WHEREAS, many states are suffering through this agricultural crisis, several states less affected have stepped up to offer assistance in the form of hay exportation; and

WHEREAS, the States of Oklahoma and Texas have issued executive orders on this topic to provide support; and

WHEREAS, the State of Oklahoma has requested assistance to expedite the delivery of hay to their state to ease the suffering experienced during this drought.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby declare because there is a state of emergency existing in the State of Kansas due to extremely dry weather and the lack of significant rainfall, it is necessary to assist and expedite all efforts of drought relief. In order to accommodate this need and to provide assistance to the citizens of Kansas in this extreme situation, I hereby order the temporary suspension of the following as they apply to motor vehicles used in the support efforts:

1. The requirements for special permits for use of over-size or overweight vehicles pursuant to K.S.A. 8-1911 for the transportation of round baled hay; and
2. The requirements for licensing/operating authority as required by the Kansas Corporation Commission; and
3. The requirements contained in the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations, CFR 49, Parts 390-399 under the authority of CFR 49, Part 390.23. All other regulations in CFR 49 shall apply.

This temporary order shall terminate at the end of thirty (30) days.

Kansas Medicaid has submitted a state plan change to the Medicaid disproportionate share program that is proposed to be effective with the publication of this notice. This change includes primarily technical corrections and clarifications that have no substantive impact on the disproportionate share program. The plan provides more detail on the computations used for the low income determination that breaks out inpatient and outpatient. There are updates on Medicare cost report citations. The timing of the reporting used for DSH is changed in the plan to correspond to what the KHPA has been doing. The KHPA has eliminated some obsolete sections. A portion of the state plan was duplicated both as narrative and as a form. The form is being eliminated since this is entirely within the narrative. The impact of these proposed changes is expected to be minimal.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday, November 22, at the office of the State Corporation Commission, 130 S. Market, Room 2078, Wichita, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations for the conservation of crude oil and natural gas.

This 60-day notice period from the date of this publication to the date of the public hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. Comments may be submitted to John McCannon, Assistant General Counsel, State Corporation Commission, Room 2078, Finney State Office Building, 130 S. Market, Wichita, 67202.

Any person requiring special accommodations under the Americans with Disabilities Act needs to give notice to the commission at least 10 days prior to the scheduled hearing date.

Copies of the proposed regulations and the economic impact statements may be obtained at the Wichita address or from the commission's Web site at www.kcc.state.ks.us. Persons requesting a copy of the proposed regulations and economic impact statements, in accordance with K.S.A. 45-129, will be required to compensate the commission for the cost of reproduction.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views orally or in writing in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations.

All written or oral comments submitted by interested parties on or before November 22 will be considered by the commission as a basis for making changes to these proposed permanent regulations.

The following is a brief summary of the proposed regulations and economic impact statements:

K.A.R. 82-3-101. This regulation contains definitions used in Conservation Division regulations. The amendment to this regulation adds a definition of coalbed natural gas.

Economic Impact Statement: The amendment to this regulation will have no direct economic impact on the agency, industry, other governmental agencies or the general public.

K.A.R. 82-3-206 and K.A.R. 82-3-307. These regulations establish the amount of the assessment on crude oil or petroleum, and gas, respectively, and the manner in which the assessment should be calculated and remitted to the Conservation Division. The substantive amendments increase the amounts of the assessments, but do not change the method for calculating or remitting the assessment to the Conservation Division. Because the assessments are made on the volume of oil or gas, which are declining natural resources, the amount of the assessment is adjusted periodically to maintain and stabilize the funding for the Conservation Division. The amendments also contain wording changes for clarification.

Economic Impact Statement: The amendments to these regulations will have an economic impact on the agency by providing adequate funding for regulatory oversight. The amendment is projected to maintain the agency's current level of funding with estimated increases in salaries and wages of 3 percent and in operating expenses of 5 percent. The amendments also will have an economic impact on the regulated industry. The amount of the assessment on each unit of oil and gas will increase, thus the impact on each operator will be directly related to the amount of oil or gas it produces. The amendments to these regulations will have no direct economic impact on other governmental agencies or the general public.

K.A.R. 82-3-305. This regulation contains the requirements for metering of gas when it is produced or sold. The amendment to this regulation requires operators to test and calibrate the metering devices that are used and sets out the monetary penalty for failure to comply with the regulation.

Economic Impact Statement: The amendment to this regulation may have a slight economic impact on the industry due to the costs of calibrating and testing the gas meters; however, most operators are already testing and calibrating their meters. This amendment will have no economic impact on the agency, other governmental agencies or the general public.

The amendments to this regulation also contain wording and sentence structure changes for clarification.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has reviewed an application from Westar Energy to develop an industrial landfill adjacent to the Lawrence Energy Center just north of Lawrence. The proposed landfill would occupy about 57 acres of a 240-acre Westar property to the north of North Iowa Street and Lakeview Road. The landfill would be used to dispose of coal combustion ash and would replace an existing landfill scheduled to close in 2007. The proposed landfill is estimated to have capacity for approximately 5.7 million cubic yards of waste disposal, with the period of active landfill operation estimated at 26 years. The bottom of the landfill is proposed at an approximate elevation of 852 feet above mean sea level (MSL) and the final landfill elevations will be approximately 992 feet above MSL. Douglas County has certified that the application described herein is consistent with surrounding land use. Douglas County has also certified that the application is consistent with the county's solid waste management plan. KDHE has reviewed the application and found it to be in conformance with the state solid waste statutes and regulations.

KDHE is providing public notice of its intent to issue a permit to Westar Energy for the proposed industrial landfill described herein. A copy of the administrative record, including the permit application, engineering drawings, draft permit and other information regarding this permit action, will be available for public review through October 23 during normal business hours at the following locations:

Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. Sunflower Electric Power Corporation (Sunflower) has applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to construct three new 700 MW coal-fired steam generating units and associated ancillary equipment (Holcomb expansion) at its generating station located in Holcomb. Emission of particulate matter (PM), PM equal to or less than 10 microns in diameter (PM₁₀), volatile organic compounds (VOCs), oxides of nitrogen (NOx), sulfur dioxide (SO₂), carbon monoxide (CO), elemental lead (Pb) and sulfuric acid mist (H₂SO₄) were evaluated during the permit review process.

The proposed permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, prevention of significant deterioration (PSD), which adopt the federal standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attainment areas are areas where the air quality meets or exceeds the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS).

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each pollutant for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to affect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each pollutant under review.

Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the proposed Holcomb expansion project indicates that the emission rate of oxides of nitrogen, sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, particulate matter, volatile organic compounds, lead and sulfuric acid mist all exceed the significance levels. Sunflower conducted the required BACT analyses. The department has reviewed Sunflower's BACT analyses and concurs with its findings that low NOx burners and overfire air with selective catalytic reduction is BACT for NOx, dry flue gas desulfurization (dry FGD) is BACT for SO₂ and H₂SO₄ and fabric filters is BACT for Pb, PM and PM₁₀ for the Holcomb expansion project.

An ambient impact analysis was performed on the air emissions of PM₁₀, NOx, SOx and CO from the Holcomb expansion project. The analysis demonstrated no significant impact on ambient air quality for Nox and CO. A more detailed analysis for SOx indicated that the emissions would not contribute to any violation of ambient air standards and, under worst case, demonstrated that 49.8 percent of the Class II increment for SO₂ was consumed. Detailed analysis showed PM₁₀ values would not contribute to any violation of ambient air standards but were above the Class II increment for PM₁₀ (30 ug/m³, 24 hour). All of these receptors that indicated the exceedance were outside of the significant impact area for the Hol-

comb expansion project. An analysis of visibility was conducted for the Great Sand Dunes National Monument, the closest federal Class I area at approximately 400 km to the west of the facility. The VISCREEN model results indicate no exceedances of the perceptibility or plume contrast either inside or outside of the Class I boundaries. Analysis of the Scott Lake Class II area, located approximately 80 km to the north, also was performed. Although some of the screening analysis were exceeded, no criteria have ever been established for a Class II area. No adverse impacts on soils and vegetation in the area were expected.

Any federal land manager who has reason to believe they may have a Class I area adversely impacted by the emissions from the proposed project has the opportunity to present KDHE with a demonstration of the adverse impact on the air quality-related values of the federal Class I area during the comment period.

A public comment period has been established until October 30 to allow citizens the opportunity to express any concerns they may have about this proposed permitting action. All comments should be submitted in writing to Rick Bolfig, Bureau of Air and Radiation, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, 66612-1366. Comments also may be presented at the public hearings.

A public hearing to receive comments on the proposed issuance of the draft air quality construction permit is scheduled at 7 p.m. October 24 in the County Commission Room, Finney County Office Building, 311 N. 9th St., Garden City. A second hearing on the proposed issuance of the draft air quality construction permit is scheduled for 9 a.m. October 26 in the Azure Room, fourth floor west, Curtis State Office Building, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Topeka. Accommodations will be available for individuals with language translation and special needs. Please notify Rick Bolfig, in writing, by October 18 as to the nature of the accommodation required and at which location the need exists.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation and all information relied upon during the permit application review process is available for public review for a period of 30 days from the date of publication during normal business hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., at the KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka; and a copy of the proposed permit can be reviewed at the KDHE Northwest District Office, 2301 E. 13th, Hays. A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Monday, November 27, in the Kansas Board of Regents' Kathy Rupp conference room, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 520, Topeka, to consider the adoption of new rules and regulations relating to the board's authority over "Qualified Admissions" (QA) at state universities.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comment on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Robin Kempf, Kansas Board of Regents, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 520, Topeka, 66612-1368, or rkempf@ksbor.org. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Robin Kempf at (785) 296-3689.

Copies of the regulations and the economic impact may be obtained by contacting Robin Kempf. A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 88-29-1 defines key terms for the regulations.

K.A.R. 88-29-2 defines the applicable scope of the regulations, specifically that the regulations apply only to undergraduate degree-seeking students unless otherwise expressly indicated.

K.A.R. 88-29-3 establishes new subcategories of admission, which state universities may adopt to manage their enrollment more effectively. Categories include regular admission, which is the only category that is mandatory; temporary admission, for students who have not completed their application file; provisional admission, for students who may be required to complete certain course work or meet other requirements during an educational probationary period; and conditional admission, for non-resident students subject to an educational probationary period during which the students must achieve a certain GPA in their postsecondary coursework.

K.A.R. 88-29-4 establishes the minimum requirements for the admission of students who have 24 or more transferable credit hours. Students must have obtained a minimum GPA in their postsecondary coursework to be admitted.

K.A.R. 88-29-5 establishes minimum admission standards for Kansas residents under age 21, that being graduation from an accredited high school and a score of 21 on the ACT, a class rank in the top third of the class or completion of an approved QA precollege curriculum with a 2.0 GPA on a 4.0 scale. Alternatively, a student may pass the GED with at least 2,550 points and a minimum score of 510 on each subtest.

K.A.R. 88-29-6 establishes minimum admission standards for Kansas residents age 21 or older. Those standards are that the applicant has graduated from an accredited high school or passed the GED with at least 2,550 points and a minimum score of 510 on each subtest.

K.A.R. 88-29-7 establishes minimum admission standards for nonresidents. Standards include graduation from an accredited high school and a score of 21 on the ACT, a class rank in the top third of the class or completion of an approved precollege QA curriculum with a 2.5 GPA on a 4.0 scale.

K.A.R. 88-29-8 describes how universities shall calculate the size of the "ten percent exception window," which is a method to admit a limited number of residents who do not meet minimum admission standards. Universities shall calculate 10 percent of all new students who have earned few than 30 transferable credit hours from a postsecondary institution, and exceptions to minimum admissions standards may not exceed that number.

K.A.R. 88-29-9 requires state universities to adopt admission policies, which are subject to board approval. The

regulation also lists mandatory provisions of such policies, such as a list of all materials required for a complete application policy and a description of who any subcategories of admissions will apply to.

K.A.R. 88-29-10 describes methods for state universities to use when evaluating applicants' qualifications. For example, the regulation states that a score of 980 on the SAT may be considered equivalent to a 21 on the ACT, and it describes how to convert letter grades or GPAs on alternative scales to a 4.0 scale.

K.A.R. 88-29-11 establishes minimum requirements for a high school's QA precollege curriculum, including one unit of computer technology, four units of English, three units of math, three units of natural science, and three units of social science.

K.A.R. 88-29-12 establishes a process by which accredited Kansas high schools can establish an approved QA precollege curriculum. To be approved, courses must meet the content requirements described in K.A.R. 88-29-13 through 88-29-17 and cover such content over an appropriate amount of class time.

K.A.R. 88-29-13 describes content requirements for a QA computer technology course.

K.A.R. 88-29-14 describes content requirements for QA English courses, including ninth-grade through twelfth-grade English.

K.A.R. 88-29-15 describes content requirements for QA mathematics, including algebra I, algebra II, geometry, and other more advanced courses.

K.A.R. 88-29-16 describes content requirements for QA natural science courses, including biology, advanced biology, chemistry, earth-space science, physics and principles of technology.

K.A.R. 88-29-17 describes content requirements for QA social science courses, including anthropology, current social issues, economics, U.S. government, U.S. history, international relations, psychology, race and ethnic relations, sociology, world geography and world history.

K.A.R. 88-29-18 establishes functional equivalents of the QA precollege curriculum for Kansas residents. These functional equivalents provide an alternative method by which residents can demonstrate equivalent academic achievement to the QA precollege curriculum, which includes coursework in postsecondary level courses or a score of 3 or higher on an advanced placement exam.

K.A.R. 88-29-19 establishes functional equivalents of the QA precollege curriculum for nonresidents. This regulation mirrors the previous, but sets slightly higher standards because nonresidents are required to get a higher GPA on the QA precollege curriculum than residents.

Economic Impact: The adoption of these regulations would result in no economic impact on any governmental agencies or units. Although processes may change slightly for the board, the state universities and Kansas high schools, functions addressed are already being handled by these agencies, and no increased cost is anticipated. Additionally, the general public would bear no costs with the adoption of these regulations.

K.A.R. 40-4-41. Utilization review organizations; application; definitions. The purpose of the proposed amendments is to reflect changes made by the American Accreditation Health Commission, a/k/a URAC. This is one of the major entities that accredits utilization review organizations nationally. These amendments also were made after consulting with the Utilization Review Advisory Committee. The amendments to this particular regulation define the terms that are included in other utilization review regulations and are used in the utilization review process.

Some of the definitions require individuals and entities that perform certain utilization review functions to possess certain credentials and be trained in utilization review procedures.

Definitions have been added and deleted to accurately reflect those services that are subject to regulations regarding utilization review organizations. Language within existing definitions have been changed to update current terminology. Other changes include the addition and deletion of statutory citations and technical changes.

The entities most impacted are utilization review organizations and health insurance carriers who perform utilization review activities and consumers of health insurance. The economic impact on those entities who per-

form utilization review functions is justified in the protection of Kansas consumers in that these definitions could require the entities that perform utilization functions to hire new personnel who meet these qualifications or provide additional training to existing personnel. This could result in additional costs. However, with the increase of managed care as a mechanism to deliver health care to consumers, many of these requirements are needed to safeguard consumers and ensure that they obtain the care that they need. There will be little or no economic impact on consumers, the Kansas Insurance Department and other governmental agencies.

K.A.R. 40-4-41c. Utilization review organizations; written procedures. The purpose of the proposed amendments is to reflect changes made by the American Accreditation Health Commission, a/k/a URAC. This is one of the major entities that accredits utilization review organizations nationally. These amendments also were made after consulting with the Utilization Review Advisory Committee. The amendments to this regulation set out the procedures and deadlines that utilization review organizations are to follow in conducting utilization reviews. This regulation also gives the provider one day to discuss the decision with the peer reviewer after receiving the decision. It also sets out who is to be notified of a utilization review decision and what information should be contained in that decision.

This regulation sets out the written procedures for some of the functions utilization review organizations shall have and maintain, and what elements, at a minimum, these written procedures should contain. This regulation sets out the requirements for written procedures for certain utilization review organization functions. These requirements could result in additional costs to the utilization review organizations in designing and implementing these written procedures. However, with the increase of managed care as a mechanism to deliver health care to consumers, these requirements are needed to safeguard consumers and ensure that they obtain the care that they need. The economic impact on those entities that perform utilization review functions is justified in the protection of Kansas consumers.

This regulation was not mandated by federal law. The entities most impacted are utilization review organizations and health insurance carriers that perform utilization review activities and consumers of health insurance.

K.A.R. 40-4-41d. Utilization review organizations; appeal procedures. The purpose of the proposed amendments is to reflect changes made by the American Accreditation Health Commission, a/k/a URAC. This is one of the major entities that accredits utilization review organizations nationally. These amendments also were made after consulting with the Utilization Review Advisory Committee. The amendments to this regulation set out the procedures and deadlines that utilization review organizations are to follow in conducting appeals of utilization review decisions. This regulation also gives the provider access to the reviewer who conducted the review a day after receiving the decision to discuss the decision with the reviewer. This regulation also sets out the credentials that reviewers are to have in conducting these appeals.

This regulation sets out requirements as to how utilization reviews appeals are to be conducted. This could result in additional costs to the utilization review organizations in training their personnel in what procedures need to be followed in conducting utilization reviews. Additional costs also could be incurred in having properly credentialed individuals on staff to conduct these appeals. However, with the increase of managed care as a mechanism to deliver health care to consumers, these requirements are needed to safeguard consumers and ensure that they obtain the care that they need. The economic impact on those entities that perform utilization review functions is justified in the protection of Kansas consumers.

This regulation was not mandated by federal law. The entities most impacted are utilization review organizations and health insurance carriers that perform utilization review activities and consumers of health insurance.

K.A.R. 40-4-29a. Same; renewability of individual hospital, medical, or surgical expense policy. The purpose of the proposed amendments is to specify information in regards to individual hospital, medical, or surgical expense policies for insureds who are eligible for Medicare. Section (a) prohibits termination of these policies if an insured wishes to continue coverage. Section (b) requires insurers to mail to its current individual medical policies who are approaching the age of 65 a notice informing policyholders of their rights under federal and state laws.

There will be little or no economic impact on insurance companies, consumers, the Kansas Insurance Department and other governmental agencies, if any.

K.A.R. 40-7-1. This regulation lists exceptions to the requirement that employees of insurance companies be licensed as insurance agents. The Kansas Insurance Department is proposing that this regulation be revoked because this regulation is no longer necessary.

The impact on companies, the Kansas Insurance Department and other governmental agencies is nonexistent.

K.A.R. 40-7-24. Agencies; agents; employees. This regulation specifies which agencies must have a licensed agent in its employ and the exceptions. The proposed change adds automobile rental products as an exception. The remaining changes to K.A.R. 40-7-24 are technical only.

There may be a positive economic impact on some business entities in that businesses that offer auto rental products will now be exempted from having a licensed insurance agent in its employ, while there may be a negative impact on agents. There will be little or no economic impact on consumers, the Kansas Insurance Department and other governmental agencies, if any.
