Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality operating permit. Russell Stover Candies - Iola Plant has applied for a Class II operating permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-540. Emissions of particulate matter less than 10 micrometers (PM₁₀) and sulfur dioxide (SO₂) were evaluated in determining the potential-to-emit during the permit review process. The purpose of a Class II permit is to limit the potential-to-emit for these pollutants to below major source thresholds.

Russell Stover Candies - Iola Plant, Kansas City, Missouri, owns and operates a confectionary manufacturing facility in Iola. Air emission sources at this facility consist of two Superior boilers each with a maximum design heat input rate of 38.85 million Btu per hour and one Cantrell International oven rated at 0.4 million Btu per hour. Ancillary equipment includes a fumigation vault for treating nuts with methyl bromide to exterminate pests, and a fuel oil tank used to supply emergency back up fuel for the boilers. Particulate emissions control equipment includes one baghouse for sugar dust collection, two mogul dust collection baghouses and two starch conditioning baghouses located at 1995 Marshmallow Lane, Iola, Allen County.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation and all information relied upon during the permit application review process is available for public review during normal business hours at the KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, and at the KDHE Southeast District Office, 1500 W. 7th, Chanute. The standard departmental cost will be assessed for any copies requested.

In order to be considered in formulating a final permit decision, written comments must be received by the close of business September 13.

A person may request a public hearing be held on the proposed permit. The request for a public hearing shall be in writing and set forth the basis for the request. The written request must be submitted to Connie Carreno, Bureau of Air and Radiation, not later than the close of business September 13 in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

On page 1030, in K.A.R. 28-16-28e (d), Table 1a, the domestic water supply criterion for dichloromethane (methylene chloride) is being corrected from 47 micrograms per liter to 4.7 micrograms per liter.

A public hearing will be conducted at 11 a.m. Friday, October 22, in the SRS board room, sixth floor, Docking State Office Building, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, to consider the adoption of amendments to an existing rule and regulation on a permanent basis effective December 1, 1999. Telephone conference will not be available.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the proposed regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to

or during the public hearing to Hope Burns, Office of the Secretary for SRS, Docking State Office Building, Room 603-N, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, but it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes. The phrase "Federal Mandate" following an item indicates that the change is required by federal policy. Optional changes in regulations related to federal programs are subject to approval by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Copies of the regulation and the economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting Hope Burns, (785) 296-3969.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. The adoption of the regulation will take place at 9 a.m. Thursday, October 28, in the SRS executive conference room, 603-N, Docking State Office Building. Telephone conference will not be available.

A summary of the proposed regulation and the economic impact follows.

Article 4.—PUBLIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

30-4-64. Work program requirements. This regulation is being amended to modify the exemption for a person who is 60 years of age or older. This exemption cannot be claimed in two-parent situations when neither parent is prevented from pursuing employment or one parent is exempt for another reason and capable of providing care for the child(ren).

This regulation is being further amended to clarify who can claim an exemption as a caretaker of a child under age one in two-parent households.

Economic Impact: These changes in exemptions are not expected to have any discernable economic impact.

This regulation also is being modified to add the following two criteria as good cause for failing to participate in work programs:

—A single custodial parent who has demonstrated the inability to obtain needed child care for a child under age six.

—Individuals who are victims of domestic violence whereby compliance with program requirements would increase risk of harm for the individual or any children in the individual's care.

Economic Impact: These changes in good cause criteria are not expected to have any discernable economic impact.

The Commission on Children and Family Services is soliciting requests for proposals for a social work liaison position within a public school system in Kansas. The position is part of the Children's Justice Act Grant. It will be funded fully for two years and 50 percent for the third year. The approximate funding for the first two years is \$29,300 per year.

The expectation of this position would be for the social work liaison to act as an intermediary between local SRS offices and the school system as a means to increase a more effective response to child abuse and neglect cases. The position would be responsible for working with school personnel, SRS staff and local community resources to ensure that a child's needs were being met who had either been abused/neglected or were at high risk of abuse without services being provided to their family. It is an expectation of this grant that the school district is able to pick up the cost of the position at the end of the three-year grant period when applying.

Executive Order No. 99-6

Designation of the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership as the State Workforce Investment Board

WHEREAS, the Workforce Investment Act of 1998, 29 U.S.C. Sec. 2801 et seq., calls for the Governor to establish a State Workforce Investment Board, and the Act provides for the designation of any established State entity in existence on December 31, 1997 (including a State council, State workforce development board, or combination of regional boards) as the State workforce investment board [29 U.S.C. Sec. 2821(a)&(e)]; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership, established by Executive Order No. 96-3, includes representatives of business and labor organizations in the State as required by 29 U.S.C. Sec 2821(e)(1)(C); and

WHEREAS, the membership of the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership is composed ("as may be required by applicable federal or state law") of representatives including private sector business, labor, state and local government, education, community-based organizations, and the general public; and

WHEREAS, the chairperson of the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership, appointed by and serving at the pleasure of the Governor, is a member representing private sector business in the State; and

WHEREAS, the Governor also appoints a vice chairperson; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership meets upon the call of the Chairperson; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership was established to increase the effectiveness of the training and employment system through combined boards and enhanced cooperation and collaboration among stakeholders at the local and State levels; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership was created as a first step in preparing the State of Kansas for anticipated further collaboration and consolidation of federal employment and training programs and the implementation of employment and training block grants; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership has made significant progress in creating shared visions and missions among stakeholders at the local and state levels;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby designate the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership (KWIP) as the State workforce investment board as set forth in 29 U.S.C. Sec. 282(a)&(e).

- (1) **Membership.** The membership provisions of Executive Order No. 96-3 shall remain in full force and effect. Membership of the KWIP continues to include representatives of private sector business, labor, local and state government entities, community-based organizations, and the general public selected in the manner set forth in Executive Order No. 96-3. The chairperson and vice chair shall be appointed to serve at the pleasure of the Governor, and the chairperson

shall continue to be a representative of the private sector business community.

- (2) **Ad Hoc Membership.** Consistent with federal law, the Governor may appoint ad hoc non-voting KWIP members.
- (3) **Compensation.** Members receive no compensation, but, to the extent permitted by law and available appropriations through state and federal sources, shall be reimbursed for subsistence, mileage, and expenses as provided in K.S.A. 75-3223 and amendments thereto for travel to and attendance of official meetings of the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership. Members who are representatives of state agencies shall be paid by the agencies represented.
- (4) **Duties.** The duties of the Kansas Workforce Investment Partnership shall be to provide information to the Governor, Legislature, appropriate public and private agencies and the public on matters pertaining to employment and training plans, programs, services, and facilities and to assist the Governor in:
- (a) development of the State plan;
 - (b) development and continuous improvement of a seamless, collaborative, universally accessible "statewide workforce investment system";
 - (c) development of linkages to assure coordination and non-duplication of employment and training services;
 - (d) designation of local areas;
 - (e) establishment of criteria for use by local elected officials in appointing members of local workforce investment boards;
 - (f) review of local area plans;
 - (g) development of allocation formulas for distribution of funds for adult and youth employment and training activities to local areas;
 - (h) development and continuous improvement of comprehensive State performance measures;
 - (i) preparation of annual reports to the U.S. Secretary of Labor;
 - (j) development of the statewide employment statistics system described in the Wagner-Peyser Act;
 - (k) development of applications for incentive grants under Workforce Investment Partnership (WIA), successive legislation, and other applicable federal programs; and
 - (l) performing any additional duties as may be required by current and future applicable employment and training federal laws and amendments thereto.

Any provision of Executive Order 96-3 inconsistent with the provisions provided above is hereby rescinded.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 99-6 and shall become effective immediately.

Article 9.—MEDICAL AND HOSPITAL

51-9-7. Fees for medical and hospital services. Charges for medical, surgical, hospital, dental, and nursing services, medical equipment, medical supplies, prescriptions, medical records, and medical testimony rendered pursuant to the Kansas workers compensation act shall be the lesser of the usual and customary charge of the health care provider, hospital or other entity providing the health care services or the amount allowed by the "Workers Compensation Schedule of Medical Fees" published by the Kansas Department of Human Resources and dated October 1, 1999, including the ground rules incorporated in the schedule, which is hereby adopted by reference. This regulation shall take effect on and after October 1, 1999. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 19.—CERTIFICATION OF FIRE INVESTIGATORS

22-19-1. Fire investigation and reporting. (a) All necessary and appropriate investigations of every fire or explosion or any attempt to cause a fire or explosion in this state by incendiary means or to defraud any insurance company shall be made by the state fire marshal, deputy state fire marshals, the chief of any paid or volunteer fire department, or any member of a fire department who has been duly designated by the chief, and the investigation shall be reported to the state fire marshal's office.

(b) Each person certified as a fire investigator I or II may conduct investigations that occur within the jurisdictional boundaries of the employing fire department or within the boundaries of any department with which the employing district has a statutorily authorized mutual aid, interlocal, or other contractual agreement concerning fire matters. Any investigation by a certified fire investigator I or II anywhere within the state may be authorized by the state fire marshal. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 31-157; effective, T-84-43, Dec. 21, 1983; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 10, 1993; amended Aug. 27, 1999.)

22-19-2. Certification of fire investigators. (a) Each fire investigator who makes application and who meets and demonstrates the following criteria may be certified by the state fire marshal:

(1) Each applicant for fire investigator certification shall be recommended by the fire chief of the jurisdiction.

(2) Each applicant shall provide proof of successful completion of a fire investigation course, within the past five calendar years, that meets or exceeds the "standard for professional qualifications for fire investigator" established by the national fire protection association in publication number 1033, 1998 edition, adopted by reference, and all law enforcement training required under K.S.A. 74-5602 et seq., and amendments thereto, and applicable regulations. Each applicant for fire investigator II certification shall also successfully complete a firearms training course approved for law enforcement officers and shall be employed full-time by a fire department or law enforcement agency. An applicant for fire investigator I

shall not be required to have firearms training or full-time status.

(3) Each applicant who has not completed a nationally recognized training course may be certified upon achievement of a score of not less than 70 percent correct on the fire investigation graded examination and upon presentation of all other requirements.

(4) Each applicant shall submit a completed KBI background investigation that demonstrates to the state fire marshal's satisfaction that the applicant has no criminal justice history or other disqualification for a law enforcement officer.

(b) Comparable qualifications from another state or jurisdiction may be recognized by the state fire marshal.

(c) Certification as a fire investigator shall be for a period of three years.

(d) Certification may be granted at two levels: fire investigator I or fire investigator II. Fire investigator I certification shall require the qualifications set out in paragraphs (a) (1) through (3) above. Qualification as a fire investigator II shall require, in addition to the requirements for fire investigator I, the successful completion of law enforcement firearms training and full-time employment as a paid member of a fire department or law enforcement agency.

(e) Any fire department or law enforcement agency may employ up to four certified fire investigator II's. Upon written application demonstrating good cause, additional certified fire investigator II's may be authorized by the state fire marshal. A fire department or law enforcement agency may employ any number of fire investigator I's. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 31-157; effective, T-84-43, Dec. 21, 1983; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 10, 1993; amended Aug. 27, 1999.)

22-19-3. Fire investigation recertification. (a) Each individual shall apply for fire investigation recertification on a form approved by the state fire marshal. Each recertification application shall include the following:

- (1) A completed recertification form;
- (2) legible photostatic copies or originals of all documents establishing the points earned; and
- (3) a notarized statement of eligibility for recertification.

(b) Each recertification application shall be received by the state fire marshal's office no later than 60 days before the expiration of the present certification.

(c) Recertification shall require the accumulation and documentation of at least 50 points in the three-year period following certification as follows:

(1) Training points shall be earned at the rate of one point for every clock hour of department-approved training attended or taught, and 10 points shall be earned for every college-level course of three or more credit hours on which the applicant achieves a grade of "C" or higher if the course content directly relates to fire investigation skills. A minimum of 30 points shall be earned in this category, and a maximum of 40 points may be earned.

(2) Experience points shall be earned for performing fire scene investigation and reporting or for the supervision of fire scene investigation and reporting. Points shall be earned at the rate of one point per fire investigation

performed or supervised. A minimum of 10 points shall be earned in this category, and a maximum of 20 points may be earned.

(3) Tested points may be earned through achievement of a score of at least 70 percent correct on a graded fire investigation examination. Meeting this standard shall be equivalent to 10 testing category points.

(d) Recertification points shall not be carried over from one recertification period into another. Fire investigators who are certified before the effective date of this regulation shall have up to two years to achieve recertification. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 31-157; effective, T-84-43, Dec. 21, 1983; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 10, 1993; amended Aug. 27, 1999.)

22-19-4a. Revocation or suspension. (a) Every certification or recertification granted by the state fire marshal may be revoked or suspended for good cause shown. For the purpose of this regulation, "good cause" shall include any of the following:

(1) Misrepresentation of any information provided on an application, in a supporting document, or in any filed report;

(2) conviction or diversion for any felony criminal offense;

(3) failure to make timely, complete reports of all investigations to the state fire marshal's office; or

(4) failure to conduct an investigation in accord with nationally recognized methods and procedures.

(b) An individual may appeal any suspension or revocation of a certification or recertification as provided for by the Kansas administrative procedure act. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 31-133 and 31-157; effective Aug. 27, 1999.)

Article 31.—ACCREDITATION

91-31-16. Definitions. (a) "Accreditation cycle" means a five-year process in which schools are evaluated by the state board for school improvement, accountability, and student performance.

(b) "Accreditation team" means the on-site team that conducts the accreditation visit.

(c) "Accreditation visit" means the on-site visit within the accreditation cycle conducted for the following purposes:

(1) Reviewing the school's progress towards achieving improvement in targeted areas; and

(2) making a recommendation to the state board regarding the school's accreditation status.

(d) "Accredited" means that a school meets state board accreditation requirements.

(continued)

(e) "Accredited conditionally" means that a school has failed to meet the requirements for accreditation and shall have one year to meet the requirements for accreditation by implementing a corrective plan.

(f) "Annual report" means a report submitted yearly to the state board that contains updated information regarding the required state indicator data.

(g) "Appeal team" means a group of individuals appointed by the commissioner of education who are responsible for resolving an appeal of an accreditation recommendation.

(h) "Candidate" means a school that has begun its initial accreditation cycle to become accredited.

(i) "Continuous improvement" means advancement utilizing data from three or more aligned measurements of performance in targeted areas of student performance when compared to results of previous years. These measurements of performance shall include the Kansas assessments and two or more locally determined measurements of performance.

(j) "Curriculum standards" means statements of what students should know and be able to do in specific content areas.

(k) "Formal relationship" means any professional service to a school, including services as a consultant or past or present employee, or any relationship to any employee or student of the school or school district.

(l) "Local board of education" means the board of education of any unified school district or the governing body of any nonpublic school.

(m) "Non-accredited" means that a school does not meet state board accreditation requirements.

(n) "On-site team" means the group of individuals selected by a school to conduct on-site visits.

(o) "On-site visit" means a visit at the school by an on-site team during the accreditation cycle.

(p) "School" means an organizational unit that, for the purposes of school improvement, constitutes a logical sequence of elements that may be structured as grade levels, developmental levels, or instructional levels.

(q) "School improvement plan" means a plan developed and submitted by a school to the local and state boards stating specific plans for achieving continuous improvement in student performance in each area targeted for improvement.

(r) "Standards of excellence" means the expectations for academic achievement that the state board has set for Kansas schools.

(s) "State assessments" means the assessments that the state board administers in order to measure student learning within the Kansas curriculum standards for mathematics, reading, science, social studies, and writing.

(t) "State board" means the state board of education.

(u) "Unit of credit" means a measure of credit that may be awarded to a student for satisfactory completion of all of the coursework of a particular course or subject. A full unit of credit is credit that is awarded for satisfactory completion of a course or subject that is offered for and generally requires a minimum of 120 clock hours to complete. Credit may be awarded in increments based upon the amount of time a course or subject is offered and generally requires to complete. (Authorized by and

implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Dec. 27, 1996; amended Aug. 27, 1999.)

91-31-18. School improvement plan. (a) Each school shall develop a school improvement plan. The school shall submit the plan to the state board for review, after approval by the local board. Within 60 days, the local board shall be notified by the state board of any deficiencies in the school improvement plan.

(b) Each school shall write its school improvement plan for at least one accreditation cycle.

(c)(1) Each school shall include in its school improvement plan the areas targeted for improvement. These targeted areas shall reflect the state standards established by the state board. Each school improvement plan shall include a results-based staff development plan focusing on the results of the instruction or training for individuals and schools.

(2) Until the building standards of excellence established by the state board are met in each subject area, each school shall target for improvement three of the following academic areas:

- (A) Mathematics;
- (B) reading;
- (C) science;
- (D) social studies; and
- (E) writing.

(3) Two of the three areas targeted for improvement shall be mathematics and reading until the school has achieved the building standards of excellence established by the state board for those subject areas.

(d) Each school may include in its school improvement plan additional areas targeted for improvement.

(e) Each school shall document and maintain records regarding student performance in each area targeted for improvement. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Dec. 27, 1996; amended Aug. 27, 1999.)

91-31-19. Board of education requirements. (a) General. Each local board of education shall assure that each school meets the requirements of this regulation.

(b) Staff.

(1) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, in filling positions for which a certificate is issued by the state board, each district shall employ persons who hold certificates with specific endorsements for the positions held.

(2) If a teacher holding an appropriate certificate is not available, a school district shall use a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas teacher or administrator certificate at any level or in any field or subject. A school district shall not allow any person holding a Kansas teaching certificate to substitute teach for more than 125 days in the same assignment.

(3) If a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas teacher or administrator certificate is not available, a school district shall use a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas substitute teaching certificate. A school district shall not allow a person holding a substitute teaching certificate to teach for more than 90 days in the same assignment.

(4) If a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas substitute teaching certificate is not available, a school district shall use a person who holds a baccalaureate degree and an emergency substitute teacher certificate. A school district shall not allow a person who holds a baccalaureate degree and an emergency substitute teacher certificate to teach for more than 30 days in the same assignment.

(5)(A) If a person holding a baccalaureate degree and an emergency substitute teacher certificate is not available, a school district shall use a person who has been certified by the state board as an emergency substitute teacher. A school district shall not allow any person who does not hold a baccalaureate degree to teach for more than 15 days in the same assignment or more than 60 days in a semester.

(B) If a local school board can demonstrate, in writing, an insufficient supply of substitute teachers, the board may appeal to the commissioner of education for authority to allow individuals holding an emergency substitute teaching certificate to continue to teach for an additional length of time not exceeding a total of 93 days in a school year.

(6) If the state board of education has declared a time of emergency, any person holding a five-year substitute teaching certificate or an emergency substitute teacher certificate with a baccalaureate degree may teach for the duration of the time of emergency in a position made vacant by reason of the emergency.

(7) Each school shall report the names of each certified staff member on the certified personnel report or the supplemental certified personnel report required by the state board. Each certified personnel staff change that occurs between September 15 and the end of the school year shall be reported on a form prescribed by the state board within 30 days after the staff change.

(c) Student credit. Each school, through the local board of education, shall have a written policy specifying that the credit of any pupil transferring from an accredited school shall be accepted.

(d) Records retention. Each school shall permanently retain records relating to each student's academic performance, attendance, and activities.

(e) Athletic practice. Each school shall have a written policy specifying that athletic practice for competition shall neither be conducted during physical education classes nor be counted for credit or as part of the school term. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Dec. 27, 1996; amended Aug. 27, 1999.)

91-31-24. On-site visits. (a) Each school shall evaluate its progress in meeting the goals of its school improvement plan in preparation for both on-site visits to the school.

(b)(1) Each school shall select an on-site team for each accreditation cycle.

(2) Whenever possible, the same on-site team shall conduct on-site visits during an accreditation cycle.

(c)(1) Each on-site team shall be comprised of the following:

- (A) A team chair approved by the state board; and
- (B) at least two other members from outside the school district who have background and skills in school improvement.

(2)(A) On-site team members shall not have had any formal relationship with the school within the past five years, except that a school may select any team members to serve for one succeeding accreditation cycle.

(B) Each school shall replace at least 50 percent of the on-site team membership in the succeeding accreditation cycle.

(C) The team chairperson may be reappointed to serve from one accreditation cycle to the next, but may serve as team chairperson for only one accreditation cycle.

(d) During the first on-site visit, the on-site team shall do the following:

(1) Facilitate the school's self-review;

(2) review the school improvement plan and provide feedback about the targets selected in the school improvement plan; and

(3) determine if any technical assistance is needed.

(e)(1) The accreditation visit shall be conducted before June 30 of the fifth year of the accreditation cycle. During the accreditation visit, the on-site team shall do the following:

(A) Review the school's progress toward improvement plan standards; and

(B) make a recommendation to the state board regarding the school's accreditation status.

(2) The accreditation team shall examine and analyze the following information in determining whether or not to recommend accreditation:

(A) The school's annual reports;

(B) school improvement data not included in the annual reports;

(C) the first-on-site visit report;

(D) the school improvement plan;

(E) data relating to continuous improvement of student performance in each area targeted for improvement; and

(F) data relating to the school's performance in state standards not targeted for improvement. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Dec. 27, 1996; amended Aug. 27, 1999.)




