A public hearing will be conducted by the Kansas State Board of Mortuary Arts at 1:45 p.m. Thursday, January 11, in Room 904, Jayhawk Tower, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the approval and adoption of two amended regulations of the Kansas State Board of Mortuary Arts. The regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. This 60-day notice period prior to the hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed administrative regulations. Jackson, Topeka, 66603-3733. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the board as a basis for approving, amending and approving, or rejecting the proposed regulations. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

A summary of the proposed amended regulations and the economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 63-1-1. Definitions. This regulation is being amended to clarify existing definitions.

Economic Impact Summary: Amendments would result in no increased income to the board. Other governmental agencies and consumers would not be affected by this regulation.

K.A.R. 63-5-1. Definition of unprofessional or dishonorable conduct. This regulation is being amended to expand the existing definition of unprofessional or dishonorable conduct.

Economic Impact Summary: Amendments would result in no increased income to the board. Other governmental agencies and consumers would not be affected by this regulation.

Lueger is for a waste control system for a confined feeding facility with a capacity for up to 1,200 head (480 animal units) of swine weighing more than 55 pounds each. The proposed facility will be located in the Southwest Quarter of Section 24, Township 3 South, Range 13 East in Nemaha County. The public was informed of the availability of the proposed agricultural waste control permit for Kevin M. Lueger through Public Notice No. KS-AG-06-333 dated September 14, 2006.

The proposed permit for Dale Haverkamp is for a waste control system for a confined feeding facility with a capacity for up to 2,400 head (960 animal units) of swine weighing more than 55 pounds each. The proposed facility will be located in the Northwest Quarter of Section 4, Township 4 South, Range 14 East in Nemaha County. The public was informed of the availability of the proposed agricultural waste control permit for Dale Haverkamp through Public Notice No. KS-AG-06-334 dated September 21, 2006.

Two public hearings on the proposed permits have been scheduled in conformance with K.A.R. 28-16-61. The public hearing for Kevin M. Lueger has been scheduled for 5 p.m. Wednesday, December 6, at the Community Building, 1500 Community Drive, Seneca, and the public hearing for Dale Haverkamp will immediately follow.

Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. Sunflower Electric Power Corporation (Sunflower) has applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to construct three new 700-megawatt (MW) coal-fired steam generating units and associated ancillary equipment (Holcomb expansion) at its generating station located in Holcomb. Emission of particulate matter (PM), PM equal to or less than 10 microns in diameter (PM₁₀), volatile organic compounds (VOCs), oxides of nitrogen (NO_x), sulfur dioxide (SO₂), carbon monoxide (CO), elemental lead (Pb) and sulfuric acid mist (H₂SO₄) were evaluated during the permit review process.

The proposed permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, prevention of significant deterioration (PSD), which adopt the federal standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attainment areas are areas where the air quality meets or exceeds the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS).

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each pollutant for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to affect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the proposed Holcomb expansion project indicates that the emission rate of oxides of nitrogen, sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, particulate matter, volatile organic compounds, lead and sulfuric acid mist all exceed the significance levels. Sunflower conducted the required BACT analyses. The department has reviewed Sunflower's BACT analyses and concurs with its findings that low NO_x burners and overfire air with selective catalytic reduction is BACT for NO_x, dry flue gas desulfurization (dry FGD) is BACT for SO₂ and H₂SO₄ and fabric filters is BACT for Pb, PM and PM₁₀ for the Holcomb expansion project.

An ambient impact analysis was performed on the air emissions of PM₁₀, NO_x, SO_x and CO from the Holcomb expansion project. The analysis demonstrated no significant impact on ambient air quality for NO_x and CO. A more detailed analysis for SO_x indicated that the emissions would not contribute to any violation of ambient

air standards, and under worst case demonstrated that 49.8 percent of the Class II increment for SO₂ was consumed. Detailed analysis showed PM₁₀ values would not contribute to any violation of ambient air standards but were above the Class II increment for PM₁₀ (30 ug/m³, 24 hr). All of these receptors that indicated the exceedance were outside of the significant impact area for the Holcomb expansion project.

An analysis of visibility was conducted for the Great Sand Dunes National Monument, the closest federal Class I area at approximately 400 km to the west of the facility. The VISCREEN model results indicate no exceedances of the perceptibility or plume contrast either inside or outside of the Class I boundaries. Analysis of the Scott Lake Class II area, located approximately 80 km to the north, also was performed. Although some of the screening analyses were exceeded, no criteria have ever been established for a Class II area. No adverse impacts on soils and vegetation in the area were expected. Any federal land manager who has reason to believe they may have a Class I area adversely impacted by the emissions from the proposed project has the opportunity to present KDHE with a demonstration of the adverse impact on the air quality-related values of the federal Class I area during the comment period.

A public comment period has been established until 5 p.m. November 30 to allow citizens the opportunity to express any concerns they may have about this proposed permitting action. All comments should be submitted in writing to Rick Bolfing, KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, 66612-1366. Comments also may be presented at the public hearing.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a revision to a previously issued air quality construction permit. Frontier El Dorado Refining Company (FEDRC) applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to construct a crude expansion project at its refinery located in El Dorado. Emission of particulate matter (PM), PM equal to or less than 10 microns in diameter (PM₁₀), volatile organic compounds (VOCs), oxides of nitrogen (NOx), sulfur oxides (SOx) and carbon monoxide (CO) were evaluated during the permit review process. On September 15, 2006, KDHE issued the construction permit for the crude expansion project.

The revised permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, prevention of significant deterioration (PSD), which adopt the federal standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attainment areas are areas where the air quality meets or exceeds the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS).

The revisions proposed by FEDRC include installing a new crude heater with a slightly greater heater duty rather than rebuilding an existing crude heater as proposed in the original construction permit application. Less than significant increases will occur in emissions of particulate matter (PM), PM equal to or less than 10 microns in diameter (PM₁₀), volatile organic compounds (VOCs), oxides of nitrogen (NOx), sulfur oxides (SOx) and carbon monoxide (CO) as a result of the proposed revisions to the construction permit.

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each pollutant for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to affect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the proposed crude expansion project indicates that the emission rate of oxides of nitrogen, sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, particulate matter and volatile organic compounds all exceed the significance levels. FEDRC conducted the required BACT analyses. The department has reviewed FEDRC's BACT analyses and concurs with its findings that dry low NOx burners, good combustion practices, use of low sulfur refinery fuel gas and various good operating practices is the BACT for the revision to the crude expansion project.

A public comment period has been established until December 4 to allow citizens the opportunity to express any concerns they may have about this proposed permitting action. All comments should be submitted in writing to Dana S. Morris, KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, 66612-1366. Comments also may be presented at the public hearing.

Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Thursday, January 4, in the fourth floor training room of the Kansas Department of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in an existing plants and plant products rule and regulation.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, 4th Floor, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

A summary of the regulation and the economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 4-15-9. The KDA Plant Protection and Weed Control Program issues federal phyto-sanitary certificates when requested by businesses that export commodities from Kansas to foreign countries. Authority to issue these certificates is conveyed to the KDA via a Cooperative Agreement with the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service (USDA APHIS) Export Services branch. Importing countries prefer certificates issued by the states where local knowledge of pests is more accurate. Currently, the numbered blank certificates are issued by the USDA at no cost to the KDA. USDA APHIS is proposing to charge the states for each blank certificate. The purpose of this regulation is to have the authority to pass on the cost of acquiring the blank certificate from the USDA to the exporters requesting the certificate.

The financial impact of adopting this regulation is limited to passing through the fee established by the USDA for obtaining the certificates. Occasionally, phyto-sanitary certificates are required to send research materials from universities in Kansas to other countries. The vast majority of phyto-sanitary certificates are requested by companies exporting grain or grain products to other countries. USDA officials have estimated the cost of acquiring the certificates to begin at \$16 each and possibly reach \$32 in two years. Given this estimate, the cost to business would be between \$21,600 and \$43,200 per year.

Article 13.—INTERSTATE MOTOR FUEL USE TAX

92-13-9. Motor fuel permits and emergency authorization. (a) Both 24-hour and 72-hour motor fuel permits shall be issued on forms prescribed by the director. Any interstate motor fuel user may request not more than

three motor fuel permits for each commercial motor vehicle identification number (VIN) at the same time. Each interstate motor fuel user requesting a motor fuel permit shall submit the requested information and the applicable fee payment to a designee of the secretary of revenue at a motor carrier inspection station or at any other location where a designee of the secretary is located. Each requested motor fuel permit shall be issued or denied by the secretary's designee.

(b) Any interstate motor fuel user may operate a commercial motor vehicle in the state without a motor fuel permit by authorization of the director if the secretary of revenue determines that an emergency has arisen. The highway patrol, motor carrier inspectors, and other appropriate personnel shall be notified by the director of the emergency situation and the time frame for the emergency authorization. 129-5-1. Prior authorization. (a) Any medical service may be placed by the Kansas health policy authority on the published list of services requiring prior authorization or precertification for any of the following reasons:

- (1) To ensure that provision of the service is medically necessary;
- (2) to ensure that services that could be subject to over-use are monitored for appropriateness in each case; and
- (3) to ensure that services are delivered in a cost-effective manner.

(c) Failure to obtain prior authorization, if required, shall negate reimbursement for the service and any other service resulting from the unauthorized or noncertified treatment. The prior authorization shall affect reimbursement to all providers associated with the service.

(d) The only exceptions to prior authorization shall be the following:
 (1) Emergencies. If certain surgeries and procedures that require prior authorization are performed in an emergency situation, the request for authorization shall be made within two working days after the service is provided.
 (2) Situations in which services requiring prior authorization are provided and retroactive eligibility is later established. When an emergency occurs or when retroactive eligibility is established, prior authorization for that service shall be waived, and if medical necessity is documented, payment shall be made.
 (e) Services requiring prior authorization shall be considered covered services within the scope of the program unless the request for prior authorization is denied. 129-5-108. Scope of services for durable medical equipment, medical supplies, orthotics, and prosthetics.

(a) Selected durable medical equipment (DME) shall be available to each beneficiary, with the following limitations:
 (1) The DME shall be the most economical to meet the beneficiary's need.
 (2) The least expensive and most appropriate method of delivery shall be used. If round-trip delivery is over 100 miles, prior authorization shall be required.
 (3) Used equipment with a warranty specified by the agency shall be used if available.
 (4) Certain DME designated by the agency shall be the property of the agency.
 (5) Educational, environmental control, and convenience items shall not be covered.
 (6) DME shall be covered for only the following types of beneficiaries:
 (A) Participants in the Kan Be Healthy program;
 (B) beneficiaries who require the DME for life support;
 (C) beneficiaries who require the DME for employment;
 (D) beneficiaries who would require more expensive care if the DME was not provided; and
 (E) beneficiaries who are residing in adult care homes.
 (7) DME services provided for the parenteral administration of total nutritional replacements and intravenous medication in the beneficiary's home shall require the provision of services by a local home health agency, physician, advanced registered nurse practitioner, physician assistant, or pharmacist.

(b) Selected medical supplies shall be available to each beneficiary for use in the beneficiary's home.

(c) Selected DME and medical supplies shall be considered for coverage only in cases in which exceptional hardship or medical need has been justified by documentation of medical necessity or by the granting of prior authorization.

(d) Orthotics and prosthetics shall be available to program beneficiaries from orthotic and prosthetic dealers enrolled under K.A.R. 30-5-59. (Authorized by L. 2005, Ch. 187, § 45 and K.S.A. 2005 Supp. 75-7403; implementing L. 2005, Ch. 187, § 41 and K.S.A. 2005 Supp. 75-7405; effective Nov. 17, 2006.)
