## Opinion No. 91-107

**Public Health—Emergency Medical Services—Establishment, Operation and Maintenance of Emergency Medical Services; Tax Levies; Protest Petition, Election; Reimbursement of Certain Taxing Districts by Counties.** David E. Retter, Concordia City Attorney, Concordia, September 12, 1991.

A county, as a subdivision of state government, is subject to limitations imposed by an enabling act. K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 65-6113 limits how a county may reimburse a taxing district that provides ambulance service. Given that home rule cannot be used because the act is uniformly applicable, the reimbursement formula cannot be altered, short of legislative amendment. ## Opinion No. 91-108

**Schools—School Unification Acts—School District Expenditures Over \$10,000; Requirements Relating to Bids and Bidders; Exemptions; Architectural Services.** Representative Galen Weiland, 49th District, Bendena, September 12, 1991.

Under the procedures utilized by the board of trustees for Johnson County Community College for entering into contracts, the signing of the contract is a ministerial function that may be delegated to an administrative official of the community college. ## Opinion No. 91-110

A city may expend revenues from the transient guest tax to upgrade handicapped accessibility on public property in a downtown shopping area where the city governing body, in its legislative judgment, determines that such expenditure will encourage either conventions or tourism. ## Opinion No. 91-111

**State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Public Employees Retirement Systems; Kansas Public Employees Retirement System—Requirement to Become Affiliated When Municipal Consolidations Occur.** Wayne K. Westblade, Hamilton County Attorney, Syracuse, September 17, 1991.

A governmental entity resulting from the merger or consolidation of two political subdivisions or instrumentalities of a county is required to maintain the membership in KPERs for those employees who were previously employed by a political subdivision or instrumentality which was a participating employer under KPERs. ## Opinion No. 91-112

**Schools-Community Colleges—Organizations, Powers and Finances of Board of Trustees—Boards of Trustees; Powers and Duties; Political Campaign Posters and Signs on Campus.** Representative Richard R. Reinhardt, 8th District, Erie, September 17, 1991.

The campus of a community college, at least for its students, possesses many of the characteristics of a public forum. For the board of trustees of a community college to prohibit or restrict speech based on the content of that speech, the board must show that its regulation is necessary to serve a compelling state interest and that it is narrowly drawn to achieve that end. The board may enforce regulations of the time, place and manner of expression if such regulations are content-neutral, are narrowly tailored to serve a significant governmental interest and leave open ample alternatives of communication. The presence of political campaign posters and signs in or on buildings located on the campus of a community college does not jeopardize the tax-exempt status of the community college. From Hazardous Waste Regulations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is providing public notice that on June 11, 1991, Parsons Precision Products, Inc., 3333 Main, Parsons, submitted a request for a variance from specific hazardous waste regulations. The request for a variance was submitted in accordance with K.A.R. 28-31-13(a).

The variance is requested from K.A.R. 28-31-4 and 40 CFR 265.176, which requires the storage of containers holding ignitable hazardous waste must be located at least 15 meters (50 feet) from the facility's property line.

Parsons Precision Products, Inc. generates ignitable hazardous waste, which is stored prior to being shipped off-site for reclamation. The company proposes to store this waste in a hazardous waste containment area with concrete flooring and curbing to contain any potential spills. KDHE has reviewed the variance request and concluded that the variance is justified.

In accordance with K.A.R. 28-31-13(b), public notice was provided that KDHE considered the request for a variance justified and made a tentative decision to grant the variance. A public comment period to receive comments regarding this tentative decision was established between August 15, 1991, and September 14, 1991. No public comments were received.

Therefore, in accordance with 28-31-13(B), KDHE announces its decision to approve this request for a variance and not to include any special conditions. The variance shall become effective September 26, 1991, and shall remain in effect until September 26, 1996.

#### Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 2 p.m. Wednesday, October 30, in Room 108 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations of the Division of Facilities Management and the Division of Personnel Services.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Administration, Room 263-E, State Capitol, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Summaries of the proposed regulations and of their economic impact follow.

#### Division of Facilities Management

**K.A.R. 1-45-16, Removal of motor vehicles,** is proposed for amendment in order to authorize towing and impoundment of vehicles illegally parked in areas under the supervision and control of the Secretary of Administration. The current regulation abates an illegal parking nuisance through court action initiated by the Attorney General. The intent of the regulation is to

simplify and thereby increase the effectiveness of the process of deterring habitual illegal parking. There would be no cost to the Department of Administration or other state agencies as a result of this amendment. The costs of having a vehicle towed and the cost for storage of a towed vehicle would be assessed to the owner of the illegally parked vehicle at an estimated rate of \$25 for towing and \$10 per day of storage. Amendments to this regulation are proposed on a permanent basis.

#### Division of Personnel Services

The following regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis:

**K.A.R. 1-5-15, Salary of employee upon demotion,** is proposed for amendment in order to allow employees to accept, in lieu of layoff, a voluntary demotion within the same organizational unit without a decrease in pay. Under the current regulation, a voluntary demotion without a decrease in pay cannot take place within an organizational unit. By permitting such a voluntary demotion in lieu of a layoff, agencies will have more flexibility in placing and retaining employees affected by a layoff action. Similarly, the affected employees will benefit from having an expanded alternative to layoff without a reduction in pay. No fiscal impact on the Department of Administration, other state agencies or the general public is expected.

**K.A.R. 1-5-27, Moving expenses,** is proposed to be revoked. K.S.A. 75-3224 and K.A.R. 1-16-2b also address the conditions and limitations under which in-state moving expenses may be paid to state employees by the agency. Revocation of K.A.R. 1-5-27 will prevent any inconsistencies in payment of in-state moving expenses due to variances between it and K.A.R. 1-16-2b and K.S.A. 75-3224. No fiscal impact on the Department of Administration, state agencies or the general public is anticipated.

**K.A.R. 1-5-30, Benefits for employees activated to military duty,** is proposed for amendment in order to make the death benefit provided to employees under this regulation parallel to the death benefits provided to state employees under the Kansas Public Employees Retirement System (KPERS). As a result, families of employees normally covered by a death benefit under KPERS will receive an equivalent benefit if the employee's KPERS death benefit coverage lapses while on active duty. State agencies with employees activated to military duty will bear the cost of future increases in the death benefit provided under this regulation to any employees who die while on active duty. However, due to the number of variables affecting the cost of the death benefit, it is not possible to project the potential economic impact on any one state agency or on the state as a whole as a result of future increases in the KPERS death benefit.

**K.A.R. 1-5-28, Shift differential,** is amended to delete an exemption contained in subsection (f) that is no longer applicable. Subsection (f) excludes certain youth service worker classes from the provisions of K.A.R. 1-5-28, as a provision for shift differential was included in their class specifications. That class series was abolished and a new class series of youth service specialists was established. In the process, the shift differential provisions which were part of the specifications for the prior class series were eliminated, thereby making the exemption in subsection (f) unnecessary. This amendment will have no impact on the amount of shift differential paid to employees in these classes, therefore, no economic impact on the Department of Administration, other state agencies, state employees or the general public is expected.

**K.A.R. 1-6-29, Acting assignment,** is amended in order to permit agencies experiencing a shortage in funds to delay filling a vacant position on a permanent basis, and in the interim to fill the position on an acting basis. The existing regulation requires that agencies using an acting appointment must concurrently take action to fill the vacancy on a permanent basis. By permitting agencies to fill a vacant position on an acting basis for a limited period of time, agencies may be able to realize some cost savings while maintaining a higher level of services than if the vacant position was simply held open. Therefore, this amendment is proposed to provide additional flexibility for agencies to manage within budget limitations.

**K.A.R. 1-9-4, Vacation,** and **K.A.R. 1-9-5, Sick leave,** are amended to clarify that if an employee is deprived of some or all of the employee's vacation due to an illness of a family member, the leave may be charged to accumulated sick leave credits, rather than vacation leave. A further amendment to K.A.R. 1-5-4 will simplify the carry-over process for excess vacation leave. These amendments are not expected to result in any fiscal impact on the Department of Administration, state agencies or the general public.

**K.A.R. 1-9-21, Nepotism,** is amended in order to conform with the provisions of 1991 HB 2454, Section 39 (L. 1991, Chap. 150, Sec. 39), which prohibits any state officer or employee from supervising, managing or advocating any action related to employment or discipline of a member of the employee's family or household. No fiscal impact on the Department of Administration, other state agencies or the general public is expected.

## Kansas Insurance Department

Notice of Hearing on Proposed  
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be at 10 a.m. Friday, October 25, in the third floor conference room of the Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations of the Kansas Insurance Department. The following is a summary of the regulations and their economic impact:

**K.A.R. 40-1-38** is a permanent regulation which adopts by reference the operative sections of a model regulation relating to insurance companies deemed to be in a hazardous financial condition. This model regulation was promulgated by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC).

Section 3 of the NAIC model itemizes various specific considerations the commissioner may contemplate in determining whether an insurance company's financial condition would make further assumption of risks hazardous to the insuring public as permitted by K.S.A. 40-222d. Section 4 of such regulation specifies corrective actions the commissioner may take when an insurance company is deemed to be in a hazardous financial condition. These actions are expressly permitted by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 40-222b and their inclusion in K.A.R. 40-1-38 simply formalizes the commissioner's authority to impose conditions and restrictions commensurate with an insurance company's financial condition.

Adoption of K.A.R. 40-1-38 will have no fiscal impact on insurance companies except those deemed to be in a hazardous financial condition. In those cases, the fiscal impact will be minimal as a result of the regulation because it simply adds specificity to existing statutory authority. Similarly, the regulation will not have a significant impact on the Insurance Department because it does not add to the department's duties and responsibilities beyond those inherent in the existing statutory provisions.

For the same reasons, the regulation will not have a measurable or quantifiable fiscal impact on the insuring public. However, the regulation in combination with its underlying statutes is of substantial public importance to the extent exercise of the regulatory authority they embody reduces or minimizes insurance company insolvencies.

**K.A.R. 40-2-15** requires individual life insurance policies and annuity contracts to provide consumers a "10-day free look" that permits the policy or contract to be returned within 10 days of its delivery to the purchaser and have the premium paid returned to the purchaser if, for any reason, the policy or contract is unsatisfactory. The proposed amendment to this regulation recognizes the unique characteristics of a variable life insurance policy. Specifically, the amendment provides a separate method of calculating the premium refund to take into account the investment results that may have transpired during the period of time the policy was in effect.

The amendment to this regulation will have no fiscal impact on this department and a minimal fiscal impact on insurers and consumers. However, in the absence of the amendment a greater fiscal impact is conceivable because of the failure to take the unique characteristics of variable life insurance into effect.

**K.A.R. 40-3-22** is substantively amended in section (c)(6)(L)(ii) to permit certain indemnity agreements to be provided by a bailee or a bailee's employees without the bailee or its employees being licensed as insurance agents or violating insurance laws or regulations. The other amendments to the regulation are editorial in nature and are necessary only to conform to state policy regarding the language and format of administrative regulations.

The amendments to this regulation will have no fiscal impact on the Insurance Department or insurance companies. It will have a beneficial fiscal impact on certain consumers because of the simplified manner in which moving and storage companies, furriers, dry cleaning establishments and other bailees can provide insurance protection for property of bailors, but the extent of this fiscal effect cannot be quantified.

**K.A.R. 40-4-23** is, in addition to certain editorial changes, being amended to include the solicitation or sale of accident and sickness insurance to persons receiving medical assistance under Medicaid as an unfair and deceptive trade practice. This amendment is precautionary in nature. Therefore, it will have no fiscal impact on this department, insurers or consumers.

**K.A.R. 40-4-37** is being amended to specifically require that the premium refund required under its "free look" provisions must be returned directly to the applicant or named insured within 10 business days following return of the policy. This regulation will have no fiscal impact on this department other than the indirect effect which flows from a reduction in the number of complaints or inquiries received. It will not have a significant overall fiscal impact on insurers or the insuring public; however, consumers will frequently have the benefit of their returned premium earlier as a result of this amendment. To this extent the fiscal impact will be favorable to individual consumers but the precise frequency and extent of this impact is not possible to quantify.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing by addressing them to the Commissioner of Insurance, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka 66612. The period of time between the date of publication of this notice and the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

The city's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds shall be aware that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the city's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted current earnings of certain corporations in the calculation of alternative minimum taxable income, with certain other adjustments. Furthermore, Section 59A of the code, as added by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, provides for a new environmental tax generally based on corporate alternative minimum taxable income. The amount of the tax is equal to 0.12 percent of the excess of alternative minimum taxable income, without regard to net operating losses and the deduction for this tax, over \$2 million. The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the taxpayer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies to reduce the amount of their deductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on such obligations. With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that

banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds. The city does intend to designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

#### Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the city, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the city with the provisions of the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. Interest on the bonds may also be excludable from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income for taxable years commencing after December 31, 1987.

#### Delivery and Payment

The city will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the bonds, without cost to the successful bidder, properly prepared, executed and registered, on or about November 14, 1991, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or greater Kansas City, Missouri, metropolitan area as may be specified by the successful bidder. Delivery elsewhere will be at the bidder's expense. **111-9-37. Name of Game.** The Kansas Lottery shall conduct an instant pull-tab game entitled "Cash Roulette" commencing on September 9, 1991. **Article 4.—REGISTRATION OF SECURITIES**

**81-4-3. Separate registration of series and portfolios.** A separate securities registration and registration fee shall be required under the act for each series or portfolio of an open-end investment company even if the series or portfolios are aggregated in one registration statement filed under the federal securities act of 1933. If exempt under K.A.R. 81-5-9, a separate notice and fee under that regulation shall be required, even if the series or portfolios are aggregated in one registration statement filed under the federal securities act of 1933. However, only one set of exhibits need be filed with the Commissioner for all separate registrations of series or portfolios aggregated into one fund. (Authorized by K.S.A. 17-1270(f); implementing K.S.A. 17-1270(f), effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

**Article 5.—EXEMPTIONS**

**81-5-9. Open-end management investment company and unit investment trust exemption.** (a) A security issued by an issuer registered as an open-end management investment company or unit investment trust pursuant to Section 8 of the federal investment company act of 1940 shall be exempt under K.S.A. 17-1261(g) if the following requirements are met:

(1) The issuer meets one of the following two qualifications:

(A) the issuer is advised by an investment adviser that meets the following requirements:

(i) the investment adviser is a depository institution exempt from registration under the federal investment advisers act of 1940, or is currently registered as an investment adviser and has been registered, or is affiliated with an adviser that has been registered, as an investment adviser under the investment advisers act of 1940 for at least three years immediately before an offer or sale of a security claimed to be exempt under this regulation; and

(ii) the investment adviser has acted, or is affiliated with an investment adviser that has acted, as investment adviser to one or more registered investment companies or unit investment trusts for at least three years immediately before an offer or sale of a security claimed to be exempt under this regulation; or

(B) the issuer has a sponsor that, at all times throughout the three years before an offer or sale of a security claimed to be exempt under this paragraph, has sponsored one or more registered investment companies or unit investment trusts, the aggregate total assets of which have exceeded \$100,000,000.

(2) The commissioner has received, prior to any sale exempted under this regulation:

(A) a notice of intention to sell on Form K-14 which has been executed by the issuer and sets forth the name and address of the issuer and the title of the portfolio or series to be offered in the state of Kansas; and

(B) an exemption filing fee of:

(i) \$1,500 for an open-end management investment company with net assets of \$400,000,000 or more; or

(ii) \$1,000 for an open-end management investment company with net assets of more than \$100,000,000, but less than \$400,000,000; or

(iii) \$500 for an open-end management investment company with net assets of less than, or equal to \$100,000,000; or

(iv) \$200 for a unit investment trust.

(b) Additional notice and payment of the applicable fee shall be required for any offer or sale of a security of an open-end management company made more than twelve months after the date on which the original notice to claim the exemption under this provision was filed with the commissioner.

(c) For the purpose of this subparagraph (a), an investment adviser is affiliated with another investment adviser if it controls, is controlled by, or is under common control with the other investment adviser. (Authorized by K.S.A. 17-1270(f); implementing K.S.A. 17-1261(g); effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

#### Permanent Administrative Regulations

#### Article 21.—FALCONRY

**23-21-1 through 23-21-14.** (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-164 and 32-215; implementing K.S.A. 32-156; effective May 1, 1988; revoked Nov. 11, 1991.)

#### Article 14.—FALCONRY

**115-14-1. Falconry; federal regulations.** The requirements for the taking and the transportation of raptors for falconry purposes shall correspond, unless further restricted by Chapter 115, Article 14 of the Kansas Administrative Regulations, to the requirements for taking, possession and transportation of raptors for falconry purposes as established by 50 C.F.R. section 21.28 and section 21.29, as they existed on September 14, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807 and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1002; effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

**115-14-2. Falconry permits.** (a) "Service," as used in K.A.R. 115-14-2 through K.A.R. 115-14-12, means the United States fish and wildlife service.

(b) Each individual engaged in falconry shall possess a current Kansas falconry permit or a current falconry permit from a state the director of the service has determined meets the minimum federal standards as required by 50 C.F.R. 21.29 for the taking, possessing and transporting of raptors.

(c) Each individual holding a valid and current falconry permit from another state shall apply for a similar Kansas falconry permit upon establishment of residency in Kansas.

(d) Each resident falconer shall possess a current hunting license while hunting, unless exempted by state law.

(e) Each nonresident falconer shall possess a current nonresident hunting license while hunting, unless exempted by state law, or while participating in a falconry field trial or a department-approved special event. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807 and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-919; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-919, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1001 and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1002; effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

**115-14-3. Falconry permit classes and requirements.** (a) Apprentice class.

(1) Each applicant for an apprentice class permit shall be at least 14 years of age.

(2) Each applicant shall be sponsored by a general or master falconer during the first two years that the apprentice falconry permit is in force.

(3) Each sponsor shall supervise no more than three apprentice class falconers at any one time.

(4) Each apprentice falconer shall possess no more

(continued)

than one raptor and shall not obtain more than one replacement raptor during any 12-month period.

(5) Each apprentice falconer shall possess only an American kestrel *Falco sparverius*, a red-tailed hawk *Buteo jamaicensis*, or a red-shouldered hawk *Buteo lineatus*.

(b) General class.

(1) Each applicant for a general class permit shall be at least 18 years of age.

(2) Each applicant for a general class permit shall have at least two years experience at the apprentice class level or its equivalent.

(3) Each general falconer shall possess no more than two raptors and shall not obtain more than two replacement raptors during any 12-month period.

(c) Master class.

(1) Each applicant for a master class permit shall have at least five years of experience at the general class level or its equivalent.

(2) Each master falconer shall possess no more than three raptors and shall not obtain more than two replacement raptors during any 12-month period. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1002, and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1008; effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

**115-14-4. Examination.** Each applicant shall successfully pass an examination administered by the department prior to issuance of a falconry permit.

(a) The examination shall cover basic biology, diseases, care and handling of raptors, literature, law, regulations and other appropriate subject matter all relating to falconry and raptors.

(b) A score of 80 percent shall be required as a minimum passing score.

(c) Each applicant failing the examination may reapply after a period of 90 days.

(d) Each applicant holding a valid falconry permit from another state shall not be required to take an examination when applying for a similar Kansas falconry permit: (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807, implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1001; effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

**115-14-5. Facilities and inspection.** (a) The following indoor facility known as a mews, and outdoor facility known as a weathering area, shall be provided by each applicant prior to issuance of a falconry permit unless an exemption is granted by the department.

(1) Mews.

(A) Each facility shall be large enough to allow easy access for the caring for raptors housed in the facility.

(B) If more than one raptor is to be kept in the mews, the raptors shall be tethered or separated by partitions and the area for each raptor shall be large enough to allow the raptor to fully extend its wings.

(C) There shall be at least one window and one secure door that can be easily closed.

(D) Each window shall be protected on the inside by vertical bars, spaced narrower than the width of the raptor's body.

(E) The floor of the mews shall permit easy cleaning and shall be well drained.

(F) Adequate perches shall be provided.

(2) Weathering area.

(A) Each facility shall be fenced and roofed or covered with netting or wire.

(B) The enclosed area shall be large enough to insure that the raptor cannot strike the fence when flying from the perch.

(C) Protection from excessive sun, wind and inclement weather shall be provided for each raptor.

(D) At least one perch shall be provided.

(b) The facilities of each applicant shall be inspected and certified by the department or a department representative as meeting minimum standards.

(c) A falconry permit shall not be issued until minimum facility standards are met.

(d) All facilities shall be properly maintained and cleaned during the term of the permit. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1002; effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

**115-14-6. Equipment.** (a) The following equipment shall be possessed by each applicant prior to issuance of a permit:

(1) at least one pair of aylmeri jesses, or jesses of a similar type, constructed of pliable, high quality leather or a suitable synthetic material. The jesses shall be used when any raptor is flown free. Traditional one-piece jesses may be used on raptors when not being flown;

(2) at least one flexible, weather-resistant leash and one strong swivel of acceptable falconry design;

(3) at least one suitable bath container for each raptor that is at least two to six inches deep and wider than the length of the raptor; and

(4) a reliable scale or balance suitable for weighing the raptors that is graduated to increments of not more than 1/2 ounce (15 grams).

(b) A falconry permit shall not be issued until all equipment requirements are met.

(c) All equipment shall be properly maintained during the term of the permit. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1002; effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

**115-14-7. Permit expiration and renewal.** (a) Each falconry permit shall be valid from the date of issue.

(b) Each falconry permit shall be valid for a period of time not to exceed three years, but each permit shall expire on December 31 in the third year of the permit.

(c) A falconry permit may be renewed without an examination. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1001 and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1002; effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

**115-14-8. Reports.** (a) Each falconer shall submit to the department a copy of any report required by 50 C.F.R. 21.28 and 21.29. Each report shall be submitted for report submission by the service.

(b) Each falconer shall provide reports to the department as required by the secretary. Such reports shall be submitted within time periods as established by the secretary and shall include information on permit and hunting activities. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990

Supp. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1001, and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1002; effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

**115-14-9. Acquisition of raptors.** (a)(1) "Eyass" means a raptor hatched that year that is not yet capable of flight.

(b) Eyasses may only be taken by a general or master falconer during the period from May 1 through July 1.

(c) Passage and haggard raptors may be taken by apprentice, general and master falconers during the period from September 1 through November 25.

(c) Not more than two eyasses may be taken by the same falconer during the specified time period for the taking of eyasses.

(d) At least two eyasses shall be left in the nest when an eyass is taken.

(e) The following raptors may be taken from the wild, but only during the specified stages of development:

(1) Red-tailed hawk *Buteo jamaicensis*—passage stages;

(2) Red-shouldered hawk *Buteo lineatus*—passage stage;

(3) Americal kestrel *Falco sparverius*—all stages; and

(4) Great-horned owl *Bubo virginianus*—all stages.

(f) Any other species of raptor in passage stage may be taken by general and master falconers if the service authorizes taking of the species from the wild for falconry purposes. No species listed as a Kansas threatened or endangered species shall be taken from the wild.

(g) Each falconer shall notify the department of intent to take raptors from the wild in Kansas. The falconer shall notify the department, immediately after the taking of a wild raptor. The proper marker shall be affixed to the raptor by the department unless the falconer is authorized by the department to affix the marker in the presence of the department representative.

(h) Marked raptors may be recaptured at any time.

(i) Each falconer shall purchase, receive, sell, barter or transfer raptors only in compliance with 50 C.F.R. 21.28 and 21.29.

(j) Captive-bred raptors of any species may be used by general and master falconers if use of such species for falconry has been authorized by 50 C.F.R. 21.28 and 21.29.

(k) Other than those species listed on federal or Kansas threatened or endangered lists, raptors taken under a depredation or special purpose federal permit may be used by general and master falconers as authorized by 50 C.F.R. 21.8. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1002; effective Nov. 11, 1991.)

**115-14-10. Other provisions.** (a) Each person possessing raptors prior to January 1, 1974 in excess of the number permitted by K.A.R. 115-14-9 and who fails to meet falconry requirements shall be authorized to retain the raptors. Each raptor shall be identified by a permanent marker provided by the service and the raptor cannot be replaced.

(b) No raptor shall be intentionally released to the wild without written authorization from the department. Markers shall be removed from such raptors and surrendered to the department.

(c) Any raptor possessed under authority of a falconry permit may be temporarily held and cared for by a person other than the permittee, if all requirements established by 50 C.F.R. 21.28 and 21.29 are met.

(d) Feathers that are molted or from birds held in captivity that die may be retained and exchanged by falconers for imping purposes only.

(e) Nonresident falconers may import their raptors into Kansas for hunting and field trial purposes, special events and for other uses as approved by the department.

(f) Each falconer shall notify the department of any permanent change of address within 30 days after the change.

(g) Falconers may export their raptors to other states for hunting, field trial or other special purposes if the falconer is in compliance with all federal laws and regulations and the laws and regulations of the state to which raptors are to be exported.

(h) Any raptor held by a falconer may be temporarily transferred to a raptor propagation permit holder, but only for purposes of breeding.

(i) Each raptor held for falconry purposes shall be marked by a permanent device provided by the service or by the department. All marking shall be in compliance with 50 C.F.R. 21.28 and 21.29 regulations for those species which are required by the service to be marked.

(j) Department markers on deceased or destroyed raptors shall be returned to the department within five days of the loss.

(k) Falconers may possess hen pheasants which are incidentally taken by falconry means during the established pheasant season. Each falconer shall possess no more than two hen pheasants per day and shall not take and possess more than four hen pheasants per season.

(1) Mistreatment of any raptor shall be grounds for permit revocation and for confiscation of any raptors in possession of a falconer. Mistreatment shall be defined as the following:

(1) having physical custody of a raptor and failing to provide food, potable water, protection from the elements, opportunity for exercise or other care as is needed for the health or well-being of the raptor;

(2) abandoning or leaving any animal in any place without making provisions for its proper care; or

(3) not fulfilling the requirements of K.A.R. 115-14-5.

(m) If the falconer has corrected the problem within 48 hours after receiving notice of the mistreatment from the department, action will not be taken against the falconer and the raptor will be returned to the falconer within 48 hours after the corrective action has been taken.

(n) If the falconer has not corrected the problem within 48 hours, action as allowed by law, including

the seizure of all raptors, may be taken by the department. K.S.A. 77-536 of the Kansas Administrative Procedures Act shall be utilized as the method of procedure in an emergency seizure and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 77-537, K.S.A. 77-541, and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 77-542 as the method of procedure in situations not of an emergency nature.

(o) In addition to other penalties prescribed by law, a resident falconry permit may be denied or revoked by the department for violation or noncompliance with any laws or rules and regulations which govern fal-

conry. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807 and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1047; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1001, K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1002 and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 32-1047; effective Nov. 11, 1991.)
