Pursuant to 7 U.S.C. 136v, Ciba Geigy Corporation has filed an application for a special local need registration for Aatrex 4L to allow the use of this pesticide to control downy brome and volunteer wheat in a wheat-wheat-sorghum-sorghum-fallow crop rotation system. At present, this pesticide is registered to control these same weed pests in other similar crop rotation systems. There is not a pesticide currently registered to perform the same task in the same crop rotation system.

Opinion No. 91-27

Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Uniform Act Regulating Traffic; Rules of the Road; Serious Traffic Offenses—Driving Under Influence of Alcohol or Drugs; Penalties. Judge David S. Knudson, 28th Judicial District, Salina, March 22, 1991.

Under K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 8-1567(f), which is a mandatory sentencing statute, the court may not suspend a portion of the fine in an amount equal to participation in a weekend intervention program for first time DUI offenders. (*State v. Kitzman*, 240 Kan. 191 (1986).)

Although the DUI statutes are not under the criminal code, the sentencing section does have a criminal connotation. Therefore, using K.S.A. 21-4610(j), which defines public service, as a guide, it would be in the court's discretion to decide if the program fit within those parameters and to order participation in the program would qualify as public service. Opinion No. 91-28

State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Parimutuel Racing—Occupation Licenses; Commission's Jurisdiction When License Expires. Janet A. Chubb, Assistant Attorney General, Kansas Racing Commission, March 25, 1991.

The Racing Commission retains jurisdiction over an administrative matter even if the occupation license that is the subject of the hearing expires by operation of law during the pendency of the proceeding. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 74-8816; K.S.A. 77-511, 77-530; K.A.R. 112-4-1. JLM

Opinion No. 91-29

Intoxicating Liquors and Beverages—Certain Prohibited Acts and Penalties—Location of Retail Store, Microbrewery or Farm Winery; Restrictions. Thomas R. Powell, Director of Law and City Attorney, Wichita, March 25, 1991.

K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 41-710(c)(1) prohibits initial licensure of a retail liquor store, the premises of which are located within 200 feet of a school or church. The distance should be measured in a straight line from the building sought to be licensed as a retail liquor establishment to the nearest property line of any neighboring school. In the case of churches, the distance should be measured in a straight line from the actual church building to the building sought to be licensed. This distinction is based on the regulatory definition of "church" as a building; the term "school" is not defined. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 41-710, K.A.R. 14-3-2; 14-13-1; 14-3-2. JLM

**Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations**

The State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 14, in Room 121 of the State Education Building, 120 E. 10th, Topeka, regarding proposed State Board Regulations 91-35-1, 91-35-2, 91-35-3 and 91-35-4. These proposed regulations concern the Educational Excellence Grant Program. The following is a summary of the substance of the proposed regulations and a summary of their anticipated economic impact.

S.B.R. 91-35-1 sets forth the definitions of terms used in the regulations. There will be no economic impact upon the Kansas State Department of Education or upon other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

S.B.R. 91-35-2 sets forth the application process for those school districts that want to make application for a grant. There will be a financial impact upon the State Department of Education for additional staff, travel, printing, and other resources. Local school districts will incur some expense in preparing the application. There will be no impact upon private business or individuals.

S.B.R. 91-35-3 sets forth the required content of the plan that those applying for a grant must submit with their application. There will be a financial impact upon the State Department of Education for additional staff, travel, printing, and other resources. Local school districts will incur some expense in developing the plan, but it is anticipated that this function will be carried out by staff already employed by the districts. There will be no impact upon private business or individuals.

S.B.R. 91-35-4 sets forth the report that must be submitted by participating school districts. There will be financial impact upon the State Department of Education for additional staff, travel, printing, and other resources. Local school districts will incur some expense in preparing the reports, including the gathering of data and the filing of the reports. There will be no impact upon private business or individuals.

Each proposed regulation is printed with this notice.

A copy of the complete economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting the secretary of the board at the address above.

All interested persons will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views or arguments, either orally or in writing, in regard to the proposed regulations. In addition, the period of public notice hereby provided constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Such written comments may be submitted to the secretary of the board at the address above. The hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures of the board.

**Article 35.—EDUCATIONAL EXCELLENCE GRANT
PROGRAM**

91-35-1. Definitions. (a) "At risk pupil" means any person who is enrolled in preschool, kindergarten or any of the grades one through 12 maintained by a school district and who is at risk of not meeting the educational goals and objectives established by the school district or of not completing the requirements necessary for promotion to grade level, grade-to-grade promotion or graduation from high school or of not becoming a productive worker and citizen. The definition of at risk pupil does not include any person determined to be an exceptional child under the provisions of the special education for exceptional child act.

(b) "At risk pupil assistance plan" means a plan which is developed and maintained by the board of a school district for the specific purpose of addressing the needs of at risk pupils of the school district.

(c) "Educational excellence grant program" means a program under which the state, for the purpose of promoting excellence in education, provides assistance through the award of grants of state monies to school districts which develop and maintain educational system enhancement plans or at risk pupil assistance plans, or both.

(d) "Educational system enhancement plan" means a plan which is developed and maintained by the board of a school district for the purpose of improving the educational system of the school district. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-9903; effective _____.)

91-35-2. Educational excellence grant program application. (a) Any board may apply for an educational excellence grant by completing and submitting to the state board, an application form prescribed by the state board. Each application shall include:

(1) and indication of whether the board is applying for an at risk pupil assistance grant, and educational system enhancement grant, or both;

(2) the name and number of the district or, if the application is being made by a consortium of districts, the name of the interlocal agency or school district which will receive grant funds and administer the program and a listing of participating districts;

(3) the mailing address and phone number of the district or interlocal agency administering the grant;

(4) the name and signature of the superintendent or interlocal agency director;

(5) the name, title, address, phone number and signature of the person who will be responsible for directing the program for the district or interlocal agency; and

(6) if application is being made for an at risk pupil assistance grant, an at risk students survey.

(b) Applications shall be submitted to the state board by the date specified on the application form, which will be not later than May 1. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-9903; effective ____.)

91-35-3. Educational excellence grant program plan. (a) Each board applying for an educational excellence grant shall submit a plan to the state board along with the application required under K.A.R. 91-35-2. The plan shall provide a clear and concise statement of the purpose or purposes of the proposed program and shall include an abstract, a general description of the program, a needs assessment, the program outcomes, the program activities, a method for evaluation of the program and a budget.

(b) The abstract section of each plan shall state:

(1) the name of the applying district or interlocal agency;

(2) the contact person for the program;

(3) the address and phone number of the contact person; and

(4) a synopsis of the program.

(c) The description section of each plan shall state:

(1) the general purpose or purposes of the proposed program;

(2) an overview and description of the proposed program;

(3) a statement of how the proposed program complements existing programs in the district or districts; and

(4) a statement of how the proposed program specifically relates to one or more of the funding priorities identified by the state board.

(d) The needs assessment section shall include a description of the specific needs which have been identified and an indication of how the proposed plan will address those needs. The needs assessment for an at risk pupil assistance program also shall include a statement of the methods and the specific criteria for identifying students as being at risk and an indication of the district's or districts' past efforts in providing assistance to at risk students.

(e) The statement of program outcomes shall describe the general outcome of the proposed plan. Specific, measurable outcomes, written in product-oriented terms, shall also be stated.

(f) Program activities shall be stated in brief, descriptive terms. Each activity that is to be conducted to implement the plan shall be described.

(g) The evaluation section shall indicate the method by which implementation will be documented and the method by which achievement of program outcomes will be assessed.

(1) For an educational system enhancement program, the evaluation shall be designed to measure the

effectiveness of the plan in improving the educational system of the school district.

(2) For an at risk pupil assistance program, the evaluation shall be designed to measure the effectiveness of the plan in meeting the needs of at risk pupils as identified by the needs assessment.

(h) The budget section shall indicate, in detail, how state and local district funds are to be spent. Local funds shall equal at least 50 percent of the total expenditures planned. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-9903; effective ____.)

91-35-4. Educational excellence grant reports. (a) Each board which is awarded an educational excellence grant shall submit a statistical and financial mid-year report to the state board which shall include information from July 1 through December 31. Each such report shall include:

(1) the date the program began;

(2) the method of selection and number of students participating;

(3) a statement of which program outcomes have been met;

(4) an indication of any problems with the program; and

(5) an itemized statement of expenditures of funds.

(b) Mid-year reports shall be submitted to the state board by the date specified on the mid-year report form, which shall be not later than January 15.

(c) Each board awarded an educational excellence grant shall submit a statistical and financial end-of-the-year report to the state board. Each report shall provide information from the preceding July 1 and shall contain:

(1) for an educational system enhancement program, an evaluation of the program's effectiveness in improving the educational system of the school district and, for an at risk pupil assistance program, an evaluation of the program's effectiveness in meeting the needs of at risk pupils as identified in the needs assessment;

(2) a statement of which program outcomes have been met; and

(3) an itemized statement of expenditures of state and local funds.

(d) End-of-the-year reports shall be submitted to the state board by the date specified on the end-of-the-year report form, which shall be no later than July 31 for programs ending June 30 and no later than September 30 for programs with summer activities.

(e) Each board awarded an educational excellence grant shall submit such other reports as are requested by the state board. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-9903; effective ____.)

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

The State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 14, in Room 121 of the State Education Building, 120 E. 10th, Topeka, regarding proposed State Board Regulations 91-37-1, 91-37-2, 91-37-3 and 91-37-4. These proposed regulations concern the Parent Education Grant Program. The following is a summary of the substance of the proposed regulations and a summary of their anticipated economic impact.

S.B.R. 91-37-1 sets forth the definitions of terms used in the regulations. There will be no economic impact upon the Kansas State Department of Education or upon other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

S.B.R. 91-37-2 sets forth the application process for those school districts that want to make application for a grant. There will be a financial impact upon the State Department of Education for additional staff, travel, printing, and other resources. Local school districts will incur some expense in preparing the application. There will be no impact upon private business or individuals.

S.B.R. 91-37-3 requires that a local board develop a parent education program plan and sets forth the minimum requirements for such a plan. There will be a financial impact upon the State Department of Education for additional staff, travel, printing, capital outlay and other resources. Local school districts will incur some expense in developing the plan, but it is anticipated that this function will be carried out by staff already employed by the districts. There will be no impact upon private business or individuals.

S.B.R. 91-37-4 sets forth the reports that must be submitted by participating school districts. There will be a financial impact upon the State Department of Education for additional staff, travel, printing, and other resources. Local school districts will incur some expense to prepare the reports, including the gathering of data and the filing of the reports. There will be no impact upon private business or individuals.

Each proposed regulation is printed with this notice. A copy of the complete economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting the secretary of the board at the address above.

All interested persons will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views or arguments, either orally or in writing, in regard to the proposed regulations. In addition, the period of public notice hereby provided constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Such written comments may be submitted to the secretary of the board at the address above. The hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures of the board.

Article 37.—PARENTS AS TEACHERS GRANTS

91-37-1. Definitions. (a) "Board" means the board of education of any school district.

(b) "Infant" and "toddler" means a child who has not attained the age of three years.

(c) "Parent education program grant" means an award of state money to a school district for the development and operation of a program to provide expectant parents and parents of infants or toddlers, or both, with information, advice, assistance, resource materials, guidance and learning experiences regarding such measures as parenting skills and the various styles of parenting; the processes and principles of growth and development of children; home learning activities designed for infants and toddlers; techniques emphasizing a positive approach to discipline; effective methods of communicating and interacting with children to foster the development of self-esteem; strategies for structuring behavioral limits and increasing mutual positive regard; and other elements of effective parenting that are conducive to the structuring of a home environment in which children are encouraged to be successful and productive learners.

(d) "School district" means any public school district organized and operating under the laws of the state.

(e) "State board" means the state board of education. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-3605; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-3604; effective ____.)

91-37-2. Parent education program grant application. (a) Any board seeking a parent education program grant shall submit an application to the state board. Each application shall include:

(1) The name and number of the district or, if the application is being made by a consortium of districts, the name of the interlocal agency or school district which will receive grant funds and administer the program and a listing of participating districts;

(2) the mailing address and phone number of the district or interlocal agency administering the grant;

(3) the name and signature of the superintendent or interlocal agency director; and

(4) the name, title, address, phone number and signature of the person who will be responsible for directing the program for the district or interlocal agency.

(b) Applications shall be submitted to the state board by the date specified on the application form, which shall be not later than May 1. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-3605; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-3604; effective ____.)

91-37-3. Parent education program plan. (a) Each board applying for a parent education program grant shall submit a parent education program plan to the state board with the application required under K.A.R. 91-37-2. The plan shall include:

(1) an abstract;

(2) a general description of the program;

(3) proposed program outcomes;

(4) proposed program activities;

(5) a method for evaluation of the program; and

(6) a budget.

(b) The abstract shall state:

(1) The name and the number of the applying district or interlocal agency; and

(2) the name, address and phone number of the contact person for the program.

(c) The general description shall include:

(1) the specific needs which have been identified and an indication of how the proposed plan addresses those needs;

(2) an overview of the proposed program;

(3) specific plans for recruiting parents to the program; and

(4) the manner in which the proposed program coordinates with existing programs in the district or districts.

(d) The program outcomes shall indicate the general outcome which is expected to be accomplished by implementation of the proposed plan during the first year. Also, specific measurable outcomes, written in product-oriented terms, shall be stated for the program after three to five years of operation.

(e) Program activities shall be stated in brief, descriptive terms. Each activity that is to be conducted to implement the plan shall be described.

(f) The evaluation section shall indicate the process by which implementation will be documented and the method by which achievement of program outcomes will be assessed.

(g) The budget section shall indicate, in detail, how state and local funds are to be spent. Local funds shall equal at least 50 percent of the total expenditures planned. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-3605; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-3604; effective _____.)

91-37-4. Parent education program reports. (a) Each board which is awarded a parent education program grant shall submit a statistical and financial mid-year report to the state board which shall include information from July 1 through December 1. Each such report shall include:

(1) the date services began;

(2) the number of families and children participating;

(3) a description of progress toward accomplishing intended outcomes;

(4) an indication of any problems with the program; and

(5) an itemized statement of expenditures of state and local funds.

(b) Mid-year reports shall be submitted to the state board by the date specified on the mid-year report form, which shall be not later than December 15.

(c) Each board which is awarded a parent education program grant shall submit a statistical and financial end-of-the-year report which shall include information from the preceding July 1 to the state board. Each such report shall contain:

(1) the information required for the mid-year report;

(2) an evaluation of the program's effectiveness as indicated by a parent satisfaction survey;

(3) the results of the evaluation of the program; and

(4) an itemized statement of expenditures of state and local funds.

(d) End-of-the-year reports shall be submitted to the

state board by the date specified on the end-of-the-year report form, which shall be not later than July 31.

(e) Each board awarded a parent education program grant shall submit such other reports as are requested by the state board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-3605; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 72-3604; effective _____.)

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Tuesday, May 7, at the Staff Development Training Center, 300 S.W. Oakley, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations, the adoption of new regulations and the revocation of existing regulations on a permanent basis.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Acting Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services, Room 603-N, Docking State Office Building, 915 Harrison, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally

on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These regulations are proposed for adoption and are scheduled to become effective July 1, 1991. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

The phrase "Federal Mandate" following an item indicates that the change is required by federal policy. Optional changes in regulations related to federal programs are subject to approval by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Article 4.—PUBLIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

30-4-41. Assistance planning. This regulation is being amended to expand the definition of essential person to include certain individuals who have previously been considered as non-essential. Individuals considered to be essential include the following: Spouses of ADC caretakers, minor siblings of ADC children, and parents of children of ADC caretakers even when no legal relationship to the caretaker exists.

Economic Impact: It is estimated that expansion of the essential person definition will allow the state of Kansas to claim federal matching on individuals for whom all state general funds are currently being expended. The estimated annual cost savings in state general funds will be \$366,660 in fiscal year 1992.

30-4-112. Income exempt from consideration as income and as a cash asset. This regulation is being amended to exempt the amount of earned income tax credit received as income and as a cash asset for the month of receipt and the following month. (Federal Mandate).

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-4-113. Income exempt as applicable income. This regulation is being amended to clarify that earned income tax credits are to be treated in accordance with K.A.R. 30-4-112(y).

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-112.

Article 5.—PROVIDER PARTICIPATION, SCOPE OF SERVICES, AND REIMBURSEMENTS FOR THE MEDICAID (MEDICAL ASSISTANCE) PROGRAM

30-5-58. Definitions. This regulation is being amended to replace the definition of "medical necessity" with a different definition, to revise the definition of "special hospital," to delete the definition of "technology dependent child" and replace it with a definition for "technology-assisted children," and to add a new definition, "emergency psychiatric admission," the text of which is set forth below.

"'Emergency psychiatric admission' means admission of a recipient as an inpatient in a general hospital after the sudden onset of psychiatric symptoms of sufficient severity that the recipient is likely to be harmful to self or others if immediate inpatient psychiatric treatment is not received."

Economic Impact: None.

30-5-77. Scope of home- and community-based serv-

ices for technology-assisted children. The secretary is promulgating a new regulation, the text of which is set forth below:

30-5-77. Scope of home- and community-based services for technology-assisted children. The scope of home- and community-based services for technology-assisted children shall consist of those services provided under the authority of a federally approved waiver. Home- and community based services shall be provided in accordance with a written plan of care by a home health agency and approved by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services. (a) Services may include one or more of the following:

(1) An average of 10 hours per month of case management services;

(2) a maximum of seven days or 168 hours per calendar year of respite care provided in the home; and

(3) medical equipment and supplies not otherwise covered under the medicaid program and approved in the plan of care.

(b) Reimbursement for services for technology-assisted children shall be based upon reasonable fees as related to customary charges, except no fee shall be paid in excess of the range maximum. The range of charges shall provide the base for computations. The effective date of this regulation shall be July 1, 1991.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-6-82.

30-5-81. Scope of hospital services. This regulation is being amended to non-cover heart and liver transplants for those who are not participating in the Kan Be Healthy program (adults), to non-cover inpatient hospital alcohol and drug addiction treatment services except for detoxification, and to add the requirement that community health centers must screen and pre-certify all admissions for psychiatric treatment.

Economic Impact: None.

30-5-86. Scope of services by community mental health centers. This regulation is being amended to reduce psychotherapy from 32 to 10 hours per recipient per calendar year, and to non-cover psychotherapy when provided concurrently with targeted case management and partial hospitalization.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-5-88.

30-5-88. Scope of physician services. This regulation is being amended to non-cover heart and liver transplants for those who are not participating in the Kan Be Healthy program (adults), to reduce individual psychotherapy from 32 to 10 hours and group psychotherapy from 32 to 20 hours per recipient per calendar year, and to non-cover psychotherapy when provided concurrently with targeted case management and partial hospitalization.

Economic Impact: None.

30-5-104. Scope of psychological services. This regulation is being amended to reduce psychotherapy from 32 to 10 hours per recipient per calendar year, and to non-cover psychotherapy when provided concurrently with targeted case management and partial hospitalization.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-5-88.

Article 6.—MEDICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM— CLIENTS' ELIGIBILITY FOR PARTICIPATION

30-6-77. Poverty level pregnant women and children; determined eligibles. This regulation is being amended to provide coverage to children who are six years of age or older and who were born on or after October 1, 1983. Coverage is limited to children whose family income does not exceed 100 percent of the federal poverty level. Other technical changes have been made. (Federal Mandate).

Economic Impact: This change will result in 1,921 additional children becoming eligible for medical assistance for a total increase in expenditures of \$5,997,888 (\$2,474,179 state general funds) for fiscal year 1992. This level will not occur immediately but instead will build each month and culminate to 1,921 children by June 1992.

30-6-82. Technology-assisted child; determined eligibles. The secretary is promulgating a new regulation, the text of which is set forth below:

30-6-82. Technology-assisted child; determined eligibles. (a) Each applicant or recipient shall meet the general eligibility requirements of K.A.R. 30-6-50 and the requirements set forth below to be eligible as a technology-assisted child.

(1) Each child shall be under the age of 16.

(2) Each child shall, if not for the provision of home- and community-based services, require the level of care provided in a hospital.

(3) Each child shall require substantial and ongoing care by a nurse and:

(A) Be dependent at least part of each day on mechanical ventilators for survival;

(B) require prolonged intravenous administration of nutritional substances or drugs; or

(C) need some other medical device to compensate for the loss of a vital body function.

(b) Eligibility shall be determined based on the financial eligibility standards and methodologies applicable to persons in home- and community-based services arrangements.

(c) The need for care and receipt of home- and community-based services under this provision shall be subject to approval by the division of medical programs. The effective date of this regulation shall be July 1, 1991.

Economic Impact: Estimated cost savings of \$221,293 (\$94,381 state general funds) in the first year of the waiver on which this change is based.

30-6-103. Determined eligibles; protected income levels. This regulation is being amended to reflect that the protected income level for older children under the provisions of K.A.R. 30-6-77(d) shall be 100 percent of the federal poverty level. Other technical changes have been made. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-6-77.

This regulation is being further amended to delete the section regarding specialized living arrangements. The standards for such arrangements are already incorporated in the existing provisions of this regulation.

(continued)

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-6-106. General rules for consideration of resources, including real property, personal property, and income. This regulation is being amended to clarify that the resources of a parent shall not be considered for children in an institutional or home- and community-based services arrangement beginning in the month following the month the arrangement begins. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

This regulation is being further amended to increase the income level upon which the community spouse and dependent family member allowances are based upon to 133 percent of the federal poverty level. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: This change is expected to increase the community spouse allowance for approximately 577 persons resulting in a total cost increase of \$567,276 (\$234,001 state general funds).

30-6-107. Property exemption. This regulation is being amended to reflect a technical change.

Economic Impact: None.

30-6-112. Income exempt from consideration as income and as a cash asset. This regulation is being amended for non-SSI to exempt the amount of earned income tax credit received as income and as a cash asset for the month of receipt and the following month. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-6-113. Income exempt as applicable income. This regulation is being amended to clarify that earned income tax credits for non-SSI are to be treated in accordance with K.A.R. 30-6-112(y).

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-6-112.

Article 7.—COMPLAINTS, APPEALS AND FAIR HEARINGS

30-7-65. Notice to recipients of intended action. This regulation is being amended to clarify that the 10-day notice requirement for notices to recipients of intended action is intended to include weekends and holidays in the computation. This is to clarify current interpretation by the agency that K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 60-206(a) does not apply to the federal regulations regarding timely notice, nor to the Kansas Administrative Regulation, nor to the Kansas Public Assistance Manual.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact as it reflects current policy.

30-7-75. Agency's summary. This regulation is being amended to change the number of days the agency has after notification of a request for fair hearing to furnish the appellant and the administrative hearings section with a summary from seven days to 15 days.

Economic Impact: None.

Article 10.—ADULT CARE HOME PROGRAM

30-10-15a. Reimbursement. Payment for services. This regulation is being amended by adding that durable medical equipment, medical supplies and other

items and services which are considered routine shall not be billed or reimbursed separately from the per diem rate; by adding that tracheostomy care kits, extra nursing care and supplies, physical, occupational and speech therapies, compressors, orthoses and splints to prevent or correct contractures and maintenance care for head-injured recipients to the list of routine items and services; and by adding that private rooms for recipients shall be covered when medically necessary or at the discretion of the facility, and that the costs shall be reflected in the facility's cost report. If the private room is not medically necessary and is not at the discretion of the facility, a family member, guardian, conservator or other third party may reimburse the difference between the usual and customary charge for a private room and the medicaid payment rate.

Economic Impact: None.

30-10-16. Heavy care. This regulation is being revoked.

Economic Impact: None.

30-10-23a. Non-reimbursable costs. This regulation is being amended to add that therapeutic beds are non-allowable.

Economic Impact: None.

Article 41.—LICENSING OF NON-MEDICAL COMMUNITY BASED AGENCIES PROVIDING SERVICES TO HANDICAPPED ADULTS

30-41-1. Definitions. This regulation is being amended to include a definition of supported employment.

Economic Impact: None.

30-41-7a. Environmental standards. This regulation is being amended to make technical changes.

Economic Impact: None.

30-41-7i. Supported employment. The secretary is promulgating a new regulation. The new regulation requires agencies offering supported employment programs to ensure that the work environment is safe and healthy; to inform clients of the program's possible effect on a client's disability benefits; and to enter a written agreement with the business entity providing the employment site.

Economic Impact: None.

30-41-20. Supported employment program content. The secretary is promulgating a new regulation. The new regulation specifies the services that together comprise the support employment program.

Economic Impact: None.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Tuesday, May 21, in the Conservation Division hearing room, third floor, 200 Colorado Derby Building, 202 W. 1st, Wichita, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations for the conservation of crude oil and natural gas.

The period of 30 days notice from the date of this publication to the date of the public hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. Comments may be submitted to the State Corporation Commission, Attn: Shari Feist Albrecht, Deputy Director, 200 Colorado Derby Building, 202 W. 1st, Wichita 67202.

Copies of the proposed regulations and the economic impact statement may be obtained at the Wichita address. Persons requesting a copy of the proposed regulations and economic impact statements, in accordance with K.S.A. 45-219, will be required to compensate the State Corporation Commission for the cost of reproduction. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views, orally, or in writing, in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations.

All written or oral comments submitted by interested parties on or before May 21 will be considered by the commission as a basis for making changes to these proposed permanent regulations. The following is a brief summary of the proposed regulations and economic impact statements:

K.A.R. 82-3-101 (Permanent regulation). The amendment adds one new definition (working pit), deletes one existing definition (drilling pit), and clarifies two existing definitions (reserve pit and workover pit). The new definition was added to give definition to language used in existing regulations. "Drilling pit" was removed because it is a general term which encompasses both the more specific terms "reserve pit" and "working pit," which are each currently defined in the regulation.

Economic Impact: None.

K.A.R. 82-3-600 (Permanent regulation). The amendment clarifies that use of surface ponds without commission approval is prohibited and establishes a \$500 penalty for unauthorized use. The amendment provides for the verbal authorization of workover pits conditioned on the filing of a written application within five days after the verbal authorization. The amendment requires the filing of an application with the Conservation Division and specifies application requirements. Chloride concentration and geohydrology are the criteria for assessing the risk that a particular surface pond poses to water resources. The amendment deletes construction requirements which have been placed in K.A.R. 82-3-601a.

Economic Impact: Since the amendment merely clarifies existing requirements for filing an application to

permit the use of a surface pond, there is no economic impact to the industry. The provision allowing the verbal authorization will require additional district staff time, estimated at approximately 10 minutes per telephone call. With each of four district offices receiving an estimated 5-10 requests per month, the economic impact to the agency is expected to range from \$653-\$1306 annually.

K.A.R. 82-3-600b (Permanent regulation). This new regulation establishes a reauthorization process for existing surface ponds (except working and reserve pits) which are located in recently identified sensitive groundwater areas, incorporated into the regulation by reference to Table III. The reauthorization involves the filing of an application with the Conservation Division on a form prescribed by the division. One year from the effective date of the regulation is the established reauthorization period. The regulation establishes a \$500 penalty for unauthorized operation of an existing surface pond after the expiration of the one-year period.

Economic Impact: The operator shall bear the expense of preparing and filing the application, which costs about \$15 per application if prepared by a commercial service.

Based on available production information, there are approximately 28,051 producing leases in Kansas. An estimated 30 percent of these leases are located in sensitive groundwater areas; a maximum of two-thirds of these 30 percent are believed to have surface ponds subject to reauthorization. For each inspection, it is expected that an average of 2.5 hours would be spent traveling to and from the site with 0.5 hour spent inspecting the site. Based on this average, each inspection would cost the agency about \$55 for staff time and \$33 in mileage expense. Assuming that the commission inspects 100 percent of these locations (5638), the one-time annual cost to the agency would be \$496,144.

K.A.R. 82-3-601 (Revocation). The regulation is to be revoked since its provisions are now contained in K.A.R. 82-3-600.

Economic Impact: None.

K.A.R. 82-3-601a (Permanent regulation). This new regulation specifies the construction requirements for surface ponds. The regulation establishes a minimum freeboard of 30" for all surface ponds except working pits, reserve pits, and burn pits which shall have a minimum freeboard of 12".

The regulation specifies that when the Conservation Division requires that surface ponds be sealed and for emergency pits in sensitive groundwater areas, the surface pond shall be constructed to limit hydraulic conductivity to 1×10^{-7} cm/sec. The regulation lists a number of available options to meet this requirement.

The regulation prohibits the construction of surface ponds deeper than five feet above the shallowest existing water table in the vicinity of the well. The regulation further establishes reporting requirements for hydraulic conductivity data.

Economic Impact: Since the regulation provides for the lining of surface ponds as determined by the Con-

(continued)

ervation Division on a case-by-case basis, it is impossible to anticipate the number of surface ponds which may be required to be lined. However, surface pond lining costs may range from \$10,152 to \$48,330 per surface pond depending on the construction option selected by the operator.

Assuming that there are 28,051 producing leases in Kansas, 30 percent of which are located in sensitive groundwater areas, and assuming two-thirds of the leases have emergency pits, a total annual industry cost for lining emergency pits located in sensitive groundwater areas is estimated to range from \$93,505 to \$6 million. This cost range varies from \$566 for lining emergency pits with plastic liners to \$2100 for fiberglass or steel tanks in lieu of emergency pits to \$11,130 for lining with Gunitite liner.

The costs of groundwater monitoring and leak detection systems are difficult to quantify since individual aquifer characteristics, which determine both the necessity and construction design of monitoring wells, vary considerably from location to location. The commission currently has authority to require monitoring and leak detection systems where groundwater pollution is suspected or where sensitive groundwater areas have been established. Any such installation costs would be borne by the legally responsible party.

The costs described above for lining surface ponds are for preventive measures against groundwater pollution from oil and gas activities. These costs are generally believed to be significantly less than actual groundwater cleanup costs after pollution has occurred. It is further believed that requiring more stringent construction of surface ponds will encourage development of new and more cost-effective alternatives and technology to ensure groundwater protection.

Enforcement of this regulation is expected to be handled by existing staff. Additional environmental geologists were hired in fiscal year 1989 to conduct various groundwater protection and remediation activities. Implementation of these more stringent construction requirements, which have been under study for three years, would be enforced by this level of district technical personnel. If, however, as implementation of enforcement is developed and necessity for additional staff is realized, it may be necessary to hire four additional environmental geologist positions. The cost of funding such new positions is anticipated to be \$143,356.

For each surface pond which may be inspected by existing commission staff, it is expected that an average of 2.5 hours would be spent traveling to and from the site with 0.5 hour spent inspecting the site. Based on this average, each inspection would cost the agency about \$55 in staff time and \$33 in mileage expense.

K.A.R. 82-3-601b (Permanent regulation). This new regulation provides for an exception to the construction and closure requirements for emergency pits in sensitive groundwater areas. Exception requests must be made in writing to the director and submitted with the surface pond application. The request must contain supporting data to show why the exception should be

granted. An on-site investigation may be conducted to determine the viability of the exception request.

Economic Impact: The applicant bears the expense of preparing and filing an exception request, estimated at \$40 per application. The commission bears the cost of any on-site investigation, including travel and staff time. For each exception request that the commission would investigate, it is expected that an average of 2.5 hours would be spent traveling to and from the site with 0.5 hour spent inspecting the site. Based on this average, each inspection would cost the agency about \$55 in staff time and \$33 in mileage expense.

K.A.R. 82-3-602 (Permanent regulation). The amendment clarifies pond closure requirements and restructures the contents of the regulation. The amendment provides an alternative method for disposing reserve pit waste down the annular space of a well which meets the Alternate I requirements for construction. The amendment also provides for the placement of solid pit contents in off-site disposal areas meeting specified conditions.

The amendment imposes a new requirement that operators of reserve pits in sensitive groundwater areas report, to the appropriate district office, the chloride content of reserve pit fluids and a drilling fluid management plan within 48 hours after drilling operations cease. The drilling fluid management methods actually used shall be reported to the Conservation Division on the affidavit of completion.

The amendment further requires reporting off-lease waste transfers and filing surface pond closure forms.

Economic Impact: If the operator chooses the off-site disposal alternative for disposal, the operator will bear saltwater hauling expenses, which cost will depend on the amount and destination of fluid transported. The operator shall further bear the expense of reporting the required information to the Conservation Division. The expense of chloride testing should be minimal since most drilling companies have on-site chloride testing equipment.

Based on an estimate of 778 wells drilled per year in sensitive groundwater areas (derived from a five-year statistical average of total wells drilled in Kansas) and estimating 10 minutes per telephone call for district staff time in receiving the reported information, the cost to the agency is expected to be \$2116 annually.

K.A.R. 82-3-605 (Permanent regulation). This new regulation specifies that dikes do not require surface pond permits. The regulation requires operators to notify the appropriate district office of any discharge into diked areas within 24 hours of the discharge. The regulation further requires operators to remove fluids from within the diked area within 48 hours after discovery of the discharge. The regulation also establishes penalties of \$250, \$500, and \$1000 for an operator's failure to properly remove fluids within the diked area.

Economic Impact: The operator shall bear the cost of notification and removal of discharged fluids and any penalty expense. The cost of removal of discharged fluids is difficult to estimate since costs will depend largely upon the amount of fluid discharged and availability of appropriate disposal facilities, whether on-site or off-site.

The agency costs will include staff time spent in receiving discharge notification (\$2.72 per call assuming 10 minutes per call) and a possible follow-up site inspection (\$55 for three hours of staff time and \$33 for mileage expense).
