Request for Comments

The following ICFsMR cost center limits are being set forth for public comment. Comments should be sent to Brian Bolen, Program Administrator, Community Supports and Services, 10th Floor, Docking State Office Building, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, 66612. The comment period will expire 30 days from the publication of this notice.

K.A.R. 30-10-214 provides for the annual review and adjustment of Class II ICFsMR cost center limits, approved by the secretary of SRS or designee, based on current cost information supplied by the enrolled, licensed providers of ICF-MR services, and formula set forth in the Kansas State Medicaid Plan (Attachment 4.19-D, Part II, Subpart O, page 1). The formula is as follows: Total allowable costs, including an inflation factor, are compared to the amount to be reimbursed under the current limits. The formula threshold requires that 60 percent of all ICFsMR are reimbursed 90 percent of their allowable costs. If less than 60 percent of the facilities are reimbursed 90 percent of their allowable costs, then the cost center limits are adjusted until the threshold is met. The inflation factor is based on the Data Resources, Inc. (DRI)-WEFA, National Skilled Nursing Facility Total Market Basket Index.

To determine where to make the adjustments, two major cost centers are analyzed according to the following prescription:

- Administrative costs are based on facility size.
- Habilitation costs are based on facility size and level of care (LOC).

The cost analysis for 2005 showed that 89 percent of the Class II ICFsMR were being reimbursed 90 percent or more of their allowable costs. Per the state plan the analysis indicates that adjustments are not required.

Recommendations

Based on cost report analysis and available funding, cost center limits for Class II ICFsMR will remain as follows:

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Wednesday, November 30, in the third floor conference room, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Deletria Nash, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, 66612-1678, via facsimile at (785) 291-3673, or via e-mail at dnash@ksinsurance.org. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. A summary of the regulations and their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 40-7-5. Agents; signatures; powers of attorney; rubber-stamped facsimiles; mechanical devices. This proposed regulation defines acceptable uses of authorizing signatures and facsimile signatures by agents. The changes to K.A.R. 40-7-5 are technical only.

There is no economic impact on insurers, consumers, the Kansas Insurance Department, and other governmental agencies, if any.

K.A.R. 40-7-7. Agents; resident procedure for obtaining company certification. This proposed regulation defines the procedure for resident agents to obtain licenses and company certification. The primary changes include the deletion of the procedures for obtaining a license. The remaining regulation now addresses the procedure for obtaining company certification only, while the remaining changes to K.A.R. 40-7-7 are technical.

There is no economic impact on insurers, consumers, the Kansas Insurance Department, and other governmental agencies, if any.

K.A.R. 40-7-7a. This regulation provides the procedure for nonresident agents to obtain a license and company certification.

The proposed revocation of this regulation would have minimal impact on insurance agents, insurance companies, the Kansas Insurance Department, other governmental agencies, and consumers.

K.A.R. 40-7-9. Agents; change in the information contained on the most recent application for a license. This proposed regulation defines when agents must file a report with the Commissioner of Insurance for actions taken against them or for changes in their information. The changes to K.A.R. 40-7-9 are technical only.

There is no economic impact on insurers, consumers, the Kansas Insurance Department, and other governmental agencies, if any.

K.A.R. 40-7-20a. Agents; continuing education; approval of courses; requirements. This proposed regulation defines terms that are used in the regulation; requirements for receiving approval for, and credit for, continuing education units; and penalties for providing false information in connection with continuing education units.

The proposed changes include clarifying the types of courses that are required. Specific changes include removing the prohibition of courses that primarily impart knowledge of specific products of specific companies if the course relates to sales promotions or marketing of the products, removing the requirement that a listing of approved courses be made available to the public upon request, and revising requirements for instructors. The remaining changes to K.A.R. 40-7-20a are technical only.

There is little or no economic impact on insurers, consumers, the Kansas Insurance Department, and other governmental agencies, if any.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, November 16, in the main conference room, Kansas Department of Commerce, Suite 100, Curtis State Office Building, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of regulations administering portions of the City Development and Redevelopment Finance Act, K.S.A. 12-1770 et seq., which provides cities the authority to issue special obligation bonds to finance certain development or redevelopment projects which bonds are payable from a pledge of the revenue received by the city from any transient guest, state and local sales and local use taxes collected from taxpayers doing business within that portion of the city's redevelopment district occupied by a redevelopment project, subject to approval by the Secretary of Commerce.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments before the hearing to Howard Fricke, Secretary of Commerce, Suite 100, Curtis State Office Building, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612-1354. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on these regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least 10 working days in advance of the hearing by contacting John L. Yeary at (785) 296-1913. Vehicles with a handicapped license plate or handicapped placard may park in any metered space around the building, and there is no charge for parking. The curbs and all entrances on Jackson, 10th Street, and Kansas Avenue to the Curtis State Office Building are accessible to individuals with disabilities.

A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 110-9-1. Definitions. This regulation defines key terms in the regulations.

K.A.R. 110-9-2. Special bond project plan; additional documentation. This regulation notifies STAR Bond applicants of the documentation that must be provided to the Secretary of Commerce in applying for approval to issue STAR Bonds.

K.A.R. 110-9-3. Certain findings; timing. This regulation provides that in the event a finding by the secretary is required under K.S.A. 12-1774(a)(1)(D) and amendments thereto, the finding shall be made by the secretary within 60 days of the submission of the information required by K.A.R. 110-9-2 by the city to the secretary; the finding shall be published in the Kansas Register within 30 days after being made by the secretary; and a copy of the finding shall be mailed to the appropriate city clerk.

K.A.R. 110-9-4. Secretary's review. This regulation provides that upon completion of the secretary's review of each special bond project plan, each applicant shall receive a written response containing a determination or seeking further information.

K.A.R. 110-9-5. Due diligence. This regulation requires applicants explore the background and financial viability of the principals involved in the development of the project and disclose such information to the secretary.

K.A.R. 110-9-6. Major commercial entertainment and tourism area; criteria. This regulation identifies the criteria utilized by the secretary to determine whether a proposed project constitutes a major commercial entertainment and tourism area.

K.A.R. 110-9-7. Annual report. This regulation identifies information to be included in annual status reports required to be filed with the secretary, in addition to that information already identified in statute.

K.A.R. 110-9-8. Bond payments; subsequent special bond projects. This regulation requires each bond trustee to distribute STAR Bond revenues upon receipt of said revenues by the trustee from the Kansas Department of Revenue. The regulation also provides that a city that has received STAR Bond funding shall not receive additional STAR Bond funding for any subsequent special bond project in the same redevelopment district without first receiving approval for each subsequent special bond project from the secretary.

It is anticipated that at least one employee of the Department of Commerce will be required to review applications, requests for approval of expenses, audit reports and project status reports; make recommendations to the secretary; and compile information necessary to prepare annual reports to the Governor, Kansas Inc., and the Legislature. Costs to the department will include staff time spent on these activities. The cost to the Department of Commerce is estimated to be approximately \$20,000. The department does not anticipate the need to hire additional employees.

Cities that seek the secretary's approval to issue special obligation bonds payable from revenues described by subsections (a)(1)(D) and (a)(1)(G) of K.S.A. 12-1774, and amendments thereto, and the principals involved in the development of projects financed with such bonds will bear the costs and be affected by the proposed rules and regulations. Specifically, said parties will incur the costs of obtaining, preparing, submitting and maintaining the

documentation and due diligence information required by the proposed rules and regulations that is in addition to requirements imposed by statute. The department cannot reliably estimate the costs required as such costs will vary considerably depending on the scope of various projects. The department considers the methods proposed to be the least costly and intrusive methods necessary to achieve the stated purpose of the rules and regulations in order to meet the department's and the secretary's statutory obligations.

The Kansas Assistive Technology Cooperative (KATCO) announces the availability of a grant award to fund up to two telework pilot sites. Successful applicants will develop strategies for persons with disabilities to obtain and maintain telework employment. Applicants must provide a 1:1 cash match.

Background

KATCO is managed by persons with disabilities to empower individuals and their families in their quest to achieve independence and self-reliance through assistive technology and economic power. Under the Telework Fund Program CFDA #84-235T, KATCO is to provide access to assistive technology and financing to qualified applicants so persons with disabilities can work as "an employee or a contractor or to become self-employed on a full-time or part-time basis from home or other remote sites."

Eligibility for a Telework Pilot Site Grant

Disability organizations, 501(c)(3) organizations, or individuals are eligible to apply.

Definition of Telework

Telework is work that can be performed effectively from home or from other remote sites (telework centers) away from an office. Telework is when an employee—whether employed by a business, industry or both, or someone who is self-employed—produces a product from a distance and delivers that product to another location via telephone, fax or the Internet. For example, an accountant can, through the use of information and communication technologies, provide accounting and financial documents to a customer outside of the state.

Goals of the Grant

The short-term goal of the grant is to develop and implement strategies that assist people with disabilities to increase telework employment opportunities and competitive employment outcomes through telework settings as employees of businesses or as self-employed workers. The long-term goal is to help identify persons with disabilities who are employed or are likely to be employed in telework settings and finance equipment that will assist them in meeting their employment goals.

Expectations of the Pilot Sites:

1. Identify target markets of both employers and workers.
2. Establish and implement a strategy or strategies to develop telework employment opportunities (identify employers) both within and outside of Kansas.
3. Establish and implement a strategy or strategies to regularly identify potential telework employees.

4. Develop and implement strategies to locate and recruit employers willing to provide telework employment.
5. Develop a process of matching potential workers with interested telework employers.
6. Identify and establish self-employment, telework opportunities for persons with disabilities.
7. Develop a tracking system that measures activities and outcomes. Specific outcomes measures include:
 - a. Total number of people employed.
 - b. Breakdown in employment full time and part time.
 - c. Industry where employment takes place.
 - d. Resource used to find employment: name of resource(s), type of resource(s), amount of time that each resource(s) used to place, etc.
 - e. Number of referrals to KATCO Loan Program.

Proposal Review

When reviewing each proposal, KATCO will consider the following factors:

1. The ability of the applicant to identify key markets for both employers and employees.
2. The ability of the applicant to comprehensively plan and coordinate telework employment opportunities.
3. The creative use of community and, when necessary, state-wide resources.
4. The ability of the applicant to establish and manage timelines, provide timely reports, and evaluate outcomes.
5. Extra points will be made available to programs working with an established telecenter(s).

Proposal Requirements

1. Completion of the cover sheet.
2. A description of the program and its association with the targeted populations and/or the priorities of the pilot.
3. An outline of the pilot's proposed goals and objectives with timelines based upon the expectations of the pilot sites.
4. Reasonably calculated budget designed to meet the proposed goals and objectives (include the 12-month budget, staff background, FTE and operating costs).
5. Any unique qualifications of the pilot site.

Proposal Procedure

All proposals are due by October 1. KATCO staff, KATCO board members and external partners will review each proposal. Announcement of the selected sites will be made within four weeks of submission date.

The estimated range of awards is \$10,000 to \$20,000.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views orally regarding the adoption of the proposed rules and regulations. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed rules and regulations and related economic impact statements in an accessible format. The proposed rules and regulations are requested for permanent adoption. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 7-43-1. Definitions. This proposed regulation defines the terms used in Article 43, which includes regulations on electronic notarizations.

K.A.R. 7-43-2. Registration requirements. This regulation prescribes the registration requirements for an electronic notary. This regulation requires a person who wants to become an electronic notary to complete a course approved by the Secretary of State; pass an examination approved by the Secretary of State; provide proof of instruction and examination to the Secretary of State when submitting the prescribed registration form; and paying a \$20 registration fee. The \$20 registration fee will have a minor economic impact on those individuals who want to become e-notaries. This registration fee will cover the administrative costs incurred by the Secretary of State from processing e-notary applications.

K.A.R. 7-43-3. Notarization of electronic signature. This regulation prescribes an electronic notary's duties when performing an electronic notarization. This regulation requires an electronic notary to complete a notarial certificate and attach it to the electronic document when performing an electronic notarization. This regulation also requires an electronic notary to take reasonable steps to ensure that the digital certificate used to create the electronic signature is valid. There is no anticipated economic impact on state agencies or the general public.

K.A.R. 7-43-4. Personal appearance requirement. This regulation prohibits an electronic notary from performing an electronic notarization if the principal does not personally appear before the electronic notary at the time of notarization. There is no significant economic impact on state agencies or the general public.

K.A.R. 7-43-5. Form of evidence of authenticity of electronic notarial act. This regulation provides that if evidence of the authenticity of an electronic notarization being transmitted to another state or nation is required, the evidence will be attached to the electronic document in a form prescribed by the Secretary of State. There is no anticipated economic impact on state agencies or the general public.

K.A.R. 7-43-6. Applicability of statutes. This regulation provides that the provisions of K.S.A. 53-101 et seq., governing notaries public, and the provisions K.S.A. 16-1601, governing electronic transactions, apply to each electronic notary. There is no significant economic impact on state agencies or the general public.

Article 42.—CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS

7-42-1. Charitable organizations; registration. (a) Any charitable organization required to register with the secretary of state may use the unified registration statement (URS) prescribed by the multi-state filer project in lieu of the secretary of state’s registration form. The URS shall include all information required by K.S.A. 17-1763, and amendments thereto.

(b) Each charitable organization that provides copies of its income tax returns to the secretary of state shall include only those sections of the returns that are open for public inspection and shall not include any list of contributor names. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 17-1763; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)

7-42-2. Professional fund raisers; registration. (a) Each professional fund raiser that purposefully directs its fund raising efforts to citizens of this state shall register with the secretary of state. The application for registration shall include the following information:

- (1) The legal name and any other names used by the professional fund raiser;
- (2) the address of the professional fund raiser’s principal place of business;
- (3) the address, if any, of the professional fund raiser’s office or location in the state of Kansas;
- (4) the type of organization: sole proprietorship, corporation, partnership, or other business entity;
- (5) the names and addresses of the officers, directors, partners, members, or other persons holding management positions; and
- (6) the names of any other states where the professional fund raiser is registered for charitable solicitations.

(b) The professional fund raiser shall attach an operating statement for each charitable organization for which the fund raiser solicits. The operating statement shall provide the name and address of the charitable organization and specify the actual or expected dates on which fund raising activity will be conducted for the charitable organization.

(c) If the professional fund raiser is employed or otherwise engaged by a charitable organization for fund raising after the professional fund raiser has filed its annual registration, the professional fund raiser shall file an operating statement for that charitable organization before beginning its fund raising activity for that charitable organization.

(d) The professional fund raiser shall sign the application under penalty of perjury. (Authorized by K.S.A. 17-1763; implementing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 17-1764; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)

7-42-3. Professional fund raisers; annual report. (a) Each professional fund raiser shall file an annual report with the secretary of state on or before July 31 each year, reflecting the professional fund raiser’s solicitation activ-

ities that occurred on and after July 1 of the previous year through the following June 30. The annual report of each professional fund raiser shall provide the following information:

(1) The legal name and any other names used by the professional fund raiser;

(2) the address of the professional fund raiser's principal place of business;

(3) the name and address of each charitable organization for which the professional fund raiser solicited funds;

(4) a description of the fund raising methods used by the professional fund raiser;

(5) the name, address, and registration number of each professional solicitor employed by the professional fund raiser and the name of each charitable organization for which the professional solicitor solicited; and

(6) financial information on each charitable organization for which the professional fund raiser solicited, including the following:

(A) The gross receipts received for each charitable organization;

(B) the itemized expenses of the professional fund raiser;

(C) the net proceeds or revenue received by the fund raiser for each charitable organization;

(D) the net proceeds given to the charitable organization; and

(E) the fees or profits given to the professional fund raiser.

(b) An authorized agent of the professional fund raiser shall sign the annual report under penalty of perjury. (Authorized by K.S.A. 17-1763; implementing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 17-1764; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)

7-42-4. Professional solicitors; registration. (a) Each application for registration as a professional solicitor shall provide the following information:

(1) The name and address of the professional solicitor;

Article 30.—WATER WELL CONTRACTOR'S LICENSE; WATER WELL CONSTRUCTION AND ABANDONMENT

EQUUS BEDS GROUNDWATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT NO. 2

28-30-200. Definitions. In addition to the definitions in K.A.R. 28-30-2, the following definitions shall apply to the Equus Beds groundwater management district no. 2:

(a) "Bedrock" means shale, limestone, sandstone, siltstone, anhydrite, gypsum, salt, or other consolidated rock that can occur at the surface or underlie unconsolidated material.

(b) "Board" means the board of directors constituting the governing body of the Equus Beds groundwater management district no. 2.

(c) "Borehole" means any hole that is drilled, cored, bored, washed, driven, dug, or otherwise excavated, in which the casing and screen have been removed or in which the casing has not been installed.

(d) "Contaminate" means to engage in any act or omission causing the addition or introduction of substances to freshwater in concentrations that alter the physical, chemical, biological, or radiological properties of the freshwater, making the water unfit for beneficial use.

(e) "District" means the Equus Beds groundwater management district no. 2, which is organized for groundwater management purposes pursuant to K.S.A. 82a-1020 et seq., and amendments thereto.

(f) "Fluid" means any material or substance that flows or moves in a semisolid, liquid, sludge, gas, or any other form or state.

(g) "Free-fall" means a method used to place grout in a water well or borehole that meets all of the following conditions:

(1) The total grouting depth below ground level does not exceed 75 feet.

(2) The grouting interval is free of fluids.

(3) The diameter of the water well casing or borehole is sufficient to allow the unobstructed flow of grout throughout the entire grouting interval.

(4) Grout is poured or discharged into the water well or borehole at a controlled rate.

(h) "Fresh groundwater" means water containing not more than 1,000 milligrams of total dissolved solids per liter and 500 milligrams of chloride per liter.

(i) "Grout" has the meaning specified in K.A.R. 28-30-2.

(j) "Grout seal" means grout that is installed, placed, pumped, or injected to create a permanent, impervious watertight bond in a well casing, annular space, geologic unit, or any other apertures or apparatuses associated with a water well or borehole.

(k) "Inactive well" means a water well that meets the following conditions:

- (1) Is not operational;
- (2) is properly constructed as specified in K.A.R. 28-30-5 or K.A.R. 28-30-6;
- (3) is equipped with a watertight seal; and
- (4) is maintained in good repair until the water well is returned to service as an active water well.

(l) "Licensed geologist" means a geologist licensed to practice geology in Kansas by the Kansas board of technical professions.

(m) "Licensed professional engineer" means a professional engineer licensed to practice engineering in Kansas by the Kansas board of technical professions.

(n) "Monitoring well" means a water well used to monitor, obtain, or collect hydrologic, geologic, geophysical, chemical, or other technical data pertaining to groundwater, surface water, or other hydrologic conditions.

(o) "Test borehole" means a borehole used to obtain or collect hydrologic, geologic, geophysical, chemical, or other technical data pertaining to groundwater, surface water, or other hydrologic conditions by means of placing sampling, logging, testing, casing, screen, or associated tools or equipment in the borehole for fewer than 30 days. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 82a-1028 and K.S.A. 82a-1213; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)

28-30-201. Plugging operations; notification; report. (a) All plugging operations shall be supervised by one of the following:

- (1) A water well contractor licensed by the department;
- (2) a licensed professional engineer or licensed geologist; or
- (3) the water well or borehole owner, or the landowner of the property on which the water well or borehole is located.

(b) Each water well or borehole owner, or the landowner of the property on which the water well or borehole is located, shall notify the district within 48 hours before any plugging operations occur.

(c) Within 30 days after the plugging operation is completed, one of the following requirements shall be met:

(1) The water well contractor, licensed professional engineer, or licensed geologist that supervised the water well or borehole plugging operations shall submit a completed report of the work on the department's plugging record form WWC-5P or WWC-5 to the department, the district, and the landowner.

(2) The water well or borehole owner, or the landowner of the property on which the water well or borehole is located, shall submit a completed report of the work on the department's plugging record form WWC-5P or WWC-5 to the department and the district. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 82a-1028 and K.S.A. 82a-1213; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)

28-30-202. Plugging operations for an abandoned water well or borehole; responsibility. (a) Each water well or borehole shall be considered abandoned if at least one of the following conditions exists:

- (1) The water well or borehole was not completed.
- (2) The water well or borehole threatens to contaminate fresh groundwater.

(3) The water well or borehole poses a safety or health hazard.

(4) Uncontrolled fluid flow is encountered or present in the water well or borehole.

(5) The use of the water well or borehole has ceased.

(6) The borehole testing, sampling, or other operations are completed within 30 days of completion of the borehole drilling.

(7) The water well or borehole owner has not demonstrated the intention to use the water well or borehole.

(8) The water well can not be maintained in an active or inactive status.

(9) The water well or borehole is not operational or functional for the intended use.

(b) Each water well or borehole owner or the landowner of the property shall plug or cause an abandoned water well or borehole to be plugged as required in subsection (c) of this regulation.

(c) Except as specified in subsection (e), the minimum plugging operations for an abandoned water well or borehole shall include the following:

(1) Before plugging operations begin, the following water well or borehole data shall be recorded as follows:

(A) The legal description of the water well or borehole location, to the nearest 10-acre tract and, if available, the geographic coordinates consisting of the latitude, longitude, and base datum;

(B) the diameter of the water well or borehole;

(C) the static water level; and

(D) the total depth of the water well or borehole.

(2) The materials used to plug a water well or borehole shall be clean, free of defects, properly prepared, and installed according to the manufacturer's specifications.

(3) All plugging material that forms a bridge, entraps air or other fluids, or forms a blockage in the water well or borehole shall be freed or removed before continuing plugging operations.

(4) All pumping, sampling, logging, and related equipment and any other material or debris in the water well or borehole shall be removed from the water well or borehole.

(5) The annular space of the water well shall be grouted as specified in K.A.R. 28-30-203.

(6) Before plugging operations begin and when plugging operations are suspended or interrupted, the opening of the water well or borehole shall be secured to prevent fluids from entering the water well or borehole.

(7) Before placement of any plugging material, the water well or borehole shall be disinfected as specified in K.A.R. 28-30-205.

(8) Except as specified in subsection (d) of this regulation, all of the following minimum grouting requirements shall be met:

(A) The water well or borehole shall be grouted from the bottom to three feet below ground level.

(B) Each water well meeting the requirements of subsection (d) shall be grouted from the top of the sand or gravel plugging material to three feet below ground level.

(C) Grout shall be placed in the water well or borehole using one of the following:

(i) A grout tremie pipe;

(continued)

(ii) free-fall; or
 (iii) a grouting procedure recommended by the grout manufacturer.

(D) Grout shall be allowed to cure as recommended by the grout manufacturer.

(9) Except as required by K.A.R. 28-30-203, the water well casing shall be cut off at a minimum of three feet below land surface and removed.

(10) From three feet below land surface to land surface, the water well or borehole shall be backfilled with clean, compacted topsoil and sloped so that drainage or runoff is directed away from the plugged water well or borehole.

(d) Any water well or borehole owner, landowner of the property, water well contractor, licensed geologist, or licensed professional engineer may utilize coarse sand or fine gravel to plug a water well by filling the water well casing to the static water level or six feet below ground level, whichever is the greater distance below ground level, if both of the following water well conditions are present:

(1) The water well is cased.

(2) The water well is completed in a single unconfined aquifer.

(e) Drill cuttings from the original borehole may be used to plug a borehole that meets all of the following conditions:

(1) The depth of the borehole is less than the highest historical groundwater level.

(2) The depth of the borehole is 25 feet or less below ground level.

(3) The borehole is not located in a contaminated area. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 82a-1028 and K.S.A. 82a-1213; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)

28-30-203. Annular space grouting procedures. (a) Each water well or borehole owner or landowner of the property with an abandoned water well that was constructed on or after May 1, 1983 shall have the water well's annular space grouted as follows:

(1) From three feet below ground level to a minimum of 20 feet below ground level; or

(2) below the point at which a pitless well adapter attaches to the well casing to a minimum of 20 feet below the pitless well adapter.

(b) The annular space of each abandoned water well in which the water well was constructed before May 1, 1983 shall be grouted as follows:

(1) If the annular space does not contain grout or gravel pack and is free of debris, the grout shall be placed in the annular space in the following manner:

(A) From three feet below ground level to 20 feet below ground level; or

(B) below the point at which a pitless well adapter attaches to the well casing to a minimum of 20 feet below the pitless well adapter.

(2) If the annular space contains gravel pack or other material, all of the following requirements shall be met:

(A) The well casing shall be removed to a depth of four feet below ground level.

(B) The annular space shall be freed of gravel pack, any other material, and fluid from the top of the casing to six feet below the top of the well casing.

(C) The grout shall be placed in the annular space from six feet below the top of the well casing to one foot above the top of the well casing.

(c) From three feet below ground level to ground level, the water well or borehole shall be backfilled with clean, compacted topsoil and sloped so that the drainage or runoff is directed away from the plugged water well or borehole.

(d) If groundwater is encountered at a depth less than the minimum grouting requirement, the annular space grouting requirement may be modified by requesting a variance from the district as specified in K.A.R. 28-30-208. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 82a-1028 and K.S.A. 82a-1213; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)

28-30-204. Inactive well; application; construction and extension. (a) Each owner of an inactive water well shall meet the following requirements:

(1) Submit a completed, signed, and notarized inactive water well agreement, on a form provided by the district, to the district manager 30 days before placing the well on inactive status. The form shall include a statement that the water well does not pose a public health or safety hazard and does not threaten to contaminate the groundwater;

(2) remove all pumping equipment from the water well;

(3) construct the water well and the annular space as specified in K.A.R. 28-30-6;

(4) seal and maintain the water well and the annular space to prohibit the entrance of surface fluids and materials and the vertical movement of subsurface water into the well and to prevent damage;

(5) post a sign that meets the following conditions within three feet of the water well:

(A) Has a minimum height of three feet above land surface;

(B) is easily visible;

(C) is continually maintained; and

(D) is constructed with the words "Inactive Water Well" and a legal description consisting of the 10-acre tract, section, township, and range description printed legibly; and

(6) securely install a watertight seal or cap on the water well casing opening a minimum of one foot above land surface that consists of one of the following:

(A) Steel plating that is a minimum of 1/4 inch thick and is welded to the casing opening;

(B) a polyvinylchloride cap glued to the water well casing opening, with a minimum standard dimension ratio (SDR) of 21 or less on well casing less than four inches in diameter and a minimum SDR of 26 or less on well casing four or more inches in diameter. The SDR shall be calculated by dividing the casing's outside diameter (OD) by its minimum wall thickness (MWT); or

(C) any other seal or cap that is approved by the district manager.

(b) Each water well owner shall repair all damage to the water well within 30 days, unless the district manager determines that the water well poses a public health or safety hazard, in which case the district manager shall set the time period for fewer than 30 days.

(c) Each water well owner shall notify the district within 30 days after the water well is returned to service as an active water well.

(d) The district manager or a staff member of the district may inspect any inactive water well.

(e) Each water well owner shall be responsible for properly maintaining the water well in the inactive status.

(f) A radius of 50 feet around the inactive well shall be free of contamination.

(g) An inactive water well shall not be used for disposal or injection of any fluids or materials.

(h) Each inactive water well shall be easily accessible for routine maintenance and inspection.

(i) Each water well owner shall notify the district manager of any change in the condition of the water well.

(j) Each inactive water well that does not meet the requirements of these regulations shall be deemed abandoned and shall be plugged in accordance with these regulations.

(k) The expiration date of the inactive water well period may be extended beyond the date authorized in the approved inactive water well agreement or the date of any extension authorized by the district manager, if the water well is in good repair and meets the requirements of these regulations. The extension of time shall not exceed one year beyond the expiration date of the inactive well agreement or the date of any authorized extension.

(l) Each approved inactive water well request and each approved extension of time shall be reported by the district to the department, in writing, within 30 days of approval on a form provided by the district. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 82a-1028 and K.S.A. 82a-1213; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)

28-30-205. Disinfection of an abandoned water well or borehole. (a) Except as specified in subsection (b), the following minimum quantities of sodium hypochlorite with 5.25 percent to 6.0 percent strength, manufactured under trade names including Clorox, Purex, Sno-White, and Topco, and other bleach products with similar properties, shall be used to disinfect each abandoned water well or borehole:

(b) Any concentration of sodium hypochlorite not specified in subsection (a) or any combination of calcium hypochlorite may be used to disinfect an abandoned water well or borehole, if a minimum concentration of 100 milligrams of chlorine solution per liter per foot of water column in the water well or borehole is produced. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 82a-1028 and K.S.A. 82a-1213; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)

28-30-206. Administrative appeal to the board. (a) Any owner of a water well or borehole or any person whose legal rights, duties, privileges, immunities, or other legal interests are affected by an order issued by the district may request an appeal hearing with the board.

(b) The request for hearing shall be filed with the board within 30 days after service of the order on the owner or owners of the water well or borehole or any person whose legal rights, duties, privileges, immunities, or other legal interests are affected by the order. The request for hearing shall state the basis for requesting a hearing and shall be accompanied by documentation supporting the request.

(c) During the hearing, the board may take into consideration any relevant information or data, including information and data from any person whose legal rights, duties, privileges, immunities, or other legal interests may be affected by the order.

(d) After consideration of all information and data presented, the board shall issue one of the following:

(1) An order remanding the case to the district manager with instructions for additional investigation; or

(2) a final order that contains findings of fact and conclusions of law.

(e) Within 15 days of the service of a final order, the owner or owners of the water well or borehole or any person whose legal rights, duties, privileges, immunities, or other legal interests are affected may file a written petition for reconsideration to the board. The petition for reconsideration shall state the basis and contain any facts and conclusions of law that are in dispute.

(f) The board shall render a written order denying the petition for reconsideration, granting the petition for reconsideration and modifying the final order, or granting the petition for reconsideration and setting the matter for further proceedings. After further proceedings, the petition for reconsideration may be denied or granted in whole or in part.

(g) Unless clear and convincing evidence is presented to the board, the board shall not render a written order if the order would result in any of the following:

(1) The impairment of an existing groundwater use;

(2) an adverse effect on public health, safety, or the environment;

(3) the threat of groundwater contamination;

(4) an adverse effect on the public interest; or

(5) the impairment of the board's ability to apply and enforce these regulations or the management program specified in K.S.A. 82a-1029, and amendments thereto.

(h) Any owner or owners or any person whose legal rights, duties, privileges, immunities, or other legal interests are affected by a final order or order rendered upon reconsideration may seek judicial review pursuant to the

(continued)

act for judicial review and civil enforcement of agency actions specified in K.S.A. 77-601 et seq., and amendment thereto.

(i) Each order issued by the board shall be mailed to the owner or owners; any person whose legal rights, duties, privileges, immunities, or other legal interests are affected by the order; and the department. Service shall be deemed complete upon mailing. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 82a-1028; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)

28-30-207. Variance; extension of time. (a) If an individual or party wants a variance from any of the regulations contained in K.A.R. 28-30-200 through K.A.R. 28-30-206 or an extension of time pursuant to K.A.R. 28-30-204, the individual or party shall submit a request, in writing, to the district.

(1) Each request shall include the following:

(A) The name, address, telephone number, and contact person of the individual or party requesting the variance or extension of time;

(B) the specific legal description of the site location to which the variance or extension of time would apply;

(C) the specific regulation from which the variance is sought or the amount of time requested; and

(D) the reason for requesting the variance or extension of time and any supporting data.

(2) A variance or extension of time may be granted by the district manager if the variance or extension is in keeping with the purposes of the Kansas groundwater exploration and protection act and the groundwater management district act.

(b) Each variance or extension of time granted by the district manager shall be reported by the district to the department within 30 days of approval.

(c) Each individual or party who wants an extension of time for the inactive water well period shall submit the request at least 30 days before the expiration date on a form provided by the district. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 82a-1028; effective Sept. 30, 2005.)
