The bonds will bear interest at rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, which interest will be payable semiannually on April 1 and October 1 in each year, beginning on April 1, 1996.

Place of Payment and Bond Registration

The principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America by check or draft of the Kansas State Treasurer, Topeka, Kansas (the paying agent and bond registrar). The principal of the bonds will be payable at maturity or upon earlier redemption to the registered owners upon presentation and surrender of the bonds at the office of the paying agent. Interest on the bonds will be paid by check or draft mailed by the paying agent to the persons in whose names the bonds are registered on the registration books maintained by the bond registrar at the close of business on the record date for such interest, which shall be the 15th day (whether or not a business day) of the calendar month next preceding such interest payment date.

The city will pay for the fees of the bond registrar for registration and transfer of the bonds and will also pay for printing a reasonable supply of registered bond blanks. Any additional costs or fees that might be incurred in the secondary market, other than fees of the bond registrar, will be the responsibility of the bondholders.

Redemption of Bonds Prior to Maturity

At the option of the city, bonds maturing on October 1, 2002, and thereafter will be subject to redemption and payment prior to maturity on October 1, 2001, and thereafter in whole on any date or in part on any interest payment date (bonds of less than a single maturity to be selected by lot in multiples of \$5,000 principal amount by the paying agent and bond registrar in such equitable manner as it shall designate), at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the redemption date, without premium.

Whenever the city is to select the bonds for the purpose of redemption, it shall, in the case of bonds in denominations greater than \$5,000, if less than all of the bonds then outstanding are to be called for redemption, treat each \$5,000 of face value of each such fully registered bond as though it were a separate bond of the denomination of \$5,000.

If the city shall elect to call any bond for redemption and payment prior to the maturity thereof, the city shall give written notice of its intention to redeem and pay said bonds on a specified date, the same being described by number and maturity, said notice to be mailed by United States certified mail to the paying agent and bond registrar, and to the manager or managers of the underwriting account making the successful bid, each of said notices to be mailed at least 45 days prior to the redemption date. Thereafter, the paying agent and bond registrar will notify the owners of the bonds of the city's redemption call by United States mail, postage prepaid. If any bond be

called for redemption and payment as aforesaid, all interest on such bond shall cease from and after the date for which such call is made, provided funds are available for its payment at the price hereinbefore specified.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received on the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of $\frac{1}{8}$ or $\frac{1}{20}$ of 1 percent. No interest rate shall exceed the index of treasury bonds published by *The Bond Buyer*, in New York, New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold, plus 2 percent. The difference between the highest rate specified and the lowest rate specified shall not exceed 2 percent. No bid of less than 99 percent of the aggregate principal amount of the bonds and accrued interest thereon to the date of delivery will be considered, and no supplemental interest payments will be considered. Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the city during the life of the bond issue on the basis of such bid, the premium or discount, if any, offered by the bidder, and the net interest cost to the city on the basis of such bid. Each bid shall also specify the average annual net interest rate to the city on the basis of such bid. Bidders shall specify in the bid form the prices (exclusive of accrued interest), expressed as a dollar price, at which the bidder intends that each maturity amount of the bonds shall be initially offered to the public (the initial reoffering prices).

Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the city, which will be determined by adding the amount of the discount bid or subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the city. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing for identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the city shall determine which bid, if any, shall be accepted, and its determination shall be final.

Security for the Bonds

The bonds will be general obligations of the city payable as to both principal and interest from special assessments levied upon specially benefited property and, if not so paid, from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation upon all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the city.

Internal Revenue Code of 1986

The Internal Revenue Code of 1986 imposes requirements on the city which must be met subsequent to the issuance of the bonds by the city and, as a result, the city will and does hereby covenant that it will diligently undertake those steps necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the bonds. The city's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware

that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the city's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted current earnings of certain corporations in the calculation of alternative minimum taxable income, with certain other adjustments. Furthermore, Section 59A of the code, as added by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, provides for an environmental tax generally based on corporate alternative minimum taxable income. The amount of the tax is equal to 0.12 percent of the excess of alternative minimum taxable income, without regard to net operating losses and the deduction for this tax, over \$2 million. The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the taxpayer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies to reduce the amount of their deductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on such obligations. With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds. The city does intend to designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the city, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the city with the provisions of the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. Interest on the bonds may also be excludable from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income.

Delivery and Payment

The city will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the bonds, without cost to the successful bidder, prepared, executed and registered, on or about September 28, 1995, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or greater Kansas City, Missouri, metropolitan area as may be specified by the successful bidder. Delivery elsewhere will be at the bidder's expense. Said bidder will also be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing documents, including a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity and a certificate regarding the completeness and accuracy of the official statement. Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve funds, immediately subject to

use by the city. The denominations of the bonds and the names, addresses and social security or taxpayer identification numbers of the registered owners shall be submitted in writing by the successful bidder to the city and bond registrar not later than 3 p.m. C.D.T. on September 20, 1995. In the absence of such information, the city will deliver bonds in the denomination of each maturity registered in the name of the successful bidder.

The successful bidder shall furnish the city by 3 p.m. C.D.T. on September 20, 1995, a certificate acceptable to the city's bond counsel to the effect that (i) the successful bidder has made a bona fide public offering of the bonds at the initial reoffering prices, and (ii) a substantial amount of the bonds was sold to the public (excluding brokers and other intermediaries) at such initial reoffering prices. Such certificate shall state that (1) it is made on the best knowledge, information and belief of the successful bidder, and (2) 10 percent or more in par amount of the bonds of each maturity was sold to the public at or below the initial reoffering prices (such amount being sufficient to establish the sale of a "substantial amount" of the bonds).

Good Faith Deposit

Each bid shall be accompanied by a cashier's or certified check drawn on a bank located in the United States of America in the amount of \$5,280, payable to the order of the city to secure the city from any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of the bid. No interest will be paid upon the deposit made by the successful bidder. Said check shall be returned to the bidder if the bid is not accepted. If a bid is accepted, said check shall be held by the city until the bidder shall have complied with all of the terms and conditions of this notice, at which time said check shall, at the option of the city, be returned to the successful bidder or deducted from the purchase price. If a bid is accepted but the city shall fail to deliver the bonds to the bidder in accordance with the terms and conditions of this notice, said check shall be returned to the bidder. If a bid is accepted but the bidder shall default in the performance of any of the terms and conditions of this notice, the proceeds of such check shall be forfeited to the city, and the city reserves the right to pursue any consequential damages as a result of such default.

CUSIP Numbers

CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on the bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on any bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the bonds in accordance with the terms of this notice. All expenses in relation to the assignment and printing of CUSIP numbers on the bonds will be paid by the city.

Bid Forms

All bids must be made on forms which may be procured from the city clerk. No additions or alterations in such forms shall be made and any erasures may cause rejection of any bid. The city reserves the right to waive irregularities and to reject any or all bids.

Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted in sealed envelopes addressed to the undersigned city clerk and marked "Proposal for

the Purchase of General Obligation Bonds." Bids may be submitted by mail, delivered in person or telefaxed as hereinbefore provided to the undersigned at City Hall and must be received by the undersigned prior to 4 p.m. C.D.T. on Thursday, September 14, 1995.

Date and Delivery of Preliminary and Final Official Statement

The city has authorized the preparation and disbursement of a preliminary official statement containing information relating to the bonds. The preliminary official statement comprises the final official statement required by Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

The preliminary official statement, when amended to include the interest rates specified by the purchaser and the price or yield at which the purchaser will re-offer the bonds to the public, together with any other information required by law, will constitute a "Financial Official Statement" with respect to the bonds as that term is defined in Rule 15c2-12. No more than seven business days after the day of the sale, the city will provide without cost to the purchaser a reasonable number of printed copies of the final official statement; further copies, if desired, will be made available at the purchaser's expense. If the sale of the bonds is awarded to a syndicate, the city will designate the senior managing purchaser of the syndicate as its agent for purposes of distributing copies of the final official statement to each participating purchaser. Any purchaser executing and delivering a bid form with respect to the bonds agrees thereby that if the bid is accepted it shall accept such designation and shall enter into a contractual relationship with all participating purchasers for the purpose of assuring the receipt and distribution by each such participating purchaser of the final official statement.

The city will deliver to the purchaser on the date of delivery of the bonds a certificate executed by the mayor and the city clerk to the effect that the final official statement, as of the date of delivery of the bonds, does not contain any untrue statement of a material fact or omit to state a material fact necessary to make the statements made, in the light of the circumstances in which they are made, not misleading.

Continuing Disclosure

A description of this undertaking is set forth in the preliminary official statement and will also be set forth in the final official statement.

Assessed Valuation and Indebtedness

The total assessed valuation of the taxable tangible property within the city for the year 1994 is \$10,124,984. The total general obligation bonded indebtedness of the city as of the date of the bonds, including the bonds, is

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\$2,199,000, including, as of the date of the bonds, temporary notes outstanding in the principal amount of \$255,000, of which \$255,000 will be retired out of the proceeds of the bonds herein offered for sale. In accordance with the financial advisor's agreement with the city, the financial advisor will be submitting a bid or participating in a group submitting a bid for the purchase of the bonds.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Environment, Bureau of Air and Radiation, will conduct a public hearing at 10 a.m. Wednesday, November 8, in the main conference room, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, to consider the adoption, on a permanent basis, of proposed amendments to existing air quality regulations K.A.R. 28-19-7, 28-19-511, 28-19-512, and 28-19-518. A summary of the proposed amendments and their economic impact follows. These amendments, with the exception of the amendments to K.A.R. 28-19-7(111) and 28-19-511(h) described below, are required by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency as a condition of approval of the Kansas Title V operating permitting program.

K.A.R. 28-19-7. Definitions. The proposed amendment to the definition of the term "applicable requirement" (K.A.R. 28-19-7(e)(1)) clarifies that the term includes all requirements which are part of the state implementation plan and all requirements contained in a construction permit. This change merely restates the existing requirement more explicitly. It does not make a substantive change and will not have any economic impact.

The definition of "volatile organic compounds (VOCs)" (K.A.R. 28-19-7(111)) is proposed to be amended to add three compounds to the list of those that are "negligibly reactive" and therefore not subject to regulations as a VOC. The three chemicals are acetone, volatile methyl siloxanes, and parachlorobenzotrifluoride. This amendment is expected to reduce the costs of regulatory compliance for those industry sources that use these compounds.

K.A.R. 28-19-511. Application contents. Paragraph (b) (3) is amended to state more explicitly that an application for a Class I operating permit must contain information on fugitive emissions of regulated pollutants, whether or not the source is a major source of fugitive emissions. This change merely clarifies the existing requirement. It does not make a substantive change and will not have any economic impact.

Paragraph (b)(3)(A) is amended to provide that the department must maintain a list of those insignificant activities that do not need to be included in a permit application. This amendment will not have an economic impact on the department or on those sources that are required to submit an application because the department already maintains such a list.

Paragraph (h) is added in order to clarify that non-major or area sources that are required to obtain Class I operating permits are only required to provide information in the permit application relating to the "applicable requirement" that causes the non-major or area source to obtain a Class I operating permit. This amendment also reduces the Class I permit application fee for these sources from \$250 to \$50. These amendments will reduce

permitting costs for non-major and area sources which are required to obtain a Class I permit.

K.A.R. 28-19-512. Class I operating permits; permit contents. Paragraph (a) (7) is amended to clarify that an emission limitation which is included in a Class I permit must be authorized by the state implementation plan. This amendment does not make a substantive change and will not have any economic impact.

Paragraph (a) (18) is amended to provide that when a permit allows emissions trading, and the source voluntarily elects the emissions trading option, a seven day notice to KDHE and EPA is required. This amendment is likely to affect only a limited number of Class I operating permit holders. The economic impact of this notice requirement on sources and on KDHE is expected to be minimal.

K.A.R. 28-19-518. Class I operating permits; complete applications. Paragraph (a) is amended to more clearly state that a source must submit a timely application in order to operate without a permit subsequent to submission of its application but before the permit is issued. The amendment does not make a substantive change and will not have any economic impact.

Paragraph (b) (1) is amended to state more explicitly that an application shall be deemed complete only if it includes the information required to be submitted by K.A.R. 28-19-511. The amendment does not make a substantive change and will not have any economic impact.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulatory action. 109-8-1. Examinations. The changes desired in this regulation allow the board to change the practical skills examination by no longer requiring examination of CPR, EOA or MAST components at a regional examination site. The changes also allow that a person who fails one of these portions of the examination prior to the change will have to successfully pass that portion of the practical examination after the change becomes effective. This is necessary, as each candidate has three attempts allowed up to one year after their date of last class.

The other change in this regulation allows the board to modify existing examinations in order to test new examinations. This change is necessary in order to have a valid, defensible examination that relates to the curriculum. In the next few years the Department of Transportation will be introducing new curriculum for all levels of emergency medical services training. New curriculum has already been promulgated for the emergency medical technician.

The economic impact to the individual seeking certification from the Board of Emergency Medical Services will be unchanged, as the fees for examination and certification will stay the same. The economic impact to the training program involves the purchase of basic life support cards from the American Red Cross or the American Heart Association. This cost is approximately \$3 per card. The economic impact to the board is an approximate \$13,000 savings in examination expenses over a fiscal year.

Economic impact to the board for testing an examination could reach \$2,000 for each different examination. This would include administration costs and salaries of evaluators.

Article 10.—CURRICULA

109-10-1. Curriculum approval. (a) The approved curriculum for first responder initial courses of instruction shall be the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Services: First Responder Training Course department of transportation curriculum HS 900 026, March, 1979," as modified by the board as follows:

(1) Lesson 3, diagnostic signs and patient examination, shall be replaced by the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician—Ambulance: National Standard Curriculum HS 900 073 third edition; March 1984;" lesson 2, anatomy, physiology and patient assessment;

(2) lesson 28 shall not be optional and the instructor shall teach this lesson; and

(3) the instructor shall teach log roll to a full spine board from lesson 14 of the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician—Ambulance: National Standard Curriculum HS 900 073 third edition; March, 1984."

(b) The approved curriculum for automated external defibrillation initial courses of instruction shall be the curriculum approved by the board on February 3, 1990.

(c) The approved curriculum for emergency medical technician initial courses shall be the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician—Ambulance: National Standard Curriculum HS 900 073 third edition; March, 1984," as modified by the board as follows:

(1) The instructor shall teach Esophageal obturator airways in accordance with the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician—Intermediate: National Standard Curriculum HS 900 091, August, 1986," section 7, airway management and ventilation;

(2) the instructor shall teach the monitoring of intravenous fluid administration in accordance with the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician—Paramedic: National Standard Curriculum

HS 900 089, August, 1986," division 2, section 4, pathophysiology of shock; and

(3) effective January 1, 1997, the approved curriculum for emergency medical technician initial courses of instruction shall be the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician: Basic National Standard Curriculum HS 808 149, August, 1994," as modified by the board on February 3, 1995 as follows:

(A) The instructor shall teach basic life support cardiopulmonary resuscitation and foreign body airway obstruction for the adult, child and infant in accordance with the "Guidelines for Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation and Emergency Cardiac Care" as published in the October 28, 1992, volume 268, number 16 issue of the "Journal of the American Medical Association;"

(B) the instructor shall teach esophageal obturator airway in accordance with the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician—Intermediate: National Standard Curriculum HS 900 091, August, 1986," section 7, airway management and ventilation;

(C) the instructor shall teach multi-lumen airways in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations; and

(D) the instructor shall teach the monitoring of intravenous fluid administration in accordance with the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician—Paramedic: National Standard Curriculum HS 900 089, August 1986," division 2, section 4, pathophysiology of shock.

(d) The approved curriculum for emergency medical technician-intermediate initial courses of instruction shall be the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician—Intermediate: National Standard Curriculum HS 900 091, August 1986."

(e) The approved curriculum for emergency medical technician-defibrillator initial courses of instruction shall be the emergency medical training program of the board curriculum, as in effect on January 1, 1989.

(f) The approved curriculum for mobile intensive care technician initial courses of instruction shall be the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician—Paramedic: National Standard Curriculum HS 900 089, August 1986."

(g) The approved curriculum for instructor-coordinator initial courses of instruction for a first responder and emergency medical technician endorsement shall be the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Services Instructor Training Program: A National Standard Curriculum HS 900 086, February, 1986" as modified by the board as follows:

(1) The instructor shall teach automated external defibrillation in accordance with the automated external defibrillation curriculum approved by the board on February 3, 1990;

(2) the instructor shall teach and have the students practice emergency medical services practical skills at the

basic life support level in accordance with the United States department of transportation national highway traffic safety administration "Emergency Medical Technician—Ambulance: National Standard Curriculum HS 900 073, third edition; March, 1984;"

(3) the instructor shall teach the course approval process as approved by the board on December 2, 1994;

(4) the instructor shall teach the state examination process as approved by the board on June 2, 1995;

(5) the instructor shall teach quality assurance of training programs as approved by the board on December 2, 1994;

(6) the instructor shall teach risk management concerns for training programs as approved by the board on December 2, 1994;

(7) the instructor shall teach planning and implementing training programs as approved by the board on December 2, 1994;

(8) the instructor shall teach teaching and evaluating the affective domain as approved by the board on December 2, 1994; and

(9) the instructor shall teach ethics in the educational process as approved by the board on December 2, 1994.

(h) The approved curriculum for instructor-coordinator initial courses of instruction for emergency medical technician-intermediate, emergency medical technician-defibrillator and mobile intensive care technician endorsements shall be the curriculum approved by the board on June 8, 1990.

(i) The approved curriculum for training officer I initial courses of instruction shall be the curriculum approved by the board on August 6, 1993.

(j) The approved curriculum for training officer II initial courses of instruction shall be the curriculum approved by the board on August 6, 1993.

(k) The approved curriculum for certified instructor-coordinators and approved training officers initial course of instruction for inter-active television endorsement shall be the curriculum approved by the board on August 5, 1994.

(l) In the event of proposed curricula or proposed curricula revisions, the board may approve no more than three initial courses of instruction to field test such proposed curricula or curricula revisions for the purpose of considering permanent adoption of the proposed curricula or proposed curricula revisions. Students of each approved field test course shall, upon successful completion of an approved field test course, be eligible to challenge the board examination for certification at the attendant level which the approved field test curriculum is intended. All examination policies as stated in K.A.R. 109-8-1(g) and (h) shall be applicable to students successfully completing an approved field test curriculum. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-6110 and 65-6111; implementing K.S.A. 65-6111, 65-6129 and 65-6142; effective, T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989; effective July 17, 1989; amended Aug. 27, 1990; amended April 10, 1995; amended Sept. 22, 1995.)

Article 18.—SPECIAL PERMITS

115-18-14. Non-toxic shot; statewide. (a) Each individual hunting with a shotgun for waterfowl, coot, rail, snipe or sandhill crane shall possess and use only non-toxic shot.

(b) The following non-toxic shot materials shall be approved for the hunting of waterfowl, coot, rail, snipe and sandhill crane:

- (1) steel shot; and
- (2) steel shot coated with any of the following materials:
 - (A) copper;
 - (B) nickel;
 - (C) zinc chromate; or
 - (D) zinc chloride; and
- (3) bismuth-tin shot. (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 32-1002; effective December 27, 1994; amended Sept. 22, 1995.)

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

The State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, November 14, in the board room of the State Education Building, 120 S.E. 10th Ave., Topeka, to consider proposed changes in State Board regulations 91-1-30, 91-1-34, 91-1-35, 91-1-36, 91-1-44, 91-1-45, 91-1-46, 91-1-48, 91-1-103, 91-1-113b, 91-1-114a, 91-1-115a, 91-1-117a, 91-1-118a, 91-1-123, 91-1-127a, 91-1-128a, 91-1-145 and 91-1-146d.

These regulations govern certification of teachers, administrators and other school personnel. Each regulation is printed with this notice. Many editorial changes are made as required by the Department of Administration. A summary of the substantive changes and the economic impact of each regulation is provided below. A complete economic impact statement for each regulation may be obtained by contacting the secretary of the State Board of Education, 120 S.E. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612.

91-1-30. Paragraph (b)(1) is amended to allow certification officers of Kansas teacher education institutions to approve lower-division courses which can be completed to renew certificates.

There will be no economic impact upon the Kansas State Board of Education, other governmental agencies or private businesses. Individuals might gain a slight economic benefit by paying tuition for lower-division courses instead of graduate-level courses.

91-1-34. This regulation is amended to clearly indicate that successful completion of a state-approved special education supervisor/coordinator program and a recommendation by a teacher education institution are requirements for obtaining an endorsement as a special education supervisor/coordinator. These requirements are currently recognized in the field, but the regulation did not specifically include these requirements.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-35. This amendment clarifies that a building administrator endorsement is a prerequisite for obtaining an endorsement as a director of vocational education. This codifies existing practice.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-36. This regulation provided for an endorsement as an assistant director of vocational education. No such endorsements have been issued and it has been determined that no such endorsement is required. Thus, this regulation is being revoked.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-44, 91-1-45 and 91-1-46. The provisions in subsection (b) of each of these regulations are being revoked because the requirements for these endorsements are now provided in 91-1-47.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-48. The reference in (a)(2) should be to 91-1-105, not to 91-1-104.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-103. This regulation dealt with health occupations instructors. The requirements for such endorsements are now provided in 91-1-50.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-113b, 91-1-114a, 91-1-115a, 91-1-117a and 91-1-118a. Regulation 91-1-112a has been replaced by 91-1-112c. The amendments reflect this change.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-123. This regulation has been replaced by 91-1-123a.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-127a. This regulation is amended to specify that successful completion of a state-approved supervisor program and two years of accredited experience in the field or area of supervisory responsibility are requisites for this endorsement.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-128a. This regulation was replaced by 91-1-128b.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-145. The proposed change in subsection (a)(5) removes the last sentence, which requires that the English proficiency exam be one taken recently and adds the option of allowing graduate students to have their English proficiency verified by the certification officer or dean of education.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies or private businesses. Individuals may save the \$45 expense of the English proficiency test by otherwise documenting English proficiency.

91-1-146d. The proposed change allows persons previously certified in Kansas to use in-service training points to renew their certificates.

There should be no economic impact upon the State Board of Education, other governmental agencies, or private businesses. Individuals whose certificates have expired but who meet the other requirements for renewal may use in-service training to renew their certificates. These individuals will avoid the costs of obtaining additional college credit hours to renew their certificates.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and

may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Lanny Gaston at (913) 296-3906 or (TDD) (913) 296-8172.

All interested persons will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views or arguments, either orally or in writing, in regard to the proposed regulations. In addition, the period of public notice hereby provided constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Such written comments may be submitted to the secretary of the State Board of Education at the address above. The hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures of the State Board of Education.

91-1-30. Elementary, middle level, junior high, and secondary endorsements. (a) Initial certification.

(1) Except as otherwise expressly provided in these regulations, each initial certificate shall be valid for three years.

(2) Any secondary endorsement shall be extended to grades five and six, if the applicant's preparation:

(A) includes course work in child and adolescent psychology, accredited experience or student teaching in one of the grades five through nine, and 15 semester hours of education or training in each field or subject covered by the endorsement. This option shall expire July 1, 1997; or

(B) meets the standards set forth in S.B.R. 91-1-144 and the appropriate middle-level subject and field requirements, and includes accredited teaching experience or student teaching in one or more of the grades five through nine, and 15 semester hours of education or training in each field or subject covered by the endorsement.

(3) Any applicant who holds or is eligible for a certificate with an endorsement at the secondary level for one or more subjects or fields shall be granted an endorsement at the middle or junior high level, if the applicant meets the requirements of S.B.R. 91-1-30(a)(2).

(4) Any elementary certificate shall include a subject level endorsement for middle or junior high school level if the applicant's preparation:

(A) includes coursework in child and adolescent psychology, accredited experience or student teaching in one of the grades five through nine for middle or junior high school level, and 15 semester hours of education or training in each field or subject covered by the endorsement. This option shall expire July 1, 1997; or

(B) meets the standards set forth in S.B.R. 91-1-144 and the appropriate middle level subject and field requirements, and includes accredited teaching experience or student teaching in one or more of the grades five through nine, and 15 semester hours of education or training in each field or subject covered by the endorsement.

(5) Any applicant who is employed at an accredited teacher education institution, may meet recent credit or experience requirements with verification by the dean or head of the education department that the experiences the

individual has acquired in the areas of research, curriculum development, staff development or inservice education are equivalent to the semester hour requirements for initial certification provided in S.B.R. 91-1-27(c).

(b) Renewal requirements.

(1) Credit other than upper-division or graduate level credit that is submitted as a basis for renewal of certification shall be approved by the applicant's district school administrator, or building administrator, or the certification officer of an accredited teacher-education institution.

(2) Applicants for renewal of certification based upon credit hours shall select credit hours which maintain or improve skills related to their employment as teachers, administrators or special services personnel. Renewal credit shall be appropriate for any endorsements which appear on the certificate, to a new endorsement area, or to professional development.

~~(2)~~(3) Applicants for renewal of certification based upon credit hours who do not have previous credit in the area of exceptional children shall have completed a two-hour survey course or other courses with equivalent content in the area of exceptional children.

~~(3)~~(4) Applicants for renewal of certification based upon accredited experience who do not have previous credit in the area of exceptional children shall have completed a two-hour survey course or other courses with equivalent content in the area of exceptional children.

(4)(5) When any person has two years of accredited, recent experience in the area for which the person is certified, and when that person meets the requirements of subsection (b)(2) (3) or (b)(3)(4) of this regulation, the person's certificate may be renewed for five years, if:

(A) the experience was obtained within the term of the three-year certificate; and

(B) the person is recommended for renewal by the administration of the school in which the person is employed.

~~(5)~~(6) For any person who does not hold an advanced degree, a renewal of a five-year certificate shall require that the person have completed a minimum of eight additional hours of recent credit or the prescribed number of recent inservice education points specified in S.B.R. 91-1-146a to 91-1-146d.

~~(6)~~(7)(A) Any person holding an advanced degree may be granted two renewals of a five-year certificate if the person has completed three years of accredited, recent experience during the term of the most recent certificate.

(B) Further renewals of a five-year certificate issued to a person who holds an advanced degree shall require that the person have completed six additional hours of recent credit or the prescribed number of recent inservice education points specified in S.B.R. 91-1-146a to 91-1-146d.

~~(7)~~(8) Any applicant for renewal of an elementary certificate who has not previously completed a course in the teaching of reading shall have completed such a course. This course shall include a supervised practicum.

~~(8)~~(9) Any person having an initial certificate who does not meet the requirements for a five-year certificate may be granted an additional three-year certificate if the person has:

(A) one year of accredited, recent experience since the issuance of the most recent three-year Kansas certificate;

(B) an advanced degree and six additional hours of recent credit or the prescribed number of recent inservice education points as specified in S.B.R. 91-1-146a to 91-1-146d, if the applicant holds an advanced degree; or

(C) eight additional hours of recent credit or the prescribed number of recent inservice education points specified in S.B.R. 91-1-146a to 91-1-146d, if the applicant does not hold an advanced degree.

~~(9)~~(10) Applicants for renewal of certification who are employed at an accredited teacher education institution may meet renewal requirements with verification by the dean or head of the education department that the experiences the individual has acquired in the areas of research, curriculum development, staff development or inservice education are equivalent to the stated semester hour requirements for renewal of certification provided in state board regulations for the certificate the individual holds or has held.

~~(10)~~(11) (A) The following types of certificates, which were valid as of July 1, 1980, shall be treated as non-expiring: 123, 124, 125, 126, 127, 128, 133, 139, 140, 144, 145, 146, 147, 157, 158, 201, and 202.

(B) Those certificates listed above, which were not valid as of July 1, 1980, shall be renewed as non-expiring certificates by meeting the requirements prescribed in S.B.R. 91-1-30(b)(2)(3), (b)(3)(4), or (b)(4)(5)(B).

~~(11)~~(12) The state board reserves the right to modify or amend the regulations relating to renewal requirements for all certificates. 91-1-34. Special education supervisor/coordinator.

(a) Each applicant for a special education supervisor/coordinator endorsement shall:

(1) have successfully completed:

(A) a state-approved graduate degree; program; the requirements for a special education subject area endorsement; and

(B) a state-approved supervisor/coordinator program;

(C) a state-approved program in one or more special education subject areas; and

(D) two years of experience in one or more special education subject areas; and

(2) be recommended by a teacher education institution.

(b) A state-approved special education supervisor/coordinator program shall consist of a course of study requiring each student to demonstrate knowledge of:

(1) procedures to develop and select curricula, instructional methods and media by:

(A) explaining the relationship between instructional objectives and the curriculum developed or selected to attain them;

(B) identifying the sources of influence upon curriculum development and selection;

(C) developing a curriculum unit meeting the instructional objectives;

(D) describing a variety of instructional methods that can be used with exceptional pupils;

(E) applying an instructional method to an instructional objective;

- (F) using media as a part of the instructional process;
 - (G) planning a series of objectives to complete a program of curriculum study and development; and
 - (H) describing the procedures required to establish and maintain an instructional resource center;
- (2) staff support system development and operation by:
- (A) explaining procedures to improve communication between and among staff members;
 - (B) eliciting information from others about issues related to the improvement of instructional programs and using the information to plan new approaches to instruction;
 - (C) describing a procedure to assist staff members with program planning and problem-solving skills;
 - (D) developing and implementing a plan for assessing program needs;
 - (E) conducting a staff development workshop that is related to program needs; and
 - (F) describing procedures to assist staff members in applying the knowledge and skills acquired through staff development activities;
- (3) human relations and consultation skills by:
- (A) explaining the function of consultation in a supervisor/coordinator's role;
 - (B) describing components of the consultation process;
 - (C) developing a consultation plan to assist staff members, individually and in groups; and
 - (D) displaying individual and group conferencing techniques;
- (4) instructional program evaluation by:
- (A) developing a plan to instruct staff in the use of a peer supervision system;
 - (B) describing the procedures used to implement a clinical supervision program;
 - (C) explaining how a supervisor/coordinator can collaborate with staff members to develop performance evaluation procedures consistent with role descriptions;
 - (D) planning a procedure for formative and summary evaluations of instructional programs; and
 - (E) describing approaches for interpreting and communicating instructional program evaluation information; and
- (5) program management activities by:
- (A) describing procedures for the selection, orientation and assignment of staff members;
 - (B) describing the supervisor/coordinator's role in planning and implementing comprehensive instructional services;
 - (C) developing a system to coordinate assignment of teacher education students to directed teaching, practicum, and other related experiences;
 - (D) planning a way to use research results to improve instructional programs;
 - (E) developing a plan for the acquisition and distribution of instructional media;
 - (F) designing a budget to provide instructional services for pupils in one of the special educational subject areas; and
 - (G) explaining how to use evaluation data to improve instruction. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Jan. 8,

1982; amended May 1, 1986; amended Jan. 28, 1991; amended P-_____.)

91-1-35. Director of vocational education. (a) The *Each* applicant for this endorsement shall meet the following requirements:

(1) hold a valid administrator endorsement issued by the state board *Kansas certificate with a building administrator endorsement;*

(2) have a credit in each of the following areas:

(A) principles and philosophy of vocational education;

(B) organization and administration of vocational education;

(C) method and materials of vocational education; and

(D) job analysis;

(3) *have three (3) years accredited experience in an approved vocational program; and*

(4) *have two (2) years of paid employment in a vocational occupation, one (1) year of which shall have been full time and continuous.*

(b) The renewal requirements for this endorsement shall be the same as those provided in S.B.R. 91-1-30(b). (Authorized by and implementing *Kansas Constitution*, Article 6, Section 2(a) of the *Kansas Constitution*; effective Jan. 8, 1982; amended P-_____.)

91-1-36. (Authorized by Article 6, Section 2(a) of the *Kansas Constitution*; effective Jan. 8, 1982; revoked P-_____.)

91-1-44. Distributive education instructors. (a) *Each* applicants for this endorsement shall meet the following requirements:

(1) hold a valid certificate issued by the state board;

(2) have a major in business, including *credit in competency, as demonstrated through an approved examination, or credit hours, in the following subject areas:*

(A) marketing;

(B) accounting;

(C) small business management or applied retailing; and

(D) visual merchandising; *or show competency through approved examination;*

(3) have credit in professional vocational education courses, including:

(A) principles and philosophy of vocational education;

(B) methods of individual training *or (job analysis);*

(C) organization and administration of vocational education;

(D) coordination techniques, *which shall (not be required of instructors of related subjects); and*

(E) methods and materials in vocational education; and

(4) have two years or 4,000 hours of approved work experience in the distributive field. The instructor of related subjects may satisfy the experience requirements with one year or 2,000 hours of approved experience.

(b) *Instructors of postsecondary programs.* Applicants for this endorsement shall meet the following requirements:

(1) *Have competency in this specific teaching area and at least two additional related office education areas; and*

(continued)

(2) at least one-fourth of the approved, related work experience shall have been within the five year period prior to application.

(e) The renewal requirements for the three-year and five-year vocational business occupation endorsements shall be the same as those provided in S.B.R. 91-1-30(b), and amendments thereto. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Jan. 8, 1982; amended June 1, 1988; amended P-_____.)

91-1-45. Office education instructors. (a) Applicants Each applicant for this endorsement shall meet the following requirements:

- (1) hold a valid certificate issued by the state board;
- (2) have a major in business, including credit in competency, as demonstrated through an approved examination, or credit hours, in the subject areas of accounting and office machines; or show competency through approved examination;
- (3) have credit in professional vocational education courses, including:
 - (A) principles and philosophy of vocational education;
 - (B) methods of individual training or (job analysis);
 - (C) organization and administration of vocational education;
 - (D) coordination techniques (not which shall not be required for instructors of related subjects); and
 - (E) methods in teaching business subjects, or methods and materials in vocational education; and

(4) have two (2) years or four thousand (4000) hours of approved work experience in the office field. The instructor of related subjects may satisfy the experience requirement with one (1) year or two thousand (2000) hours of approved experience.

(b) Instructors of postsecondary programs. On and after September 1, 1982, applicants for this endorsement shall meet the following requirements:

- (1) Have competency in this specific teaching area and at least two (2) additional related office education areas; and
- (2) At least one-fourth of the approved, related work experience shall have been within the five (5) year period prior to application.

(e) The renewal requirements for the three (3) -year and five (5) -year vocational business occupation endorsements shall be the same as those provided in S.B.R. 91-1-30(b). (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Jan. 8, 1982; amended P-_____.)

91-1-46. Data processing instructors. (a) Applicants Each applicant for this endorsement shall meet the following requirements:

- (1) hold a valid certificate issued by the state board;
- (2) have credit in general data processing and current program languages;
- (3) have credit in professional vocational education courses, including:
 - (A) principles and philosophy of vocational education;
 - (B) job analysis; and
 - (C) for coordinators of cooperative programs, organization and administration of vocational education, and coordination techniques; and

(4) have two (2) years or four thousand (4000) hours of approved data processing experience or show competency through an approved examination.

(b) Instructors of postsecondary programs. On and after September 1, 1982, applicants for this endorsement shall meet the following requirements:

- (1) Have competency in this specific teaching area and at least two (2) additional related office education areas; and
- (2) At least one-fourth of the approved, related work experience shall have been within the five (5) year period prior to application.

(e) The renewal requirements for the three (3) -year and five (5) -year vocational business occupation endorsements shall be the same as those provided in S.B.R. 91-1-30(b). (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Jan. 8, 1982; amended P-_____.)

91-1-48. Specialized occupational vocational home economics. (a) A one (1) year endorsement in a specialized occupational program shall be issued to those applicants who meet the following requirements:

- (1) have a baccalaureate degree in home economics;
- (2) have credit in each area identified and cited in 91-1-104 (not in S.B.R. 91-1-105, except this requirement shall not required of apply to postsecondary instructors);
- (3) have twenty-four (24) semester hours in the area of concentration; and
- (4) have nine hundred (900) clock hours of work experience directly related to the instructional field, or three hundred (300) clock hours if supervised for college credit.

(b) The specialized vocational home economics endorsement may be renewed twice as a one (1) -year endorsements upon meeting the following requirements:

- (1) accredited experience;
- (2) participation in the annual joint vocational education conference or approved equivalent; and
- (3) credit from the following areas:
 - (A) job analysis;
 - (B) principles and philosophy of vocational education;
 - (C) home economics occupations;
 - (D) methods of teaching vocational home economics or vocational education methods; or and
 - (E) coordination techniques.

(c) The one (1) -year specialized vocational home economics endorsement may be renewed for three (3) years upon completion of:

- (1) Accredited experience;
- (2) credit from areas listed in paragraph (b)(3)(C) of this regulation;
- (3) participation each year in the joint vocational education conference; or and
- (4) participation in one (1) approved professional conference in the instructor's area of concentration.

(d) The three (3) -year specialized vocational home economics endorsement may be renewed as a five (5) -year endorsement upon completion of:

- (1) accredited experience;
- (2) participation each year in a joint vocational education conference or an approved equivalent; and
- (3) participation every three (3) years in one (1) approved professional conference in the instructor's area of concentration.

(e) Subsequent five (5) year specialized vocational home economics endorsements shall require:

- (1) accredited experience;
- (2) eight (8) additional semester hours of credit;
- (3) participation each year in the joint vocational education conference or an approved equivalent; and
- (4) participation every three (3) years in one (1) approved professional conference in the instructor's area of concentration.

(f) Provisional one (1) -year vocational home economics endorsement.

(1) a one (1) -year endorsement may be issued to a person employed in an approved vocational home economics program who shows:

- (A) skill in a specialty area of home economics; and
- (B) extensive work experience directly related to the instructional area.

(2) The renewal requirements for the provisional one (1) -year vocational home economics endorsement shall be the same as those provided in S.B.R. 91-1-48(b) or (c). (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Jan. 8, 1982; amended P-_____.)

91-1-103. Authorized by and implementing Kansas Constitution, Article 6, Section 2(a); effective Jan. 8, 1982; revoked P-_____.)

91-1-113b. Biology. (a) Each applicant for a biology endorsement at the secondary level shall have successfully completed a state-approved program in biology, shall have met the general requirements in S.B.R. 91-1-112a 91-1-112c, and shall be recommended by a teacher education institution.

(b) A state-approved program shall consist of a course of study requiring each student to demonstrate knowledge of:

(1) The fundamentals of biology, including botany, zoology, bacteriology or microbiology, anatomy, and physiology;

(2) laboratory techniques concerned with the study of systematics, development, evolution, genetics, behavior, homeostatic mechanisms and all the life processes in animals, plants, and microbes;

(3) the fundamentals of ecology;

(4) the proper conduct and direction of meaningful field trips and investigations concerned with obtaining information on ecological populations, ecosystems, energy flow, nutrient cycles and the sociobiological aspects of ecology;

(5) chemistry, mathematics, and physical science or physics, including:

(A) Knowledge of the laboratory techniques equivalent to general college chemistry;

(B) subject-matter knowledge equivalent to general college physical science or college physics; and

(C) a working knowledge of mathematics equivalent to college algebra;

(6) a variety of methods and modalities for teaching human sexuality, including information about sexually transmitted diseases, especially acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS); and

(7) the rights and responsibilities of the individual as they relate to family systems and parenthood.

(e) Prior to July 1, 1994, any institution may request that its biology program be approved by the State Board under the provisions of this regulation.

(d) On and after July 1, 1994, any institution desiring to have an approved biology program shall meet the requirements of this regulation. (Authorized by, and implementing; Kansas Constitution Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective June 1, 1993; amended April 25, 1994; amended P-_____.)

91-1-114a. Chemistry. (a) Each applicant for a chemistry endorsement at the secondary level shall have successfully completed a state-approved program in chemistry, shall have met the general requirements in S.B.R. 91-1-112a 91-1-112c, and shall be recommended by a teacher education institution.

(b) Approved programs shall require students to complete a course of study allowing the students to acquire:

(1) Knowledge and understanding of the fundamental concepts of general chemistry and a command of the laboratory techniques found in general college chemistry;

(2) knowledge and understanding of organic chemistry and a command of laboratory techniques found in organic chemistry;

(3) knowledge and understanding of analytical chemistry and a command of quantitative laboratory techniques found in analytical chemistry;

(4) knowledge and understanding of the concepts and laboratory techniques found in general college biology;

(5) knowledge and understanding of the concepts and laboratory techniques found in general college physics; and

(6) knowledge of and proficiency in pre-calculus mathematics, including advanced algebra and trigonometry.

(e) This regulation shall take effect on and after May 1, 1987. (Authorized by, and implementing; Kansas Constitution Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective May 1, 1985; amended P-_____.)

91-1-115a. Earth and space science. (a) Each applicant for an earth and space science endorsement at the secondary level shall have successfully completed a state-approved program in earth and space science, shall have met the general requirements in S.B.R. 91-1-112a 91-1-112c, and shall be recommended by a teacher education institution.

(b) Approved programs shall require students to complete a course of study allowing the students to acquire:

(1) Knowledge and understanding of the fundamental concepts and laboratory techniques of physics, biology, chemistry, geology, astronomy, meteorology, and oceanography;

(2) proficiency in mathematics, including advanced algebra, trigonometry, matrices and determinants, exponential and logarithmic functions, and probability; and

(3) the ability to integrate environmental concepts into earth and space science curricula. The course of study shall allow students to acquire the ability to:

(A) describe the relationships among the lithosphere, atmosphere, and hydrosphere, and man's human environ-

(continued)

ment as they apply to the interdisciplinary study of the earth and space sciences; and

(B) demonstrate the application of analytical methods of multidisciplinary approaches to studying and solving problems encountered by societies living in a world with such environmental constraints as finite natural resources, population increases, and diminishing energy reserves;

(4) knowledge of field geology and an ability to use the basic techniques of field geology. This knowledge and ability shall be acquired through field experiences; and

(5) knowledge of concepts and laboratory techniques beyond the introductory level in at least one area of earth and space science.

(e) This regulation shall take effect on and after May 1, 1987. (Authorized by, and implementing, Kansas Constitution Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective May 1, 1985; amended P-_____.)

91-1-117a. Physical science. (a) Each applicant for a physical science endorsement at the secondary level shall have met the general requirements in S.B.R. 91-1-112a 91-1-112c, shall be recommended by a teacher education institution, and shall have met the requirements in two of the following regulations:

(a) S.B.R. 91-1-114a—Chemistry;

(b) S.B.R. 91-1-115a—Earth and Space Science; or

(c) S.B.R. 91-1-118a—Physics; and shall be recommended by a teacher education institution.

(b) This regulation shall take effect on and after May 1, 1987. (Authorized by, and implementing, Kansas Constitution Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective May 1, 1985; amended P-_____.)

91-1-118a. Physics. (a) Each applicant for a physics endorsement at the secondary level of instruction shall have successfully completed a state-approved program in physics, shall have met the general requirements in S.B.R. 91-1-112a 91-1-112c, and shall be recommended by a teacher education institution.

(b) Approved programs shall require students to complete a course of study allowing the students to acquire:

(1) Knowledge and understanding of the fundamental concepts of general physics and a command of laboratory techniques found in general physics;

(2) knowledge of the concepts of physics beyond the general physics level and laboratory techniques found in physics beyond the general physics level;

(3) knowledge of the concepts of general biology and laboratory techniques found in general biology;

(4) knowledge of the fundamental concepts of general chemistry and command of laboratory techniques found in general chemistry; and

(5) knowledge and proficiency in basic calculus.

(e) This regulation shall take effect on and after May 1, 1987. (Authorized by, and implementing, Kansas Constitution Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective May 1, 1985; amended P-_____.)

91-1-123. (Authorized by Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Jan. 8, 1982; revoked P-_____.)

91-1-127a. Supervisor. (a) Each applicant for a supervisor endorsement at the elementary, middle or secondary level shall:

(1) have successfully completed a state approved graduate degree program in the field or area of supervisory responsibility; and

(2) have successfully completed a state-approved supervisor program;

(3) have two years of teaching accredited experience in the field or area of supervisory responsibility; and shall

(4) be recommended by a teacher-education institution.

(b) Approved programs shall enable require students to complete a course of study allowing students to:

(1) Demonstrate knowledge of developments in the areas of supervisory practice, staff development and student testing by:

(A) demonstrating knowledge of the various evaluative, supervisory, and staff development procedures; and

(B) demonstrating knowledge of student testing and educational accountability systems;

(2) demonstrate knowledge of principles, practices and evaluation strategies associated with curriculum development by:

(A) demonstrating knowledge of the philosophical, social, political and intellectual conditions that shape school programs; and

(B) demonstrating ability to cooperatively plan with teachers, administrators and others regarding the staffing, implementation, and evaluation requirements of a specific curricular or instructional strategy;

(3) demonstrate knowledge of behavioral and management science theory and its application to supervisory practice in schools by:

(A) demonstrating a basic knowledge of the school as a social system with elements that influence pupil learning and teacher effectiveness; and

(B) demonstrating a knowledge of motivational research and its implications and the ability to initiate specific teacher and classroom improvement strategies; and

(4) demonstrate skill in applying knowledge of supervisory practice through participation in a directed field experience. The students shall be able to assume and perform directed supervisory responsibility for some aspect of the instructional or curricular program through a work experience in a school or school system.

(e) This regulation shall take effect on and after May 1, 1986. (Authorized by, and implementing, Kans. Const. Art. 6, Sect. 2(a) Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective May 1, 1984; amended P-_____.)

91-1-145. Evaluating credits from international institutions. (a) To receive a valid teaching certificate for the state of Kansas, all persons each person who have has graduated from an accredited institutions institution outside of the United States of America shall meet the following requirements.

(1) The person shall contact a credentials evaluator for complete evaluation of academic credentials. Official copies of secondary education certificates, and diplomas shall be provided. Material which is not written in English shall be translated into English by a translator, and

the translator shall verify the accuracy of the translation. A list of credentials evaluators shall be maintained by the Kansas state department of education.

(2) *The person shall obtain a teacher education institution recommendation. The institution shall be accredited by the state board or a state-authorized agency of the state in which the institution is located, if the state has officially adopted standards for accrediting teacher education institutions. The definition of teacher education institution cited in S.B.R. 91-1-26(s)(1) and (2) shall not apply to the recommendation process described in this regulation.*

(3) *The person shall provide evidence of the recent credit or recent, accredited experience specified in S.B.R. 91-1-27(c).*

(4) *The person shall complete the Kansas application for certification. The application shall be accompanied by official documentation, including official transcripts, certificates, and diplomas. The application also shall be accompanied by the certification fee established by the state board.*

(5) *If the person's primary language is not English, the person shall submit verification of proficiency in spoken and written English. To verify English language proficiency, the person shall:*

(A) Obtain a passing score on an English language proficiency examination designated by the Kansas state department of education for all applicants whose primary language is not English; or

(B) provide written verification of English language proficiency from the dean of education or the certification officer if the person is a graduate student of an accredited teacher-education institution located in the United States. The examination shall include competency in spoken English. The examination shall have been taken within the six-year period immediately preceding the date of application for certification.

(b) All applicants Each applicant shall:

(1) Possess the equivalent of a four-year baccalaureate degree at an institution of higher education in the United States of America; and

(2) have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.5 on a 4-point grade scale, or its equivalent.

(c) If the applicant does not meet all of the above requirements, he or she the applicant shall be given information regarding accredited teacher education programs at Kansas institutions of higher education. In addition, any applicant who does not meet all of the above requirements shall be notified of the appeal process prescribed in S.B.R. 91-1-27g. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective May 1, 1983; amended May 14, 1986; amended P-_____.)

91-1-146d. Renewal of certification based upon inservice education. (a) Any certified applicant who holds or has held a Kansas certificate and who is employed by an education agency having a state-approved inservice education plan on file with the Kansas state department of education may prepare an individual development plan. This individual development plan shall:

(1) Include sequential instructional experiences designed to improve performance in an area of certification or include courses in a planned program leading to a new endorsement;

(2) reflect the job-related needs of the individual;

(3) correlate with the needs and goals of the education agency;

(4) result from cooperative planning with a designated supervisor;

(5) be signed by the employee;

(6) be signed by the supervisor, if the supervisor and the employee are in agreement;

(7) be reviewed and approved by the council, based upon guidelines adopted by and available from the state board; and

(8) be reviewed and approved by the governing body of the education agency.

(b) Area professional development centers providing inservice education for certification renewal shall provide the inservice education through a local school district, an accredited non-public school, an institution of postsecondary education or another education agency which has a state-approved inservice education plan.

(c) Renewal of certification based upon inservice education shall require: meet the following requirements.

(1) Each individual whose highest degree is a baccalaureate degree to shall have experiences worth at least 160 inservice education points during a five-year period, half of which shall be college or university credit;

(2) Each individual having a master's degree or other advanced degree shall have experiences worth 120 inservice education points during a five-year period; and

(3) Experiences worth at least 100 inservice education points during a five-year period shall be required for a renewal of a substitute teaching endorsement.

(A) A substitute teacher may earn all 100 points through inservice education.

(B) A substitute teacher employed for any period of time by an education agency having a state-approved inservice education plan may participate in that district's inservice education plan.

(d) An application for renewal of a certificate based upon inservice education shall be accompanied by verification by the governing body of the education agency that the inservice credit is valid for renewal of a certificate.

(e) An applicant who is not eligible under subsection (a) of this regulation for renewal of a certificate using inservice education shall meet the provisions of S.B.R. 91-1-30(b) for the renewal of a certificate. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective May 1, 1983; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 1, 1987; amended June 1, 1988; amended P-_____.)


