Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Friday, April 2, in the conference room in Suite 409, Capitol Tower, 400 S.W. 8th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations of the Kansas Board of Examiners in Optometry.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Kansas State Board of Examiners in Optometry, 403 N.W. Lyman Road, Topeka 66608. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of proposed regulations and their economic impact follows. None of these regulations are mandated by federal law as a requirement for participating in or implementing a federally subsidized or assisted program. K.A.R. 65-4-3, Fees. This regulation complies with the requirements of the optometry law that the Board of Examiners in Optometry set certain licensing fees by regulation. This regulation will establish the cost to persons applying for licensure to practice optometry in Kansas by renewal, examination or reciprocity as follows:

(a) Fee for initial license examination	\$150.00
(b) Fee for first retaking of license examination	\$ 50.00
(c) Fee for second and subsequent retaking of license examination	\$ 30.00
(d) Fee for license issued by examination	\$ 25.00
(e) Fee for reciprocal license	\$ 75.00
(f) (1) Fee for annual renewal of license	\$110.00
(2) Fee to obtain license renewal upon first failure to renew license prior to expiration date	\$250.00
(3) Fee to obtain license renewal upon second and subsequent failure to renew license prior to expiration date	\$300.00

The only changes were in the initial license examination fee, which was increased to \$150 from \$130, and in the annual renewal fee, which was increased to \$110 from \$90. These increases are necessary to finance needed expansions of the board's budget. These fees will be paid by applicants and licensees. Because of the relatively small amounts, no noticeable effect on citizens or consumers is anticipated. There is no less costly or less intrusive methods to obtain the purpose of the regulation, thus none were considered.

K.A.R. 65-4-4, Notice to Board. This regulation was amended to eliminate the requirement previously

found at K.A.R. 65-4-4(i) requiring a licensee to notify the board of cancellation of the licensee's policy of professional liability insurance. The change was the result of the legislature eliminating the requirement that licensees maintain such insurance. This regulation will have no economic impact.

Comments are welcome on any subject related to vocational rehabilitation and independent living services for Kansans with disabilities. In addition, comments on the following areas will be especially helpful:

- * Quality and timeliness of services provided by Rehabilitation Services
- * Access to rehabilitation engineering and assistive technology services
- * Unmet service needs
- * Transition from special education to the adult world of work and community living
- * Methods of expanding services to people with severe disabilities and to underserved populations
- * Utilization of rehabilitation facilities and independent living centers
- * Supported employment and supported living services
- * Methods to expand rehabilitation teaching and vocational counseling for persons who are blind or visually impaired, including older persons who are blind or visually impaired

Rehabilitation Services also is interested in receiving public comment on its proposed Order of Selection policy. In accordance with the U. S. Rehabilitation Act, an Order of Selection is required when there are insufficient resources to provide vocational rehabilitation services to all eligible individuals who apply for services. Under an Order of Selection, eligible clients are assigned to one of several priority categories, with the highest priority reserved for those with the most severe disabilities. Depending on available resources, it is possible that persons in lower priority categories would not be served and a waiting list would be created.

Rehabilitation Services anticipates that it will implement an Order of Selection prior to the end of state fiscal year 1993 (June 30, 1993). Interested persons may request a copy of the proposed policy by calling (913) 296-3911 V or (913) 296-7029 TDD. Copies of the policy also will be available for review at your local Rehabilitation Services office and at the forums listed above.

Information received through the forums will be used to guide preparation of program and budget priorities for Rehabilitation Services and to contribute to development of state plans submitted to the Federal Rehabilitation Services Administration.

Opinion No. 93-14

Schools—School District Finance and Quality Performance—Definitions; Local Effort; Consideration of Pub. L. 81-874 Funds. Senator Janice L. Hardenburger, 21st District, Haddam; Representative Kent Glasscock, 62nd District, Manhattan, February 4, 1993.

A determination of whether a state has established a program of state aid for free public education which is designed to equalize expenditures for free public education among the unified school districts is to be made by the United States secretary of education. If the United States secretary of education should determine that the school finance and quality performance act, K.S.A. 72-6405 *et seq.*, meets the qualifications set forth in 34 C.F.R. § 222.62, the Pub. L. 81-874 funds received by a unified school district may be considered by the state board in determining the amount of state aid to which the school district is entitled. Under the state program, Pub. L. 81-874 funds constitute a portion of the general fund of the unified school district. Any unexpended and unencumbered balance remaining in the general fund, as well as an amount equal to the federal impact aid of the school district, is considered to be a portion of the local effort. As part of the general fund of the school district, unexpended and unencumbered funds which may have been Pub. L. 81-874 funds in preceding years may be considered as a portion of the local effort. As long as the assistant district attorney does not practice civil law when acting as a conservator, and his job as a conservator does not interfere with his ability to devote full time to his duties, he may continue in his role as a conservator. The support staff of the district attorney's office may be part of the public employer-employee relations act contracts; however, any memorandum of agreement which is entered into cannot preempt state law or the rights of the public employer listed in K.S.A. 75-4326. Constitution of the State of Kansas—Finance and Taxation—System of Taxation; Classification; Extent of Classification for 501 Organizations. Representative Susan Wagle, 99th District, Wichita, February 8, 1993.

The 1992 amendment to article 11, section 1 of the Kansas constitution allowing use of a lower assessment rate for real property owned and operated by not-for-profit organizations that are not subject to federal income taxes pursuant to section 501 of the internal revenue code is not self-executing. The legislature must define by appropriate legislation the types of 501 organizations eligible for the lower rate. Cited herein: Kan. Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Drugs; Related Provisions—Alcohol and Drug Safety Action Program; Fees, Disposition. Harold T. Walker, City Attorney, Kansas City, February 8, 1993.

Money credited to the alcohol and drug safety action fund pursuant to K.S.A. 8-1008 may not be used for costs of a municipal court in providing the services specified by subsection (a) of that statute if the municipal court is not certified as a community-based alcohol and drug safety action program for the judicial

district in which the municipal court sits. Up to 10 percent of the money in the fund may be used to pay the administrative costs of the court charged with administering the provisions of K.S.A. 8-1008. Money in the fund may not be used to pay for a court's expenses in hearing DUI and other alcohol related offenses. Cited herein: K.S.A. 8-1008; 8-1567. JLM

State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Crime Victims Compensation Board; General Provisions—Claims for Compensation; Application; Conditions; Time. Betty A. Bomar, Director, Crime Victims Compensation Board, Topeka, February 9, 1993.

Pursuant to subsection (b) of K.S.A. 74-7305, compensation may not be awarded unless the claim has been filed with the Crime Victims Compensation Board within one year after the occurrence of the injury or death upon which the claim is based, unless the victim was less than 16 years of age and the injury or death is a result of one of those crimes set forth in subsections (b)(1) through (b)(8) of K.S.A. 74-7305. Opinion No. 93-20

Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Uniform Act Regulating Traffic; Rules of the Road—Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Drugs; Mandatory Imprisonment; Custody of Law Enforcement Officials. Robert J. Watson, Overland Park City Attorney, Overland Park, February 9, 1993.

To satisfy the mandatory imprisonment requirements imposed by K.S.A. 8-1567, the individual must be in custody. Providing private security guards in a hospital setting is not sufficient in and of itself to meet this requirement; however, constant surveillance by law enforcement officials in a jail is not required either. The determining factor is the intent of the court and law enforcement officials to retain custody and control of the prisoner. K.S.A. 39-966(d), which prohibits adult care home licensees and proprietary home health agencies from qualifying as providers of assessment and referral services, does not violate section 1 of the Kansas bill of rights or the fourteenth amendment to the United States constitution. The Board of Mortuary Arts will conduct a regularly scheduled business meeting at 9 a.m. Thursday, April 1, at the board's Topeka office, 700 S.W. Jackson, Suite 904. Examinations will be administered on Friday, April 2, at the Downtown Holiday Inn City Centre in Topeka.

In addition, a public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, April 1, at the board's Topeka office to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing regulations.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the board's Topeka office. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally in the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the board as a basis for approving, amending or rejecting the proposed regulations.

Copies of the regulations and economic impact statements may be obtained from the board's Topeka office, (913) 296-3980.

The following is a brief summary of the regulations proposed for amendment:

K.A.R. 63-1-3 further defines the registration and apprenticeship process for an embalmer license. The

changes relate to the board's intent to accept the national embalmer examination.

There will be no additional costs to the students or apprentices, as \$50 has been the registration fee for many years.

There will be no fiscal impact to the Board of Mortuary Arts.

K.A.R. 63-1-4 addresses the board's acceptance of the national embalmer examination. It amends the format of the examination to fit the national standards.

Applicants failing a part of the examination will now pay a partial examination fee of \$80 per section (maximum of \$160).

There will be no fiscal impact to the Board of Mortuary Arts, as all examination fees are paid by the applicants directly to the national testing company.

K.A.R. 63-3-10 addresses death from infectious or contagious diseases. It allows for burial or cremation without embalming within 24 hours of death as long as no health hazard results. Certain conditions are defined.

There will be no fiscal impact resulting from the amendments to this regulation.

K.A.R. 63-3-11 concerns preparation and transportation of dead human bodies. It also addresses infectious or contagious disease deaths.

There will be fiscal impact resulting from the amendments to this regulation.

K.A.R. 63-3-19 establishes a reinstatement fee for funeral home establishments and branch establishments late with renewing their licenses.

Funeral homes late with their renewals will have to pay a reinstatement fee equal to the renewal fee.

The fiscal impact will depend on the number of funeral homes late with their renewals. These two licenses have not had any kind of a financial penalty for late renewals. Hopefully, the addition of a penalty will solve the problem of late renewals.

K.A.R. 63-4-1 amends the cost to take the embalmer examination and adds a partial examinations fee to meet national requirements:

Applicants to take the embalmer examination will pay \$10 more. The examination consists of two sections. Failure of a section will result in a partial examination fee of \$80 per section (maximum of \$160) to retake.

There will be no fiscal impact on the Board of Mortuary Arts, as applicants pay these examination fees directly to the national testing company.

Corporation for Change**Request for Proposals**

The Corporation for Change is issuing a request for proposals on a new research project, "The Gatekeeping Project," which will examine the decision making processes that bring children into and then release them from state custody.

Information on the request for proposals follows. Applicants should be aware of the system of weighing factors to be used in evaluating proposals.

The Problem

The number of children in the custody of the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services increased 28 percent from 1985 to 1991, from 5,565 to 7,112. During the same period the number of SRS field staff available to work with these children and their families remained virtually constant.

Between fiscal year 1985 and fiscal year 1992 foster care costs more than doubled, reaching \$48 million. National studies have shown that Kansas allocates more money per capita to state hospital care for children than any other state. Kansas cannot continue this rate of increase without seriously affecting the level of resources available for other important programs.

The Blueprint for Kansas Children and Families recognized the seriousness of this problem and set a goal of reducing institutionalization of children. Likewise, in an effort to reduce long term foster care costs, the 1992 Kansas Legislature approved the first year of the SRS Family Agenda for Children and Youth, a plan to strengthen the effectiveness of the department's programs that serve children, youth and families. The plan includes five major elements: helping families to safely care for their children; improving out-of-home care for children when placement is necessary; working with juvenile offenders while providing for public safety; involving communities and other systems in the care and protection of Kansas children; and strengthening state government's capacity in the care and protection of children.

In order to achieve the goals of the Kansas Blueprint for Children and Families and the Family Agenda, it will be necessary to reduce the number of children coming into SRS care. The purpose of this study is to develop a better understanding of the decision making process that brings children into the care of the state and, based on that information, to design a gatekeeping function for the Kansas child welfare system. It is intended that this gatekeeping will prevent removal of children from the custody of their parents whenever possible or, when such action is necessary, shorten the length of time of placement.

Scope of Service**A. Examine the factors that bring children into state custody.**

This section will include a thorough review of the characteristics of children in the custody of SRS. It will include family status, age, race/ethnicity, geographic location and any other relevant demographic variables for which data are available. It will also examine factors such as criminal records, school violations, truancy, drug or alcohol use, and number of pregnancies to determine their relevance to the placement decision.

This section of the report will thoroughly review the roles played by various professionals, e.g. social workers, district attorneys, judges, school counselors, etc., in the decision to remove a child from the custody of his or her parents.

Finally, the report will review current policies and practices in the child welfare system and summarize their strengths and weaknesses with respect to the ease and appropriateness with which children enter state custody. Are these practices and policies consistently applied across the state or do they vary from region to region? If such variation exists, is it appropriate? To what extent does the source and availability of funding influence placement/custody decisions?

B. Examine the factors that remove children from state custody.

There is considerable speculation that it is very difficult for children to leave state custody once they enter it. Document the length of stay in state custody for children who have recently gone through the system. How many children stay in the system until they reach adulthood? Are there differences for children in need of care and juvenile offenders? Are there certain characteristics that correlate with length of stay?

Assess the tracking systems that are in place in SRS and the courts to ensure that children are not "lost" in the system.

C. Review the type and adequacy of services available to children prior to and following entry into state custody.

Review the array and quality of services available to the child and the family prior to placement and after placement. Are there waiting lists for services? Would a different placement decision have been made had alternative services been available? Is there a different array of services available after placement than before? Is the availability of services a factor in retaining children in state custody? How many agencies are involved in providing services to these children and families? How much communication takes place among agencies and how effective is that communication?

D. Recommendations

Discuss the pros and cons of alternative policies, including specific cost estimates and potential effectiveness of each. This section should distinguish between legislative change and administrative policy change. It should also discuss the appropriate roles of private service providers and citizen review boards. Make specific recommendations for policy changes that

will keep as many children as possible out of state custody without compromising their well being.

This section should also identify data and management problems in the child welfare system that become apparent throughout the conduct of the research.

Criteria for Selection of Researcher

The contract will be awarded on a competitive basis using the following criteria and weights:

1. Quality of the proposal and the closeness with which it meets the scope of services statement (30 percent).

2. Methodology to be used to gather specific information from state agencies and other relevant parties (25 percent).

3. Cost (20 percent).

4. Experience in evaluating public policy (15 percent).

5. Timeframe in which various components of the study can be completed (10 percent).

Bids are expected to fall in the range of \$10,000 to \$25,000. The Corporation for Change is anxious to receive results as soon as possible. The report can be divided into components and submitted as each is completed.

1. Cover page including title of proposal, principal investigator, agency address and phone number.

2. Method and scope of work statement. Describe how the applicant agency will gather specific data. Applicant must present plans for conducting the work involved in each section of the study. Included in this discussion will be the following:

- eliciting agency cooperation
- coordinating with local area SRS and judicial staff
- consulting with other agencies/organizations
- anticipating potential difficulties in conducting the research
- planning work to fit a reasonable time frame

3. Qualifications of applicant. Include in this section a brief history of the organization, evidence of credibility, and expertise of key staff.

4. Budget. Include detailed budgets for all phases of the study.

Notice of Meeting to Adopt Proposed Administrative Regulations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment will conduct an open meeting during its Executive Environment session scheduled from 8 to 9 a.m. Tuesday, March 9, in the office of the Secretary, Room 901, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to adopt new temporary and permanent regulations 28-29-84 and 28-29-85. K.A.R. 28-29-84 establishes a permit fee schedule for any solid waste disposal facility or area. K.A.R. 28-29-85 establishes a state mandated solid waste tonnage fee schedule and collection process for all solid waste facilities.

K.A.R. 28-29-84 formalizes existing permit fee procedures and modifies the fee structure, creating an economic impact just over \$100,000. The proposed permit annual renewal fee for a construction demolition debris disposal area and a transfer station is \$500; for a solid waste compost facility \$250; for an incinerator, an industrial solid waste disposal area, processing or reclamation facility \$1,000; and for a municipal solid waste disposal area \$2,000. A similar but higher fee schedule is proposed for new permit application fees.

K.A.R. 28-29-85 establishes the mechanism for the collection of the state solid waste tonnage fees from all solid waste disposal areas, as mandated by the state legislature. This regulation requires that large scale municipal solid waste facilities use scales in measuring tonnages and remit the fees monthly. All other municipal, construction demolition and industrial disposal areas are given several alternative measurement and tonnage fee payment options that require quarterly payments. This new \$1.50/ton fee and its costs of implementation may exceed \$6,000,000.

A public hearing was held on the regulations at 1:30 p.m. January 25 in the Henderson Learning Center, Washburn University, Topeka, with a phone link to the Trails Room, Memorial Union, Fort Hays State University, Hays. Nine oral and written comments were provided on the record. K.A.R. 28-29-85 was modified to clarify that all solid waste disposal areas were subject to the \$1.50 state solid waste tonnage fee.

Article 4.—PUBLIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

30-4-90. Eligibility factors specific to the GA-unrestricted (GAU) program. (a) Each applicant or recipient shall meet the applicable general eligibility requirements of K.A.R. 30-4-50, and the specific eligibility requirements set forth below, in order to be eligible for GAU.

(1) Each applicant or recipient, and the members of the assistance family group for whom the applicant or recipient is legally responsible, shall be ineligible for GAU if the applicant or recipient:

(A) Is eligible for a federal program; or

(B) has been rendered ineligible for a federal program due to a voluntary action on the part of the applicant or recipient.

(2) Each applicant or recipient and all persons for whom the applicant or recipient is legally responsible, if living together, shall be within at least one of the following categories to be eligible for GAU:

(A) Parents and their minor children who are living together, if the parents are not voluntarily unavailable for employment. A person shall not be considered voluntarily unavailable for employment if the person is attending high school full-time or is participating in an agency-approved, work-related activity. Assistance under this provision may not be denied solely because a person is participating in post-secondary education or training activities during other than normal working hours. Assistance under this provision shall also be granted to non-ADC children who are living with a conservator or a personal representative who is not within the degree of relationship for ADC;

(B) a person who has been medically or psychologically determined to be physically or mentally incapacitated based on one of the following conditions:

(i) Fractures/soft tissue injuries requiring 12 months of surgical management to restore function or preventing full weight-bearing for 12 months;

(ii) amputation with: hip disarticulation; or at the tarsal region due to peripheral vascular disease or diabetes; or inability to use a lower prosthesis for 12 months;

(iii) permanent loss of use of any two limbs;

(iv) active inflammatory arthritis (corroborated by laboratory results) persistent for three months despite treatment;

(v) arthritis (demonstrated on x-ray) with: inability to stand or walk unassisted; or surgical reconstruction/arthrodesis preventing full weight-bearing for 12 months; or gross deformity and functional limitations of joint in both arms;

(vi) osteomyelitis/septic arthritis of a major bone or joint persisting five months despite prescribed treatment;

(vii) ankylosis/fixation of spine at 30 or more degrees flexion confirmed by x-ray;

(viii) osteoporosis with: multiple vertebral fractures not due to trauma or 50 percent compression of vertebral body not due to trauma;

(ix) marked difficulty standing or walking which is expected to persist for 12 months;

(x) blindness with best corrected acuity of 20/100 in better eye; or constriction of visual fields to 25 degrees or less in each eye;

(xi) best corrected visual efficiency of 26 percent or less in the better eye;

(xii) total bilateral ophthalmoplegia confirmed by ocular motility studies;

(xiii) deafness with aided speech discrimination of 40 percent or less in better ear;

(xiv) permanent inability to produce (by any means) intelligible, sustainable speech;

(xv) labyrinthine—vestibular dysfunction with frequent vertiginous episodes and hearing loss;

(xvi) chronic skin disorders involving the hands, feet, axillae, perinium or extensive body areas which are resistant to treatment and result in severe functional limitations;

(xvii) chronic pulmonary insufficiency (confirmed on x-ray) due to any cause with: PFS showing FEV-1/MVV or VC restricted to 35 percent or less of expected values; or DLCO of 35 percent or less expected; or severe, chronic impairment of gas exchange confirmed by arterial blood gases; or cyanosis, dyspnea at rest, chronic wheezing and rhonchi and use of accessory muscles of breathing; or documented need for 24-hour supplemental oxygen;

(xviii) asthma or other episodic pulmonary impairments with prolonged expiration, wheezing and rhonchi between attacks despite treatment and severe, prolonged attacks requiring intensive treatment occurring at least each two months on average;

(xix) congestive heart failure with: persistence for three months despite treatment; or cor pulmonale; or persistent severe left ventricular hypertrophy;

(xx) ischemic heart disease with ongoing angina resulting in severe functional limitations;

(xxi) cardiac arrhythmias with repeated uncontrolled syncopal episodes;

(xxii) peripheral vascular disease with persistent ulceration despite treatment, amputation or other manifestations causing severe functional limitations;

(xxiii) hypertensive end-organ damage resulting in severe functional limitations;

(xxiv) uncompensated cardiomyopathy with left ventricular ejection function of 30 percent or less;

(xxv) documented need for a heart transplant;

(xxvi) other congenital or acquired heart disease with severe functional limitations due to cardiac dysfunction;

(xxvii) stricture, stenosis or obstruction of the esophagus (proven) with weight loss sustained at a level indicative of malnutrition;

(xxviii) peptic ulcer disease (proven) with: recurrence after definitive surgery despite treatment; or inoperable fistula formation; or demonstrated recurrent obstruction; or weight loss sustained at a level indicative of malnutrition;

(xxix) chronic liver disease with: esophageal varices resulting in massive bleeding or requiring a shunt; or significantly elevated serum bilirubin persisting for at least three months; or recurrent or persistent ascites associated with persistent hypoalbuminemia; or persistent (proven) hepatic cell necrosis or inflammation; or documented need for a liver transplant;

(xxx) chronic inflammatory disease of the digestive system with: persistent or recurrent systemic manifestations resulting in severe functional impairment; or obstruction due to intractable abscess, fistula formation or stenosis; or significant persistent weight loss sustained at a level indicative of malnutrition;

(xxxi) disorders of the pituitary, thyroid, parathyroid or adrenal cortex which are resistant to treatment and result in severe functional impairment;

(xxxii) diabetes mellitus with: severe neuropathy resulting in marked difficulty standing, walking or using the hands; or frequent episodes of ketoacidosis despite treatment;

(xxxiii) impaired renal function persisting for at least five months due to chronic, progressive disease with: elevation of serum creatinine to four mg. per 100 ml. or greater; or creatinine clearance of 29 liters/24 hours or less; or severe complications which require chronic dialysis or renal transplant;

(xxxiv) nephrotic syndrome with the following lasting three or more months: anasarca and serum albumin of 3.0 gm. per 100 ml. and proteinuria of at least 3.5 grams per 24 hours; or anasarca and proteinuria of at least 10 grams per 24 hours;

(xxxv) acute leukemia or acute phase of chronic leukemia;

(xxxvi) documented need for a bone marrow transplant;

(xxxvii) chronic anemia with hematocrit persisting below 30 percent with: requirement for blood transfusions each two months on average; or due to a chronic gastrointestinal disorder;

(xxxviii) myeloma or myelofibrosis with radiologically demonstrated involvement and intractable bone pain;

(xxxix) myeloma with: severe persistent hypercalcemia; or significant levels of plasma cells in peripheral blood;

(xl) coagulation defects (including chronic thrombocytopenia with persistence of severely decreased platelet count) and hemorrhagic disorders with recent spontaneous hemorrhage or intracranial bleeding;

(xli) chronic polycythemia not controllable by treatment with severe, persistent functional impairment due to hemorrhage or thrombosis;

(xlii) sickle cell disease with: sickle cell crises occurring each three months on average; or chronic anemia with hematocrit persisting below 30 percent; or requiring frequent extended hospitalization;

(xliii) recurrent systemic bacterial infections with the past four months due to: myelofibrosis; or chronic leukemia; or chronic granulocytopenia with absolute neutrophil counts persisting below 1000 cells/cubic millimeter;

(xliv) HIV infection with presence of opportunistic disease or severe functional impairment;

(xlv) morbid obesity (100 percent over desired weight) with sustained skeletal, cardiovascular or respiratory disease resulting in functional limitations;

(xlvi) systemic lupus erythematosus or progressive systemic sclerosis with recurrent visceral manifestations resulting in severe functional impairment;

(xlvii) polymyositis, polyarteritis or other collagen vascular disease with severe involvement of affected body systems resulting in severe functional impairment;

(xlviii) organic brain syndrome persisting for three or more months with severe functional limitations preventing the performance of employment;

(xlix) mental retardation;

(l) functional psychotic disorder which cause severe functional limitations precluding competitive employment and requiring ongoing psychiatric or psychological treatment;

(li) other severe and persistent mental illness (not controllable by medications or other treatment) which causes severe functional limitations precluding competitive employment and requires ongoing psychiatric or psychological treatment;

(lii) seizure disorder not controllable by medications with: major motor seizures occurring on an average of one each two months despite at least three months of treatment; or minor motor seizures occurring on an average of one each week despite at least three months of prescribed treatment;

(liii) cerebral palsy with: mental retardation; or severe emotional lability or abnormal behavior; or severely limited ability to communicate; or severe limitations in motor functioning;

(liv) other chronic neurological disease (not controllable by treatment) or persistent manifestations of CNS insult resulting in: severely limited ability to stand, walk or use the hands; or persistent severe difficulty swallowing or breathing; or severe expressive or receptive aphasia resulting in severely decreased ability to communicate; or frequent acute exacerbations of the disease resulting in severe functional limitations;

(lv) histologically malignant brain tumors proven by pathology report; or other brain tumors causing severe functional limitations despite treatment;

(lvi) lymphoma not controlled despite treatment or metastatic disease of a lymph node from undeterminable primary;

(lvii) hormone-dependent or isotope-sensitive malignancies or sarcoma of soft parts not currently controlled despite treatment;

(lviii) non-hormone-dependent or non-isotope-sensitive solid malignancies with evidence of active disease and which are: inoperable/unresectable/incomplete excision; or recurrent after radical surgery; or metastatic beyond the regional lymph nodes; or not controlled despite treatment; or generally considered uncontrollable by established medical or surgical procedures;

(continued)

(lvix) permanent residuals of neoplastic disease resulting in severe functional impairment; or

(lx) other medically determinable impairment or impairments that: prevents the performance of gainful employment; is expected to last 12 months or longer or result in death in less than 12 months; and is not controllable within the 12-month period by medication, surgery, or other treatment;

(C) a person whose presence is required at home because of a verified, medically-determined condition of another member of the home whose condition does not permit self-care and who meets the criteria of subparagraph (2) (B) above, and when the care is not available from another person in the home;

(D) a woman who is pregnant and not eligible for APW. The father of the unborn child shall also be included in the same assistance plan if they are living together. Neither the pregnant woman nor the father shall be voluntarily unavailable for employment;

(E) a parent or parents of a child who has been removed from the home and placed in foster care, if there is an agency-approved plan to return the child to the home; or

(F) a child in a family group who is not otherwise eligible for assistance as a result of an established period of ineligibility resulting from the provisions of K.A.R. 30-4-58(d), 30-4-63(e), 30-4-64(d), or 30-4-110(c)(8) if there is an approved social service plan substantiating that the child is facing imminent removal from the home and placement into a foster care arrangement if assistance is not reinstated. Assistance shall be provided in accordance with the social service plan, which shall not exceed the budget deficit for the family group.

(3) The needs of the applicant or recipient and all persons for whom the applicant or recipient is legally responsible shall be included in the same assistance plan, if living together, except for persons who are not otherwise eligible. The needs of certain persons in the family group who are not otherwise eligible shall be excluded in determining eligibility for GAU. However, the resources of those persons in the family group shall, unless the resources are specifically exempt, be included in determining eligibility for GAU. Such persons include:

- (A) SSI recipients;
- (B) persons who are ineligible due to the receipt of lump sum income;
- (C) persons who are ineligible due to a sanction;
- (D) minor parents whose needs are met through foster care payments; and
- (E) aliens who are ineligible because of the citizenship and alienage requirements or sponsorship provisions.

(b) A presumptive eligibility determination shall be made for persons who are being released from a medicare-approved psychiatric hospital or from the Larned correctional mental health facility in accordance with an approved discharge plan. Minimally, the presumptive determination shall be based on available information concerning the person's income and resources. The general eligibility requirements of K.A.R. 30-4-50

may be waived until a formal eligibility determination is completed. Assistance provided shall equal 100 percent of the applicable GAU budgetary standards and the provision of subsection (a)(1) of K.A.R. 30-4-140 shall be waived. Assistance under this provision shall not exceed the month of discharge and the two following months. Assistance under this provision may be extended by the department beyond the three-month limitation for good cause.

(c) Each applicant or recipient who refuses to authorize the department to file for and claim reimbursement from the social security administration for the amount of GAU provided the individual pending a determination of eligibility for the supplemental security income program shall be ineligible for GAU. Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct**Advisory Opinion No. 93-1**

Written February 11, 1993, to all interested persons:

Due to publicity involving certain campaign contributions by national office holders to state candidates, the commission takes this opportunity pursuant to K.S.A. 25-4159 to point out the operative language of K.S.A. 25-4157a(b), a provision of the Kansas Campaign Finance Act.

K.S.A. 25-4157a(b) states:

No candidate or candidate committee shall accept from any other candidate or candidate committee for any candidate for local, state or national office, any moneys received by such candidate or candidate committee as a campaign contribution. The provisions of this subsection shall not be construed to prohibit a candidate or candidate committee from accepting moneys from another candidate or candidate committee if such moneys constitute a reimbursement for one candidate's proportional share of the cost of any campaign activity participated in by both candidates involved. Such reimbursement shall not exceed an amount equal to the proportional share of the cost directly benefiting and attributable to the personal campaign of the candidate making such reimbursement.

Only one conclusion is available. A state candidate may not accept a contribution from the campaign committee of a national candidate, or campaign funds from any other candidate for state or local office.

Advisory Opinion No. 93-2

Written February 11, 1993, to Anne Wigglesworth, M.D., Manhattan.

This opinion is in response to your letter of December 30, 1992, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest law (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*).

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a newly appointed member of the Board of Healing Arts. You have filed your statement of substantial interests but have questions concerning the requirements involving five situations. They are:

- 1) You participate as a lecturer in the Wyeth-Ayerst Visiting Professors Program. This entails lectures to groups of physicians and nurses on women's health issues. In 1992 you earned \$700 from this activity.
- 2) You occasionally receive other speaking fees at such activities as the State Family Planning Conference.
- 3) You do some freelance writing; for example, the KC Star paid you \$150 for an article and photograph describing medical practice in Czechoslovakia.

4) You serve as consultant with the Pottawatomie County Health Department for its family planning and cancer screening clinic. You earn approximately \$480 per year.

5) Currently, you are in the process of applying for the PROJECT HOPE as an on-site consultant for programs in Central Europe.

Question Presented

Are any of the above activities prohibited by K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* due to your service on the Board of Healing Arts?

Opinion

Concerning questions three and five, we find nothing in the Act which applies at all and those activities certainly are permitted.

Question four raises a question about the application of K.S.A. 46-233 and K.S.A. 46-286. These sections generally prohibit a state officer from participating in governmental decisions involving private entities by which they are employed or in which they hold a substantial interest. The level of involvement here meets neither of these tests, so the prohibitions do not apply to the issue presented by question four; however, we do urge caution before participating in governmental decisions which might affect one of your interests.

Questions one and two raise basically the same question involving the receipt of speaking fees by state officers or employees. K.S.A. 46-237(f) is in point. That section states:

No state officer or employee shall accept any payment of honoraria for any speaking engagement except that a member of the state legislature or a part-time officer or employee of the executive branch of government shall be allowed to receive reimbursement in the preparation for and the making of a presentation at a speaking engagement in an amount fixed by the Kansas commission on governmental standards and conduct prior to the acceptance of the speaking engagement. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the reimbursement of state officers and employees for reasonable expenses incurred in attending seminars, conferences and other speaking engagements.

We have enclosed a copy of Opinion No. 91-39 which discusses the definition of honorarium. Applying that test to the situation you have described in question one, we are satisfied the fee is not prohibited by K.S.A. 46-237(f). Other situations will have to be judged on their own merits.

Advisory Opinion No. 93-3

Written February 11, 1993, to David C. Cunningham, Director of Property Valuation, Department of Revenue, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of January 12, 1993, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest law (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*).

(continued)

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as the Director of Property Valuation for the Department of Revenue. You advise us that the Division of Property Valuation employs approximately 60 property appraisers. These appraisers monitor the work of the county appraisers and their staff in respect to the valuation and appraisal of all real and personal property. As part of their duties, they audit and review the work of county staff.

It has come to your attention that some of these individuals are appraising residential and commercial properties outside of regular working hours. Although some appraisals are for the the purpose of home finance and present no conflict, the potential exists that PVD appraisers will be employed by a taxpayer to appraise their property for ad valorem purposes.

In this scenario, a taxpayer may employ a PVD appraiser to establish a value for taxation purposes which is contrary to the one established by the county appraiser. If the property value is appealed, PVD employees may then be placed in the position of both defending the value they established and reviewing the values the county appraiser established. PVD must also approve any adjustments in value made at the hearing officer/panel level of appeal.

Question Presented

Is it permissible under K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* for a property appraiser to appraise properties outside of working hours, which appraisals may be subject to your agency's review or even the review of the appraiser himself or herself?

Opinion

We have reviewed K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* in its entirety and find no provision which applies to this situation. We would suggest two possible courses of conduct to remedy this unfortunate situation. First, since the legislature is in session, you could make a legislative proposal. Second, you should contact the Attorney General's office to see whether your agency can establish its own employment guidelines prohibiting this type of conduct.

Advisory Opinion No. 93-4

Written February 11, 1993, to Nancy L. Moore, City Attorney, Coffeyville.

This opinion is in response to your letter of December 23, 1992, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the local level conflict of interest law (K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*).

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as Coffeyville City Attorney. You advise us that the Montgomery County Fair Association is a private non-profit corporation organized in 1909 under the laws of the state of Kansas. Its principal responsibility is putting on the Interstate Fair and Rodeo, which takes place annually at the city of Coffeyville's Walter Johnson Park.

In the last year, problems have arisen over the use of the park and certain rodeo facilities and equipment purchased and placed in the park by the Fair Association. Prior to this, the Fair Association and city operated on an informal basis, with all requests to use the rodeo facilities channeled through the Fair Association. Last fall, a problem arose when the Fair Association denied the use of the rodeo facilities and the applicant appealed to the city commission. The commission allowed the group to use the rodeo facilities over the objection of the Fair Association. As a way to prevent future problems, the city commission proposes to create a Fairgrounds Commission to oversee the operation of the park and rodeo facilities throughout the year. All members of the Fairgrounds Commission would be appointed by the city commission, with two recommended by the Fair Association and one recommended by the other four members.

Questions Presented

- 1) Would it be a violation of K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.* for the two or possibly three members of the Fairground Commission who are also members of the Montgomery County Fairground Association to vote on issues concerning the Montgomery County Fairground Association?
- 2) Must appointed members of the Fairground Commission file substantial interest disclosure statements pursuant to K.S.A. 75-4302a(e)?

Opinion

K.S.A. 75-4304 prohibits the participation of local governmental officers in certain votes affecting businesses by which they are employed or in which they hold a "substantial interest." Assuming the members of the Montgomery County Fair Association are not employed by it, but rather serve on its board of directors or in some other official position and do not receive compensation for this service, the only issue is whether that service constitutes the holding of a "substantial interest."

K.S.A. 75-4301a(a) (4) states:

If an individual or an individual's spouse holds the position of officer, director, associate, partner or proprietor of any business, other than an organization exempt from federal taxation corporations under section 501 (c) (3), (4), (6), (7), (8), (10) or (19) of chapter 26 of the United States code, the individual has a substantial interest in that business, irrespective of the amount of compensation received by the individual's spouse.

Applying this exception, it is our opinion, assuming the Montgomery County Fair Association is exempt from federal taxation by one of the listed provisions, that the members of that association do not hold a "substantial interest" in it. Thus, the prohibitions of K.S.A. 75-4304 do not apply and the members of the Fairground Commission who also are members of the Montgomery County Fair Association could vote on issues affecting the association.

Turning to your second question, K.S.A. 75-4302(a) (e) in our view does not set out a special disclosure requirement for individuals holding the type of interest

we have just discussed. Rather, this section requires those persons otherwise required to file under K.S.A. 75-4302a(b) to disclose these types of interests. Thus, since those serving on the Fairground Commission are not required to file disclosure statements under K.S.A. 75-4302a(b), they need not do so because of the language of K.S.A. 75-4302a(e).

Advisory Opinion No. 93-5

Written February 11, 1993, Allison Peterson, Chairman, Kansas SAFE KIDS Coalition, Director of Communications, Kansas Medical Society, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of January 26, 1993, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest law (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*).

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as Chairperson of the Board of Kansas State Kids Coalition.

From information you provided contained in the "National SAFE KIDS Coalition (TM) Agreement," we discern the following structure: The National SAFE KIDS Campaign (TM) (Campaign), acting through CNMC Child Ventures (Children's), a subsidiary of Children's National Medical Center in Washington, D.C., has contracted with the Kansas State Safe Kids Coalition, as represented by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE), which is designated as the "Lead Organization" of the coalition.

According to the agreement, the purpose of the campaign, acting through its state and local coalitions, is to "seek to reduce unintentional injuries to children by concerted community action, including promoting public awareness of unintentional childhood injury prevention strategies and facilitating public appreciation for the safety measures necessary to protect children." We further understand from information you provided that a state SAFE KIDS coalition is a structured group of diverse local individuals and organizations which join forces to carry out a program to reduce unintentional childhood injury in their communities.

Pursuant to the contractual relationship, Children's provides media, public policy, program leadership and a support structure. KDHE, as the designated lead organization for the Kansas coalition, is committed to a number of responsibilities, including the development of the Kansas coalition structure and procedure, outreach activities, information gathering, oversight of fund raising, provision of a staff person, and preparation of an annual report. It is our understanding that KDHE fulfills these responsibilities on behalf of and for the Kansas SAFE KIDS Coalition.

Some of the organizational members of the Kansas SAFE KIDS Coalition are businesses which are regulated by KDHE. These businesses may donate money to the SAFE KIDS Coalition which would be held by KDHE for the sole use of and at the discretion of the coalition.

Question Presented

Does the receipt by KDHE of contributions for the benefit of the coalition from entities licensed, regulated or inspected by KDHE violate K.S.A. 46-237(c)?

Opinion

K.S.A. 46-237(c) states: "No person licensed, inspected or regulated by a state agency shall offer, pay, give or make any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year to such agency or any state officer or employee of that agency."

As we view this section, the language requires the receipt by the state agency of something of value which inures to the benefit of or is for the use of the agency. Here the agency serves merely as a conduit and draws no agency benefit from the transactions. Thus, in our opinion, the situation you have described does not violate K.S.A. 46-237(c).

Notice of Available Federal Funding
for Adult Education

Pursuant to assurances as set out in the amended Kansas State Plan for Adult Education, notification of available federal funding for four programs is announced. These funds are authorized by Sections 322 and 353 of the Adult Education Act (P.L. 100-297).

Section 322 of the Adult Education Act provides federal financial assistance to states to assist and expand existing programs and to develop new programs for adults whose lack of basic skills:

- (a) renders them unemployable;
- (b) keeps them, whether employed or unemployed, from functioning independently in society, and
- (c) severely reduces their ability to have a positive effect on the literacy of their children.

Two grant programs are available under Section 322. The Basic Program Grant provides eligible entities direct and equitable access to federal funds provided under Section 322. The eligible entities are local education agencies, public or private nonprofit agencies, community-based organizations, correctional education agencies, postsecondary educational institutions, and institutions which serve educationally disadvantaged adults. Applications will be accepted until May 10 for grants under this section.

The Gateway Grant program is available only to public housing authorities. These are competitive two-year grants for literacy programs and related activities. Any public housing authority that receives a grant shall consult with local adult education providers in conducting programs and activities with assistance provided under the grant. Applications will be accepted until May 10 for grants under this program.

Two grant programs are also available under Section 353. Staff Development Grant applications are a necessary companion to the applications for a Section 322 Basic Grant Program. No Section 322 Basic Grant Program will be approved without an approved Section 353 Staff Development Grant application. Staff Development Grants must address the following priorities established by the Adult Education Act:

- (a) Training for full-time professional adult educators;
- (b) Training for minority educators;
- (c) Training for educators of adults with limited English proficiency; and
- (d) Training teachers to recognize and more effectively serve illiterate individuals with learning disabilities and individuals who have a reading ability below the fifth grade level.

Applications will be accepted until May 10 for grants under this program.

In addition, mini-grants of up to \$500 are available under Section 353 for research and special demonstration projects. Proposals for these projects should address the federal and state staff developmental

priorities. Applications will be accepted until December 30 for grants under this program.

HOUSE BILL No. 2076

AN ACT relating to insurance; concerning mutual insurance companies other than life; merger and consolidation; amending K.S.A. 40-1219 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 40-1219 is hereby amended to read as follows: 40-1219. (a) *Except as otherwise provided herein*, the agreement of merger or consolidation shall be submitted to a vote of the policyholders of each company at an annual, periodic or special meeting of policyholders of each such company. The right of a policyholder to vote shall be governed by the laws of the domiciliary state and the bylaws of the company. Written or printed notice shall be given not less than ~~twenty (20)~~ 20 days before each such meeting, either personally or by mail, to each policyholder entitled to vote. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail, with postage prepaid, addressed to the policyholder, at ~~his~~ *such policyholder's* address as it appears on the records of the company. Such notice, whether the meeting is annual, periodic or special, shall state the place, day, hour and purpose of the meeting, and a copy or a summary of the agreement of merger or consolidation, as the case may be, shall be included in or enclosed with such notice: *Provided, That*.

(b) In the case of consolidation the proposed articles of incorporation of the new company must be set out in full in or enclosed with ~~said~~ *such* notice and in the case of merger, any amendments to the articles of incorporation of the continuing company as may be desired or necessary to provide for the purposes of the merger or to comply with law, must be set out separately and in full in or enclosed with ~~said~~ *such* notice clearly showing the nature of such amendments. The policyholders may vote in person or by proxy. Two-thirds (~~2/3~~) of the votes cast by the policyholders of each such company, as are represented at the meeting in person or by proxy, must be in favor of the agreement in order to ~~approve~~ any such agreement. Should the agreement fail to receive the required number of votes it shall be null and void.

(c) *The provisions of subsections (a) and (b) shall not apply to the surviving company of any merger or consolidation to which this act applies whose surplus as regards policyholders is greater than 25 times the surplus as regards policyholders of the nonsurviving company or companies. For purposes of this section, the surplus as regards policyholders of the respective companies shall be those reflected by the most recent statement of financial condition filed with and accepted by the commissioner pursuant to K.S.A. 40-225 and amendments thereto.*

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 40-1219 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

HOUSE BILL No. 2019

AN ACT concerning standing committees of the house of representatives; providing name changes; amending K.S.A. 74-49,121 and K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 46-1901 and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 46-1901 is hereby amended to read as follows: 46-1901. (a) There is hereby established a joint committee on health care decisions for the 1990's which shall consist of six senators and six members of the house of representatives. The senate members shall be the chairperson of the senate committee on public health and welfare or a member of such committee designated by the chairperson and the ranking minority member of the senate committee on public health and welfare or a member of such committee designated by the ranking minority member, the chairperson of the senate committee on ways and means or a member of such committee designated by the ranking minority member, the chairperson of the senate committee on financial institutions and insurance or a member of such committee designated by the chairperson and the ranking minority member of the senate committee on ways and means or a member of such committee designated by the ranking minority member, the chairperson of the senate committee on financial institutions and insurance or a member of such committee designated by the chairperson and the ranking minority member of the senate committee on financial institutions and insurance or a member of such committee designated by the ranking minority member. The house of representative members shall be the chairperson of the house committee on appropriations or a member of such committee designated by the chairperson and the ranking minority member of the house committee on appropriations or a member of such committee designated by the ranking minority member, the chairperson of the house committee on public health and welfare or a member of such committee designated by the chairperson and the ranking minority member of the house committee on public health and welfare or a member of such committee designated by the ranking minority member, the chairperson of the house committee on *financial institutions and insurance* or a member of such committee designated by the chairperson and the ranking minority member of the house committee on *financial institutions and insurance* or a member of such committee designated by the ranking minority member. The committee on organization, calendar and rules shall designate a senator member to be chairperson or vice-chairperson of the joint committee as provided in this section. The speaker of the house of representatives shall designate a representative member to be chairperson or vice-chairperson of the joint committee as provided in this section.

(b) A quorum of the joint committee shall be seven. All actions of the committee may be taken by a majority of those present when there is a quorum. From and after the effective date of this act and until December 31, 1990, and in the year 1991 and in each odd-numbered year thereafter the chairperson of the joint committee shall be the designated member of the senate from the convening of the regular session in that year until the convening of the regular session in the next ensuing year. In the year 1992 and in even-numbered years thereafter the chairperson of the joint committee shall be the designated member of the house of representatives from the convening of the regular session of that year until the convening of the regular session of the next ensuing year. The vice-chairperson shall exercise all of the powers of the chairperson in the absence of the chairperson.

(c) The joint committee shall study, investigate and analyze the following matters:

- (1) Policy priorities appropriate for health care in Kansas;
- (2) problems of access to health care services;
- (3) rural health care issues;
- (4) coordination of the delivery of health care services;
- (5) financing of health care by the private and public sectors;
- (6) initiatives in health care policy, delivery and financing developed by the private or public sectors in other states and by the federal government; and
- (7) other matters relating to health care in Kansas as directed by the joint committee.

(d) The joint committee shall report to the legislature on or before December 31 each year any findings and recommendations which the joint committee deems appropriate.

(e) The joint committee shall meet on call of the chairperson as

authorized by the legislative coordinating council. All such meetings shall be held in Topeka, unless authorized to be held in a different place by the legislative coordinating council. Members of the joint committee shall receive compensation and travel expenses and subsistence expenses or allowances as provided in K.S.A. 75-3212, and amendments thereto, when attending meetings of such committee authorized by the legislative coordinating council.

(f) Amounts paid under authority of this section shall be paid from appropriations for legislative expense and vouchers therefor shall be prepared by the director of legislative administrative services and approved by the chairperson or vice-chairperson of the legislative coordinating council.

(g) The joint committee on health care decisions for the 1990's may introduce such legislation as it deems necessary in performing its functions.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 74-49,121 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-49,121. To accomplish the purposes set forth in K.S.A. 74-49,118 and amendments thereto, the Kansas public employee retirement study commission shall conduct a continuing study and analysis of the various public employee retirement systems established by law, the benefits and costs thereof, and their relation to other pension and benefit systems affecting public employees. At least once each

year, the commission shall solicit input from public employers and employees as to needed improvements to the system. When requested by the legislative coordinating council, the commission may study specific matters referred to the commission and report to such council the results of the study. At the joint request of the chairperson of the senate committee on ways and means and the chairperson of the house committee on pensions, investments and benefits appropriations, the chairperson of the commission may call a special meeting during the legislative session to consider and promptly report on special matters referred to the commission. The commission shall not intervene in the management and administration of the Kansas public employees retirement system, including the investment of funds, vested by law in the board of trustees of such system. The commission shall submit an annual report of its findings and recommendations to the governor and the legislature during the first week of each legislative session and may periodically submit other reports.

Sec. 3. K.S.A. 74-49,121 and K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 46-1901 are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.
