or (3) above, the proposed civil penalty shall be not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000.

(c) For each second or subsequent occurrence of a violation for which a civil penalty has been assessed within a three-year period, the civil penalty assessed for the subsequent violation shall be the maximum amount for the category listed.

(d) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a; implementing L. 1988, Ch. 7, § 5; effective Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-13-63. Criteria to determine dollar amount of proposed civil penalty.** (a) In determining the amount of any proposed civil penalty, the gravity of the violation shall be considered by the secretary or the secretary's designee. Factors to be considered shall include:

(1) The potential of the act to injure humans, pets, domestic animals, wildlife or the environment;

(2) the severity of potential injuries;

(3) the extent to which injury actually occurred;

(4) the respondent's history of compliance with state and federal pesticide laws and regulations promulgated thereunder;

(5) any action taken by respondent to remedy the specific violation or to mitigate any adverse health effects or environmental effects which were the result of the violation; and

(6) whether or not the violation involved any misrepresentation or fraud.

(b) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 2-2467a; implementing L. 1988, Ch. 7, § 5; effective Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-13-64. Informal settlement.** (a) The respondent may request a settlement conference. The request may be contained either in respondent's answer to the complaint or presented at the pre-hearing conference. A request for a settlement conference shall not constitute an answer to a complaint. A settlement conference shall not affect the respondent's obligation to file a timely answer to a complaint.

(b) Once a settlement is reached, the parties shall

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reduce the settlement to writing and present the proposed written consent agreement to the secretary or the secretary's designee. The consent agreement shall state that, for the purpose of the proceeding, respondent:

(1) Admits the jurisdictional allegations of the complaint;

(2) admits the facts stipulated in the consent agreement;

(3) neither admits nor denies specific factual allegations contained in the complaint; and

(4) consents to the assessment of a stated civil penalty. The consent agreement shall include any and all terms of the agreement and shall be signed by all parties or their counsel or representatives of record.

**4-13-65. Adjusting the amount of the proposed civil penalty.** (a) Each respondent shall present all evidence on the issue of adjustment of the proposed civil penalty at the settlement conference. Such evidence may include mitigating factors or new evidence not previously known at the time the complaint was issued.

(b) Upon presentation by the respondent of new evidence establishing facts and circumstances that were unknown to the secretary at the time the complaint was issued and which relate to the gravity of the violation, a new civil penalty may be proposed. When these additional facts establish that respondent did not commit the violations charged, the complaint shall be dismissed. When the new evidence reveals additional charges should have been filed, a new complaint containing appropriate additional civil penalties may be filed.

(c) The burden shall be on the respondent to present evidence of any mitigating factors to support any requested reduction in the amount of proposed civil penalty. The amount of the civil penalty may be reduced if the reduction serves the public interest.

(d) The amount of reduction shall not exceed 40% of the amount of the original civil penalty proposed. The amount of a civil penalty shall not be reduced to less than \$100 per offense. Whether or not a proposed civil penalty is reduced lies within the sole discretion of the secretary or the secretary's designee; reductions shall not occur unless evidence of mitigating factors has been presented by respondent.

**4-16-1c. Adoption by reference.** (a) The following sections of title 9 of the code of federal regulations, revised as of January 1, 1988, are hereby adopted by reference:

(1) All of part 301 except subparagraphs s, iii and kkk, yyy, and zzz of part 301.2;

(2) All of part 302 except section 302.2;

(4) All of parts 304 through 306 inclusive;

(5) All of part 307 except sections 307.5 and 307.6;

(6) All of parts 308 through 311 inclusive;

**4-16-3a. Exemptions.** (a) In addition to the requirements for a retail store set forth in 9 C.F.R. 303.1(d)(2)(iii) adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-16-1c, a retail store shall also comply with the sanitation requirements prescribed by K.A.R. 28-23-81 through K.A.R. 28-23-89 as amended and supplemented.

(b) In addition to the requirements for a restaurant set forth in 9 C.F.R. 303.1(d)(2)(iv) adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-16-1c, a restaurant shall also comply with the sanitation requirements prescribed by the K.A.R. 28-36-20 through K.A.R. 28-36-29 as amended and supplemented.

(c) Notwithstanding the requirements for the exemption as a "custom slaughterer" as set forth in 9 C.F.R. 303.1(a) and (b) adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-16-1c, both the custom slaughtering of dead, dying, diseased, or disabled animals by any person and the custom processing of the carcasses of dead, dying, diseased or disabled animals by any person shall be prohibited.

**4-16-7a. Overtime work by inspection personnel.** The operator of an establishment which requires the services of a division employee on any Saturday, Sunday or holiday, or for any interval of more than four or eight regularly assigned hours on any other day, shall request in advance that the inspector supply inspection service during the overtime period. The operator of that establishment shall pay the division for overtime services at the rate of \$16 per hour to reimburse the agency for the cost of the inspection services. This regulation shall become effective on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-6a44; implementing K.S.A. 65-6a26; effective May 1, 1986; amended Jan. 1, 1989.)

**4-16-252. Temperature requirements.** (a) The refrigeration system of each slaughtering or processing plant for meat or meat food products shall be equipped with accurate and reliable controls to ensure the automatic maintenance of uniform temperatures. Temperatures shall be maintained as follows:

(1) Temperatures in each chill cooler or aging cooler shall not exceed 37 degrees Fahrenheit. A tolerance of 10 degrees Fahrenheit may be allowed for a reasonable time, not to exceed 16 hours, after fresh carcasses or fresh meat products have been placed in the cooler.

(2) Temperatures in each sharp freeze room or

compartment shall not exceed 10 degrees below zero Fahrenheit where still air cooling is employed. In sharp freeze room or compartments where forced air circulation is employed, temperatures shall not exceed zero degrees Fahrenheit. In either case, a tolerance of 10 degrees Fahrenheit shall be allowed for a reasonable time, not to exceed six hours, after fresh meat food products have been placed into the sharp freeze room or compartment.

(3) The temperature in locker rooms or storage freezers shall not exceed zero degrees Fahrenheit.

(b) Each chill cooler, each sharp freeze room or compartment, each locker room and each storage freezer shall be equipped with either an accurate direct-reading thermometer or accurate direct-reading temperature indicator.

(c) Subject to the provisions of subsection (d) of this regulation, uncooked meat or meat food products shall be maintained during transportation at an internal temperature which does not exceed 45 degrees Fahrenheit. Cooked meat or meat food products shall be maintained at an internal temperature of at least 140 degrees Fahrenheit during transportation. Frozen meat or meat food products shall be transported in a compartment in which the air temperature does not exceed zero degrees Fahrenheit except during defrost cycles or reasonably brief periods of loading and unloading meat or meat food products.

(d) Meat and meat food products which have been determined by the administrator to be shelf stable shall not be subject to the cooling requirements of subsection (c) of this regulation. For the purposes of this subsection, shelf stable products shall include:

(1) Meat or meat food products canned in hermetically sealed containers which have been cooked under pressure;

(2) acidified products packed in vinegar pickle, if the meat ingredients in liquid media have a pH value which does not exceed 4.5 and the preparation procedure complies with K.A.R. 4-16-1a *et seq.*; and

(3) other dried or cured products which meet requirements contained in the meat regulations for pH, moisture/protein ratio and water activity. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-6a44; implementing K.S.A. 65-6a25 and 65-6a30; effective Dec. 26, 1988.)

(6) All of sections 381.210 through 381.218 inclusive; and

(7) All of sections 381.300 through 381.311 inclusive.

For the purpose of this regulation, poultry units shall be computed by using .25 units for each goose or turkey, one unit for each chicken or other bird.
