Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 8:30 a.m. Friday, December 3, in the P.D.R. West and East Rooms of the Shawnee Country Club, 913 S.W. 29th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent rules and regulations of the Board of Technical Professions.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Board of Technical Professions, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Suite 507, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

The following is a brief summary of the substance of the proposed regulations:

Article 6.—PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

K.A.R. 66-6-6, 66-6-8, and 66-6-9. This regulation modifies the dates in the regulation from the date of notification of the license renewal to be mailed by the board to the date of the expiration of the license for each profession. There are also changes in the technical language of the regulations to make the regulations consistent with the statutory language.

Article 8.—EXAMINATIONS

K.A.R. 66-8-2, 66-8-3, 66-8-4, and 66-8-5. These regulations are being modified to exclude language that requires a "written" examination by the board. Future exam development will result in some exams being administered by the board in a computer-based format.

Article 9.—EDUCATION

K.A.R. 66-9-1, 66-9-2, 66-9-4, and 66-9-5. These regulations clarify whether baccalaureate or master's degrees are acceptable to fulfill the educational requirements of each profession.

Article 10.—EXPERIENCE

K.A.R. 66-10-1. This regulation sets out the experience requirement for architectural applicants and revises the publication date of the adoption by reference to the 1993-1994 edition of the "IDP Guidelines."

K.A.R. 66-10-3. This regulation allows an architect reciprocity applicant to satisfy the application requirements with a file that has been compiled and evaluated by NCARB if the applicant was licensed prior to January 1, 1993. If the applicant was licensed after January 1, 1993, then the NCARB certification is required of an architect reciprocity applicant.

K.A.R. 66-10-4. This regulation clarifies that the direct supervision of a licensed professional is required for landscape architectural work beginning February 22, 1993. This regulation also allows 50 percent credit for work experience obtained after a landscape architectural applicant has achieved junior status in an accredited landscape architecture curriculum not to exceed one year.

K.A.R. 66-10-9. This regulation clarifies that engineering applicants must have their experience work verified by their supervisor. This regulation also excludes work experience credit prior to graduation except that which is allowed in the provisions of a "co-op" program.

Article 11.—INTERN ENGINEER CERTIFICATION

K.A.R. 66-11-1. This regulation clarifies that an intern engineer or an engineer-in-training certificate will only be granted after satisfactory proof of graduation has been provided to the board.

K.A.R. 66-11-2. This regulation changes the requirements for admission to take the fundamentals of engineering examination from a student in their last semester of an ABET engineering curriculum to a student who has achieved "junior status" in an ABET engineering curriculum.

Article 12.—MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR
THE PRACTICE OF LAND SURVEYING

K.A.R. 66-12-1. This regulation modifies the publication dates of the documents adopted by reference to the current publication dates.

Other various grammatical changes or changes appropriate to format are also being made.

There is no fiscal impact as a result of the adoption of these regulations.

A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Friday, December 10, in the Kansas City Council Chambers, lobby level of the Municipal Office Building, 701 N. 7th, Kansas City, Kansas, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations of the State Board of Indigents' Defense Services.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Board of Indigents' Defense Services, Room 304-N, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612. Written comments must be submitted to the board no later than Wednesday, December 8, in order to be considered at the public hearing. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. Pursuant to the requirements of K.S.A. 77-416(b), the State Board of Indigents' Defense Services submits the following description of the economic impact of the above-referenced regulations:

K.A.R. 105-2-1. The regulation amends the definition of "panel" to include those attorneys who are assigned under the regional public defender plan to represent indigent clients. The regulation also adds language relating to the voluntariness of the appointment and assignment panel. The regulation adds the definition of "regional public defender" in lieu of "public defender." This definitional change coincides with other regulations, which spell out the duties of the regional public defender, and is part of the change to the regional defense delivery system. Other defi-

nitional changes in the regulation are "assigned" vs. "appointed counsel," "region" and "conflicts office."

K.A.R. 105-3-11. The amended regulation requires the court to appoint a panel attorney in conflict cases if the agency does not have a conflicts office for that particular jurisdiction.

K.A.R. 105-5-2. The amended regulation adds language allowing the board to set the rate of compensation to assigned counsel through contractual negotiation. The regulation continues the current rate of compensation for appointed counsel.

K.A.R. 105-10-1a. K.A.R. 105-10-1 is repealed, and this new regulation defines the state's six regions by judicial district. The regulation requires the court to appoint the regional defender unless a conflict of interest exists or the case is one being appealed. The procedure for appointment of counsel for conflict cases and appellate cases is set forth in the regulation.

K.A.R. 105-10-3. This new regulation sets forth the schedule for implementation of the regional plan. The regulation identifies the officials and agencies that must be notified prior to the changeover to the regional delivery system.

K.A.R. 105-10-4. This new regulation sets forth the procedure for notifying the courts of the creation of a conflicts attorney office, the contents of the notice and the effective date of the change specified in the notice for that particular district.

K.A.R. 105-10-5. This new regulation allows the regional defenders, the state appellate defender and/or the conflicts attorney to contract for attorney services upon written authorization by the director.

The proposed set of regulations summarized above are not mandated by federal law as a requirement for participating in or implementing a federally subsidized or assisted program.

The cost related to the regional defense plan will be borne by the agency as start-up costs of new offices and the hiring of new personnel during the first two years of implementation. The third and subsequent years following implementation will result in a savings to the agency and, therefore, to the state general fund. This reduced level of spending will conceivably affect private attorneys who are now receiving compensation from the agency.

As an alternative to the current system, the agency also held two public hearings to consider the issue of proration of attorney fees. The issue of proration is viewed as a short-term savings but one that is extremely costly in the mid to long term. Litigation costs would quickly expend any savings generated from a proration plan. The board rejected proration due to the potential costs to the state and its apparent unconstitutionality. Implementation of the regional plan with the set of rules summarized above is seen as the only viable method of increasing efficiency and accountability.

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Monday, November 29, in the fourth floor conference room of the Mills Building, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes to existing rules and regulations on a permanent basis.

Nurse Aides, Medication Aides, and
Home Health Aides

K.A.R. 28-39-164 through K.A.R. 28-39-174 are proposed new regulations pertaining to the training and certification of nurse aides, medication aides, and home health aides. These regulations are repealing K.A.R. 28-39-79 through K.A.R. 28-39-81b. The proposed new regulations establish training standards for nurse aides, medication aides, medication aide updates, and home health aides and corresponding course instructor and sponsor qualifications and responsibilities; out-of-state and allied health training endorsement standards and examination process to become certified as a nurse aide; allied health training endorsement standards and examination process to become certified as a home health aide; and state examination process for nurse aide, medication aide, and home health aide trainees.

The economic impact of these regulations includes an administrative cost to the department of \$76,000 per year and \$94,000 per year to the federal Medicaid/Medicare program; a \$10 fee per applicant who enrolls for a state examination or applies to receive medication aide update certificate; and the cost of conducting a 90-hour or 20-hour course or paying for taking the 90-hour or 20-hour course. No other costs are foreseen for the department, other governmental agencies or units, private citizens, or consumers.

Home Health Agency Licensure

K.A.R. 28-51-100 through K.A.R. 28-51-112 are being amended to reflect recent changes in federal regulations and state statutes. A summary of the proposed amendments follows:

K.A.R. 28-51-100 amends definitions currently in use in federal regulations or defined in state statutes. New definitions of home health aide and home health aide trainee are included.

K.A.R. 28-51-101 clarifies the licensure application process in accordance with K.S.A. 65-5104.

K.A.R. 28-51-102. License fee. This regulation is amended to delete outdated reference to the original effective date of the regulation. The amendment clarifies the submittal of an annual report.

K.A.R. 28-51-103. Organization and administration. An additional responsibility is placed upon home health agency administrators to ensure that home health agency patients receive a written copy of the

governing body's established patient's bill of rights. Statutory reference to the abuse, neglect, or exploitation law is also updated.

K.A.R. 28-51-104. Home health services. Minor changes are made in terminology to lend consistency between licensure and federal certification regulations. The term "plan of treatment" is changed to "plan of care" which is also consistent with the "plan of care" definition found in K.A.R. 28-51-100. The requirement for a summary report to be sent to the attending physician every 60 days is changed to 62 days for consistency with Medicare regulatory changes.

K.A.R. 28-51-108. Home health aide services. This regulation is amended to reflect the newly developed *Kansas 90-hour Home Health Aide Curriculum* and the home health aide training requirements established under new K.A.R. 28-39-171.

K.A.R. 28-51-110. Clinical records. As with the previous regulations concerning home health services, minor amendments are included to lend consistency between federal and state regulations. The term "clinical notes" is added to reduce confusion related to the term "progress notes," which has specific definition for both licensure and federal certification.

K.A.R. 28-51-111. Patient's bill of rights. The minimum provisions for a patient's bill of rights are expanded to reflect consistency with Medicare regulations. Rights related to the patient's plan of care, sources of payment, and treatment of his/her property are expanded. The licensing agency's toll-free complaint telephone number is also to be given to all patients.

K.A.R. 28-51-112. Home health aide training program. Extensive alteration of this regulation has been completed to enhance compliance with Medicare certification regulations and newly developed K.A.R. 28-39-171 through 28-39-174.

There is no significant economic impact as a result of the proposed amendments to these regulations.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Executive Order No. 93-157

Advancing an Accommodation and Return to Work Policy for State Employees Injured in the Course of Their Employment

WHEREAS, the Americans with Disabilities Act, as amended by the Civil Rights Act of 1991, and the Kansas Act Against Discrimination, as amended by L. 1991, Chapter 147, require that reasonable accommodations be made to the known physical or mental limitations of an otherwise qualified individual who is an employee;

WHEREAS, a primary purpose of the Kansas Workers' Compensation Act, as amended by L. 1993, S.B. 307, is to restore injured employees to work at a comparable wage;

WHEREAS, the Kansas Civil Service Act, codified at Kansas Statutes Annotated, Chapter 75, Article 29, prohibits discrimination in state personnel policies based on physical requirements, except where such requirements constitute a bona fide occupational qualification;

WHEREAS, the state must maintain its well trained, experienced, well educated and highly motivated work force if it is to remain competitive in the national and international market;

WHEREAS, the loss of individuals injured in the course of their employment deprives the state of a critically needed source of labor in a period where demographic and other changes are creating shortages of qualified applicants for many jobs;

WHEREAS, the mainstreaming of employees permanently affected by injuries in the course of their employment will result in more persons with disabilities working, in increased earnings, in less dependence on various social systems for financial support, in increased spending on consumer goods and in increased tax revenues;

WHEREAS, state employees should be judged by their abilities and not on the basis of their disabilities;

WHEREAS, a primary purpose of this executive order is to assure equality of opportunity and economic self sufficiency for injured or disabled employees of the state;

NOW THEREFORE, under the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, the agencies under my jurisdiction are hereby ordered as follows:

- I. The Director, Division of Personnel Services, Department of Administration, shall establish and maintain a Return to Work policy and procedure for state employees who suffer occupational injuries. Such policy and procedure shall be applicable to all state agencies and employees subject to the Americans with Disabilities Act, the Kansas Act Against Discrimination or the Kansas Workers' Compensation Act.
- II. Each state agency shall have as a goal that it shall return an injured employee to the same job with or without reasonable accommodation whenever possible. Agencies unable to return an injured employee to the same job shall have as a goal that it shall return the injured employee to other state service at a level of pay within 90% of that earned by the employee immediately prior to sustaining the work-related injury.
- III. All state agencies shall diligently carry out the directives as set forth in the Return to Work policy.

This document rescinds and supersedes Executive Order No. 90-125. It shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 93-157, and shall become effective immediately.

**Executive Order No. 93-160
Establishing and Providing for
Membership of the Cabinet**

WHEREAS, the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests supreme executive power in the Governor; and

WHEREAS, the Constitution of the State of Kansas authorizes the Governor to require information be provided the Governor from officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to their respective duties; and

WHEREAS, the State of Kansas has adopted a cabinet form of executive organization for major functions of state government; and

WHEREAS, it is right and proper that the Governor establish the Cabinet and provide for its membership.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor and chief executive of the State of Kansas, I hereby establish the Cabinet. The Cabinet shall be composed of the following secretaries or their duly authorized representatives (in case of absence from time to time):

1. The Secretary of Administration
2. The Secretary of Aging
3. The Secretary of Agriculture
4. The Secretary of Commerce and Housing
5. The Secretary of Corrections
6. The Secretary of Health and Environment
7. The Secretary of Human Resources
8. The Secretary of Revenue
9. The Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services
10. The Secretary of Transportation
11. The Secretary of Wildlife and Parks

The Governor shall chair the cabinet. The Secretary of Administration shall serve as vice-chair and preside in the absence of the Governor.

The Cabinet shall meet on call of the Governor at such time and place as may be established by the Governor. Each member of the Cabinet shall serve without additional compensation.

The Governor shall appoint a Secretary of the Cabinet, who shall prepare minutes, organize the agenda and coordinate the meetings of the Cabinet, at the direction of the Governor.

Other State officers of the Executive Branch of Government, or their duly authorized representatives, shall by request of the Chair, attend meetings of the Cabinet, and shall advise and assist the Cabinet in their discussions, deliberations and assignments, as may be determined by the Governor.

Expenses of the Cabinet members, if any, shall be paid by the agency of which the member of the Cabinet is the head; or in the case of a duly authorized representative, of which he or she is employed.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 93-160, shall be effective immediately and shall replace Executive Order No. 87-94, which is hereby rescinded.

Establishing the Governor's Flood Relief
Advisory Commission**

WHEREAS, many businesses and citizens of the State of Kansas experienced great loss and devastation as the result of extensive flooding during much of the summer of 1993;

WHEREAS, in response to these losses, generous gifts have been made to the State of Kansas to assist in flood recovery efforts;

WHEREAS, it is essential to ensure that these gifts are used wisely and prudently to the benefit and good of the people of Kansas and that decisions regarding their use are made with the advice of a representative cross-section of the State's citizens and communities;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor and Chief Executive of the State of Kansas, I hereby establish the Governor's Flood Relief Advisory Commission for the purpose of providing advice and counsel regarding the disposition of flood recovery gifts to the State of Kansas. In evaluating potential uses for these gifts, the Commission shall consider the welfare and interests of all Kansas flood victims and communities affected by 1993 summer floods.

Membership on the Commission shall be by official commission of appointment of the Governor, certified by and filed with the Secretary of State. The Governor shall appoint a Chairperson of the Commission. The Commission shall meet upon call of its Chairperson as necessary to carry out its duties under this Executive Order.

Members of the Commission shall serve without compensation and without subsistence allowances, mileage or expenses.

This order shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 93-158 and shall become effective immediately.

Executive Order No. 93-159
Concerning State Affirmative Action

WHEREAS, the State of Kansas is dedicated to the belief in the freedom and equality of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, various state and federal orders, laws, rules, regulations and guidelines prohibit discrimination because of race, color, sex, religion, national origin, age, disability, political affiliation or membership in the military; and

WHEREAS, it is the duty of state government to assure equal employment opportunity and promote utilization of protected persons through affirmative action; and

WHEREAS, the assurance of equal employment opportunity through affirmative action requires one state agency to implement and coordinate a comprehensive state affirmative action plan.

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor and Chief Executive of the State of Kansas, I hereby order and direct:

1. The Department of Administration, under the supervision and direction of the Secretary of Administration, to be the single coordinating agency responsible for securing equal employment opportunity within the state civil service system; and

2. The Secretary of Administration to prepare, promulgate, and update the State Affirmative Action Plan; and

3. The Board of Regents and the Secretary of Administration to recommend and coordinate state policy concerning the relationship between Board of Regents' institutions and the requirements of the State Affirmative Action Plan; and

4. Each state agency to establish an Agency Affirmative Action Plan within the parameters set by the Department of Administration; and

5. The Department of Administration, under the supervision and direction of the Secretary of Administration, to evaluate agency affirmative action plans at prescribed intervals; and

6. All state agencies to cooperate fully with the Secretary of Administration in the development and maintenance of the State Affirmative Action Plan, and to take all actions the Secretary of Administration finds legal, necessary and proper to execute their responsibilities.

Executive Order 80-47 is hereby superseded by this Order and force and effect of said Executive Order is hereby rescinded.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 93-159 and shall become effective immediately.

Executive Order No. 93-161
Rescinding Executive Order No. 93-155

WHEREAS, Section 2 of Article 15 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, as amended by the people in 1940, provides for the establishment of the civil service; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Civil Service Act was enacted in June of 1941 to answer "the natural demand for greater efficiency and economy in government and . . . to provide for a merit system under which its selection of state officers and employees can be made on a basis of merit and fitness"; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Civil Service Act divides the civil service into the classified and unclassified services; and

WHEREAS, rules and regulations of the Secretary of Administration have been adopted and "are intended to provide a uniform, comprehensive and effective system of personnel administration for the State of Kansas"; and

WHEREAS, it is the goal of personnel administration to offer "fair and equal opportunity . . . to all qualified individuals" and to have "positions essentially alike . . . treated in a uniform manner in all personal processes"; and

WHEREAS, on October 4, 1985, Executive Order No. 85-84 adopted and extended the application of certain rules and regulations of the Secretary of Administration to certain positions in the unclassified service under the Kansas Civil Service Act; and

WHEREAS, on February 10, 1993, Executive Order No. 93-155 modified the adoption and extension of the application of certain rules and regulations of the Secretary of Administration to certain positions in the unclassified service under the Kansas Civil Service Act.

WHEREAS, such application has necessitated reevaluation and reexamination of that previous Executive Order.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor and chief executive of the State of Kansas, I hereby rescind the force and effect of Executive Order 93-155.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 93-161 and shall become effective immediately.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

The State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, December 14, in the board room of the State Education Building, 120 S.E. 10th, Topeka, to consider proposed changes in regulations numbered K.A.R. 91-12-22, 91-12-23, 91-12-45, 91-12-46, and 91-12-71.

The following is a summary of the substance of each proposed regulation and a summary of its anticipated economic impact. All of the proposed substantive changes are based upon federal requirements.

K.A.R. 91-12-22. This regulation contains definitions of the terms used in Article 12. The proposed revision revises the current definition for assistive technology devices by clarifying that individually prescribed medical devices are not defined as an assistive technology device unless they are needed to provide a free appropriate public education. There will be no economic impact upon the State Department of Education. If it is determined that these medically prescribed devices, such as eyeglasses and hearing aids, are needed by each visually or hearing impaired student, there may be substantial impact upon other governmental agencies and upon private business or individuals. However, if they IEP team considers individually prescribed medical devices are not needed to provide a free appropriate public education, then it would have very little fiscal effect.

K.A.R. 91-12-23. This regulation concerns state approval of special education programs. The proposed revision is to clarify the waiver regulation that a federal law or regulation cannot be waived. There will be no economic impact upon the State Department of Education or upon other governmental agencies, private business or individuals.

K.A.R. 91-12-45. This regulation concerns comprehensive evaluation. The proposed revision clarifies and sets specific criteria for when a public agency may establish limitation on the costs of evaluation at public expense. There will be no economic impact upon the State Department of Education or upon other governmental agencies, private business or individuals.

K.A.R. 91-12-46. This regulation concerns special education action following evaluation. One proposed revision requires that any notice given to a parent regarding proposed special education action identify any factor which is relevant to the agency's proposed special education action concerning the child. In addition, this regulation is amended to make it clear that the child will remain in his or her present educational placement during the pendency of any administrative or judicial proceedings. There will be no economic impact upon the State Department of Education or upon other governmental agencies, private business or individuals.

K.A.R. 91-12-71. This regulation concerns qualifications and powers of educational advocates. The proposed revision adds to these qualifications. They

include having knowledge and skills to ensure adequate representation of the child and having no interest that conflicts with the interest of the child he or she represents. These qualifications are currently in practice in Kansas but are not in the regulations. There will be no economic impact upon the State Department of Education or upon other governmental agencies, private business or individuals.

A copy of each of the proposed regulations and complete economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting the secretary of the State Board of Education at the above address prior to the date of the hearing.

All interested persons will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views or arguments, either orally or in writing, in regard to the proposed regulations. In addition, the period of public notice hereby provided constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Such written comments may be submitted to the secretary of the State Board of Education at the address above. The hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures of the board.

RegulationsArticle 65.—MENTAL RETARDATION
DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY PROVIDER
REVOLVING FUND

30-65-1. Eligible providers, loans, interest, repayment. (a) Only providers of mental retardation or developmental disability (MR/DD) services otherwise recognized and approved pursuant to MR/DD programs administered by the department of SRS shall be eligible to participate in the MR/DD provider revolving fund program.

(b) Loans issued under this program shall not exceed the equivalent of the reimbursable sums which would be allowed for the particular services provided over a period of time not to exceed four months.

(c) Interest shall not be charged to the provider on any sums loaned.

(d) Each loan shall be repaid in accordance with the terms and conditions specified in that particular loan agreement, but in no case shall the term during which repayment is to be made exceed twice the length of time upon which the loan amount was calculated. If any provider becomes in arrears or in default on the provider's repayment, then those arrearages or unpaid sums may be offset and deducted by the department from any future reimbursement or grant awards due to the provider from the department. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1993, Chapter 292, Sec. 30(b); effective, T-30-10-21-93, Oct. 21, 1993.)

30-65-2. Loan application, approval. (a) Any eligible provider may make application for a loan under this program by submitting the designated loan application form to the department. Each application shall:

- (1) Specify the individually named client who would be served with the proceeds of the loan;
- (2) specify the amount of the loan sought and the services upon which it is based;
- (3) include a proposed repayment schedule;
- (4) be signed by an authorized official of the provider; and
- (5) be accompanied by any additional information that may be required upon the application form, or that may be necessary to adequately explain the nature of the loan.

(b) Each loan application received by the department shall be reviewed and approved or denied within 14 days of receipt.

(1) Any application considered to be incomplete shall be denied, but may be resubmitted by the provider along with the additional information the department specifies as necessary to make the application complete.

(2) All loan approvals shall be subject to available resources.

(3) Nothing herein shall be construed to prevent the department and provider from agreeing to some loan amount or term different from the amount or term sought in the loan application, so long as the final loan agreement is in compliance with the provisions of the regulations.

(c) A loan application shall not be approved for any provider whose cash reserves are more than the amount regularly necessary to cover two months' operating expenses, including any unusual debt due or expenses expected to be incurred within 90 days of the date of the loan application. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1993, Chapter 292, Sec. 30(b); effective, T-30-10-21-93, Oct. 21, 1993.)

30-65-3. Loan agreement, proceeds availability. (a) Each loan approved by the department shall be evidenced by a loan agreement signed by the secretary and an authorized official of the provider. The agreement shall be on a form approved by the department for such purposes and shall specify:

- (1) The loan amount;
- (2) the repayment schedule; and
- (3) other terms and conditions which may be appropriate.

(b) The proceeds of each approved loan shall be made available only on or after the date the client receiving the services that are the subject of the loan is actually placed with the provider. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1993, Chapter 292, Sec. 30(b); effective, T-30-10-21-93, Oct. 21, 1993.)

Article 12.—TANNING FACILITIES

69-12-1. Definitions. (a) "FDA" means the United States food and drug administration.

(b) "Consumer" means any member of the public who is provided access to a tanning facility in exchange for a fee or other compensation, or any individual who, in exchange for a fee or other compensation, is afforded use of a tanning facility as a condition or benefit of membership or access.

(c) "Tanning device operator" means an individual who controls operation of the tanning device and instructs and assists the consumer in the proper operation of the tanning device.

(d) "Tanning facility operator" means the person who is licensed to operate a tanning facility.

(continued)

(f) "Person" means an individual, association, corporation or other legal entity. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1925; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-2. Licenses. (a) Prior to operating a tanning facility, a person shall make application, on forms provided by the board, to the Kansas state board of cosmetology for a tanning facility license. The application shall be accompanied by the applicable tanning facility license fee.

(b) Prior to the issuance of a tanning facility license, the tanning facility and tanning devices shall be inspected by an authorized agent of the board for compliance with article 12 and K.S.A. 65-1920 *et seq.*, and amendments thereto. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1925 and implementing K.S.A. 65-1926; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-3. Expiration of licenses and renewals.

(a) All licenses shall expire on December 31 of each year.

(1) Application to renew a license shall be made 30 days prior to the expiration date.

(2) Application for renewal of a tanning facility license shall be made on forms approved by the board and shall be accompanied by the applicable renewal fee.

(b) A tanning facility operator may renew the tanning facility license within 59 days of the expiration date of the license by submitting a renewal fee and a delinquent renewal fee.

(c) A tanning facility operator may reinstate a tanning facility license after 60 days of the expiration date of the license and up to December 31 of that year by submitting a reinstatement fee. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1925; implementing K.S.A. 65-1926; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-4. Licenses on closed facilities returned to board. When a tanning facility is permanently closed, the tanning facility operator shall immediately mail the tanning facility license to the Kansas state board of cosmetology. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1925 and implementing K.S.A. 65-1926; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-5. Fees.

New tanning facility license fee	\$100.00
Tanning facility license renewal fee	\$100.00

69-12-6. General cleanliness of facility. (a) All tanning devices shall be cleaned after each use.

(b) Open waste containers shall be prohibited.

(c) Soiled towels shall be deposited in a closed receptacle and not used again until properly laundered and sanitized.

(d) Each tanning facility shall be kept well lighted, well ventilated, and in a sanitary condition. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1925; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-7. Tanning device operators. (a) A tanning device operator shall be present when a tanning device is operated.

(b) A tanning facility operator shall maintain verification of training for each tanning device operator.

Training shall include knowledge in the following areas:

(1) the requirements of these regulations;

(2) procedures for correct operation of the facility;

(3) recognition of injury or overexposure;

(4) manufacturer's procedures for operation and maintenance of tanning equipment; and

(5) emergency procedures in case of injury.

(c) A tanning facility operator shall maintain a list of tanning device operators, trained in accordance with this section, which shall be available at the tanning facility. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1925 and implementing K.S.A. 65-1924; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-8. Warnings. (a) The tanning facility operator shall post warning signs as specified in subsections (a) and (b) of K.S.A. 65-1922.

(b) The tanning facility operator shall have available for inspection, written warning statements that are in compliance with K.S.A. 65-1921. The tanning device operator shall read the required information to any illiterate or visually handicapped consumer, in the presence of a witness. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1925; implementing K.S.A. 65-1921 and K.S.A. 65-1922; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-9. Report of injuries. (a) The tanning facility operator shall forward to the board of cosmetology, a written report of any injury, within five working days of its occurrence or knowledge thereof. The report shall include:

(1) the name of the affected individual;

(2) the name and location of the tanning facility involved;

(3) the nature of the injury; and

(4) any other information considered relevant to the situation. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1925; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-10. Exposure schedule. (a) The recommended exposure schedule for each tanning device shall be displayed in a conspicuous place near the device.

(b) The tanning device operator shall ensure that consumers do not exceed the tan time indicated by the manufacturer. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1925 and implementing K.S.A. 65-1924; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-11. Timer. Each tanning device shall have a timer which complies with the requirements of 21 CFR Part 1040, Section 1040.20 (c)(2) as in effect on September 6, 1985. The maximum timer interval shall not exceed the manufacturer's maximum recommended exposure time. No timer interval shall have an error greater than $\pm 10\%$ of the maximum timer interval for the product. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1925 and implementing K.S.A. 65-1924; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-12. Control device. Each tanning device shall have a control that allows the consumer to turn off the device at any time. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1925; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-13. Eyewear. (a) Each consumer shall be provided with protective goggles and instructions for their use.

(b) Protective goggles shall meet the requirements of 21 CFR Part 1040, Section 1040.20 (c)(4) as in effect on September 6, 1985.

(c) Protective goggles shall be properly sanitized before each use. Exposure to the ultraviolet radiation produced by the tanning device itself shall not be considered a sanitizing agent.

(d) Each consumer shall wear the protective goggles as instructed. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1925 and implementing 65-1924; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-14. Protective barriers. There shall be physical barriers to protect consumers from injury induced by touching or breaking the lamps. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1925; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-15. Stand-up booths. (a) For stand-up booths, there shall be physical barriers or other means such as handrails or floor markings to indicate the proper exposure distance between ultraviolet lamps and the consumer's skin.

(b) The construction of each booth shall be such that it will withstand the stress of use and the impact of a falling person.

(c) The entrance to each booth shall be of rigid construction. Doors shall open outwardly. Handrails and non-slip floors shall be provided. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1925; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-16. Lamps. (a) Each tanning facility shall use only tanning devices manufactured in accordance with the specifications set forth in 21 CFR Part 1040, Section 1040.20, as in effect on September 6, 1985, "Sunlamp products and ultraviolet lamps intended for use in sunlamp products."

(b) Each sunlamp product or ultraviolet lamp used in these facilities shall not emit any measurable *Ultra-violet C* radiation.

(c) Each ultraviolet lamp contained within the sunlamp product shall be shielded to avoid contact with the consumer.

(d) Services and repair shall be carried out by a competent person in accordance with the information supplied with the device.

(e) Defective or burned out tanning lamps or bulbs shall be replaced with a type intended for use in that device and shall be of the same ultraviolet range, A or B, as the manufacturer specifies, and shall be the original lamp type as specified by the manufacturer, or an equivalent lamp approved by the FDA. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1925; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)

69-12-17. Enforcement. (a) A tanning facility operator shall be responsible for implementing and maintaining the tanning facility and tanning device in compliance with all applicable regulations and statutes both individually and jointly with all tanning device operators employed by or working in the tanning facility.

(b) Refusal to permit, or interference with, an inspection by an authorized representative of the board of cosmetology during any time the facility is operating shall constitute cause for the board to revoke, cancel, suspend, or place the license on probation. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1925; effective Dec. 13, 1993.)
